DISEASE KILLED DOCTORS SWEAR

Dr. Graham Chambers Stoutly of Opinion That Perkins' Death Was Due to Natural Causes and Clashes With Prosecutor.

MRS. MACDONALD'S STATEMENT

Disputes Its Accuracy and Excuses Her Signing It—Contradicts Mrs. Johnston—Whence Came the Pill Box?

CAYUGA, April 22.—(Special.)—The trial of Mrs. Mattie Perkins resumed at 1 o'clock this afternoon, and the defense submitted some strong testimony concerning the mysterious pill box.

George McArthur, who with a cousin of the prisoner testified that a week before the arrest he had carefully searched the Perkins' house in an endeavor to find strychnine tablets, and swore that the drawers of the kitchen cabinet did not contain the box which has been produced in court, and in which Dr. Ellis found strychnine crystals.

Mr. Arnold sought to break the story on the ground that he had made no definite search for a box, or made any memoranda.

"What did you expect to find?" asked Mr. Arnold, on cross-examination, "an elephant of a pink pill?"

Justice Mabee asked several questions upon this point, and Mrs. Hensley, a sister of the prisoner, explained the writing of the word "poison" in a book by telling of a conversation she and Mrs. Johnston had.

Mrs. Johnston sought unsuccessfully to prevent the signed statement from going in at evidence, and the contents of which she in part repudiated.

The evening session was almost entirely taken up with medical evidence and the defense is nearly closed.

It is possible that a verdict may be given within 24 hours, or that the jury will have announced a disagreement.

A. K. Goodman, a practicing barrister of Cayuga, said he had known the Perkins intimately since their marriage.

Mrs. McDonald testified that she had been a neighbor of the Perkins for several years, and that she had often visited Mrs. Perkins, and on several occasions stayed all night with her.

DR. FALCONER MAY BE FINAL CHOICE FOR VARSITY HEAD

Many of the Board of Governors Said to Have Found in Him the Man for the Presidency.

The board of governors of Toronto University are at last converging towards the appointment of a new president for the university.

The governors have had a herculean task to perform—to make the choice of one individual, upon whose shoulders they can conscientiously and preferably, enthusiastically, place the responsibility not only of maintaining the fame of the university, but of broadening and widening its influence.

A great many names, very carefully considered as eligible, have been narrowed down to that of a few outstanding names, and The World is informed that in all probability one of these stands out prominently as the man who will probably be elected by the board.

Dr. Falconer is, in the opinion of a man qualified to judge, considered a very strong man for this position.

Members of the board last night admitted that one of the government's chief aims was to secure the approval of the conference that the government establish a Transvaal Boer volunteer force.

OTTAWA, April 22.—(Special.)—Today in the house was devoted to the Hamilton Radial Railway bill, and at 11 o'clock to-night the government struck its colors and suddenly retired from the field.

The bill itself was not so objectionable as it came to the house from the railway committee. Indeed, it was no worse than many bills that have been carelessly passed in days gone by.

Mr. Campbell (Centre York) took a bold stand in supporting the bill, and contended that it was an attempt to have a trolley line from Hamilton to Toronto given power to carry passengers inside the boundaries of the city, before negotiating with the city for terms.

Mr. Henderson (Halter) supported Mr. Campbell. Railways should not be excluded from Toronto.

Mr. Macdonell (South Toronto) declared that the bill was a "bluff" and that the people of Toronto were opposed to their fellow-citizens freely coming to Toronto.

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

COMMITTEE TO REPORT ON CONDITION OF CELLS... Ald. Gardner Says They're Unsanitary—Ald. Lees Complains About Accounts...

HAMILTON, April 22.—(Special.)—After hammering away ever since the beginning of the year, Ald. Gardner succeeded in getting a committee appointed this evening by the markets committee to investigate the condition of No. 3 police station. He declared that the cells were in a disgusting unsanitary condition. Ald. Lees found fault with several accounts. He complained that hundreds of dollars were being spent by the chairman without consulting the committee, but his colleagues assured him that all the accounts were perfectly correct.

Harvey Richards was arrested this evening. The police accuse him of preying upon drunks around hotels. The husband who this morning was let down with a \$3 fine, got into trouble a few hours after his release, and was locked up again on a charge of drinking.

HAVE SOME FIREBRANDS CONVICTED AUTOISTS IN CANADA, SAYS LAURIER MAY LOSE LICENSES

Premier's Reason for Opposing Justices of the Peace Asked to Send Records to the Provincial Secretary's Dept.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) LONDON, April 22.—Premier Laurier, interviewed by the Canadian Associated Press, said: "It is well known my views were against the Imperial council. I was against it, as I did not wish that resolutions might be passed over here that might cause trouble in Canada, for you know," said Sir Wilfrid with a smile, "we have some firebrands in Canada, Bourassa and others."

"I wanted an Imperial council committee, to be under the supervision of the colonial office, so that in any dispute which might arise we would have a responsible minister to deal with. I pointed to the difficulty we had in Canada when the war in South Africa broke out, when there were some misgivings on the part of the French-Canadian, but they were finally brought around."

"In New Zealand and Australia, where they have an one nationality, such matters are made easier."

"To the suggestion that the result of the present conference will only be that the representatives of the different parts of the empire will become better acquainted, Sir Wilfrid replied that the fact that Bourassa and Jameson, two men who fought against each other, were members of the conference, would tend greatly towards the confederation of South Africa."

A Sydney cable says Premier Deakin's attempt to get rid of a colonial office intervention is exciting keen interest, now it is understood the history of the relations of the colonial office and the Australian colonies is one long chapter of dissatisfaction.

The position of the ministers accompanying the premiers continues unsatisfactory. The opening day Sir William Lyne threatened Lord Elgin he would leave the country within 24 hours if not allowed to participate in the conference. It now transpires that one of the ministers who sit behind the premiers "felt so like a child sitting with its finger in its mouth, keeping good," that he lost patience and broke the silence, wanting to know who he was, what he was and why he was not sitting alongside his own prime minister.

The Canadian Associated Press understands Lord Elgin looked hurt and Winston Churchill glared disapproval without, however, overawing the despatch.

60 CASES OF SMALLPOX. Malignant outbreak and one death in Huron County.

Hay and Stephen townships, Huron County, are the last points heard from in regard to the smallpox outbreak. It is reported to be serious, as the cases are of a malignant type of the disease, and one death has occurred. Dr. Bell, the Provincial Board of Health inspector, made an investigation on the 21st inst. of the nature of the local authorities to supply information, and from the suspicious nature of the circumstances. No fewer than 50 cases were cleared up, and a number of the patients had no medical attendance.

The death of one occurred at Dashwood, and the condition of the others is dangerous. The provincial authorities are taking every precaution to confine and extinguish the scourge.

JAPS' PEACE PROPOSALS. Principally Along the Line of How to Wage War.

TOKYO, April 22.—According to The Japan Mail, the Japanese delegates at The Hague peace conference will present a series of independent propositions, among them being the conclusion of conventions for the conduct of battle on land and at sea, the use of mines in commercial routes, the use of wireless telegraphy between belligerent forces and points in neutral territory, the use of neutral ports for belligerent purposes, methods for declaring the opening of hostilities, and the limitation of armaments.

BRITAIN'S PEACE ENVOYS. LONDON, April 22.—The British delegates to the peace conference at The Hague are: Sir Edward Fry, ex-lord Justice of appeal, and a member of the permanent court of arbitration at The Hague; Sir Ernest Satow, ex-British minister at Tokyo and Paris, and a member of the permanent court of arbitration at The Hague; Lord Reay, president of the Royal Asiatic Society and University College, London, and a member of the privy council, and Sir Henry Fowdler, the British minister at The Hague.

Mining Editor World: At last we have heard from Foster. W. K. George, president, and W. H. NEW LONDON, Conn., April 22.—United States Steamboat Inspectors Whitney and Stewart today made public their finding in the steamer Larchmont marine disaster, on the night of Feb. 11, when more than 100 lives were lost in the sinking of the steamer after collision with the schooner Harry Knowlton in Block Island Sound.

The responsibility for the collision is laid upon Pilot John L. Anson of the Larchmont, who was drowned.

"While it is true that the Larchmont was equipped with boats and rafts in excess of lawful requirements," say the inspectors, "only a sufficient portion of her boats to cover the boatage prescribed for passenger steamers of her tonnage was efficiently davited. This, in our opinion, accounts for the fact that only five of the Larchmont's eight boats reached Block Island."

SHUT OUT LORD ABERDEEN. (Canadian Associated Cable.) LONDON, April 22.—Lord Aberdeen and party were refused admission to the Canadian Pavilion at Dublin Exhibition by the man on duty, who said his orders were imperative, though the officials explained who the visitor was. Aberdeen got the name of the man, and said he deserved to be commended.

REGINA, Sask., April 22.—(Special.)—The Standard (Liberal) publishes an editorial insinuating that parliament cannot prorogue until secret has been given to the findings of the lumber commission's report, which declared that the dealers in the west had combined to raise prices.
