These drovers wanted to know why the Davies Company on Wednes. day of this week, at Bowmanville, paid Toronto prices, or \$7 per cwt. to farmers, while at Pickering, a point where there is no competition, they only paid \$6.75. A buyer from Shelburne stated that the Davies buyers on Wednes. day, at that point, sixty five miles from Toronto was paying \$7 per cwt. and said that it would cost 50 cents per cwt to deliver them in Toronto and that, instead of \$7 being quoted in yesterday's paper as the Toronto price, \$7.50 was nearer the value of hogs. 




