SOME VALUABLE AND PRACTICAL SUGGESTIONS FOR CITIZENS.

Keep Through Train On the Esplanade—Wall of Two Feet Tracks for Passengers—Trolley Overhead Bridge—How to Improve the Water Front—The Viaduct Scheme Again Recommended.

Mr. George A. Chapman, a well-known member of the Board of Trade, has drawn up a memorandum on the Esplanade question that is of a very practical character. The World gives a space to some of the leading sentences:

Negotiations have been carried on for the past three or four years to induce the two railway companies to erect a joint elevator in the central part of the water front of the city to receive grain and produce for the consumption and to do away entirely with the track deliveries of these products.

An additional relief would be speedily obtained by the Grand Trunk running a spur line from some point or west of the Esplanade to tap the tracks of the Don and obtaining from the latter railway running power to run a trolley car over the tracks of the Grand Trunk.

There are two ways of accomplishing the first object either by erecting a trolley car on the Esplanade or by carrying it over the tracks without going into the water front. The advantages to be gained are so great that the railway companies should be urged to add it to their list of projects.

MURDER IN A LAMBER CAMP—An Indian Girl in the Story.

ASHLAND, Wis., March 11.—A ruddy, constructed pine box stood in the baggage car of an east-bound express, larger at one end than the other and about 6 feet long. It was plainly enough an improvised coffin. It bore the following inscription:

HENRY GUELPH, Otterville, Canada. On the coffin was seated a tall man, gaunt and gloomy, who told me the remains came from a lumber camp near Sable Lake, and added that he was his youngest brother, only 20 years old, who had last left home to go to the lumber woods. It had been shown to him in the back at night by an unknown person. The shooting was done an hour when everyone else in the camp was asleep, and the howling of a blizzard through the trees prevented the sound of the rifle shot from awakening the man. The boy fell from the lumber woods. He died in the morning only his hot heels were visible. The man said he had suspicions as to the murderer and there was a Chipewyan Indian girl in the story.
