In the year 1861 there will be four Eclipses : three of the Sun and one of the Moon ; and a transit of Mercury over the Sun's disc.

I. An annular Eclipse of the Sun, Jan. 10th, 1861 ; invisible in Nova Scotia.

II. An annular Eclipse of the Sun, July 7, 1861 ; invisible in Nova Scotia.

III. A partial Eclipse of the Moon, Dec. 17th, 1861 ; visible at Halifax as follows :

Moon enters Penumbra.....	1h. 31m. morning.
Moon enters Shadow.....	3 13 "
Greatest Eclipse.....	4 4 "
Moon leaves Shadow.....	4 55 "
Moon leaves Penumbra.....	6 37 "

IV. A total Eclipse of the Sun, Dec. 31st, 1861 ; visible as a partial one on the Eastern coast of this continent. Commencing at Halifax at 8h. 3m., and ending at 9h. 53m., morning.

A Transit of Mercury, Nov. 11th, 1861 ; invisible in Nova Scotia.

MORNING & EVENING STARS.

Venus will be a Morning Star till May 15th, then an Evening Star till the end of the year.

Mars will be an Evening Star till August 28th, then a Morning Star till the end of the year.

Jupiter will be an Evening Star till August 30th, then a Morning Star till the end of the year.

Saturn will be an Evening Star till Sept. 5th, then a Morning Star till the end of the year.

SIGNS.

The following signs are used in our Almanack to denote the different positions and phases of the Moon. ☽ denotes the Moon in the first quadrature—that is, the quadrature between change and full. ☾ denotes the Moon in the last quadrature—that is the quadrature between full and change. ● denotes New Moon. ○ denotes Full Moon.

HALIFAX.

Latitude, North, 44° 39' 20"
Longitude, West, 63° 36' 40" in time 4h. 14m. 26-7s.

NOTE.—It is to be observed that throughout the Calendar pages the Computations are in *Mean Time*, with the exception of the rising and setting of the Sun. Also that the Sun and Moon's declinations are given for the Meridian of Greenwich.

THE TIDES.

By the action of the sun and moon, especially the latter, the waters of the large oceans of the earth are drawn in the directions of these bodies, so as to rise and fall according to their position in relation to them. These regular movements are called **THE TIDES**.

The movement of the waters in the tides chiefly follows the course of the moon. The lunar day, or interval from the moon being on the meridian of any place, till she is again on that meridian, is 24 hours 50 minutes, in consequence of the rapid motion of the moon through the sky. Hence the phenomena of the tides take place in this period. There are two **HIGH-WATERS** or **FLOODS** at the same time, one on the meridian next the moon, the other on the opposite meridian; and at every place there are two high-tides in the lunar day, at an interval of about 12 hours 25 minutes. The tides are the highest when the sun and moon are in conjunction or opposition—then called *spring-tides*; lowest when the moon is in her quarters—then called *neap-tides*. The tides are affected by the moon's distance, the sun's distance and elevation, and by local causes.

The tide on the side of the earth next the moon is caused by the direct action of the moon, in drawing towards her the waters there. But the moon also acts on the mass of the earth, as well as the waters under her; hence she, in a manner, gives the earth a tendency *from* the water on the farther side of the earth, which produces a high tide on that side also.

To CLEAN CALICO FURNITURE.—Shake off the loose dust; then lightly brush with a small, long-haired furniture-brush; after which wipe it closely with clean flannels, and rub it with dry bread.

If properly done, the curtains will look nearly as well as at first; and if the color be not light, they will not require washing for years.

Fold in large parcels, and put carefully by.

While the furniture remains up, it should be preserved from the sun and air as much as possible, which injure delicate colors; and the dust may be blown off with bellows.

THE FARMER'S FRIEND.

TO MAKE HENS LAY PERPETUALLY.—Hens will lay perpetually if treated in the following manner:—Keep no roosters (cocks): give the hens fresh meat, chopped up like sausage meat, once a day; a very small portion, say half an ounce a day to each hen, during the winter, or from the time insects disappear in the fall till they appear again in the spring. Never allow an egg to remain in the nest for what are called "nest eggs." When the roosters do not run with the hens, and no nest eggs are left in the nest, the hens will not cease laying after the production of twelve or fifteen eggs, as they always do when roosters and nest eggs are allowed; but continue laying perpetually. The only reason why hens do not lay in winter as freely as in summer, is the want of animal food, which they get in summer in abundance, in the form of insects.

MAKING BEDS.—Close or press bedsteads are ill adapted for young persons or invalids; when their use is unavoidable, the bed-clothes should be displaced every morning, and left for a short time before they are shut up. The windows of bed-rooms should be kept open for some hours every day, to carry off the effluvia from the bed-clothes; the bed should also be shaken up, and the clothes spread about, in which state the longer they remain, the better. The bed being made, the clothes should not be tucked in at the sides or foot, as that prevents any further purification taking place, by the cool air passing through them.

A warming pan should be chosen with holes in the lid. About a yard of moderately-sized iron chain, made red-hot and put into the pan, is a simple and excellent substitute for coals.

EXCELLENT METHOD OF REARING CALVES.—Put some water on the fire, nearly the quantity that the calf can drink. When it boils, throw into it one or two handfuls of oatmeal, and suffer the whole to boil for a minute. Then suffer it to cool until new-milk-warm. Then mix with it one or two quarts of milk that has stood twelve hours, and has been skimmed: stir the whole and give it to the calf to drink. At first it is necessary to make the calf drink, by presenting the finger to it, but it soon learns to do so without this help, and will grow incomparably fatter than by the old method.

The economical advantages resulting from it are as follows:—According to the old method, the calf intended for slaughter is made to suck for three weeks, and those intended for agriculture, from six to eight weeks. Suppose the cow gives only a moderate quantity of milk, the value of it will amount, in three weeks, to nearly the value of the calf. If, on the contrary, we rear a calf according to this method, we consume during the three weeks only three quarts of oatmeal.

To PROTECT GRAIN FROM RATS.—An individual of much practical experience informs us that green "ELDER," deposited in and about the mows of hay and grain, will prove an effectual preventive against the depredations of mice and rats. These animals are frequently very destructive in their ravages; and if a remedy so simple and easy of attainment is efficacious, it deserves to be known and remembered by all. We have long known that the stalks and leaves of the common mullein will drive rats from their haunts. There is something in the odour of this plant that is as disgusting to their ratships as was the leek to ancient Pistol—they "cannot abide it."

To CURE WOUNDS IN TREES.—Wounds in trees are best cured by covering them with a coat of common lead paint without turpentine (for turpentine is poison to vegetation) in the sun, on a fine dry day.

To CLEAN PAINT.—Never use a cloth, but take off the dust with a little long-haired brush, after blowing off the loose parts with the bellows. With care paint will look well for a long time, if guarded from the influence of the sun. When soiled, dip a sponge or a bit of flannel into soda and water, wash it off quickly, and dry immediately, or the soda will eat off the color.

When the wainscot requires scouring, it should be done from the top downwards and the water be prevented from running on the unclean parts as much as possible, or marks will be made which will appear after the whole is finished. One person should dry with old linen as fast as the other has scoured off the dirt, and washed off the soap.

THE USE OF SULPHUR IN DESTROYING INSECTS ON PLANTS, AND ITS BENEFIT FOR VEGETATION.—Tie up some flower of sulphur in a piece of muslin or fine linen, and with this the leaves of young shoots of plants should be dusted; or it may be thrown on them by means of a common swawn's-down puff, or even by a dredging-box.

Fresh assurances have repeatedly been received of the powerful influence of sulphur against the whole tribe of insects and worms which infest and prey on vegetables. Sulphur has also been found to promote the health of plants, on which it was sprinkled; and that peach-trees, in particular, were remarkably improved by it, and seemed to absorb it. It has likewise been observed, that the verdure, and other healthful appearances, were perceptibly increased; for the quantity of new shoots and leaves formed subsequently to the operation, and having no sulphur on their surface, served as a kind of comparative index, and pointed out distinctly the accumulation of health.

TO TAKE STAINS OUT OF MARBLE—Mix unslacked lime in finest powder with stringent soap-ley, pretty thick, and instantly with a painter's brush lay it on the whole of the marble. In two months' time wash it off perfectly clean; then have ready a fine thick lather of soft soap, boiled in soft water; dip a brush in it, and scour the marble. This will, with very good rubbing, give a beautiful polish.

TO TAKE IRON-STAINS OUT OF MARBLE.—An equal quantity of fresh spirit of vitrol and lemon-juice being mixed in a bottle, shake it well; wet the spots, and in a few minutes rub with soft linoon till they disappear.



TO CURE THE DISEASE IN APPLE-TREES.—Brush off the white down, clear off the red stain underneath it, and anoint the places infected with a liquid mixture of train oil and Scotch snuff.

BAD EFFECTS OF IRON NAILS ON FRUIT TREES.—It often happens that some of the limbs of fruit trees trained against a wall are blighted and die, while others remain in a healthy and flourishing state. This has hitherto been erroneously attributed to the effects of lightning; but from closer observation, and from several experiments, it has been found to arise from the corroding effects of the rust of the nails and cramps with which trees in this situation are fastened. To avoid this inconvenience, therefore, it requires only to be careful in preventing the iron from coming in contact with the bark of the trees.

To MEND CHINA.—Mix together equal parts of fine glue, white of eggs, and white of lead, and with it anoint the edges of the article to be mended; press them together, and when hard and dry scrape off as much of the cement as sticks about the joint. The juice of garlic is another good cement, and leaves no mark where it has been used.

To IMITATE GROUND GLASS.—Rub the glass over with a lump of glazier's putty, carefully and uniformly, till the surface is equally covered. This is an excellent imitation of ground glass, and is not injured by rain or damp. It is useful for kitchen windows, &c.

HEALING WOUNDS IN TREES.—This method consists in making a varnish of common linseed oil, rendered very drying by boiling it for the space of an hour, with an ounce of litharge to each pound of oil, mixed with calcined bones, pulverized and sifted, to the consistence of an almost liquid paste. With this paste the wounds of trees are to be covered, by means of a brush, after the bark and other substance have been pared, so as to render the whole as smooth and even as possible. The varnish must be applied in dry weather, in order that it may attach itself properly.

CANKER IN TREES.—Cut them off to the quick, and apply a piece of sound bark from any other tree, and bind it on with a flannel roller. Cut off the canker, and a new shoot will grow strong, but in a year or two you will find it cankered.

A bare pasture enriches not the soil, nor fattens the animals, nor increases the wealth of the owner.

TOMATO SAUCE.—Crush half a dozen, more or less, of very ripe, red tomatoes; pick out the seeds, and squeeze the water from them; put them into a stew-pan, with two or three finely-sliced shalots, and a little gravy: simmer till nearly dry; when add half a pint of brown sauce, and simmer twenty minutes longer; then rub it through a tummy into a clean stew-pan; season with Cayenne pepper and salt, a little glaze, and lemon juice; simmer a few minutes, and serve. Tarragon or Chili vinegar are sometimes added; and sliced onions may be substituted for the shalots.

TO PREVENT THE FLY IN TURNIPS.—From experiments lately made, it has been ascertained that lime sown by hand, or distributed by a machine, is an infallible protection to turnips against the ravages of this destructive insect. It should be applied as soon as the turnips come up, and in the same daily rotation in which they were sown. The lime should be slacked immediately before it is used, if the air be not sufficiently moist to render that operation unnecessary.

TO DESTROY WASPS ON FRUIT TREES.—Wasps, about the month of July, will begin to swarm about the early fruits; and for their destruction, phials should be hung about the branches, half-filled with honey and water, or with sugar and small-beer. These should be emptied and replaced once in two or three days, otherwise they do not take so well—these little animals being extremely sagacious, and dishing the appearance of their own species, when dead.

RACAHOUT DES ARABES.—A pleasant beverage for Invalids.—Mix thoroughly one pound of ground rice; one pound of arrow-root; half pound of fine chocolate. Put the mixture into a jar for use. When it is wanted, make a teaspoonful of the Racahout into a paste with cold water or milk; then stir it into half a pint of boiling milk, and let it boil up for a minute or two; add sugar, if agreeable, and drink it as you would chocolate.

FATTENING CHICKENS.—Take, for that purpose, a quantity of rice, and grind or pound it into a coarse flour; mix sufficient for present use with milk and a little coarse sugar; stir the whole over the fire till it makes a good paste; and feed the chickens in the day time only, by putting as much of it as they can eat, but no more, into the troughs belonging to their coops. It must be eaten while warm; and, if they have also beer to drink, they will soon grow very fat. A mixture of oatmeal and treacle, combined till it crumbles, is said to form a food for chickens, of which they are so fond, and with which they thrive so rapidly, that at the end of two months they become as large as the generality of full-grown fowls fed in the common way.

A horse should not be permitted to drink cold water whilst warm; neither should the fore legs or feet of a horse be washed until he gets cold.

AUTUMN PEAS.—The purple-flowered peas are found to answer best for a late crop in autumn, as they are not so liable to be mildewed as many of the other sorts, and will continue flowering till the frost stops them.

These peas may be sown in July, August, or as late as the first week in September, if sown in a warm, sheltered situation, and in a soil inclining to sand.

Soak the peas in warm milk, and after you have drawn the drills, water them before you sow the peas; it is best to sow them towards the evening. If the autumn should prove very dry, they will require frequent watering.

When peas are sown before winter, or early in spring, they are very apt to be eaten by mice.

To prevent this, soak the peas for a day or two in train oil before you sow them, which will encourage their vegetation, and render them so obnoxious to the mice that they will not eat them.

NUTMEG PUDDING.—Pound, fine, two large or three small nutmegs; melt three pounds of butter, and stir into it half a pound of loaf-sugar, a little wine, the yolks of five eggs, well beaten, and the nutmegs. Bake on a puff-paste.

PUMPKIN PIE.—Stew the pumpkin dry, and make it like squash pie, only season rather higher. In the country, where this real Yankee pie is prepared in perfection, ginger is almost always used with other spices. There, too, part cream, instead of milk, is mixed with the pumpkin, which gives it a richer flavor.

CHEAP PAINT.—Tar mixed with yellow ocre makes an excellent green paint for coarse woodwork, iron fencing, &c.

IMPROVED METHOD OF MAKING BUTTER.—If the dairy consists of three or four cows, they should be milked in the summer thrice a day; in the morning, at noon, and in the evening. Each milking must be kept by itself, in flat wooden vessels, to cool in like manner; and thus in succession for two or three days, according to the temperature of the air, the milk thickens, and thence is fit for churning soonest in warm weather. The quantity of butter will be generally in the proportion of a pound (twenty-two ounces) for each ten pints, or five English gallons of milk. In winter, the cows are to be milked only twice a day, and the milk is to be put into the churn warm from the cow, where it might stand a day or two longer than in summer before it becomes sufficiently thick; in intense cold it will be necessary to add a small quantity of boiling water. The dairy-maid must not be disheartened if she does not succeed perfectly in her first attempt.

APPLE FRITTERS.—Pare and core fine large Pippins, and cut them into round slices. Soak them in wine, sugar, and nutmeg, for two or three hours. Make a batter of four eggs; a table-spoonful of rose-water; a table-spoonful of wine; a table-spoonful of milk; thicken with enough flour, stirred in by degrees, to make a batter; mix it two or three hours before it is wanted, that it may be light. Heat some butter in a frying pan; dip each slice of apple separately in butter, and fry them brown; sift pounded sugar, and grate nutmeg over them.

To WHITEN THE TEETH.—Mix honey with finely powdered charcoal, and use the paste as a dentifrice.

MILCH Cows.—Milch Cows are infinitely more profitable kept in the house than out of doors, but they must be trained to it, otherwise they do not thrive.

The best food for them is clover, lucern, potatoes, yams, turnips, carrots, cabbages, peas, and beans.

Such cows as those in the neighborhood of London, kept in the house, and properly fed, ought to yield nine gallons per day, for the first four months after calving.

In the management of cows a warm stable is highly necessary; and currying them like horses not only affords them pleasure, but makes them give their milk more freely. They ought always to be kept very clean, laid dry, and have plenty of good sweet water to drink. Cows treated in this manner have given two gallons of milk at a time, when within ten days of calving.

CHEAP CARPETING.—Sew together strips of the cheapest cotton cloth, of the size of the room, and tack the edges to the floor. Then paper the cloth as you would the sides of the room, with any sort of room paper. After being well-dried, give it two coats of varnish, and your carpet is finished. It can be washed like carpets, without injury, retains its gloss, and, on chambers or sleeping rooms, where it will not meet rough usage, will last for two years as good as new.

To PROMOTE THE HEALTH OF FARM ANIMALS.—All domestic animals should be abundantly furnished with salt. A supply kept within their reach, whenever it can be done, is recommended. Horses and pigs should occasionally have ashes given them in their food; and pigs ought at all times, when confined in pens, to be supplied with charcoal, as, besides being a medicine, it is a cheap and valuable food.

To DESTROY WASPS ON FRUIT TREES.—Winter is the season to apply the following solution. The juices are then determined to the root. Soft soap, two pounds; leaf or roll tobacco, one pound; nux-vomica, two ounces; and turpentine, half an English gill: boll them in eight English gallons of soft or river water, to six; and use it milk warm. With a sponge carefully anoint every branch, root and bud; and be sure to rub it well into every joint, hole, and angle, as it is there the eggs are chiefly lodged. Repeat each winter.

The Mails for the United Kingdom are closed at Halifax every alternate *Thursday* evening at 8 o'clock. Letters, &c, for England, which may be dropped into the box after the hour of closing, and up to the arrival of the Packet will be forwarded in a bag, loose—but such letters must be prepaid by stamps. The Royal Mail Steamers leave Boston for Halifax and Liverpool, G. B., every alternate *Wednesday*, arrive at Halifax on *Thursday* evening or very early the succeeding morning, leaving Halifax immediately after receiving the mails. Letters will also be received on board the Steamers after the Mail has left the Post Office. Must be prepaid by stamp.

Letters to and from England, 12½c., *prepayment compulsory*, can be prepaid by using a 12½ cent., or two 5, or one 10 cent Stamp, together with half of a 5 cent. Stamp cut diagonally. Newspapers free.

The postage on books from Great Britain to Nova Scotia, or vice versa, is for a packet not exceeding 4 oz. 7c., currency; not exceeding ½ lb. 12½c; ½ lb. and not exceeding 1 lb., 25 cts.; and so on adding 25 cts. for every additional pound or fraction of a pound. One book package may

contain separate Books, Publications, Almanacks, and Maps and Paper, Parchment or Vellum; the latter three materials may be written or printed on—the package may contain the name and address of the sender. Rollers may accompany prints and maps, and markers may be sent with books. No letters must be sent with or written on a book package, and no such package must exceed two feet in length, width or depth. The postage must in all cases be prepaid by Stamps.

Closed Mails for the United Kingdom *via* United States are made up at Halifax to meet the Steamers leaving New York for Liverpool. Letters to be specially addressed "*via New York.*" Letters 17c.; newspapers 2c. each, must be prepaid.

Mails are made up to be forwarded by the Canadian line of Steamers, *via* Pictou and River DeLoup—postage same as by Cunard line. Letters for Canada also forwarded by this route: closing every Saturday after the departure of the R. M. S. for England.

The Mails for the United States, *via* Boston, per Royal Mail Steamers, are made up on *Tuesday* evening of the week in which the Packet from England is due, at 8 o'clock. Should the Steamer not arrive by 6 o'clock the following morning, *supplementary Mails* will be made up. Should the Steamer from Liverpool arrive previous to *Tuesday* night—the Mails as heretofore will be closed *immediately on her arrival.*

A closed mail for Canada is made up and forwarded at the same time in charge of the British Officer. Letters so forwarded must be specially addressed "Closed Mail for Canada," postage 12½c.; viz. 8c. packet rate, and 4c. Colonial rate—prepayment optional.

The Mails for Bermuda and the West Indies are made up finally at Halifax on the Thursday evening of the week in which the Royal Mail Steamer is expected to arrive from Boston, at 8 o'clock. Letters 8c.—when posted in the interior, 5c. additional, which must be prepaid. Newspapers 2c. each, which must be paid by stamp.

Letters are forwarded *via* Bermuda for Chagres and the Pacific, Chili, and Peru: postage 33c., must be prepaid; 5c. additional when posted in the interior. Havana, Honduras, Laguyra, Mexico, Venezuela, and the British and Foreign West India Islands. Postage to Foreign West Indies, 8c. when posted at Halifax; 5c. additional when posted in the interior—must be prepaid. Newspapers 2c. each, to be prepaid by stamp.

The Mails for Newfoundland (and Cape Breton during the Summer months) are made up at Halifax once a month during the months of December, January, February, and March; and once a fortnight during the months of April, May, June, July, August, September, October, and November, closing finally on the Thursday evening of the week in which the R. M. Steamer is expected to arrive from Boston. Postage 8c.; when posted in the interior 5c. additional. Newspapers 2c. each, which must be paid by stamp at the time of posting.

The Mails for St. Pierre and Miquelon are forwarded to Sydney, C. B., from whence they are despatched by the French Packet during the Summer months, and from Halifax direct in the Winter months. Letters 8c. packet rate, and 5c. inland—prepayment optional.

All letters are charged by weight, and a uniform rate of postage of 5c. on a letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight has been established throughout British North America. To any part of the United States 10c.; to Oregon and California 15c.

Letters posted in any town within the Province for delivery in the same town are liable to the rate of 2c. for every half ounce.

The Postage on all Letters posted in Nova Scotia, and addressed to any place in this Province, the other British North American Provinces, and the United States, as well as to the United Kingdom, must be prepaid by Stamp.

Letters sent unpaid, addressed to any part of the above-named places, will be charged with a *double* rate of postage.

Official letters, addressed to the Provincial and Military Public Departments are to be treated as heretofore.

Newspapers pass free to any part of the Province, British North America, (Newfoundland and Bermuda excepted) and the United States when sent by land Mail—to be put up in covers open at the ends.

Printed Circulars, Prices Current, Handbills, and other printed matter of like description, put up in covers open at the ends, and without any written communication, may be sent to any part of the Province to any place within the same, as well as through Nova Scotia, at the rate of 1d. per ounce—prepayment optional, except when addressed to the United States, in which case the postage must be prepaid.

Pamphlets, Magazines, Periodicals, or Books, bound or unbound, done up in covers open at the ends, unaccompanied by any written communication, may be transmitted as above mentioned, through the mail, in this Province: not exceeding 2 ounces in weight, free; and when exceeding 2 ounces 1c. for every ounce up to 48 ounces, beyond which weight they cannot be sent by mail.

British reprints of copyright works from the United States, by *land mail or steamer*, charged letter postage.

For Dartmouth *daily*, postage 2c.

For Musquodoboit Harbor, every Tuesday morning, at 9 o'clock.—Return Mail due on Monday afternoon, at 5 o'clock.

For Prospect on Saturday afternoon, at 2 o'clock. Return mail due on Saturday morning at 11 o'clock.

For Ketch Harbor and Sambro on Friday evening, at 10 o'clock. Return mail due on Saturday.

✉ Letters for *Registry* must be posted half an hour previous to the closing of the mail by which they are to be forwarded, and the postage as well as the registration fee must be *prepaid*.

Letters *prepaid by stamps*, and dropped into the Letter Box during the night, and up to 5 o'clock, a. m., will be forwarded by the mails despatched same morning.

When the mails from England arrive before 9 p. m., they are delivered the same evening, and after that hour at 7 next morning.

All other mails arriving before 7 p. m., will be delivered the same evening—if after that hour and before 8, at 6 o'clock—and if after 8, at 7 o'clock the following morning.

The Postmaster General is not liable for the loss of any letter or package, unless such loss should arise from his own default.

Land Mails made up at Halifax, 8 p. m.

MONEY ORDER SYSTEM.

1. Orders may be issued for any sum under and up to 20 Dollars, Currency, but shall not exceed that amount.

2. The charge for each Order (without respect to the amount thereof) shall be Ten cents. Currency, to be paid in advance by the party applying for the Order.

3. The Money Orders shall be made out upon forms supplied by the Head Office, and no order will be valid or payable unless given upon the regular printed form.

4. Persons applying for Money Orders will be required to state the particulars upon a Form of Application provided for that purpose.

5. If, in consequence of error or misapprehension, the purchaser of a Money Order should desire to change the place of payment named therein the issuing Postmaster will write across the face of the Order, in black ink, the words "*Now payable at*—," specifying the place,—to which he will affix the date of his signature. The charge for transfer, as it will involve some correspondence, will be Ten cents. in each case.

6. No alteration of the Payee's name will be allowed after an order has been issued and the advice mailed, but a new one will be granted, and the usual charge of Ten cents. made.

7. Parties procuring Money Orders will please to examine them carefully, to see that they are properly filled up and stamped. This caution will appear sufficiently important when it is understood that an Order defective in any important respect will throw difficulties in the way of its payment.

8. When a Money Order is presented for payment at the Office on which it is drawn, the Postmaster, or Clerk employed, will use all proper means to assure himself that the Applicant is the party named and intended in the Advice, and upon the payment of the Order will be careful to obtain the signature of the Payee to the receipt at foot.

9. When, through illness or other insuperable difficulty, the Payee—that is, the person named in the Advice—is prevented from presenting the Order in person, the Postmaster will be at liberty to accept a written authority from him in favor of a second person, provided always that such written authority is satisfactorily proved to be genuine.

10. Any Money Order Post Office may repay an Order issued by itself, but only to the party who obtained it. The charge or commission shall in no case be returned.

11. For the present, the Offices in this Province which are authorized to grant and pay Money Orders are as follows, viz: General Post Office, Halifax; Post Offices at Amherst, Antigonish, Annapolis, Arichat, Baddeck, C. B., Digby, Guysboro', Kentville, Lunenburg, Liverpool, Pictou, Port Hood, Shelburne, Sydney, Truro, Windsor, and Yarmouth.

12. Postmasters, when not in funds, may defer payment of money for six days until they shall have received a supply from the Head Office.

PARCEL POST.

Parels closed at the ends and sides may be posted at any Post Office in Nova Scotia, for conveyance to any other Post Office (not Way Office) in the Province, at a rate of Postage subject to the following condition:

1. No letter or letters shall be enclosed.

2. The parcel shall not contain any explosive substance, glass, liquids, or other matter likely to injure the ordinary contents of the mail, under penalty of the forfeiture of the parcel.

3. The weight of the parcel shall not exceed 3lbs., nor the size exceed one foot in length or breadth, or six inches in thickness.

5. The parcel may be registered, on prepayment, also by stamp, of a registration fee of 10c., in addition to the above rate.

6. The parcel shall have the words, "*By Parcel Post*," plainly written over the address. It should be well and strongly put up, and be legibly addressed to the Post Office address of the intended receiver, including the name of the County in which the Post Office is situated. The following is an example of the mode of address recommended

7. If the name and address of the sender be written on the parcel, it will, if delivery should fail from any cause, be returned unopened to the sender on payment of an additional rate of 25c. for the return conveyance.

8. If the number of stamps affixed to a packet be insufficient to prepay the proper rate, the amount deficient will be rated unpaid, with a fine of 10c. in addition.

The Steamer *Eastern State* leaves Brown's wharf every other Tuesday for Boston, and touches at Yarmouth on the way. Messrs. J. M. Watson & Co. have two packets running continually to Boston, viz: the barque *Halifax*, and the brig *Boston*.

A packet runs between Halifax and Liverpool, Queen's Co., leaving Cronan's Wharf occasionally through the month.

Two fine schooners—the *Sylvia* and the *Lunenburg Packet*—sail about every ten days for Lunenburg,—the former from Black's, and the latter from J. M. Watson, & Co.'s Wharf.

The Guysborough Packet sails from the Long Wharf.

The Sydney (sailing) Packet generally starts from Caldwell's wharf.

LIGHT HOUSES.

On the coast of Nova Scotia, and on the coast of New Brunswick in the Bay of Fundy.

SAMBRO ISLAND—West entrance Halifax harbor. *A fixed light.*

CROSS ISLAND—Entrance to Lunenburg harbor. *Two lights—flash light above; fixed light below.*

IRON-BOUND ISLAND LIGHT.—Off the entrance to LaHave River. *A bright, flash light* of ten seconds duration, followed by an eclipse of thirty seconds. The lantern is placed on a square wooden tower, painted *white* on the southern side of the Island, and is visible from all points of approach. Elevation seventy-five feet above sea-level.

PORT MEDWAY.—Beacon light on Admiralty head, west side of the entrance of the port. Building square, painted *white* with *black square* in the centre of seaward sides, *plain white light*, forty feet above sea level, and stands within thirty fathoms of the shore.

LIVERPOOL.—South end of Coffin's Island. *A plain revolving light.*

FORT POINT harbor light, at the head of Liverpool harbor, southern entrance of the river. *A bright fixed light*, visible from all points of approach, and must be left on the larboard hand when entering the harbor.

RAGGED ISLAND HARBOR LIGHT.—On Gull Rock, off the entrance of the harbor. Building square, and painted *white*, exhibiting a *clear, fixed light*, at an elevation of fifty-one feet above the sea-level, and is situated in Lat. $43^{\circ} 39' N.$, and in Long. $64^{\circ} 66' W.$

BARRINGTON.—Baccaro Point, east side of the entrance to Barrington Bay. *A flash light* of fifteen seconds.

CAPE SABLE, SEAL ISLAND.—The first light on approaching the Bay of Fundy is on the South Point of Seal Island. *A plain, white light*, elevated about eighty feet above high water mark, and may be seen, on approaching the Island, from any point of the compass. A very dan-

gerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called Blonde rock, about three and one-third miles S. by W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

SHELburnE.—McNutt's Island. *Two fixed lights*—one above the other.

PuBnico HARBOR LIGHT.—A Beacon Light on the S. E. side of the entrance to Pubnico Harbor, situate on the E. side of the entrance to the Bay of Fundy, about thirteen miles northerly of Cape Sable. Building square, painted *white*. *A fixed red light*, on the seaward side, twenty-eight feet above high water level, (rise and fall twelve feet,) and stands fifteen fathoms from low water mark. The point of beach is bold.

YARMOUTH.—West side of the harbor. *A plain, revolving light*.

A FOG BELL has been erected on the E. Cape of Yarmouth harbor, a few feet to the southward of the Light House, and about one and a quarter miles from the extreme outer point of the Cape. Strikes *seven* times per minute.

BRIAR ISLAND.—*A plain, white light*, situate about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point of the Island.

WESTPORT.—Peter's Island, at the south entrance of the Grand passage. *Two white lights*, placed horizontally, to distinguish it from Briar Island Light, at an elevation of forty feet above high water mark.

DIGBY GUT LIGHT.—On the west side of Digby Gut, from Briar Island north-eastward. This light is chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin. *A fixed, white light*.

PORT WILLIAMS.—On the E. side Bay of Fundy, Annapolis Co.; at distance of say five miles shows a *white light*, on nearer approach a *green light*.

MARGARETTEVILLE.—On E. side Bay of Fundy, Annapolis Co., at a distance say 5 miles shows a *white light*, on nearer approach a *red light*.

BLACK ROCK LIGHT.—On the southern shore of the Bay of Fundy. *A fixed, white light*.

APPLE RIVER LIGHT.—North side of the entrance to Apple River, in Chignecto, or Cumberland Bay. *Two fixed lights*, placed horizontally.

PARTRIDGE ISLAND RIVER.—An Octagonal light beacon, on the west side of the entrance to Partridge Island River, Parrsborough, on the north side of the Basin of Minas, and exhibits a *plain, white light*, at an elevation of thirty feet above high water; rise and fall about forty-five feet; the Tower is white, and stands close to high water mark on the beach. Vessels can only enter the harbor at high water, and must lie aground on the soft bottom when the tide is low.

HORTON BLUFF LIGHT.—In the Basin of Minas, ninety-five feet above sea level, high water; rise and fall forty to forty-five feet. Building square painted *white*; stands sixty feet from the Bluff, and shows a *white light*, which may be seen in clear weather, over the greatest part of the Basin of Minas, (after passing Cape Blomedon,) and above the Five Islands, and up Windsor River, until intercepted by the continuation of the Bluff to the southward of it.

BURNCOAT LIGHT.—At Burncoat Head, Southern side of the Basin of Minas. *A plain, fixed white light*.

MEAGHER'S BEACH.—East side Halifax harbor. *A fixed light*.

DEVIL'S ISLAND.—An Octagonal Light Beacon on the S. W. point of Devil's Island, at the entrance of the Eastern passage to Halifax har-

bor, and exhibits a *red light* on the seaward sides, to distinguish it from Sambro and Meagher's Beach lights; stands forty-five feet above high water mark; rise and fall six feet. The tower painted dark brown, with a white belt between the Balcony and Lantern to distinguish it in the day time.

EASTERN BEAVER, OR WILLIAM'S ISLAND.—*A revolving light.*

WHITE HEAD ISLAND LIGHT.—On the S. W. point of White Head Island. The tower is square, painted *white*, stands seventy-five fathoms from the water's edge, with an Octagonal Iron Lantern, sixty feet above sea level at high water; rise and fall six feet. The light is distinguished by *bright flashes* of ten seconds duration, followed by eclipses of ten seconds, displaying alternately three flashes and three eclipses in a minute. The light will not be totally obscured during the eclipse.

CANSEAU, CRANBERRY ISLAND.—*Two fixed lights*, one above the other.

GUYSBOROUGH HARBOR BEACON.—On the west side of the entrance to the harbor, head of Chedabucto Bay. *A fixed light.*

ARICHAU BEACON.—*A Light* on Point Morichi, on the south-east side of the southern entrance to the harbor. Building square, painted *white*. *A white light*, thirty-four feet above the sea-level.

EDDY, OR SAND POINT LIGHT.—On Eddy, or Sand Point, on the west side of the south entrance to the Strait of Canseau, distinguished by *two white lights* placed horizontally, twenty-five feet above the sea level. Building square, painted *white*, with a *black diamond* on the seaward side.

WEST SIDE OF THE GUT OF CANSEAU.—*A fixed light.*

PICTOU LIGHT.—On the south-east side of the entrance to the harbor. *Two fixed lights*, vertical—upper one *white* lower one *red*.

PICTOU ISLAND LIGHT.—On the south-east point of the Island. Building square, and painted *white*. *A fixed light*, fifty-two feet above high-water mark.

PORT HOOD LIGHT.—Changed from *white* to *red*, when seen from the northern entrance, to distinguish it from the Margaree and North Canso lights.

SEA WOLF, OR MARGARIE ISLAND LIGHT.—Situate on the N. W. side of the Island of Cape Breton, nearly midway between Port Hood and Cheticamp harbors, and distant from Cape Breton, two and a half miles. *A plain white light*. The lantern is placed on a square wooden tower, painted *white*, near the centre and summit of the Island. The lantern is 298 feet above sea level—visible from all points of approach. To vessels in proximity to the Island the light may become obscured by the abrupt cliffs or sides of the Island, which may serve as a guide to tack or anchor by, as hundreds of vessels find anchorage on the south-east side. The chief landing is near the south-east end, in shore, where a few fishing stages and boats are kept in use during the fishing season.

ST. PAUL'S ISLAND.—*A fixed light* on the north-east end, and a *flash light* on the south-west end.

LOW POINT LIGHT.—East side of Sydney, C. B. harbor. *A fixed light.*

FLINT ISLAND LIGHT.—On Flint Island, on the eastern coast of Cape Breton. Lat. $46^{\circ} 11' 5''$ N., and Long. $59^{\circ} 45' 20''$ W., and exhibits a *bright, flash light*, every fifteen seconds, visible from all points of the compass. The light is sixty-five feet above sea level, and can be seen at the distance of twelve miles.

SCATTERIE ISLAND.—*A revolving light* at the east end of the Island.

LOUISBURG.—On the east side of the entrance to the harbor. *A fixed light.*

GANNET ROCK LIGHT.—This light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands, off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. *A white, flash light*, twenty seconds dark and forty seconds light, in each minute. Building painted in stripes, *vertical, black and white.* Between the northernmost and southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them almost above water, and extend eastward from the Light House about four miles. From this range further westwardly, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker called the Bull—this may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan open.

MACHIAS SEAL ISLAND LIGHT.—*Two fixed, white lights* upon the Machias Seal Islands, forty-five feet above high water, and bearing from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W., distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance, of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, British or American. Both buildings painted *white.* Vessels standing to the northward between these lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these lights into one, as they will be, then, not more than three-fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the east of the lights.

HEAD HARBOR LIGHT.—Next in order after passing Grand Manan and the plain white light (American) on West Quaddy Point, is Head Harbor Light, placed on the N. E. extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the Inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbor. *A fixed white light.* Building painted *white*, with a *red cross* on it.

POINT LE PREAU LIGHT.—Upon this projecting headland two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant twenty-eight feet. Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass where they may be useful; both are *fixed* and *white.* Building painted *red* and *white*, in stripes, five feet broad each, horizontally.

PARTRIDGE ISLAND LIGHT.—At the entrance of the river and harbor of St. John, N. B. *A fixed, white light.* The building painted *red* and *white* in vertical stripes.

QUACO LIGHT.—*A revolving, white light*, placed on a small rock, off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. The light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. Building painted *white* and *red*, in horizontal stripes.

CAPE ENRAGE LIGHT.—On a point of that name in Westmoreland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbor, N. S. Building painted *white*, and about 120 feet above the tide mark. *A plain, white light.*

WEST QUADDY LIGHT.—This is an American light, placed on the west side of the entrance in the St. Croix, by Lubec and Eastport.

A LIGHT HOUSE has been erected upon CAPE RACE, Newfoundland, *a fixed white light*, from sunset to sunrise. The light is visible to seaward from N. E. by E. round by the S. E. and S. to W., and is elevated 180 feet above mean water level of the sea, and may be seen in clear weather 17 miles from a ship's deck. The tower is striped red and

white vertically. It stands close to the old beacon which has been cut down. The Lighthouse is in Lat. 46 degrees 39 minutes 19 seconds N., Long. 53 degrees 2 minutes, 28 seconds W. Bearings magnetic. Var. 24 degrees W.

In the River and Gulf of St. Lawrence and Strait of Belle Isle:

BELLE-ISLE LIGHT.—An island at the eastern entrance of the Strait of Belle-Isle, separating Labrador from Newfoundland, situated at the extreme south west point of the island. A *single fixed white light*. Building—circular stone tower, faced externally with fire brick of a light colour. Lat. 51° 53' 0''; Long. W. 25° 26' 0''. Whole horizon lighted, and seen in fair weather 28½ nautical or 32½ statute miles.

POINTE AMOUR LIGHT, Labrador Coast, Strait of Belle-Isle, at the south east point of Forteau Bay, Lat. N. 57° 27' 30''; Long. W. 56° 53' 40''. A *single fixed white light*—two thirds of the horizon illuminated, and seen in fair weather 18½ nautical or 21½ statute miles. Building—a circular stone tower, faced externally with fire brick of a light colour.

ANTICOSTI LIGHT at the extreme west end of the island of Anticosti Lat. N. 49° 52' 30''; Long. W. 64° 35' 0''. A *single, fixed white light*—two-thirds of the horizon illuminated, and seen in fair weather 15 nautical or 18 statute miles. Building—a circular stone tower, faced externally with fire brick of a light colour.

CAPE ROZIER LIGHT.—East coast of Gaspe, at the extreme point of the Cape. Lat. N. 48° 51' 0''; Long. W. 64° 35' 0''. A *single fixed white light*—two-thirds of the horizon illuminated, and seen in fair weather 16½ nautical or 19½ statute miles. Building—a circular stone tower, faced externally with fire brick of a light colour.

Signals will be given at or near each of the above four light houses by means of an air or fog whistle, sounded at short intervals during foggy weather and snow storms, or by a nine-pounder gun, fired every hour, in case of the whistle being out of order.

Made on the Flag Staff at Citadel Hill, when vessels are seen or reported from an Outpost.

A Brig, a small ball at the end of the yard, and a large one at the inner halliard.

A Brigantine, a cross close up at the outer halliard.

Two or more do., a cross half hoisted.

A Topsail Schooner, a cross close up at the inner halliard.

An upper yard having been added to the Ship Staff, it will be used exclusively to designate Steam Vessels, thus :

One ball East or West indicates a Steam Vessel repeated in that quarter.

A small ball out and a large one in, a Branch Packet or Merchant Vessel.

A large ball out and a small one in, a Man-of-war-Steamer, or Royal Mail Steamer.

Numbers will be indicated as directed from the lower yard.

The lower yard is now used for sailing vessels only.

When the description of vessel in sight is ascertained from the Citadel, the following descriptive colours will be hoisted at the mast head :

A Union Jack, Flag Ship.

Do. with a red Pendant over it, a two decker.

Do. with a blue Pendant over it, a Frigate.

Do. with a blue and white Pendant over it, a Ship or Barque rigged Sloop-of-War.

Do. with a white Pendant over it, a Brig rigged Sloop-of-War.

Do. with a red and white Pendant over it, a Schooner or Cutter-of-War.

A white Pendant with two blue crosses, a Transport or a vessel with troops on board—if a Man-of-War, the Union under.

A white Pendant with a blue ball, a Steamer—if a Man-of-War, the Union under.

A red Flag pierced white, Royal Mail Steam Packet from England.

A blue and red Flag crossed white, do. from Boston.

A white and blue Pendant, do. from Newfoundland.

A white and red Pendant, do. from Bermuda,

A blue Pendant, a Ship.

A blue and white pendant, a Barque.

A red Pendant, a Brig.

A red and white Pendant, a Brigantine.

HACKNEY CARRIAGES.

[Extract from an Ordinance of the City, passed July 7th, 1851.]

12. Any person or persons having a license in full force, who shall stand his carriage in any other than its appointed place or manner,—or not having it properly numbered,—or any driver or person in charge of a licensed carriage, who shall not produce the table of fares and distances when thereby required, or who, being upon his stand disengaged, shall refuse to convey any person seeking to employ him,—or who shall in any way violate this Ordinance, shall, for each offence, besides being liable to have his license revoked, forfeit and pay such a fine as under and by virtue of this Ordinance may be adjusted against him. And the owner or driver of any such carriage who shall demand or extort from any person or persons a sum beyond the rate of fare herein established, or hereafter to be established, may be so fined, and shall forthwith forfeit the License for such carriage, and be liable to refund to the party grieved the sum so extorted, with cost of prosecution. Livery stable keepers, not occupying the stands of said City are exempt from this Ordinance; further than that they are hereby required to obtain a license for each carriage they shall use to convey persons for hire, within the limits of the City; which license shall continue in force and be renewed as aforesaid, and the carriage shall be numbered, and have the letter L, besides its number, painted or placed on it as aforesaid.

To and from any Steamer, passenger vessel,—to and from any hotel or dwelling house to any stage office or place within a mile, with half cwt. of luggage,—1s. 3d.

As above, with more than half cwt. and less than two cwt. of luggage —2s. 6d.

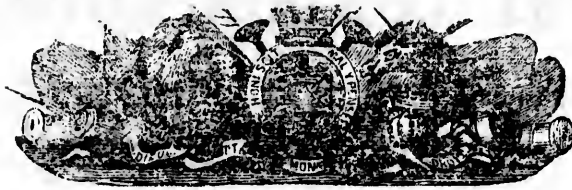

Extracts from the Acts of Assembly.

Section 7—"There shall be no professorship of Theology in the University, nor shall any religious tests whatever be required of or imposed upon any member of the Corporation, Professor, Teacher, Student, or other person in any way connected with the University or with the Collegiate School."

Section 8 empowers—"To confer degrees in Arts, Law, and Medicine, to wit: the several degrees of Bachelor of Arts, Master of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Laws, Doctor of Laws, Bachelor of Medicine, and Doctor of Medicine, and Diplomas in Civil Engineering and Land Surveying, Agriculture, Commerce, and Navigation, and such honorary degrees and certificates of honor, merit, and attendance at lectures, as the Senate may judge expedient and proper."

Section 15—"Every candidate for matriculation is required to produce at the time of his examination a written statement from his parents or guardians, or other person having charge of his education, setting forth the name of some Minister of Religion in or near Fredericton, under whose religious instruction he is to be placed; and, in order to the keeping and allowance of any Term, every student must produce a certificate from his religious instructor for the time being, that he has regularly attended Divine Service on Sundays, during such Term, unless prevented by unavoidable circumstances."

Section 16—"Portions of the Holy Scriptures shall be read by the President, or one of the Professors, daily in the University, and morning and evening prayers offered according to the form prescribed by the Senate; and all resident students shall be required to attend such Scripture readings and Prayers, except those whose parents or guardians, or other person having charge of their education, may have signified to the contrary in writing to the President."

Section 18—"Any person may, on application to the President, and on payment of the fees required, and observance of the regulations prescribed, be admitted to

attend any one or more courses of Lectures in the University, and receive certificates accordingly."

Section 19 Provides for the admission of fifty-six free students under certain conditions.

Section 24 establishes two scholarships of £15 each, one for the Classical and one for the English Department of the Collegiate School, to be competed for annually in July.

Section 25—"There shall be in the University one scholarship of £15, either in the general or the special undergraduate course, for each County Grammar School in the Province, and for the Collegiate School, to be open to competition under such regulations, and held for such times as the Senate may prescribe; and the holders of such scholarships shall be exempt from all fees for instruction in the University.

The University of New Brunswick,

Entirely free from denominational bias or control, and re-organized throughout under the Act of Assembly, offers very great facilities and advantages to all persons in the Lower Provinces who desire a Collegiate education.

The Officers of Instruction are thoroughly competent to the discharge of the duties of their Professorships. The Senior Professor is well known as a Graduate of Oxford, and fellow of C. C. College, and as a finished scholar and accomplished educator. The Professors in the Scientific department are gentlemen of high standing, large experience, and undoubted zeal and ability as instructors; they are in correspondence with Scientific Associations abroad, and are zealous cultivators of their respective sciences. The Professor of Modern Languages resided for eighteen years on the Continent of Europe, and was for several years Professor in the Royal College in the Isle of France.

A Library of Literary and Scientific Works, especially adapted to illustrate the course of study pursued in the University, and a very extensive and complete set of apparatus have been procured at an expense of upwards of £5,000.

The Museum contains several thousands of Botanical, Geological, and other specimens, scientifically classified and arranged to illustrate the different branches and departments of Natural History; one section is devoted to a series of illustrations of the plants, minerals, rocks and fossils of the Lower Provinces, and particularly of New Brunswick.

The domestic arrangements for residents are under the personal supervision of the President, who does not keep a separate table, but boards with the Students.

The Scriptures are read and prayer offered Morning and Evening, and at the commencement of Lecture hours; and there is a constant appeal to the moral and religious sentiment in carrying on the daily routine of education and government.

Clergymen of all the leading religious denominations reside in Fredericton, who, in accordance with the spirit of the Act of Assembly and beyond the letter of its provisions, interest themselves in the welfare of the Students, and charge themselves with the religious instruction and training of as many of them as are committed to their care.

Additional Professors will be appointed, and the general arrangements modified as may be required in the career of usefulness and prosperity on which the University is believed to be now entering.

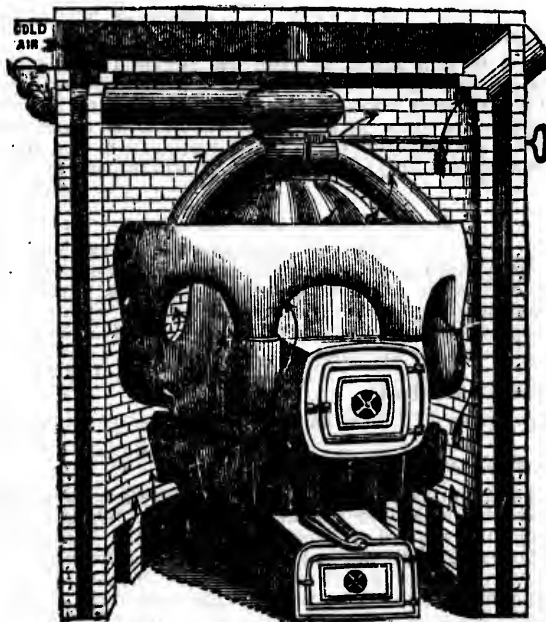

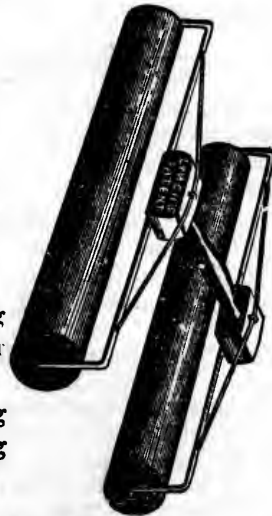

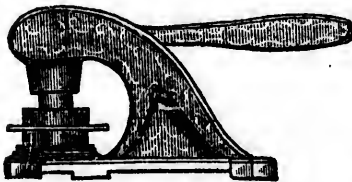

VERBS.

CLASSIFICATION OF VERBS.

95. Verbs are—Neuter, Intransitive, Transitive, or Auxiliary.

96. NEUTER or SUBSTANTIVE verbs are those expressing existence only; as—to be.

97. INTRANSITIVE verbs are those which express action without any object immediately affected by it; as—to walk, to run. They are called *intransitive* verbs, because the action does not pass over to an object.

98. TRANSITIVE verbs are those which express action which passes over to an object; as—to strike, to punish. They are called *transitive* or *active* verbs, because they have an immediate object; that is, we must strike *something*, or punish *somebody*.

99. AUXILIARY verbs are those which are used to form the voices, moods, tenses, &c., of other verbs, but do not by themselves express either being or action; as—*shall, will, may, might*. They are called *auxiliary*, because their office is to assist in conjugating others.

100. The following verbs, in their various moods, tenses, numbers, and persons, are used as auxiliaries—be, have, do, will, may, can, shall, must, let; to which may now be added—get.

Some of these, as—be, have, do, and get, are often also principal verbs, which may be conjugated separately. In such cases, though the same in form as the auxiliaries, they convey distinct and independent ideas.

101. The verb TO BE is used throughout all its moods and tenses to form the passive voice (see 114), by adding the past participle of a transitive verb; as—he was beaten. In connection with a present participle, it forms a progressive tense; as—I am writing.

DENMARK.—PHYSICAL AND DESCRIPTIVE.

is the island of Bornholm, which affords freestone, marble, limestone, potter's-clay, and ochre, with some seams of indifferent coal.

192. *Rivers.*—The Elbe, a large German river, washes the southern frontier of the kingdom; but from the flatness of the surface, and the limited extent of the land-tracts, it is impossible that Denmark should have any large river of its own. The only one worthy of mention is the Eider, which separates Schleswig from Holstein.

193. *Lakes.*—There are about 400 lakes scattered over the surface, but most of them are very small. The largest are Ersom and Arre, in the north of Seeland.

Fjords and Gulfs.—The Liimfiord extends from the Kattegat nearly across the whole breadth of North Jütland; at first in a narrow stream, but afterwards expanding into a broad basin, interrupted by tongues, and studded with small islands. It is separated from the German Sea only by a narrow strip of land, which was broken through by the waves in 1825; and the Agger Canal, of little commercial value, has since been formed at the breach. Smaller fjords in the mainland are Ringskiöbing, Nissum, and the bays of Kaløe and Flensborg; in Seeland, the Ise-fiord; and in Fühnen, the Odensee-fiord.

194. *Straits, Sounds, &c.*—The Skagerrack, the Kattegat, the Sound, the Great and Little Belts, all lead into the Baltic; and the toll which the king of Denmark receives for the passage of foreign vessels through them, forms an important item of his revenue.

195. *Climate.*—The air is humid and cloudy; and the climate much milder than its latitude would indicate.

196. *Soil and Vegetation.*—In Jütland and the Duchies, the soil is almost entirely alluvial, much of it being covered with a vegetable mould well adapted for cultivation, while the marshy districts produce excellent pasturage.

In the north-west parts of Jütland, however, the higher grounds are sandy, and for the most part covered with bent, heath, and brambles. The soil of the islands is of moderate fertility, and throughout there are frequent accumulations of peat. The forests are not now extensive, and are chiefly confined to the eastern coasts of the peninsula and the islands of Seeland and Fühnen.

197. *Animals.*—In losing their vast forests, the Danish territories have also lost the larger wild animals.

The wolf has entirely disappeared; the wild-boar has become very rare; the stag and fallow-deer remain only in parks; but the fox, marten, polecat, and various smaller quadrupeds, exist in great numbers. Game is abundant; the shores and fjords abound in aquatic birds; and the surrounding seas furnish unfailing supplies of white and flat fish.

198. Domestic animals, however, form the principal wealth of Denmark. Horses, valuable for military purposes, are

different trades, they still assist each other. The tailor makes clothes for all the others, and gets some of their things in return. The shoemaker makes shoes for all the others, and gets some of their things in return; and in like manner all the rest exchange their articles with each other. The exchange is not made in the articles themselves, for that would not be convenient; the exchange is made by means of money, which is to the same purpose.



199. Tailors, shoemakers, carpenters, and others who make articles for use, are *mechanics* or *artisans*, and they form a very large body of the people. The persons who employ a great number of artisans, and give them *wages* for their labour, are *manufacturers*; and these sell the articles they make to *shopkeepers*, who sell them to the public, or whoever will buy them. When *shopkeepers* sell an article, they get a little more for it than they paid for it, and that is called their *profit*. If the bookseller pays fivepence for a book, and sells it for sixpence, then he has a penny of profit. If manufacturers and shopkeepers did not get profit on their articles, they could not sell them, for it is only the profit that they live upon.

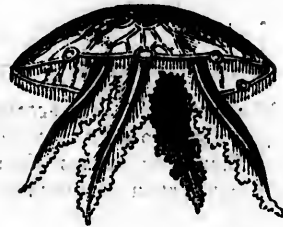
CLASS. ACALEPHÆ.

26. ACALEPHÆ (*ἀκάλειφα*, a nettle) are so called from the property many of them possess of irritating and inflaming the skin, the cause of this property being still undiscovered. Cuvier divided the Acalephæ into two Orders, marked by the possession or non-possession of an air-bag to sustain them in the water, calling the former *Hydrostatic* and the latter *Simple*. More recent inquirers arrange them in four groups, named from peculiarities of structure, *Pulmonigrada*, *Ciliograda*, *Cirrhigrada*, and *Physograda*. The most important forms are the *Medusa*, or common jelly animal, the *Berœe*, and the *Physalia*.

27. *Medusa*.—The body of this creature is in the form of a gelatinous disk, more or less convex on the upper surface, somewhat like the head of a mushroom, and termed the umbrella. From the centre of this, and from the margin, there depend in most of the species tentacula, more or less numerous, and more or less elongated. When the *Medusa* is

seen dead on the beach, it appears as a piece of coarse jelly, and it is difficult then to imagine how lively and beautiful are the movements of the living animal, as it advances through the water in search of prey.

28. The solid parts of the *Medusa* form so small a proportion of its frame, that if a specimen of ten poundweights be put upon a filter, what remains after the fluid parts, which are chiefly sea-water, have escaped, does not exceed two drachms in weight! Yet though they are so very soft, they feed upon prey of firm structure—such as crustacea, and other marine animals of much higher organisation than themselves, which,



The events narrated in this book transpired in the year 52 A. D., or 58 B. C., during the consulship of L. Calpurnius Piso and A. Gabinius.

¹ What Caesar here calls *omnis*, is that *part* of the Gauls, which had become a Roman province as early as the year 58 B. C. This southern district, Caesar usually designates simply *Provincia Nostra*.

² *Aliam* is here used in the sense of *alteram*, 'the other,' the ordinary form, in an enumeration of a definite number of parts, *unus, alter, tertius*. In the passage in Cicero in which he uses *unus, alius, tertius*, the whole number of parts is not enumerated, nor is it certain how many he intended to specify.

³ The three rivers here mentioned are the modern Garonne, Marne, and Seine.

⁴ *Cultus* expresses everything belonging to the outward appearance of civilised life, such as dwelling, clothing, daily occupation, and the like; whereas *humanitas* refers to the moral condition of the people.

⁵ The *mercatores* were important functionaries who followed the Roman camp as traders, and often penetrated into places where the Roman arms had never been. They differed considerably from the *negotiatores*, in carrying their goods with them on pack-horses and in waggons, and supplying the tribes among whom they traded with various luxuries, such as arms, wine, &c.

⁶ *Eorum* refers to the inhabitants of Gaul generally, and is here used with colloquial carelessness, instead of *una pars eorum* or *partium*.
