DROWNED IN THE BAY. The Sad Fate of a Young Toronto Post-Office

Three young post-office clerks named Wm. E. Bennett, Geo. Thomas and Geo. Wright, were out on the bay yesterday afternoon enjoying a sail. The boat upset Thomas swam ashore, Bennett clung to the boat, and Wright was drowned.

The young men left Clindenning's boat-house about half-past three for a sail. Thomas and Bennett changed their clothes before starting, and were barefooted, but Wright went out in ordinary attire. Thomas and Wright immediately struck out for shore, but Bennett clung to the boat. Thomas reached the island in an exhausted condition, but Wright, who was impeded by his boots, sank to rise no more. 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
