THE GOVERNMENT NOW PANIC-STRIKEN

what it really was? Why pass an act to say black is white?

A Grave Scandal. I feel that the striking panic, irrespective of politics, will look upon it as a grave scandal that the very men, whose seats are being attacked in the Legislature, in the courts, should be the persons to vote on this extraordinary proposed legislation. The accused, after having pleaded in the courts, is now called upon before the trial begins to sit in judgment in his own case and to take the decision out of the hands of the impartial and properly appointed judges of the land.

Years ago, questions as to the due election of members of Parliament were decided, not by the courts, but by a Parliamentary Committee. One of the greatest reforms introduced into this country and one that was approved of by all parties was the transferring of these questions to the courts of law. But in this instance we are asked to go backwards and have the Legislature, instead of the courts, with two of its important limbs amputated, may live a little longer.

Blunder and Humiliation. I don't think that Mr. Hardy has in this move shown his usual shrewdness. It looks to me as if he had been guided, not by his own judgment, but that he yielded to the impetuosity of those who foresee their heads about to be cut off by the law. The proposed legislation may please the holder and the office-seeker, but it will be a humiliation to the majority of the independent and intelligent men of the Liberal party. It will help to swell the ranks of those for some time been running in the province against the Government.

Years' Unfair Advantage. Mr. E. F. Clarke, M.P., had fire in his eye when he asked his opinion of the August session of the Provincial House. "I think it an extraordinary move on the part of the Premier," he replied, "to take from the courts the question of the right of the majority to vote and leave it in the hands of a party, some of whose members owe their seats to these very constables. In some cases the majorities are so small that if the vote is divided the seats will be changed hands, and the Liberals will be the Government have taken a very unfair advantage of their political opponents," he exclaimed Mr. Clarke, "hereby. KILLED AT THE CROSSING. Father and Daughter Lose Their Lives at Downsview.

Whistle Blowing From the City. Mr. Jacob Stong and Mrs. Peterbaugh Were Caught by the Northern Express and Instantly Killed—Another Daughter Likely to Die.

At 7:30 last night, as the Northern train, No. 98, in charge of Conductor W. M. Home, was rushing past the crossing near Hamilton, July 13.—(Special.)—The Harbor Committee was in session for an hour this evening, Ald. Fearnside presiding. At the recommendation of the City Solicitor the committee decided to ask the Public Works Department to supply a copy of the Act Respecting Public Harbors. The secretary suggested to send a letter to the Smelting Works Company, thanking them for making an opening in the dock at the works. The Dominion Government will be asked to send the dredge at present at Oakville to this port.

Where is Leonard? Mrs. W. H. Schofield, 237 Ferguson-avenue, north, has asked the police to try to find her step-father, who has been missing for several weeks. The missing man's name is David P. Leonard, and he left Kamloops, B.C., to come to Hamilton. It is believed that he was used only as far as Winnipeg. His (remains) arrived in Hamilton some time ago.

A Lawless Crowd. About 1000, this morning a special train on the T. & E. R. from the Fort Erie road pulled into the crossing at Downsview. The train was crowded with lawless and rowdy elements. The horses broke away unhurt, but the father and Mrs. Peterbaugh were killed outright, while Miss Stong was terribly mangled and tossed over the fence. Miss Stong was completely decapitated and her daughter bruised beyond recognition. The cowcatcher of the train was totally wrecked.

Her Life in Jeopardy. Miss Judith Jane Stong, who was in the wrecked rig, and is the only one left alive, was brought down to the crossing by a horse-drawn ambulance. A bright, healthy young woman, she was completely decapitated and her daughter bruised beyond recognition. The cowcatcher of the train was totally wrecked.

Respecting the Killed. Jacob Stong was 70 years of age, a man of massive build, standing fully 5'10". He was born in York Township, and lived up to the time of his last decease on the 4th concession of the said Township—the last lot on the town line. He was respected and loved by all his friends, and his death is a great loss to the community.

Eye-Witnesses' Story. Mrs. Baker, who, with two children, was standing on the platform where the accident happened, was seen at her home, 111 Edmund-street, Toronto, yesterday. Washington, July 13.—The Navy Department today posted the following memorandum of information received from Admiral Sampson:

"Santiago, July 27, 1898.—The landing of the army was completed yesterday afternoon, all having been disembarked with the addition of 2075 of General Garcia's forces.

"The Yales arrived with 1300 troops and these are now being debarked at Siboney. The vessels of this squadron are now patrolling a coast line of nearly 2000 miles, a line greater in extent than that patrolled by 600 ships during the civil war.

CANADA, THE EMPIRE'S PIONEER.

Mr. Mulock's Strong Postage Stamp Commended—Large Decrease in Imports Reported.

London, July 13.—Everywhere to-day in the press and among the public, Canada is heartily congratulated on her successful stand against British officialdom in the matter of Imperial postage.

The trade returns are less favorable than they have been for many recent months. While the exports to the United Kingdom from all countries increased 7 1/2 per cent, the imports from the United Kingdom to all countries increased 2 per cent, and decreased 4 per cent, respectively.

The chief increases in imports from Canada for the six months were: Wheat 230,000, value \$1,000,000; butter 400,000, value \$800,000; and live stock 400,000, value \$1,000,000.
