# JAPS SEIZING RUSSIA'S NORTH PORT FLEET NOT IN HARBOR

### Czar's Ships at Mouth of Tumen River Covering Movements of Troops.

#### ALEXIEFF REPORTS NO DAMAGE.

Yinkow, March 7.—An official despatch received here says the Japanese are again bombarding Vladivostok. This news lacks confirmation from other sources.

#### JAPS HOVERING ABOUT.

London, March 7.—A despatch to the Central News from St. Petersburg says telegrams received from Vladivostok say that seven Japanese ships approached that port at 10 o'clock this morning, entered Usuri Bay at about noon and after some manoeuvring started out seaward.

#### FLEET IN THE TUMEN.

Tokio, March 7.—It is believed that the Vladivostok squadron is now in the vicinity of the mouth of the Tumen River, engaged in covering the movements of Russian troops from Possett Bay to the Valley of the Tumen.

Russian scouts are reliably reported to have penetrated south as far as Klungung. The earlier Russian movement into Northern Korea was regarded as a diversion, but it now appears that a considerable force has been sent there.

It is thought that the Russians may occupy and fortify some strong position on the Tumen river, and that the Russian movements in North-western Korea are mesare and unrelaxing.

#### ALEXIEFF AGAIN VAGUE.

St. Petersburg, March 7.—Victory Alexieff has telegraphed the czar from Mukden, under today's date, as follows:

"Supplementary to my telegram of March 6, I most humbly report that at 1.25 p.m. five out of seven of the enemy's ships approached the ports Suvaroff and Linvitch, on the Tumen river, on the roadstead and along the valley of the River Obyskenensky."

The firing lasted until 2.15 p.m., at which hour the Japanese squadron began to steam to the southward, disappearing out of sight at 6.30 p.m. There were no losses on the batteries or the fortifications.

In the town one man was wounded, and one woman was killed, according to information just received. The enemy's squadron again appeared in sight of the fortress at 8 o'clock this morning.

A later message from the victory says that the commander at Vladivostok reports that yesterday's bombardment inflicted no serious losses on the port. The fortress did not return the enemy's fire.

Today at midday the enemy again entered Usuri Bay and approached to point from which they bombarded the harbor on March 6. They left again, making for the open sea."

#### YANKES FOR PIRATES.

St. Petersburg, March 7.—The Associated Press learns that the Russian authorities have been approached indirectly by American shipping firms desiring authority to fit out privateers to prey upon Japanese commerce, but that they were not successful.

#### WAR NOTES.

Vladivostok, March 7.—The Russians are hunting for Japanese. Any person concealing them will be punished. It is said only one person, and that a woman, was killed by Sunday's bombardment. A few Russians were wounded.

Scout March 7.—The Russian soldiers operating in the vicinity of Aynia are committing all manner of excesses, treating the natives with cruelty, and perpetrating robberies upon every opportunity. Korean soldiers attacked a number of the invaders there yesterday, the 4th instant, and succeeded in killing thirty of them.

St. Petersburg, March 7.—It is considered probable that the bombardment on Sunday was to cover a move by land against Vladivostok.

Tokio, March 7.—A number of trophies from the Russian cruiser Varing, including one gun, have been forwarded to the Japanese imperial court.

#### Drive on Sunday.

Hamilton, March 7.—Rev. T. Albert Moore, traveling secretary of the Lord's Army, preached here yesterday morning on Sabbath observance, and he was advertised to preach in Dundas in the evening. The preacher would have traveled on the electric cars, so he had to walk a distance of ten miles, in a heavy rainstorm. A boat was driven very wet when they arrived at their destination.

#### To Use Dynamite on Don.

# WHITTS DECISION OF COURT PERTH FULL OF FIGHT YET

### If Judgment Goes Against Town Deputation Will Ask Legislature to Reconsider.

Perth, March 7.—(Special.)—Renewed interest is manifested in Perth over the municipal ownership contest. The decision of the court is awaited with much anxiety. If the decision Wednesday is another defeat for the town, a mass meeting will be held at once and a delegation appointed to visit the legislature and urge the reconsideration of the bill. That the opposition company should be able without the aid of a single cent to place obstacles in the way of the municipal ownership movement is one of the causes for the intense dissatisfaction that prevails here.

#### Has Better Water Power.

Chairman Foy of the light committee of the council has pointed out that while the Canadian Electric Light and Power Company does not possess sufficient water to generate the power that is required for every-day service, the Perth company, which the city would purchase, has a dam at the headwaters of the Tay, or at least near the source of the opposition plant, and is in a position to increase its supply of water at will. The Canadian company, however, cannot increase its power. The banks surrounding the upper Tay are high and the height of water can be increased at small cost, but the contrary is true lower down the course of the river. The Perth company secures water. This is a subject worthy of consideration in view of the determination of the big company and its friends in the legislature to uphold the old plant on the city.

#### May Cause It Trouble.

In any event the Canadian company has aroused a spirit of hostility that threatens to cause that enterprise serious trouble immediately. While the company has a twenty-five year water franchise with the city, it has no franchise with the city, and its power merely occupies the streets of the town. The council is determined to prevent the company from removing these poles immediately. This is one of the propositions that will come up for consideration just as soon as the fight in the legislature is over.

#### Want Light All Night.

The sentiment is unanimous in favor of an all-night street lighting service. Perth. As the situation stands today, any meeting in a public building or private residence must be adjourned brought out in readiness for the lighting of the lights. Therefore every hotel and business house in the town is supplied with lamps for just such emergencies. For five months the citizens assert the use of oil lamps has been the stage of water in the Tay. The Canadian company is supposed to have steam power for use in such cases, but the plant is so out of date that the water power is depended upon wholly to supply the energy for lighting the residences.

#### Here is a Letter Mayor Stewart has Written the World on the Subject.

"I have thank you for the interest you are taking in our electric light matter. There can be no two sides to the justice and fairness of the town's position and the principle involved in our bill, which was consigned to the morgue by the private bills committee when they carried the twelve months' hold."

In 1890 when the Canadian Company's bill was before the legislature a committee from Perth was sent down to Toronto and kept there until satisfactory was secured. This bill will be duplicated if it becomes necessary to make another appeal to the legislature.

#### Gets Revenue From Town.


The revenue derived from the town by the Canadian Company is considerable. This is one reason why the citizens feel that the management is exhibiting a mean spirit in seeking to place obstacles in the way of the progressive element. The Canadian Company gets \$100 annually from the town for forty hydrants and \$14 for light supply the municipal buildings. This income will not be interfered with by the municipalization of the Perth lighting plant. There is nothing in the plan that contemplates competing with the Canadian Company any further than the city does. The Canadian Company claim, however, that the present management of the Perth Co. is unable to charge its plant or extend its business in any way, whereas if it is acquired by the town improvements will be made at once. In fact, thousands of dollars have been appropriated for these improvements by the town.

# ROSS GIVE OPTION OF CLOSING THE BARS WITH SHOP LICENSES

### Two Questions To Be Submitted to All Municipalities as Units Next January.

#### MORE RESTRICTION PROMISED

This morning Premier Ross will gather together his followers and submit his proposed temperance bill for their consideration. From a source that cannot be questioned The World learns that the measure will involve the principle of compulsory local option voted on simultaneously in all the municipalities of the province on the day of the next municipal elections. The questions to be submitted to the people are two:

1. Are you in favor of the closing of the bars and allow the sale of liquor in shops without breaking bulk.

2. Are you in favor of the sale of liquor in shops?

The women will have the right to vote on these two questions. Each municipality will be treated as a separate unit and wherever a majority is secured the local option law will go into effect. One unit may decide for no sale of any kind and another may vote to close the bars and allow the sale of liquor in shops without breaking bulk.

Where the act is not put in force the government proposes to RESTRICT THE SALE BY THE ADOPTION OF MORE STRINGENT REGULATIONS AND THE REDUCTION OF THE NUMBER OF LICENSES. Some temperance advocates have been urging the government to place the shops under a strict control, but it is a question whether it can be induced to adopt this principle, except as an experiment in a few municipalities. This will be the question submitted to the party to-day. The government is not anxious to set up an array of local treatments, but may yield to the advanced temperance sentiment to the extent of making a trial, and that successful abolishing this feature of the bill. In any case under the new bill there will be restrictive clauses affecting those municipalities which do not carry out the plan.

# BANK CLERK SHOT HIMSELF WAS TO EXPLAIN SHORTAGE

### Louis Appleton of Local Branch Molsons Bank Succeeded in Montreal Office.

Montreal, March 7.—(Special.)—Lucas B. Appleton, a clerk in the Toronto branch of the Molsons Bank, who had been summoned here by General Manager Elliott to explain an alleged shortage, committed suicide this afternoon outside the door of the head office.

Appleton called upon Mr. Elliott this morning, but was told by the general manager to come back in the afternoon, which he did, and while walking up and down the hallway outside the manager's office drew a revolver and discharged its contents into his brain. Appleton, who has a wife and family, died instantly. The remains were taken to the morgue and will be buried on Tuesday. The local officials decline to make a statement.

**LYDITE FALLING SHORT OF HIGH EXPECTATIONS**

**Boer War Showed Damage Done by Shells Was Not So Great as Anticipated.**

Lyddite, the explosive which is used in shells, takes its name from Lydd, an experimental and proving station in Kent, England. It became known as a new explosive in 1888, when a howitzer battery was sent out to the Sudan expedition equipped with Lyddite for use in the British expedition against the Sudan. It was found to have a terrible effect in the destruction of objects adjacent to where the shells fell. Lyddite is a simple picric acid brought into a dense state by fusion. Its function is not to send the shells to their destination, but to burst them when they arrive there. The Lyddite is packed into the shells, which have their fuse holes at the nose, and are cast into the air in order to lessen the effect of the gun's discharge on the explosive contents of the shell.

Artillerists had long been trying to invent a shell capable of being fired at a high angle of elevation, and of not merely dropping into an enemy's trench, but of bursting over their defenders. Lyddite it was thought on its introduction would be found to fulfill these conditions in a deadly degree.

At the beginning of the South African war, General Buller, the commander-in-chief of the Boers, was stated to have protested to General Buller, White at Ladysmith against the use of Lyddite as used in the naval gun brought into use by Captain Lambert, but the use of high explosive is regarded as permissible by all civilized powers, and all nations use high explosives in some form for the long range of torpedoes and submarines, even if they had not adopted them in the form of dynamite shells.

It remains doubtful after the experience of the British in the Boer war, whether the Lyddite shells effected so much destruction as was anticipated. The artillery regiments which were used in the Boer war, and the works on the Onela River during the battle of Colenso and its sequel, were not so much damaged as was expected. No account is given of the shells being used in the Boer war, but it is said that the French owners of the Panama Canal Company will be unable to furnish a clear title for sale to the United States.

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OF REAL POWER OF KOREA FAVORITE OF THE EMPIRE

Attracted Monarch's Attention by Ingenuity in Wringing Cash From the People.

Seoul, March 7.—It is difficult to imagine a more ignorant ruler of any country than is the Emperor of Korea, who, although he recently celebrated the fortieth anniversary of his coronation, has scarcely ever set foot outside the palace walls.

The emperor has to assist him in governing his country a council of state and a cabinet fully equipped with administrative offices, but none of them are suffered to decide the slightest item without first consulting his majesty. As it often occurs that the emperor refuses to see his ministers for weeks at a time, matters fraught with grave importance remain unsettled and unprogressed.

It has been stated with considerable truth that his majesty possessed but little idea of the present crisis between Japan and Russia, in which Korea is so largely involved, until the knowledge of the arrival at Seoul of foreign legations to protect the various legations (a necessary measure, as the people were becoming excited and no longer to be kept from him, and then he became immovably alarmed for his personal safety.

For several years the Emperor of Korea has relied upon the advice of Yeoungik, and such is the power wielded by this man that no one now dares to oppose him. The emperor has done so have often forfeited their lives or have been deported after being deprived of all their possessions.

His majesty's course, known of the dispute existing between Russia and Japan, and from time to time has long deferred, he was finally compelled to message, but Yeoungik has assured him that there was nothing to fear, that while possibly those nations might enter upon a war, he, Yeoungik, would arrange so that no trouble would result in Korea.

The business relations between Korea and the other countries should be conducted through the office of the minister but as Yeoungik controls that as well as all other departments, it has been found impossible to accomplish more than Yeoungik was willing should be done. Every avenue of approach to his majesty has been carefully guarded by this man, who has thus practically become the ruler of the kingdom.

Yeoungik is an illiterate, uneducated man, and, although unable to read or write, he succeeded, several years ago, in obtaining an important appointment in the government service. In this position he succeeded in attracting the Emperor's attention by the wonderful ingenuity he displayed in devising new plans for squeezing the people to obtain to enrich his majesty's personal coffers. It is impossible to enumerate the various schemes adopted by Yeoungik, but perhaps the one most generally known is to create false accusations of treason, and then confiscate all of the property of the accused and of his family.

No Cruelty Too Abhorrent. No form of cruelty has been neglected by Yeoungik in his determination to extract the last farthing from the miserable wretch who fell into his clutches. Sex made no difference, and thus deterred this man when he was in need of funds for his master. It was by this means that he continued to wield the power he possesses.

Personally an ill-favored, unkempt man, he is careful to live in very humble quarters, well knowing that his many favorites have fallen through yielding to habits of luxury and dissipation.

IN PURPLE AND GOLD.

Gorgeous Visitors to the Tibetan Mission of Younghusband.

Pharigze, Tibet, March 6.—The Timpuk Jongpen, the envoy from Bhutan, who has been conferring with the Tibetan general and endeavoring to persuade them, so far without result, to come to terms with the British, has returned to Phari from Tuna camp, greatly edified by the Maxims and typewriters which were used in his presence. He will probably proceed to Bhutan. The Jongpen has a retinue of 50 men, armed with long swords, with jeweled hilts, the scabbards being of silver inlaid with gold. The chief attendants are gorgeously clad in purple and gold tunics and richly embroidered fur caps. Huge Tibetan musk-tiffs accompanied the party.

The interview at Phari between the Jongpen and Mr. Walsh, the assistant commissioner, was imposing and picturesque. The British and the Tibetan were surrounded by eight trumpeters, with silver instruments over two feet long, and received the salute of "The Barren Rocks of Aisa" from the bugles of the 8th Gurkhas. He dismounted from his horse upon a stool covered with snow-leopard skin, and was carried forward a few yards before he stepped down to meet the assistant commissioner. According to custom, the Jongpen laid a white silk scarf over the head of the assistant commissioner as they shook hands.

The dinner, which took place at Tuna on the 18th, was interesting as being the first held between the British and Bhutan governments. Costly gifts were exchanged by the envoy and Colonel Younghusband. The hosts and the troops is so far good. At Tuna, there have been 10 cases of pneumonia, and one proved fatal, the patients dying of suffocation, owing to the restricted air.
