NOT A KNAVE, BUT A CLOWN.

Police Constable Charles Givens, who is the only one of his kind in the city, is a clown.

The story Police Constable John A. Charlton told the Magistrate yesterday with respect to the Craigmile legacy is true.

He is not the knave that the Craigmile claim him to be, but he is shown to have been guilty of a heartless piece of deception and of having perpetrated the most dishonest piece of "detective" work.

The charge against Charlton was that he falsely represented himself to be Philip Verham of Toronto and that he claimed to be executor of the estate of Alexander Craigmile, who was reported to have died in Ramsgate, New South Wales, in 1892, leaving an estate valued at \$250,000 for distribution among his heirs.

Here is the statement Mr. Murdoch made on behalf of the defendant to admit the writing of the letters under these circumstances. A man named Birney, who had been a friend of Craigmile, had written to Charlton, who had a request from Mrs. Thomas Craigmile to induce Charlton to distribute the Craigmile legacy.

The Magistrate: Were they written by Charlton himself?

Mr. Murdoch: He wrote them himself. The Magistrate: Then he disguised his hand?

Mr. Murdoch: Perhaps he did. It is only what any amateur detective might be expected to do.

The Magistrate: It was a cruel scheme to deliberately tell the relatives of Alexander Craigmile that he was dead, and must have caused great disappointment to the relatives to find out that the legacy is only a myth.

Charlton's confession that he wrote the letters under a fictitious name, that he did not know whether Craigmile was alive or dead, and that he knew of no will was strongly criticised by the Magistrate.

The case was remanded for a week with a view of seeing if Charlton can furnish corroboration of his story.

Meantime the Magistrate has advised Charlton to pay James Craigmile his expenses, as it was through Charlton's folly that he came here.

After Charlton has paid his lawyer and his dupe he will probably come to the conclusion that he is not out for a detective.

ANOTHER BREAK IN WHEAT.

THE SENTIMENT IS VERY BEARISH IN WALL-STREET.

Canada Stocks Quiet and Irregular—Advance in Sterling Exchange—Bears On Fork Driven To Cover—Cotton Closed Strong—Oil Dull.

Wednesday Evening, Jan. 10. The edge is off stocks today.

Money is easier in London at 1 1/4 per cent. on call and account. Consols steady, closing at 94 1/2 for money.

There is another decrease in the gold holdings of the United States Treasury, the amount now being only \$75,615,000.

Silver bullion in London is firm at 21 1/2 per ounce, and in New York at 69c.

The Imperial Bank of Germany has reduced its discount rate from 5 to 4 per cent.

It is expected by many banks that the Bank of England will tomorrow reduce its rate to 3 1/2 per cent.

Canadian Pacific closed 1/4 1/4 easier in London at 7 1/2.

The earnings of the Canadian Pacific for the week ended Jan. 7 were \$27,000, a decrease of \$2,000 as compared with the same week of last year.
