

Treaty Acceptance Campaign Opens in Dublin

Crowds Assemble in Vast Numbers--- Cabal Against Lloyd George---All Eyes Focused on Fiume--- Exciting Week End in Belfast.

CAMPAIGN FOR TREATY OPENS.

DUBLIN, March 5. The crowds gathered to-day for the opening of the campaign for acceptance of the Anglo Irish treaty were not only because of their enthusiasm but also because of the high degree of interest which they evinced. Under a big umbrella the people stayed in place to hear all the speakers. With the exception of a minor flag incident in some women and girls, there was no disturbance. The Free State Tricolor perfectly maintained by the Republican police. The crowd jeered and whistled the women for the flag affair. Collins asserted that once the State was established the union of northeast Ulster was certain. He expressed determination to establish a police force notwithstanding the warnings of De Valera. It would be a political force to protect any man but would be for the protection of every citizen in Ireland. Arthur Higgins, who was suffering from influenza, pointed to British troops in Ireland as proof that Ireland had been betrayed.

BRITISH POLITICAL SITUATION UNCHANGED.

LONDON, March 5. According to an apparently inspired statement to-night the British political situation was unchanged. Lloyd George's offer to resign has been held in abeyance but not withdrawn. He is still awaiting assurances of the continued loyalty of Unionists to the Coalition Government. The Premier has pointed out that candidates are being chosen for a general election who openly disclaim his leadership yet receive approval of the Unionist members of the Government who are urging Lloyd George to resign. Coalition Liberals are almost as anxious that he should resign. They suggest there is little hope for the Coalition in a general election and many want to seek a union with Asquith Liberals under the leadership of Lloyd George.

SITUATION IN FIUME GRAVE.

ROME, March 5. The situation in Fiume is considered most grave. The Italian Government feels the delicacy of the situation in

which Premier Facta and Foreign Minister Schanzer have been placed, but is determined to respect loyalty to the treaty of Rapallo. The first object of the Cabinet is to restore order in Fiume and armed forces are being despatched for that purpose.

A WARNING TO CANADA.

NEW YORK, March 5. Arguing that a continuance of Government control of railway may affect Canada's borrowing powers, the Wall Street Journal deals with the railway question and the rumours that Canada will soon be in the market for a loan of \$400,000,000, of which \$100,000,000 is to be raised in New York. If the borrowing country has embarked on extravagant project, the lender may well hesitate, this paper says. Canada has not inflated her currency and exchange with United States is now nearly at par, but after deducting active assets of \$276,000,000 Canada's net debt is \$7,388,000,000, an enormous sum for a small population.

THE COAL MINERS' DISPUTE.

INDIANAPOLIS, March 5. The Opposition of the United Mine Workers to negotiation of single state wage agreements was regarded by union officials here to-day as leaving only a conference between the Union and Companies in the entire central competitive fields as a possibility for averting the threatened coal miners' strike in April. The International aspect of the situation was emphasized by messages from Calgary reporting that Western Canadian Coal Companies refused to negotiate new agreements except on their own basis.

NATIVE OF ST. JOHN'S DIES AT 104.

ZION, ILLS., March 5. Mrs. Della King, 104 years old, a native of St. John's Nfld., died here from influenza. More than forty years ago she was said to have contracted an incurable disease and was told she could only live a few months. She leaves nine children, seventeen grand children and fifteen great grand children.

A DEADLOCK.

CALGARY, ALBERTA, March 5. The Coal Companies in District 18, Western Canada, declare that unless the miners accept a wage reduction of 35 per cent. they will close the mines. The miners' representatives reply that if any reduction is attempted a general strike will be called.

PRINCE IN NORTHERN INDIA.

PESHAWAR, March 5. The Prince of Wales arrived here to-day after a delightful journey in the Hill country. He received a warm welcome. From here, the extreme northern point of the India tour, the Prince will motor up the Khyber Pass and inspect troops to-morrow.

LABOR LEADER SPEAKS.

OTTAWA, March 5. People who did not heed the mutterings of workers who are not satisfied with constitutional methods to secure a just place in the world were living in a fool's paradise, President Tom Moore of the Canadian Trades and Labor Congress, told the Canadian Club here last night. This did not apply only to European countries, but to North American countries, where masses of the workers were still waiting the attainment of those ideals outlined in the Versailles Treaty after the Great War when the hero the nation worshipped was the common man.

FIRING IN BELFAST.

BELFAST, March 15. Firing which took place during a greater portion of Saturday night continued to-day and as the evening advanced became incessant at some points. Only a few casualties were reported. The firing seemed to be more for intimidation than for destruction. Workshippers returning from morning service in Townsend Street Presbyterian Church were fired on. They scurried for shelter while the police hurried to the spot and engaged in a duel with the gunmen. There were no casualties, aside from the wounding of two men of a party of troops passing at the time. Owen Hughes was shot and killed, while riding in a York St. car Saturday night. A bomb was thrown into the home of John Press, Lanark Street, wounding one son and two daughters. Saturday night in York Street District, was one of the worst since last August. Attacks were made on three police patrols, in which one policeman was wounded. Woman shoppers wildly rushed to places of safety. After eleven o'clock the police brought a machine gun into play in the snipers' zone and many walls in Kent Street were pelted with bullets.

OPPOSITION TO TARIFF BILL.

WASHINGTON, March 5. Opponents of the United States tariff bill assail it on the ground that it is a measure to restrict trade with other countries, and even in some instances to prohibit it, and they maintain it is especially unwise because of the effect it will have in hampering trade with Canada. Strong opposition is certain to develop in the Senate when the Bill comes up.

Produce and Provisions.

(From Saturday's Trade Review.)

Codfish—The export this week was the lowest on record for a long time, and amounted to only 220 quintals from St. John's to Halifax by Sable I. from Messrs. Hickman and Baird. The Oporto consumption fell off from the previous week by about 2,000 quintals, but at 7.75 it is still a satisfactory normal average, being 1,000 quintals a day. The Newfoundland stocks on hand have been reduced to \$1,200, and there was never less in sight to back this up during the Lenten season. The price should improve, judging from all the surrounding circumstances.

Cod Oil—None went forward this week to either side of the Atlantic. The market is a little better in New York, and there is confidence that an improvement will set in very soon, as the fisheries in which this product is used are awaking under the influence of general business revival. The latest New York quotation is 44 cents per gallon in barrels. Dealers there are stocked up heavily, and their holdings will have to be cleared off before there is any considerable demand.

Cod Liver Oil—The market continues quiet with very slow demand. Whilst the price for new oil may improve a little, it is not expected that there will be a recurrence of any attractive prices the coming season. Attention of dealers is now centered on the new Norwegian output which will be coming forward soon. If their fishery is large this will be a prime factor in keeping the market down to about the present level for the coming season. A short fishery with them would, on the other hand, boom prices of refined oil.

Flour—Flour to-day in St. John's is sold considerably under what it would cost to sell new importations. Wheat advanced steadily during the week, and there are no circumstances that would make for a decline. The reported damage to the new winter wheat crop in the United States wheat belt is now a recognized certainty, as evidenced by the rush last week by dealers in buying so heavily in Chicago and Winnipeg at the advance of six to seven cents a bushel, and cash wheat at four to five cents. Spring fishery outfit flour here cannot be much under \$11.00. The present quotation is \$10.50 wholesale for leading brands and \$9.00 for under grades. Importations this week were 3,400 barrels.

Pork—The S.S. Canadian Sapper brought in 100 barrels and the Rosalind 105 barrels of Pork this week, making the total since New Year 3,556 barrels, as compared with 3,120 this date last year. The advance is firm and steady. Hogs have gone from \$6.50 per 100 lbs. in December to \$9.00, and barrelled Pork has moved up in about the same ratio. Mess Pork which was \$14 in the United States market at New Year, is now \$20 per barrel. The advance in other brands is not so striking. Stocks in Chicago are very short for this time of the year, and the export demand is fairly good. In the local market Mess is \$31, Fat Back \$29, Ham Butt \$32, Spare Hibs \$30, Family Mess \$45, and Boston Butt \$32 per barrel, wholesale.

Beef—By the last S.S. Bornholm from Boston and Halifax 767 barrels were imported, and the Rosalind \$12 barrels. Prices of barrelled beef continue comparatively cheap, notwithstanding the advance in pork, but dealers generally predict higher prices in the course of the spring. The British Government has decided to continue the embargo on Canadian cattle to prevent the further spread of disease, and this fact, no doubt, accounts in some degree for the continuance of last year's low prices. The local quotations are the same as quoted last week, viz. Bos. Plank \$26.00; Bos. Packet \$20.00; Family Special \$21.00, Boneless \$21.50 per barrel, wholesale.

Molasses—The Maritime Provinces have placed some orders at Barbados for new Molasses at 40 cents per wine gallon F.O.B. The market is firm at this price, which dealers on the island are endeavoring to keep up. The "Czarina" with a load of last year's molasses is expected to have her repairs effected by this time and ready to sail for St. John's. Three other Newfoundland vessels are there waiting cargoes of new crop which is now ready. The local price is still 80 cents per gallon for Fancy in the puncheon and 3 cents additional for tierces and five cents in barrels.

Sugar—The export demand has improved somewhat in the United States, and the market is firmer in consequence. One thing seems to us almost certain, and that is the prices cannot go any lower this season. The

quotation in the United States market at the close of February was as low as \$6.50 per 100 lbs. for White Granulated, but as the surplus Cuban old stock is being fast depleted, it is reasonable to look for an advance before long. As a matter of fact, the quotation in London increased six pence per cwt. for refined sugar last week. In the fact of all these facts, it is only right to say that there are to-day sugar experts who hold to the opinion that sugar will be lower in April and May. The St. John's quotation is still \$10.25 per 100 lbs. for American White Granulated, imports for the week amounted to 1,570 barrels.


Potatoes—There are fair quantities of imported potatoes being offered now at stronger prices, viz. \$4.50 to \$4.80 per sack of 130 lbs.—an increase of about one-dollar per barrel since January. Local stock was scarce on the market all the past month owing to the frosty weather, and we do not know at this price these will be offered. It is likely to be influenced by the price of imported and should be around \$4.00 per barrel. 300 barrels of Nova Scotian ware imported by the Mapledawn.

Feeds—The S.S. Bornholm brought in 500 sacks of oats, 1,200 sacks corn meal, 400 sacks corn, and 320 sacks feed last trip, while in addition to 1,457 sacks of oats by the S.S. Canadian Sapper and 822 sacks by the Mapledawn, also this week, gave a good supply to the market. The quotation for white oats is now \$4.00 per sack of 4-bushels wholesale; mixed \$3.90; Bran \$2.80 to \$3.00, Corn \$2.70 to \$2.80. The prices are likely to hold about these levels all the spring.

Hay—The hay situation is quite strong this week, and the local quotation wholesale at \$54 per ton. The supply was getting short when the S.S. Canadian Sapper arrived on Tuesday from Halifax with 1,777 bales, which was augmented by 1764 bales by the Mapledawn. We are approaching the time of year when Hay generally reaches its highest point, viz. the spring months, and dealers believe that the market will take on a further increase and keep a high level till next July.



The report is given in the city press that Mr. Morgan, who came here last summer to superintend the management of the Railway under a commission, is about to leave again to return to his work with the C.P.R. We cannot see that anything has been done to improve the management of the system, since Mr. Morgan has assumed control, except the expenditure of one million dollars of the money granted by the Government last year to help the company. This money has been mostly spent in ballasting parts of the road that should have been attended to in the ordinary course of keeping up the road. It is said that this sum had been spent on the road up to the end of last year. To all appearances, the system has been run in the same old way, the presence of Mr. Morgan and the generous loan from the people's chest having done but little in the way of improving the system generally. The railway has been a very expensive luxury to the Colony, and the people have to pay for it indirectly as well as directly.—Harbor Grace Standard.

Bell Island and Unemployment.

A MISUNDERSTANDING.
A meeting of the unemployed was held in the Town Hall, Hr. Grace, on the evening of Feb. 23. A large gathering was present and was addressed by the Hon. Dr. Barnes and Mr. F. C. Archibald, M.H.A., Rev. W. R. J. Higgett and others. Mr. Wm. Harris was Chairman and Mr. Harold Martin, Secretary of the meeting. Dr. Barnes made an offer to the men of four days' work a week on Bell Island at the rate of two dollars and ten cents a day, \$2.40 a week. To those who have horses and cannot go to the island, another proposition was made—that of cutting sleepers at the rate of 15 cents each.

These proposals seem to be as good as can be secured, and no doubt they will be accepted by those of our men who are in need and desire work. It was also stated at the meeting by Dr. Barnes that Detective O'Neil had exceeded his authority when he made the statement that \$9 a week was guaranteed by the Government.—Hr. Grace Standard.



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TELLING FORTUNES BY CARDS

(From the Sovereign Magazine)

THE CREOLE METHOD.
You will no doubt remember the fascinating story of how Josephine, the wife of Napoleon I. and Empress of France, had her fortune told when still a girl. She was a Creole—that is, a native of the West Indies and of French descent. Tradition tells us that she went to an old colored witch, who laid out the cards according to the Creole system and from them prophesied, "You will be greater than a queen." Josephine at first had faith in this prediction; but after waiting for a king to propose to her, she married a French soldier named Beauharnais, by whom she had two children. He died during the early part of the French Revolution. Napoleon, who at that time was a poor lieutenant, deeply in debt and without prospects, proposed to her. He did not seem likely to carry out the prophecy and raise her to be more than a queen; so she refused him. At last she was won over by his persistency and married him. In the course of years she became Empress of France.

Just what the Creole method of divination was has been forgotten for many years. The following system, however, has recently been declared by an old gray of Martinique to be the exact method used by the fortune-teller of Josephine. It will not be found in any other book. It will be interesting principally because it differs materially from all the methods given in other books on cartomancy. Begin by shuffling all the 52 cards thoroughly. The inquirer then cuts them and takes the pack in his left hand, first holding it on his forehead and saying, "Que le cressus parle!" which means, "Let the brain speak!"—then holding it over the heart, saying "Que le coeur decide!" or in English, "Let the heart decide!" The operator then takes the cards and spreads them fanwise before her on the table, with the backs up. The inquirer then draws out at random the mystic number of 9 cards, arranging as follows, face up:

The first is called the "Key Card," for it decides the interpretation to be put on the rest. If it is a Heart, it foretells the height of success; if a Diamond, it foretells wealth; if a Spade, it brings misfortune; if a Club, it denotes hard work. The next two cards decide the time in which the fortune will be determined. The low spots indicate a short space; the higher spots, a longer space of time. The court cards indicate a remote fortune, but a happy one. The next three cards indicate the rank or station to which Fortune will elevate the inquirer. If court cards, the Fates will be kind; if ordinary or low cards, the inquirer will have to be content with mediocrity. The Ace means disgrace or, at best, a very low station.

The next two cards denote the course of married life. If court cards, the marital relations will be happy; if low cards, there will be trouble and friction. The Ace means unhappiness at home. The last card is devoted to health. A court card means the best of health; the lower, more or less serious illness, according to the degree indicated by their spots. The Ace means an early death. The cards that were drawn by Josephine were (so we are informed):
King of Hearts.
Ten of Diamonds.
Nine of Diamonds.
Queen of Hearts.
Queen of Diamonds.
Queen of Clubs.
King of Clubs.
Ten of Hearts.

It will be seen that every card denotes the height of fortune—a combination that is rarely met with. After reading the mystic nine, the remaining cards are again shuffled and the inquirer draws out thirteen cards at random from the pack. These are arranged in the form of a cross, as shown in the diagram elsewhere.

Put the first card in the center and the remaining cards to left, right, top and bottom as indicated by the numbers. The reading of the cards is as follows:
Hearts denote love; Diamonds, wealth; Clubs, hard work; and Spades, misfortune.
Of the court cards, Kings are lucky for women inquirers and Queens for men; Knaves are lucky if real and unlucky if black.
The Ace is always a sign of coming evil.
The odd numbers are lucky for men and unlucky for women, and the even numbers are the reverse. A 2-spot means a gift; a 3-spot, a letter; a 4-spot, news; a 5-spot, an accident; a 6-spot, a change; a 7-spot, friendship; an 8-spot, assistance; a 9-spot, home conditions; a 10-spot, business conditions.

Let us suppose the cards just laid out in a cross are the following:
Knave of Hearts.
Ten of Clubs.
Ace of Spades.
Three of Diamonds King of Spades.
Eight of Hearts Six of Hearts.
Queen of Spades.
Ten of Hearts Four of Hearts.
Seven of Diamonds.
Knave of Spades.
Two of Clubs.

This we would read as follows, the inquirer being a lady:
The Knave of Hearts denotes lack in love; probably a suitor if the inquirer be unmarried, or a loving husband if the inquirer be married.
The Ten of Clubs indicates that business conditions will soon improve, for an even number is lucky for ladies. The Ace of Spades shows a very dark and pressing trouble that threatens. Three of Diamonds shows that money will be lost by a foolish transaction. Eight of Hearts shows that fortunate assistance will be at hand. Ten of Hearts means that through friendship the business conditions will have greatly improved. Six of Hearts indicates a change of residence.

The King of Spades means that a dark man will have a disagreeable effect upon the inquirer, and the Queen of Spades, the man's wife, will be instrumental in making things unpleasant. Be careful not to get into their bad graces.
The Four of Hearts indicates welcome news from a dear friend. The

seven of Diamonds shows that this friendship will bring gain of money as well. Knave of Spades means, "Beware of a treacherous man who is disposed to do you harm!" The Two of Clubs means an unexpected gift from a business man, or possibly a gain through hard luck. Other interpretations may be put on these cards according to the temperament of the fortune-teller.

A modification of this method is to draw 21 cards instead of 13. Arrange 12 of these in the form of a semicircle, and the other 9 in the form of a triangle within the circle. To discover the past, read the circle first from left to right. Then to predict the future, read the triangle beginning at the left-hand angle, going up to the apex, down on the right-hand side, and across the base.

CARD ORACLES.
Answering questions by means of cards is a popular pastime. If the inquirer wishes to know:

"When will my wedding be?" she draws four cards and lays them face up on the table. The spots must be counted to get the number of weeks. A Queen or King means a speedy marriage with prosperity. A Knave means a delay. An Ace signifies trouble and bids the inquirer consider well before taking the important step.

"Will my lover be true to me?" Lay the top 15 cards on the table face up. If the Ten, Nine or Eight of Hearts is among them, the chances are favorable. If the Ace of Spades is among them, the omen is bad. If the King of Hearts turns up, you can trust him for life.

"Have I cause for jealousy?" Count off the top cards. If the Ace of any suit is among them, beware, for there is someone he loves better than you!

"Shall we ever part?" Lay out 4 cards from the top in the form of a cross. Count the spots. If odd then you will never part; if even, be prepared for a short parting in the future. If an Ace is among them, the parting will be a long one. "Is it advisable for me to change my residence?" Lay 9 cards in a circle face up. If the middle card is a picture card, remain where you are. If a small card, the number of spots indicates how many months you should move.

If an Ace, it indicates the need of great care.

"What fortune is there in store for me?"

Take off 3 cards and lay them face up. If red cards, they foretell a good fortune; if black, trouble. If a King or Queen appears it means that influential friends will help. If a Knave, beware of an enemy. If an Ace, you will have a struggle to achieve success.

Hearts.

In days of youth, life's golden spring. When throbs of love begin; Then hearts are trumps, and fate will bring A hand that's sure to win.

Diamonds.

In summer-time of joyous life. When gifts of wealth expand; Then diamonds are trumps, and the happy wife Finds them a winning hand.

Clubs.

In the autumn days of life's decline, When friends are choice but few; Then clubs are trumps, and club-life fine Holds winning hands for you.

Spades.

When winter comes with hoary age, Then spades are trumps, my boy, The Sexton's spade will close life's page. With its sorrow and its joy.

Household Notes.

Use a large quantity of water when cooking cabbage or onions as they are improved as the flavor is lessened. For a change use pineapple juice to replace one-half amount of vinegar required in your French dressing.

If your cottage cheese is a bit too hard, add cream; if you wish to increase the quantity add the white of an egg. Fish omelet is an excellent dish for using a small amount of leftover fish.

To remove all fat globules from soup stock, the ones too small for skimming, lay as much tissue paper as possible on top of soup, then lift off quickly before paper becomes soft.

Serve with a border of hot, diced, buttered beets. Stuff the goose with a peanut stuffing (fine chopped peanuts are added to the breadcrumbs) and serve with a grapefruit sauce.

Cover a thin layer of dough with stewed raisins, thickened and sweetened. Roll like a jelly roll, and bake. Serve with lemon sauce.

To prevent your cake from sticking to the pan set pan directly on a cloth wrung out of hot water, as soon as you remove cake from oven.

Spray a little linseed oil over the linoleum, then wipe with your dust mop. If this is done the linoleum will not have to be washed so often.

Cook beets without removing the skins or breaking off the fine roots; in this way the flavor, juice and color are not withdrawn in cooking.

If your potatoes are very small scrub them thoroughly and boil without paring. Press through a potato ricer, and not a bit of potato will be wasted.

Add lye to your stove polish and a fine luster will result. If you add a little vinegar or a pinch of granulated sugar the polish will be more permanent.

When making chocolate or banana pie, sprinkle a little sugar over beaten whites of eggs before the goes into the oven. This will make it brown more quickly.
