#### NOT YET ANNEXED

The doctrine so earnestly preached by the Conervatives in September last, which may be sumned up in the statement that if you purchase goods for your household at a corner store run by an Italian you will develop an olive complexion, a taste for garlic and a desire to take part in the Italo-Turkish war, is brought into disrepute by the figures given in the government report of Canada's trade, just issued.

The figures in the report show that during the fiscal year our trade with the United States creased by eighty millions, or twenty-eight per cent. of the figures for the previous year. During he same period our trade with Great Britain has ncreased only seven per cent.

If the doctrine of the opponents of reciprocity were sound, a steady alienation of our loyalty from he British Empire and a growing attachment to United States should have been observable oughout the year, culminating about this time in e annexation of Canada by Uncle Sam. It might suggested that the necessary formalities have delayed only by the interest of Uncle Sam in presidential nominations, but for the fact that the most sensitive observer fails to detect any marked lessening of the love of the Canadian peoe for the Union Jack.

The feverish persistence with which the Convative press is assuring its readers that reciocity is dead is in itself the best possible eviace of the liveliness of that issue. 
