A DRILL SHED HITCH.

Another Expensive Arbitration Loomin Into View. The drill shed difficulties are not ended yet. The Dominion authorities are desirous of closing up Centre-street along the line of the expropriation, but opposition is expected from the property-owners on that thorough-fare north of the site. 




