A Fatherly Man.
A RECORD WHICH HAS RARELY, IF EVER, BEEN EXCEEDED.

Were it not part of the records of the Bucks county courts we could hardly credit the fiction of John Heffer, who was accidentally killed some years ago at the age of 68. He was married first in 1840. In eight years his wife bore him seventeen children. The first and second years of their marriage she gave birth to twins. For four successive years afterward she gave birth to triplets. In the seventh year she gave birth to one child and died soon afterward. Heffer engaged a young woman to look after his large brood of babies, and three months later she became the second Mrs. Heffer. She presented her husband with two children in the first two years of her wedded life. Five years later she had added ten more to the family, having twins five times. Then for three years she added but one a year. At the time of the death of the second wife twelve of the thirty-one children had died. The twenty that were left did not appear to be any obtainable to a young widow like a slave to keep a score of mouths in bread. The third Mrs. Heffer became the mother of nine children in ten years, and the couple's treatment and happiness of the couple were proverbial. One day in the fall of 1885 the father of the forty-one children was creating a railroad track and was run down by a locomotive and instantly killed. His widow and twenty-four of the forty-two children are still living.

The deepest spot yet sounded in the northern coast of Japan, where a depth of 4,655 fathoms was found by the United States ship Thetis. This is equal to 27,500 feet. The highest peak in Asia, which reaches a height of 28,000 feet—a difference from the greatest depth of only 70 feet.
