

Freight Arrangements.

The Mail the other day published the following from its Hamilton correspondent:—

"According to the new arrangement between the Grand Trunk and the Great Westra freight from the Wellington, Grey and Bruce line, going east by Canadian routes, will take the Grand Trunk at Guelph, and will not come to Hamilton at all. The square timber now lying along the Southern Extension to Kincardine, for instance, will be brought to the water at Toronto instead of at Hamilton. Grand Trunk freight through Toronto and Paris, or Paris alone, and going round by Caledonia, will at Toronto or Paris take the short cut by the Great Western. It appears to be intended that at all competing points freight is to take the route offering the shortest mileage in each particular case, and that the practice of either road carrying by round-about routes to compete with the other, is to be discontinued."

The Hamilton Times authoritatively denies the assertions made in this paragraph, and states that the story is a pure fabrication. No such arrangement as that indicated has been made.

The Dawson Route.

The Globe states that it has received the most positive assurances that the difficulties connected with the Dawson Route are at an end; that it is now well supplied with the necessary means of forwarding passengers and freight, and that all is working smoothly. The contractors state, in answer to inquiries, our contemporary says, that they have now over hundred and thirty vehicles employed between Fort Garry and the North-west Angle, and over 80 teams and wagons on the Shebandowan and Thunder Bay section, with an average of sixteen teams on the portages. A number of incompetent and uncivil employees have, it is said, been dismissed—a fact that gives colour to some of the complaints that were so loudly made—and an efficient staff has, it is asserted, been engaged.

THE FEDERAL BANK.—The first meeting of the shareholders of this new banking institution was held in Toronto on Thursday. The following Board of Directors was appointed: Messrs. Samuel Nordheimer, William Alexander, Benjamin Lyman, E. Gurney, jr., George W. Torrance, John S. Playfair, and William Galbraith. The Board subsequently met and elected S. Nordheimer, Esq., President, and W. Alexander, Esq., Vice-President, and appointed H. S. Strathy, Esq., Cashier; Messrs. Crooks, Kingsmill & Cattanaock, Solicitors. The Bank will occupy the premises lately bought on its behalf from the Edinburgh Life Assurance Company, Wellington street, which have been very much enlarged and improved, the counting-room being one of the handsomest in the city.

PRINCE EDWARD COUNTY is to be next afflicted by the presence of Messrs. Rykert, Lauder and Cameron, who will picnic at the Sand Banks in the course of a few weeks. Fortunately there is a Striker in that County who is able to avert any ill consequences that might result from the epidemic.

Donations to Firemen.

The Toronto Nation says:—A recent occurrence in a western city gives us the opportunity of calling attention to the apparently growing practice of presenting donations to firemen for their exertions in saving property from destruction. The impulse that prompts a man, whose house or whose store has been threatened during the night with imminent peril, or rescued from total destruction, to sit down in the morning and enclose a cheque to the Chief of the Fire Department, is a natural one; but it is liberality which we venture to think should be discouraged. In some places the firemen are regularly paid; in others, they are volunteers who are indirectly paid by exemptions from taxation; in others, the position is a purely honorary one. But from whatever motive the service is adopted, there is a tacit and implied, if not a definite agreement made, that firemen shall devote their best energies to the extinction of fires in all cases. It is a duty for them to do so, and it is universally a matter of pride with them to fulfil that duty to the uttermost. But if the present custom of giving donations is allowed to spread, the effect will be long felt upon the principles and morals of our Fire Departments. A different motive for exertion will be substituted for the present one. The firemen will soon come to look upon a fire not as a thing to be extinguished everywhere with indiscriminating zeal, but prospective donations will keep the wall of a rich generous merchant wet and safe, *vel non proximus ardet Ucalegon*, if Ucalegon be poor or have a reputation for stinginess. The evil at present is probably only prospective; but the bad effects of largesses are quickly spread and rapidly felt.

PAINFUL ACCIDENT.—On Thursday 23rd inst., a little boy son of Mr. Henry Giller, who resides near Berlin, met with a painful accident. It appears that the little one and several other children were playing on a bench which was by some means upset and the child fell off in such a way that the falling bench struck its right arm midway between the elbow and wrist, breaking both bones and lacerating the flesh. Dr. Bowly was promptly in attendance, and at latest accounts the child was progressing favourably.

The "French Country" in Canada. Speaking of the French settlers in the Province of Quebec, and their mode of living, Harper's Magazine says:—

"The poor soil is exhausted, and the whole French Country is overstocked with wretched and shiftless habitants. Thousands of them travel many miles to help the Vermont farmers, or to work in the brick-yards of New England. The summer over, they return with almost the only money they ever see, and which is too often all exhausted before they reach home. Their cabins are of squared logs, the chimneys filled with mortar; the gables are of sawed boards, and the roofs are of tin or wood. The open summer kitchen is exposed to every storm. Close by the adjoining corn-crib, and making a ladder for the rats, stands the ponderous cart, with wooden axles and double springs of the same material. Within call is the small-bodied but large-limbed "French horse," originally from Normandy, and as his master drives him he will first deal a blow, and then you will hear, "Avant! Ah! pauvre cheval! vous avez un bon maitre!" The shaggy brown and white dog, unlike any other of his species, also appears. It is well that these animals can subsist on little, and that little of the coarsest kind, for their masters have nothing more or better to give them. Besides onions and potatoes, peas form the chief diet; and so common is this staple that "pea-soup" is used derisively as an adjective or a noun. Poultry and salt pork are the more substantial dishes, and the only one on the bill of fare. Ye, they have one luxury—the *boudin*, or "blood-pudding," as the English call it. A fine pig is selected, the throat cut, and the blood allowed to drip into a pan; an old woman adds flour and other things, as experience suggests, and stirs the whole until it becomes cold. This delightful compound is then baked, and those who have eaten of it say that it is excellent.

Tobacco is not a luxury but a necessity with these people. After raising and curing it they twist it into rolls like a Bologna sausage, and smoke the strong and filthy stuff in short clay pipes. In person the habitants are small, and have the regular features of the French. If any beard is worn, they very thinly cover the face. Upon their heads are hats with narrow brims or caps without visors. Their clothing is of coarse woolen stuff, called "French gray." In cold weather several pairs of stockings cover their feet, which are then thrust into moccasins, or immense boots without heels, secured by a strap over the instep. For merely wet weather, or for standing on the ice, wooden shoes (*sabots*) are used. In personal habits cleanliness seems to be unknown. Small-pox prevails to an alarming extent. The language they speak does not arise to the dignity of a *patois*. Even when French is spoken entirely, it has the English construction and idioms. They are poor, but seem to be happy, especially in the enjoyment of their numerous holidays, the number of which they ever strive to increase. On saints' days, processions are formed, and all lookers-on are expected to uncover the head and kneel as they pass with banners and images."
