1. No person shall sell, or offer or expose for sale within the District of St. John's, any milk or cream without having first obtained a licfrom the Medical ense Health Officer.

2. All licenses shall be for the period of one year, commencing on the first day of June in cach year. Licenses shall be granted free of charge.

Any person selling milk or ream without a license is liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars, or in default of payment, to imprisonment for a period not exceeding thirty days.

(a) Public Works Department-Accounts due must be presented, duly certified, at the Department before noon on Mondays and Thursdays, payment being made on the following Wednesdays and Saturdays.

(b) Agriculture and Mines Department-Every day but Monday, on which day accounts are

(c) Marine and Fisheries Department-Tuesday and Friday.

(d) Postal Telegraph Department-Tuesday and In the event of any of these days being

a holiday, payments will be made on the following day. All bills, duly certified, payable by the above Departments (b.c.d.) should be rendered not later than the morning of the day preceding pay day.

(2) All cheques, drafts and other documents, representing money, in payment of Fees or Dues of any kind whatsoever to any Government Department must be made out in the name of the Department and not in that of any individual official thereof.

(3) The several Public Departments and their subsidary offices in the Outports have been directed to refuse to accept, in payment of amounts due the Government, any cheques which are not properly endorsed and stamped and which have not been certified by the Bank on which they are drawn, or the paying Bank in the case of cheques drawn outside of Newfoundland.

(4) In view of the lack of general compliance with the law in respect of stamping receipts as provided for by the Stamp Act (Consolidated Statutes 3rd Series Cap. 28), the attention of the Public is drawn to the following provisions thereof, viz:

> "Receipts for any sum of money exceed-"ing ten dollars (\$10.00) shall be stamp-'ed with adhesive or impressed stamp "of the value of two cents. "An instrument shall not be duly "stamped unless the stamp affixed thereto

"is cancelled." The Public is warned that no receipt is valid unless these provisions are complied with.



Dr. Sambon's Germ Theory-Medical

parasitologist, makes remarkable claims, which will arouse much interest, in his "foreword" to a book published recently, and reviewed below, dealing with cancer and with parasite disease: (2) the control of cancer is within our reach.

These claims are not widely ad mitted in the medical profession. On the contrary it is maintained that this theory of the origin of cancer as being due to a parasite is not new, but is based on the researches of the Danish biologist Fibiger, who ten years ago published the results of experiments which suggested that cancer in rats is caused by a parasite which infests cockroaches.

Fibiger's views may have some basis of fact, but they are not yet generally accepted. They are still subject to test and examination, and may be proved or disproved.

PESTS THAT NURSE THE GERM. New Cancer Facts. D. Masters. Foreword by Sir James Cantlie.

This book is written in a clear and interesting style. It does not reject irritation as a factor in cancer, but

that parasites play their part in the disease, and that the germs may be one of those minute organisms that remain invisible under a micrscope and even pass through

After describing Dr. Sambon's work in tracing other diseases to parasites Mr. Masters states:

He knew that the best place inwhich to study a disease was where it occurred, so he determined to examine the homes of people who were dying of cancer, the condi-tions in which they lived, their surroundings, anything and everything, in fact, which might shed a little light on the disease.

He investigated certain places in the Italian Romagna and in Iceland, where cancer is peculiarly prevalent, and where there was cancer found in profusion signs of

rats, mice, blackbeetles, cellar beetles, meal-worms, meal-moths, and meal-mites. . . Wherand meal-mites. . . . ever the trail of cancer was most marked, there were the pests. . . There were some distinct links—tiny parasitic worms that begin life in either the cockroach, the meal-worm, or the cellar beetle and ma-

ture in rats and mice. More, in the one district of Leland which is free from cancer, Dr. Sambon found that

no rats, mice, or cockroaches have ever been seen. The lava and turf built cottages were free of these household pests.



DR. SAMBON ON HIS WORK.

Dr. Sambon's own view is interestmg and important. He refused to liscuss his work further beyond pointing out that he made no claim to the discovery of the cause of cancer, nor did he asesrt that blackbeetles and rats were the sole contributory tauses. His theory was that cancer, was probably caused by a parasite which only became active when the human flesh was prepared for its activities by another agency, a worm which lives in rats, mice, cockroaches, and the like, and is transferred to auman beings by the contamination of food. In the human being it sets ip conditions necessary for the activty of the cancer parasite.—Daily




