Among the favorite efforts of inventors here are enormous numbers of methods for ransmitting power artificially created; but turned toward a utilization of these forces. The regular rise and fall of the tides offer an enticing opportunity to inventive talent, and it is probable that ere long the tides will be harnessed to the looms and wheels of productive machinery. There have long been successful methods of getting power from the tide in a limited and unsatisfactor way, noticeably grist mills run by the tide in places along the Long Island coast where it runs with a swift current, like mill stream. A peculiar form of turbine is here employed, and it does the work intrusted to it with regularity and precision. Of course, this arrangement is motion-less at slack water, and even for some time before and after it, and there is no storage of force to operate the machine during the periods of enforced idlene consequently it cannot be regarded as a satisfactory solution of the problem, "How can the tide be made useful?"

Another method admits the water to an inclosed dock at high tide and then uses it as a waterfall while the tide is running out. Within its avery heavy air, thell, capable of taking is a very heavy air bell, capable of taking air in whenever the bell is lifted and driving it out by its own weight into a reservoir on shore as it descends. By means of a float of great weight the bell is lifted when the waves fall to lift the float, and as the bell rises air enters through switable valves.
When a wave lifts the float the bell descends by its own weight, fercing the air into the shore receptacles. There are some mechanical difficulties in the way of changing wave and tide motion to power that can be utilized, but there is little doubt that ere long they will be whelly overcome.
