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

BOSTON, Feb. 27.

A chemical discovery, said to be one of the most important of the 20th century, has been made at Fixed Nitrogen Research Laboratory at Washington, Prof. Arthur B. Lamb, of Harvard, announced last night. The discovery is that of a new catalyst which will bring about the permanent union of Hydrogen and Nitrogen atoms, and will yield 14 per cent. of ammonia, he said. According to the announcement two great benefits will be derived from the new product. The United States, it is claimed, will have at its command an explosive twice as effective as that discovered by the Germans a few months before the start of the world war. The American farmer will also have a fertilizer much cheaper and more effective than heretofore available
