In a few years we hope to see this rivalling the Grand Banks of Newfoundland. Hundreds of crafts will fill the waters and a hive of industry be opened up that will prove a genuine spur to everybody. It has been amply demonstrated that the fishery is not for the few, it is for the many. It is not a mere chance that the fish are there; they will be there as long as man lives, and it is not one thing to begin the work of bringing them to market? Who will be the pioneer in this new field of labor?
