There has been no opportunity to make an examination which would enable us to arrive at any definite conclusion as to the cause."

The resolution has been discussed in aucus, and acording to the premier's statement, members on the government ide are absolutely united on the issue, so that its adoption by an overwhelming majority is assured.

It reads as follows: Whereas, in the opinion of this house, the interests of the Province of Ontario would, without doubt, be injuriously affected should the proposed reciprocity agreement between Canada and the United States of America come into force.

And whereas this house as representing the people of Ontario should not remain silent when a matter of such vital importance to the province is being discussed, but should clearly state its attitude with respect thereto.

Therefore this house deplores the aking of the said agreement and hereby records its strong dissent therefrom for the following reasons:

#### PLANS FOR PORT OF ANTWERP.

Antwerp, generally admitted to be in est ports in the world, is on the river Scheldt, about fifty-three miles from the North Sea, This river, navigable for transoceanic steamers about four miles above Antwerp, furnishes an excellent entrance and exit for the vast trade not only with the rich and thick-ly populated country of Belgium, but also with the northeastern part of France, Luxemberg, south Germany and Switzerland.

This traffic passing thru Antwerp is growing so fast that the authorities have difficulty in supplying the necessary means for port extension. A silting of sand in certain parts of the river bed limits the size of steamers coming to this port. When, however, the government has carried out its project for cutting an entirely new bed for the giver and diverted its course there will river and diverted its course there will doubtless be no limit to the size of the

in a few years, entirely outgrow her docking facilities. About ten years ago engineers were put at work preparing various propositions that would make the port equal to any demands that are likely to be made on it for many years to come. These plans are completed, have received the sanction of the royal government, and the King of Beigium, when opening the present session of parliament, again urged the chambers to supply liberal fluancial craft coming up the river.

The entire dock system of Antwerp may be said to be divided into two parts: (1) The river, the front of which for fully three miles is bordered by the company walls of pressive measure and chambers to supply liberal financial support for this important project. Along the edge of the quays and over the railway tracks, there are ninety-one hydraulic movable cranes of one and a half and two ton capacity. The cranes are of uniform type, and revolve on a four-meter gauge line, thus allowing a railway to pass between the archways, and to manoeuvre freely. Communication from the main lines up to the quay wall is established by eight-wheeled gliding platforms, on which the trucks are hauled transwhich the trucks are hauled trans-versely. Prevention of Smoke in Berlin.

The comparative absence of smoke in Berlin is due partly to the use of fuel briquettes, Concul General A. W. Thackara states that 30 per cent. of the coal fuel consumed in the city and suburbs is brown coal briquettes, and it has been technically demonstrated that, having been produced without the addition of a special binder, they burn with less smoke than any other briquettes. Considerable coke is also used in Berlin. The coal briquettes produced in Germany increased from 0,250,000 tons in 1901 to about 16,200,000 tons in 1907, while the production in 1910 will exceed 18,000,000 tons.—Consular Report

Calumnious Reports.

Writing to The Tribune from Lucerne. F. In paying a tribute to Ambassador Bryce he said: "He has come to be regarded as the ambassador of Canada." The treaties in which Canada was concerned had been negotiated by him.

ment:

Mr. Brodeur remarked that this made no difference. He contended that thruout the history of the question the bay had been regarded as an open sea. It had been excluded from the Chamberlain-Bayard treatly of 1888.

NOVA SCOTIA WATER POWERS

A Brief Summary of the Present Situation in the Province.

The Province of Nova Scotia has no large rivers and the watersheds on which water may be collected are comparatively small. Six hundred square miles is about the area of the largest watershed in the province that the writer is aware of, and the average watershed area of streams is probably not more than one-third that amount. This is compensated for to some extent, however, by the fact that many of our streams have a rapid descent and offer fairly high heads for the utilization of the water. In the province there are powers to be found capable of development under heads of from 100 to 400 feet, altho in every case where such high head exists the watershed is limited in extent. I may say in this connection that I have investigated one water-power having but ten square miles of watershed which is well worth development, as there is a total fall of 275 feet in a little over two miles, as well as practically unlimited opportunities for storage of water on the watershed.

In all parts of the province there are water-powers which have not so far received attention. On others of our streams the development is fairly well advanced, and some few of our

our streams the development is fairly well advanced, and some few of our rivers, particularly the Mersey and St. Croix, are at present generating quite an amount of power. At the same time and in general it is true that so far our power developments have been on those streams which have the greatest

powers on streams having a deficiency of natural reservoirs.

It is most unfortunate that so far no data as to stream flow in the province of Nova Scotia is obtainable. The only information to be had bearing on the subject is the rainfall records taken at a few places in the province. It is not often that even the rainfall records for the immediate locality of the streams are to be got, and recourse must be had to records for other places, distant sometimes over a hundred miles. It is evident that calculation based on such data must be after all only an approximation, the accuracy of which will demation, the accuracy of which will de-pend in large measure on the judgment and experience of the one who is mak-

At this date so little demand for water-power has been in evidence that all the facts in connection with some of the best Nova Scotia water-powers are not even fully known. It is found that, as a rule, the majority of our large factories are located in the large centres of population, and for many of the different factories there are considerations which make this imperamany uses to which our scattered powers could be put, of which the more vigorous prosecution of our mineral development is only one. Besides very many of our powers are sufficiently large to warrant the expense of quite lengthy transmission lines in order to venient point where manufacturing can G.
