WILLING TO EXPROPRIATE GAS CO. WITHOUT CONSENT
Hamilton Deputation Coming Down to the Legislature To-day—Censured Factory Inspector.

HAMILTON, March 6.—(Special.)—At the joint meeting of the board of control and legislative committee this evening, the Hamilton bill, in which the city seeks power to go into the gas business, was considered. The Ontario Pipe Line Company and the Hamilton Gas Light Company protested against that part of the bill which authorizes the city to expropriate the plant of the companies without their consent.

At the meeting of the city council this evening, it was decided to give the contract for the boiler and steam pumping station to cost \$4400, to the Goldie-McCullough Co. of Galt. The fire committee this evening instructed the city to provide plans for a new automobile fire fighting apparatus from the United States and Canadian firms building in the Patrick Barrett case this evening, brought in a verdict strongly censuring the Hamilton Milling Company for allowing a wheel to be unprotected, so that Barrett could fall upon it. It also censured the factory inspector for not having seen that the wheel was protected.

PLANS FOR PORT OF ANTWERP. Antwerp, generally admitted to be in point of tonnage among the four largest ports in the world, is on the river Scheldt, about fifty-three miles from the North Sea. This river, navigable for transoceanic steamers about four miles above Antwerp, furnishes an excellent entrance and exit for the vast trade not only with the rich and thickly populated country of Belgium, but also with the northeastern part of France, Luxembourg, south Germany and Switzerland.

This traffic passing thru Antwerp is growing so fast, that the city has become difficult in supplying the necessary means for port extension. A sitting of the city council, held on the 1st inst., has carried out its project for cutting an entirely new bed for the river. The plan is to excavate the river bed to a depth of from two to three feet, and to divide it into two parts: (1) The river, the front of which will be made by a dam, and will be used for fully three miles in the direction of the inland shipping, such as coal, tin, etc.; six dry docks, 4,500,000 square feet of sheds, innumerable warehouses, steamships, a harbor and electric powerhouses; a sheer of 120 tons, two-hundred-ton cranes, one five-ton crane, one six-ton crane, one five-ton crane, and nearly 400 hydraulic and electric cranes of smaller capacity; an apparatus for shipping goods; one of lifting twenty-five-ton trucks; one barge with two movable appliances for the transshipment of ores; fifty hydraulic or electric working cranes, etc.

Along the edge of the quays and over the railway tracks, there are ninety-one hydraulic movable cranes of one and a half to two ton capacity. The cranes are of uniform type, and revolve on four-meter gauge line, thus allowing a railway to pass between the archways, and to manoeuvre freely. Communication from the main line to the quays is established by eight-wheeled sliding platforms, on which the trucks are hauled transversely. By raising the platform, the latter undertook to supply the power necessary for the cranes. The platform is placed along the quays for moving the sliding platforms and also the railway trucks along the quays. The fact is that the plan is to excavate the river bed to a depth of from two to three feet, and to divide it into two parts: (1) The river, the front of which will be made by a dam, and will be used for fully three miles in the direction of the inland shipping, such as coal, tin, etc.; six dry docks, 4,500,000 square feet of sheds, innumerable warehouses, steamships, a harbor and electric powerhouses; a sheer of 120 tons, two-hundred-ton cranes, one five-ton crane, one six-ton crane, one five-ton crane, and nearly 400 hydraulic and electric cranes of smaller capacity; an apparatus for shipping goods; one of lifting twenty-five-ton trucks; one barge with two movable appliances for the transshipment of ores; fifty hydraulic or electric working cranes, etc.

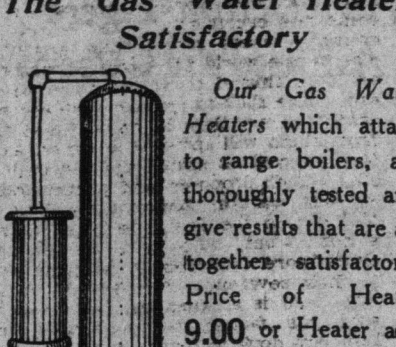
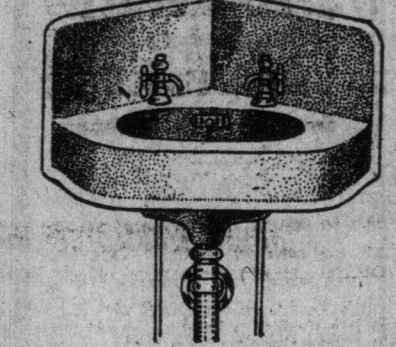

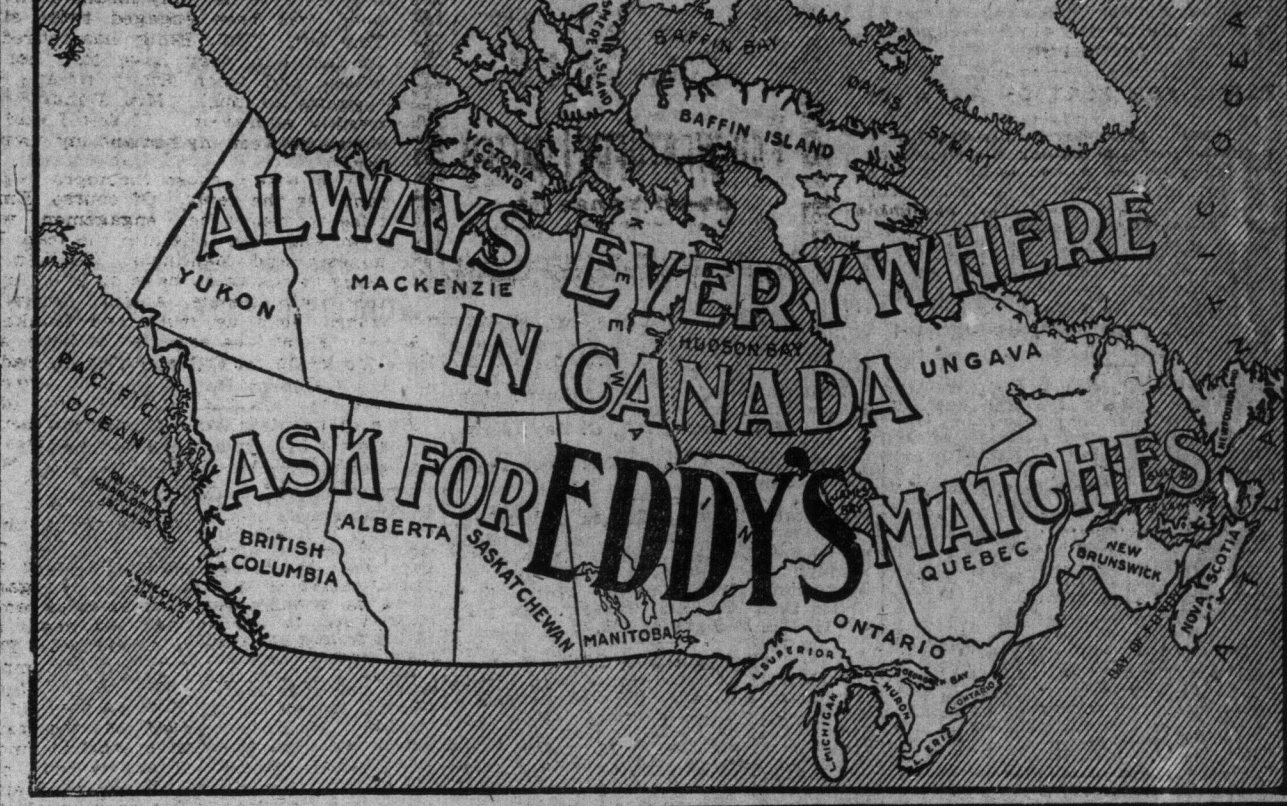

## Corn Scores Advance at Chicago Wheat Market Has Heavy Tone

### Corn Bought on Strength of Crop Report—Wheat Situation Still Weak—U. S. Wheat Visible Decreases.

CHICAGO, March 6.—Spring-like weather and millers holding aloof made a weak finish to-day for wheat. The close showed a loss of 1/4 to 3/8 compared with forty-eight hours before. In corn there was a net advance of 1/4 to 1/2, and in left unchanged to the below.

There were reports of higher temperatures, and that planting was in progress as far up as the Canadian Northwest. This condition, together with the fact that an advance of four cents since the middle of last week had failed to stimulate any demand on the part of manufacturers of flour, proved too much in favor of owners of wheat. During the middle of the day there was a decided display of strength owing to a big decrease in the U. S. visible supply. It was pointed out also that primary receipts this season had been 27,000,000 bushels less than last year, but that exports had fallen 25,000,000 bushels.

The close was easy at almost the low end of the season. May ranged at 95c to 96c, with last sales 95c to 96c down, at 95c to 96c.

Corn bought because of figures indicating a firm demand, mostly in excess of 1/2 year ago. May varied between 84c and 86c, closing steady, 85c to 86c up, at 85c.

Cash grain was firm. Oats, the following corn, did not do so well in a radical way. A number of the large local shorts covered. High and low limits for May were 81c and 82c, with the final price a shade above Saturday night, at 82c to 83c.

Realizing by packers eased off provisions. At the close pork was a shade to the lower, lard off a shade to 2/4c, and ribs unchanged to 7/16c decline.

"Port Mann will be laid out on a practical basis. It is a level town-site and the business and residential portions of the town will be separated by the physical lay of the land," he said.

### PORCUPINE ABSORBS PUBLIC INTEREST.

Any speculative interest in local financial circles to-day was given to the Porcupine stocks, which are being given a wider speculation every day. The Toronto stock market to-day was quiet with the exception of the interest taken in the unlisted securities.

The regular active listed issues were slightly heavy, the selling being quite prominent in Rio and Mackay.

President Mackenzie's statement that there is no immediate change of an increase in the Rio dividend dampened the ardor of the Rio bulls, and undoubtedly resulted in realizing that did not show profits to traders.

Mackay common declined in sympathy with the pathetic condition of Wall-street. Liquidation has followed the declaration of the regular dividend and impatient speculative holders are liable to release their stock without some special incentive which at present is not forthcoming.

Burt shares were strong and the market for same was good.

There was a heavy bid of enquiry for the semi-investment shares to-day, and such dealings as developed came from brokerage houses with a special following.

Preferred stocks of merit, bonds and the shares of financial institutions were looked after by those who think they observed the trend of the money market, but the transactions in these were light because of the smallness of offerings at what is supposed to be the current market.

The tendency will become narrower until something occurs to take it out of the rut. This will probably not be long. Would stand ready to buy on any prices for quick turns, but not stay too long. If we mistake not, several railroad dividends will have to be reduced before long. Shrinkage in traffic is starting them in the face. It is reported to be the purpose of the conference at Washington to-day between the railroad presidents and the commission, to try to arrange that advance schedules may again be enforced at the end of a set period if they find that increased operating expenses necessitate higher rates. The conference was a better tone at the opening of the market this morning. Influenced by the higher range of quotations asked from London. That city, however, did but little, selling possibly 5000 shares on balance. Business was not active and even in the first hour, which is usually the best, total transactions footed only 91,000 shares with less than half that amount for the succeeding period. Professional operations were responsible to a large extent for the bulk of the transactions. Also the room sentiment was said to be bearish. It is remarkable how firm the market holds, notwithstanding. Evidently some of the larger operators are not inclined to increase the bears. The Bank of England rate of discount is expected to be lowered next Thursday. Closing prices were slightly off from highest. We are still believers in higher prices and would buy on all breaks for trading turns.

### BIG SUIT OVER LOGS

Claim Made by Paper Co. That Quebec Bank Unlawfully Seized Them.

An injunction restraining the Quebec Bank and the George Gordon Company, lumbermen of Cacine Bay, Ont., from taking possession of the logs and balsam logs valued at \$20,000 from the defunct Imperial Paper Mills of Sturgeon Falls, and E. R. C. Clarkson, receiver, is being asked of Justice Britton in the non-jury spring assizes.

Unsettled damages are also asked by the paper company, and the assizes were for the alleged loss, which was incurred when the defendants (the Quebec Bank), who claimed the logs as security for money loaned, looted them from the river boom where they were held and allowed them to mix with the logs of the Gordon Company.

E. R. C. Clarkson, the receiver, claims that the securities of the bank give them an unfair preference over the other creditors.

The case will proceed to-day.

### Creditors Get Less Than Third.

The estate of W. G. Beggs of Collingwood, who assigned to N. L. Martin a couple of weeks ago, has just about been settled. The liabilities were \$72,000, and the assets \$42,000. The stock was sold at 70 cents, which will mean about 32 1/2 cents for the creditors. Two Toronto houses and one Montreal house were large creditors.
