# Assassination of Mr. McGee.

More Evidence against Whelan
The last news from Ottawa on Saturday
is that further evidence against Whelan
has been discovered by Detective Cullen.
He found out that the house adjoining
McKenna's (nearly opposite Mrs. Trotter's) has been for a long time unoccupied,
that the doors have been left lying open;
and that in the back door steps two tracks
and two only could be traced. They were
those of a man who entered and left the
house by that way. Both boot marks corresponded precisely on being measured
carefully, and Whelan's boots having
been procured from the gaol were found
to fit exactly in the bootmarks in the snow
When asked for his boots this morning,
Whelan sighed and was evidently upset,
but said these were not the boots he wore
on the night of McGee's murder. If
Whelan committed this murder, and of

least doubt, then his sudden disappearance immediately after would be readily
accounted for. He could pass through
the untenanted building directly on to

BY ATLANTIC CABLE.

Paris, April 11—The new army bill and other extraordinary war measures create great uneasiness throughout the country, and there is much murmuring and discontent, especially in the rural districts. The press are endeavoring to allay the excitement by saying the preparations are the best guarantee of peace.

Paris, Sunday, April 12—The Moniteur publishes an official report to the Emperor by Minister Pinard, in which an account is given of the military changes which have been made since the bill for the reorganization of the army has gone into operation, and of the effect which they have had upon the country. The minister states that all the reforms introduced in the Guarde Mobile in accordance with the provisions of that bill are now completed, and he asserts that these changes have been received with popular applause almost everywhere throughout the empire. He contradicts the reports of dissatisfaction and declares that the new army law is sustained and defended by the patriotism of the French people, who thus give a new proof of their confidence in the Emperor.

Southampton, April 12, evening.—The steamship Union, from New York, 2nd inst., arrived about four o'clock p. m., and after transferring London passengers and mails, salled for Bremen.

But even if the act were applicable to Secretary Stanton's case, he held that the mere act of removal did not constitute a high crime or misdemeanor, unless it could be shewn that it was wilfully and maliciously done. The accusation was that the President knew Secretary Stanton's case to come within the scope of the law, but there was no proof of it. On the contrary, the proof was all the other way. As a legal argument his speech has received high praise. The Court will now examine witnesses for the defence.
