THE BOER ADVANCE BEGINS; A SIMULTANEOUS INVASION!

Enemy Are Preparing to Enter British Territory at Five Separate Points, Therefore It Is Impossible to Guess Their Plan of Campaign.

Orange Free State and the Transvaal Will Make a Common Cause—Britain's Reply to the Impudent Ultimatum Accepting War as the Recourse—British Agent Greene Has Left Pretoria—Latest from the Scene.

The British diplomatic agent in the Transvaal has left Pretoria. There was no truth in the rumor that Mr. Greene had been assassinated.

Martial law has been declared in the Transvaal, and British subjects, without passports, must leave the Republic within eight days.

Judging from present appearances, the Boers are marching to the frontier, the plan being a simultaneous invasion of British territory at five separate points: Laing's Nek, Kimberley, Vryburg, Mafeking and Lobatsi. As yet not a shot has been fired.

London, Oct. 12.—When the Cabinet meets at noon to-day it is evident the Boer advance will be in full swing. Judging from present appearances, the Boers are preparing for a simultaneous invasion at five separate points—Laing's Nek, Kimberley, Vryburg, Mafeking and Lobatsi—therefore it is almost impossible to guess the plan of campaign.

Boers Seize a Station. A despatch from Durban, dated Thursday, 8 o'clock a.m., announces that the Boers seized Albertina station and demanded the keys, which were delivered to them by the station master, who reached Ladysmith on a trolley. The excitement at Ladysmith is increasing and the troops are ready to act at a moment's notice.

The Eastern Telegraph Company, Limited, announces that no code messages will be accepted for Cape Town.

BRITAIN'S REPLY TO THE BOERS.

LONDON, Oct. 12.—The following is the text of the British reply to the Boer ultimatum sent Oct. 10, at 10.45 p.m.:

Chamberlain to Milner, High Commissioner: "Her Majesty's Government have received with great regret the peremptory demand of the South African Republic, conveyed in your telegram of Oct. 9.

"You will inform the Government of the South African Republic, in reply, that the conditions demanded by the Government of the South African Republic are such as Her Majesty's Government deem it impossible to discuss."

At the present juncture is peculiar. While the Transvaal has virtually declared war, technically Great Britain and the Free State Boers are on friendly terms. It is alleged that the Free State Boers have been endeavoring to induce the Boers to cross the Caledon River and consent to a conference in the belief that they favor the Transvaal, but it is understood that the Boers refuse the idea.

So far as news received thus far shows no shot has yet been fired. The evacuated district between Christown and Newcastle has an area of 250 square miles and consists chiefly of hilly moorland, sparsely populated.

There is no abatement of the anti-English feeling on the Continent.

War Party on Top. Although a considerable minority of the English public regard war with grave misgivings, it is practically impossible for this feeling to get voice at the present juncture.

Men who are arriving here report that the Boers are still streaming from different directions and districts to the Natal frontier, many of whom have been refused by the existing officers going on foot.

Boers Occupy a Railway. Vryburg, Oct. 12.—(Special.)—A body of Boers has cut the border fence, advanced to the railway and cut the telegraph wires. Two thousand Boers are now occupying the railway line.

How the Boers Took the Reply. Cape Town, Oct. 12.—The reply of the Imperial Government to the Transvaal ultimatum is published here. It was accompanied by instructions to Mr. Conyngham Greene, the British diplomatic agent at Pretoria, to ask for his passports.

Free States Moving Westward. Cape Town, Oct. 12.—Last evening the Orange Free State commando moved nearer the Natal border, in the direction of Modder River.

Fund for the Refugees. London, Oct. 12.—Five of the leading South African firms in London have subscribed £2000 each to the Lord Mayor's fund for the relief of the refugees.

To Stop Supplies for Boers. Port Elizabeth, Cape Colony, Oct. 12.—The rail authorities have ordered the stoppage of supplies for the Boers.

Quebec, Que., Oct. 12.—The annual session of the Methodist General Missionary Board opened to-day in the Young Men's Christian Association Building, with about 40 members, under the presidency of Rev. A. Carman, D.D., General Superintendent of the Methodist Church in Canada.

Ottawa, Oct. 12.—A reception was tendered to-night in the Basilica to Archbishop Falconio, the Papal delegate to Canada. The delegate arrived at the Central Station at 6.30. He was driven immediately to Archbishop Duhamel's residence.

Winnipeg, Oct. 12.—(Special.)—The blacksmiths and boiler-makers all over the western division of the C.P.R. quit work at 15 o'clock, in sympathy with the striking machinists. The definite reason given is that the company did not hold a conference with the committee representing the men as a union.

Like a Civil War. Pretoria, Oct. 11.—(Delayed in transmission.)—Five hundred Britishers have applied to the Landrood to remain in Pretoria. Permits to those considered eligible will be granted only after the proclamation of martial law.

Amsterdam, Oct. 12.—A despatch to the Handled from Batavia, capital of the Netherlands Indies, Java, says that a violent earthquake has visited the south side of the island of Ceram, next to the largest of the Moluccas, between Booro and Paupa, completely destroying the Town of Amhel and killing, it is estimated, some 4000 persons, as well as injuring some 500 others.

MR. TARTE THREATENS TO RESIGN IF CANADIAN CONTINGENT GOES

There Was a Hot Time at the Meeting of the Laurier Cabinet Yesterday—No Decision Reached—Another Meeting This Morning.

There is trouble in the Laurier-Tarte Cabinet at Ottawa. After a long meeting of the Cabinet yesterday the Ministers were forced to admit that no decision as to whether a Canadian contingent be sent to the Transvaal, in the interests of the empire, had been reached.

Mr. Tarte, who is still master of the Cabinet, prevented the announcement which loyal Canadians are anxiously awaiting being made to-day. If the contingent goes at Canada's expense Mr. Tarte says he will resign. Efforts at a compromise were futile. The Cabinet meets again to-day at 10 a.m.

Can Sir Wilfrid Hold Him? To-night the Premier and Mr. Tarte went down to the cathedral to assist in the reception to the Papal delegate. The function was over before 10 o'clock, but Sir Wilfrid did not seek his nocturnal rest until midnight. He spent the intervening two hours with his stiff-necked Minister, trying to soothe his wounded feelings and flatter him into a yielding frame of mind against the next meeting of the Cabinet, which has been called for to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

Mr. Tarte Will Resign. That a force of Canadian volunteers will go to South Africa to fight for justice under the British flag seems certain, but if it goes as a Canadian contingent, sent by the Canadian Government, and paid out of the public funds of the Dominion, Mr. Tarte will resign.

Tricked a Compromise, But No! At to-day's Council compromise was tried upon him in vain. Weaklings of the Government, and there are too many of them, to expect a thoroughly honorable course to

be taken by the Government at this juncture, were willing to call the force a Canadian volunteer corps to serve with the British army in the field, and to be paid in part by the Imperial and in part by the Canadian Government. But Mr. Tarte was obdurate. It looked, when Council broke up at 6 o'clock, as if he would hold out against the majority and make good his word to have his way or quit the Ministry.

Sir Wilfrid may have written him to a more yielding frame of mind to-night. To-morrow will tell.

Sorry Spectacle From Abroad. Meantime, the sorry spectacle which is degrading Canada in the eyes of Britons beyond the sea, and filling every true British-Canadian with shame and resentment is to be prolonged yet another day.

The Executive of the Conservative Association of Ottawa met to-night and adopted this resolution, seconded by Dr. Routhier, French-Canadian: "That a special vote of thanks be tendered to the Conservative and Independent papers in Canada, for bringing the Laurier Government to a sense of its duty with regard to the sending of a contingent of Canadian troops to assist our fellow-colonists in South Africa and the Mother Country, under whose protection we live, thereby giving expression to our loyal and practical sympathy with the British Empire."

THE LIBERAL SPLIT IN THE NORTHWEST

Between the Siftonites and Their Opponents There is an Acute War.

TANGLE IN ARRANGEMENTS

Resulted in a Chilling Reception to Hon. David Mills at Regina Yesterday.

SIFTONITES HAD THE SPEAKER.

But the Antis Had the Crowd, and the Attendance Was Most Disappointing.

Regina, N.W.T., Oct. 12.—(Special.)—Hon. David Mills agreed when going west to address the Regina Liberals on his way east, but owing to a wrong construction put on the telegram to him, he was advertised to speak under the auspices of the Junior Association, consequently the Regina Liberal Association, or anti-Sifton element, took no part whatever. Mr. Pettigill and the Executive were invited to the car, and Mr. Mills there expressed his sorrow at the state of affairs here, and appeared much disappointed when he found he was not fulfilling his engagement with the senior association.

Scott Was Condemned. Mr. Walter Scott, editor of The Regina Leader, has the patronage at Regina, and the district association has not been consulted with regard to this matter in particular for over a year.

A Chilly Affair. The reception in the afternoon was attended by about a dozen, and the meeting at night would have been a failure had not a lot of Normantites, now attending at Regina, put in an appearance. Only for the unpopularity of the Scott Association, the welcome to Mr. Mills would have been largely attended and enthusiastic.

Mr. Mills Has Hopes. The address given from Scott's association, expressed dissatisfaction with the existing tariff and hoped to see a change. It also referred to the elevator and railway monopolies, and trusted that steps would be taken to remedy the evils.

Mr. Mills, in reply, stated that the tariff was not satisfactory to him, and he hoped to see it improved. As to the elevator and railway grievances complained of, he was not conversant with them, but hoped soon to be.
