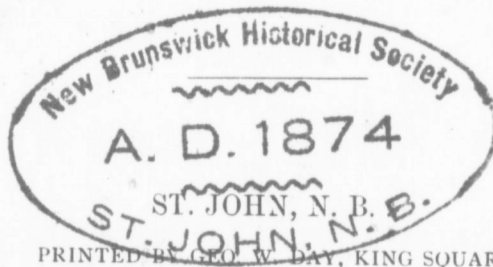

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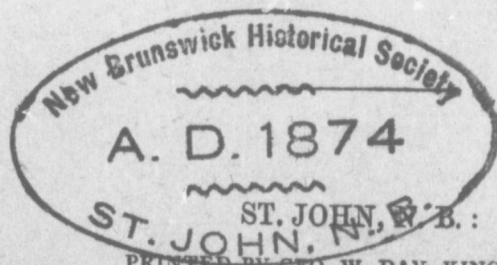

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RULES AND REGULATIONS
OF THE
NEW BRUNSWICK
AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY.

- I. That the Society be called the "AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK," for the purpose of co-operating with "*The British and Foreign Bible Society*," in promoting the distribution of the Holy Scriptures, both at home and abroad.
- II. That, conformably with the principles of the Parent Institution, the Bibles and Testaments to be circulated by the Society shall be without Note or Comment, and those in the language of the United Kingdom, of the authorised version only.
- III. That all persons subscribing *One Dollar*, or upwards, per annum, or *Twenty Dollars*, or upwards, at any one time, shall be members of this Society.
- IV. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, Depositary, and a Committee, consisting of not less than twelve other members of various religious denominations, with power to add to their number; and that five members of the Committee constitute a quorum.
- V. That the Ministers of all Evangelical Churches in the City are, *ex officio*, members of this Society. That every Clergymen, or other Minister, who is a member of this Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at the meetings of the Committee.
- VI. That the Committee shall appoint all the officers of the Society, and meet once every Quarter, or as often as the business shall require on some day to be fixed by themselves.
- VII. That the Committee shall divide Saint John into Districts, and appoint two or more of their members for each District, who may associate with themselves any subscribers, for the purpose of soliciting subscriptions and donations from the inhabitants thereof; and that they shall establish proper Agents and Correspondents in different parts within the limits of the Auxiliary Society.

VIII. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by the Society shall be applied, after deducting incidental expenses, in the first instance, to the purchase of such a number of Bibles and Testaments from the Parent Institution as are required for local supplies; that the surplus funds shall be given to the Parent Society as a free contribution; and that the Bibles and Testaments in the Society's Depository shall be sold at the prime sterling cost as currency.

IX. That for the purpose of giving full effect to the benevolent designs of the British and Foreign Bible Society, in their grant of the Scriptures for distribution among the poor, the Committee shall make it their business to enquire what families or individuals, residing within their several Districts, are in want of Bibles and Testaments, and unable to procure them, and that it shall be the duty of the Committee to furnish them therewith at prime cost, reduced price, or gratis, according to their circumstances.

X. That for the still further promotion of the circulation of the Scriptures, it is expedient to encourage the formation of *Branch Societies* in such Districts, within the sphere of the Auxiliary Society as may not be sufficiently populous to form Auxiliary Societies of their own; such Branch Societies, and the individual members thereof, to be entitled to the same privileges from the Auxiliary Society as it and its individual members enjoy from the Parent Institution.

XI. That such persons as may not find it convenient to become members of the Auxiliary Society, or any one of its Branches, shall, upon forming themselves into Bible Associations, be entitled to purchase at the Depository of this Society, under the direction of the Committee, copies of the Scriptures at prime cost, for sale, or at reduced prices, for gratuitous distribution among poorer neighbors.

XII. That all Clergymen and other Ministers, within the sphere of this Society, making collections in their respective congregations in behalf of this Institution, shall be entitled on remitting such collections to the Treasurer of this Society, to receive Bibles and Testaments to an amount not exceeding one half of the said respective collections, estimated at prime cost, as shall be found to be needed by the poor in the vicinity; such returns of Bibles and Testaments to be claimed within one year from the remittance of the collection. It is recommended in this, and all the other cases, to prefer supplying the poor by sale at low prices, rather than by *gratis* contribution.

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THE SEVENTY-FIRST ANNUAL MEETING
OF THE
NEW BRUNSWICK
AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY.

The Seventy-first Annual Meeting of the NEW BRUNSWICK AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY was held at the Centenary Church on Thursday evening, Jan. 8th, 1891. The attendance was large.

Mr. J. E. Irvine, in the absence of Mr. T. W. Daniel, the President, presided.

On the platform were Rev. Drs. Macrae, Pope, Sprague, Wilson, Rev. Messrs. Daniel, Macneil, Sampson, Parsons, Crisp, McFarland, Mellick, and Steele, and Messrs. R. Cruikshank and William Peters.

The Choir, composed of members of St. David's and Centenary choirs, led the congregation in singing the opening hymn, beginning—

Arm of the Lord, awake, awake,
Put on Thy strength, the nations shake,
And let the world adoring see
Triumphs of mercy wrought by Thee.

Devotional exercises, consisting of Scripture reading and Prayer, were conducted by Rev. Henry Daniel.

Mr. J. E. Irvine addressed the meeting. He regretted exceedingly, he said, that T. W. Daniel Esq., the honored and beloved president of the Society, was not occupying the chair. Mr. Daniel, although not seriously ill, felt unable to be present. Therefore it again fell to the speak-

er's lot to fill the position. He would merely refer very briefly to a few points on which Mr. Daniel had expected to speak. The great object the Society had in view was to encourage the wider circulation of the Scriptures, without note or comment. During the year ending May, 1890, the Society had issued 3,790,000 copies. Since the inception of the Society it has issued 124 million copies of the Scriptures. Last year's output was 115,000 more than the year before and over a million more than that of 1880. The receipts had been \$1,000,000.

The Society had printed the Bible in 291 different languages. In addition to the Parent Society in London, there were the American Bible Society and the Scotch Bible Society. The total number of Bibles issued by these three Societies in the past year was 5,890,000. Scattered through India, Ceylon, Japan, Egypt, China and Mauritius were 314 Bible-women, engaged in distributing Bibles and disseminating Biblical truths. They had visited an average of 15,000 people per week during the last year. It was the 71st Annual Meeting of the New Brunswick Auxiliary. St. John was one place where they always had a successful meeting, and he trusted that this would be no exception.

The Secretary, Mr. Joshua Clawson, then read his report. After which the choir sang the hymn,

Zion's King shall reign victorious ;
All the earth shall own His sway ;
He will make His kingdom glorious ;
He will reign through endless day.

After which, Rev. R. S. Crisp moved, seconded by Rev. Mr. McFarland, the first Resolution, as follows :

Resolved, That the report, an abstract of which has now been read, be received and printed under the direction of the Committee ; that the vacancy on the Committee caused by the election

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of the Hon. John Boyd to the Vice-Presidency be filled by Mr. James Shaw; that the remaining members of the Committee be re-appointed; and,

Whereas, The Portland Branch has transferred its work to this Committee and ceased to exist; therefore

Resolved, That Messrs. W. S. Fisher, F. H. Hayes and S. G. Kilpatrick be appointed members of the Committee in the interest of the North End.

A collection was then taken up and another hymn sung.

Rev. Dr. Macrae moved the second Resolution, which was seconded by Rev. W. H. Sampson.

Resolved, That the lessons of mortality which have been taught in this City and vicinity with such startling suddenness during the past year should impress upon us forcibly the prominent lesson, 'What your hand findeth to do, do it with your might,' and so while surrounded even in the vicinity of our homes by various grades of danger, sin and wretchedness, and learning also each season more about darkest Africa, Europe, Asia and America, we should feel it more than ever our duty to send abroad that 'sweet word of life,' which this Society circulates, to be a lamp to the feet, and a light to the path of those who are treading such dark and devious ways, and to guide them into the paths which lead upward to the city of our God.

The third Resolution was moved by Rev. H. G. Mellick, seconded by Mr. Robert Cruikshank.

Resolved, That the thanks of this meeting be hereby tendered to the ladies' association of St. John, and also to the various Branches and agencies in connection with this Auxiliary that have contributed and rendered tangible aid to our funds.

The meeting was brought to a close by the benediction pronounced by Rev. G. T. Parsons.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

IN presenting the Seventy-first Annual Report of the New Brunswick Auxiliary Bible Society, and in referring to the Eighty-sixth Report of the British and Foreign Bible Society, your Committee have pleasure in stating that during the year the work of the Society has been well maintained.

This wonderful institution, spreading its branches and scattering its leaves of healing over nearly all the countries of the world, may here and there be checked in its growth for a time, by paganism, superstition or infidelity, but, standing firm in the love and loyalty of the Christian people, opposition will but ensure increased support and cause the sturdy branches to spread more widely the blessing of their vigorous life.

The Parent Society reports an increase of issues of over 100,000, having circulated during the year 836,000 Bibles, 1,387,000 Testaments, and 1,568,000 Portions, a total of nearly 3,800,000 copies. The demand for the standard editions shows strong and rapid progress. The receipts have been £212,000, which is nearly the same as last year, of which £113,800 was Free income, and £98,200 for sale of scriptures. Legacies, always an uncertain item, have again been less than in the previous year, but the Free Contributions from Auxiliaries are gradually and steadily rising. The expenditures were necessarily large, being £15,000 more than the income. Altogether the outlook, though not without anxiety, is fraught with encouragement and promise.

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The printed report of our own Auxiliary, already issued, shows decided differences in some of the items of income, but in the total receipts a slight gain over last year.

The increase in contributions from City Churches is chiefly due to special effort by St. James' Church; and the slightly decreased amount from the Ladies' Association is caused by the fact that some ladies preferred to place their contributions on the lists of their own churches.

There is again a falling off in the net sales of the Society's editions of the scriptures in St. John. Many prefer the more expensive Teachers' Bibles, and if the scriptures are as fully circulated, this is not to be regretted; but the general public are surely not aware how good and how cheap the Society's issues are.

The Treasurer remitted to the Parent Society in March, £500 as a free contribution, being again £50 in excess of the previous year, and £63 18s. 10d. in payment of books.

Remittances were also made by other Auxiliaries in the Province, viz.:—Fredericton, £40 free contribution, and £10 for purchase of books; and Miramichi Ladies, £40 free contribution, making a total from New Brunswick of £653 18 10.

The Depositaries, Messrs. J. & A. McMillan, report having sold, during 1890, 628 Bibles and 1,102 Testaments;

and having issued to other depositories in the Province 55 Bibles and 71 Testaments.

The Branch in the late City of Portland has imitated the example of Civic Union, and has transferred its work to the care of your Committee; and this meeting will be asked to appoint, by resolution, several gentlemen to represent the North End on the Committee.

Our Agent, Mr. Thomas Mackelvie, has vigorously canvassed the Province in the interests of this Society, and by address at public meetings, by correspondence, by personal influence, and by the abundant distribution of reports and pamphlets, has done his best to promote the cause.

The Treasurer has also received, on 18 August last, from

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the Executors of the Estate of the late Edward Sears, Esq., (one of the Vice-Presidents of this Auxiliary), a Trinity Church Debenture for \$500, bearing four per cent. interest (twenty years from 1st July, 1890.) Interest only to be used; principal to be kept permanently invested.

The Agent, Mr. Mackelvie, has reported as having collected during the year, at the several places he has visited, \$113.49, and that his expenses in this Province, for postage, expressage of Reports, stationery, and travelling expenses, during the year, amount to \$69.21. His collections are somewhat smaller than usual, as the Branches of Colburn and Durham, and Campbellton, put their own collectors over the ground.

The Ladies' Association announce by their President, Mrs. Clinch, that they have already completed their collections for the current year, amounting to \$321.56, being \$49 more than last year.

Death has removed from the Society one of its Vice-Presidents, Mr. Edward Sears. Long prevented, by the infirmities of age, from active participation in the work of the Committee, he spent the evening of his days respected and beloved by the many who remembered his kindly ways, and the energy and success with which he aided in building up the business and prosperity of our city.

The Committee have filled the vacancy in the list of Vice-Presidents by adding the name of Hon. John Boyd.

Thankful for past success, and hopeful of vigorous advance in the future, the Committee commend the work of the Society to your continued interest and support.

AGENT'S REPORT.

The President and Committee of the New Brunswick Auxiliary Bible Society.

GENTLEMEN :

Since I last formally addressed you, another year has sped away, bearing on its historic wings to the chronicles of Heaven the checkered annals of the British and Foreign Bible Society, which things the angels, together with the spirits of the just made perfect, doubtless desire to look into. It is due, however, to the living who are interested in this great cause, that at this period I render an account of my stewardship, and also record the condition of the seventy Branches in the Province committed to my care,

As in the past I have again to regret that my efforts to procure annual returns from many of the Branches in due time for our Report, have proved futile; hence I am unable, at the present writing, to record the condition of such Branches as compared with their past history. I hope, however, that all the Branches will yet be educated up to our standard of order in that respect, and that each in its stated month will regularly carry on its collecting work, and forward to your Treasurer its annual contribution.

Judging from the failure in some farm crops in the last two years, and the almost general cry of hard times in country districts, I am apprehensive of a diminution in the aggregate contribution of the Branches. I am sure, however, that there is no abatement of interest in our cause; and in those places where contributions have fallen away, such may be accounted for on other grounds, and with a change of circumstances there will again be an increase in their annual gifts.

Concerning meetings, I may say that with a few exceptions they were better attended than in former years, but,

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as on some preceding occasions, in more than one town I have again to report that the saddest failures occurred during seasons of religious revival. Such may seem strange, yet may be incongruous only in matters of religion. I have been in a town where two political and two prayer meetings were held at the hour appointed for the *annual meeting* of the Branch Bible Society; the former, of course, were hostile camps bent on each other's defeat at the coming poll; the latter, however, were convened in the interest of the Kingdom of Christ; but many will agree with your Agent in thinking that it would have been a becoming act had they for one hour united in the interest of that Society whose success concerns alike every loyal subject of that kingdom. "O that they all may be one,"—were it only for an hour in each passing year—one in mind, heart and hand in sending the written Word of God to all nations.

I started on my travels on the 22nd April, and, as usual, began the visitation of the Branches in the Western part of the Province.

The meeting at Welsford was held in the pretty little Methodist Church, and was fairly attended. I was assisted by the pastor of that church in presenting the Society's cause and claims, and in the appointment of collectors. General regrets were expressed that the legislative duties of the President prevented him from being with us on that occasion. There I received the plate collection of \$2.02.

The following night I was assisted in addressing a large audience in the F. C. Baptist Church at Patterson, where the plate collection of \$2.82 was handed to me. There, too, several collectors were chosen to canvass the locality.

On Friday night the meeting at Blissville was small but quite pleasant, from the interest manifested in the work. I am glad to know that that nice place has again become tributary to our good cause, and bids fair to grow in liberality. I received the plate collection of 55c., and on the same day you received the returns of the collectors' work last winter.

On Sabbath, the 27th, I addressed two meetings at Harvey Station and vicinity. That Branch is connected with the Fredericton Auxiliary, but lies on my line of travel.

There were three meetings in St. Stephen on the night of my visit, hence no arrangement was made for a fourth in our interests. I was advised to visit that town henceforth either on a Tuesday or a Thursday, as the remaining evenings are stately engaged for local interests. I am sorry at seeing quite a diminution in St. Stephen's last year's gift, but hope that it is the only instance, in many years, recorded below \$100. St. Stephen might easily hold the position of honor as the banner Branch of the Auxiliary.

On Tuesday night, at Milltown, we had a small meeting, at which I was assisted by Rev. Mr. Berry. It is always a pleasure to address the people there, as they are most attentive listeners, and deeply interested in our cause. There I was handed the plate collection of \$2.00.

On my arrival at St. Andrews it was with deep regret I learned that no meeting had been appointed. There the esteemed Secretary of the Branch should receive more hearty help towards the securing of popular meetings and active canvassers. For many years he was assisted by the venerable Mr. Wier, whose zeal in Bible work was phenomenal, and who, even under the infirmities of age, pleasantly made a house to house canvass for contributions to the cause; but he has now gone to his blessed reward, and his work awaits another willing hand to carry it on in St. Andrews. Who will take it up? The contribution in the present Report, though good, yet evokes an appeal for that active help which might be responded to by more than one person in that town, beautiful for situation as the western gate of a prosperous province.

We had a nice meeting in the Hall at Bayside on Thursday, 1st May, at which I received the plate collection of \$1.96. This Branch is worthy of great praise for its zeal and liberality, and I am glad to notice an increase in its gift for 1889-90. Although separated from a foreign shore by only the River St. Croix, those who are so loyal to the Prince of Peace as to give yearly of their substance for the spread of His Word, need have no fears that wars and rumors of wars can ever interfere with their best interests. And doubtless as these good people, surrounded as they

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are by mountain crag, flowing tide, and foreign shore, are often reminded of the 46th Psalm, and comfort their own hearts with that same hope of refuge which they generously convey to others through the medium of the Bible Society.

On Friday I was kindly driven by Master Millen to Bocabec, at which place about fifty people gathered in the Methodist Church. I hope the Committee of this Branch has succeeded in a canvass of the district, which, though not rich, covers a wide field. There I have always found a pleasant resting place in the hospitable home of Jeremiah Hanson, Esq.

On Saturday, as on former occasions, I walked to Saint George. Two meetings had been arranged for me on Sabbath, but the morning was so very stormy that I could not get to Pennfield. In the afternoon I addressed the Presbyterian congregation at St. George, and received from the plate \$6.09. In the evening the Baptist minister vacated his pulpit in my favor, and I was thus privileged to address another large assembly. I have not yet been able to organize a Branch at St. George, but am hopeful that it will yet be accomplished.

Finding that the season was slow in opening up, and travelling very difficult, I came home and resumed work on the 25th. I was still, however, too soon on the way, for my first meeting was at Debec on the 28th. It was still raining very heavily, and the meeting was consequently small. It rained again on the following night, when, at Northampton, we had a small meeting; but our good friends in that small Branch are always prompt and liberal in their gifts.

At Hartland the meeting was a failure, only a few of the Society's best friends having come to the hall.

The day was fine when at Glassville, on Sabbath, and the Presbyterian congregation handed me the plate collection of \$5, and I notice that the Treasurer has since received \$4.28 from that Branch.

The following day, at Kent Station, I received 91 cents at meeting, and \$10.25 with a list of subscribers. May that new Branch continue in well-doing. It has a good

chance on both sides of the river to accomplish great things.

Again I was doomed to disappointment at Andover—no meeting, and very little encouragement as to the future in the County town of Victoria.

At Grand Falls we had a nice meeting, which was addressed by Rev. W. B. Armstrong, the President, and Rev. Mr. Lods, of the French Mission. I was handed \$1.57 from the collection plate, and you have since received the amount of the subscription list from that interesting Branch.

At Florenceville the meeting was fair, but we had not the benefit of the clergy on that occasion. I received from the plate \$1.04.

On the 6th of June we met in the Baptist church at Centreville, when a Branch was organized. That village is the business centre of an extensive and rich agricultural district, and contains four commodious churches. It is hoped that the new Branch there will grow in popular favor and yield us good fruit. Its first committee are all ministers of the gospel, and I anticipate a splendid gathering at its next annual meeting.

At Bloomfield, Carleton County, a funeral on Sabbath forenoon precluded our intended meeting at the same hour. There I received \$3 from the Misses and Mr. Sherard, at whose house when in that district I have always been shown the kindest hospitality. On the afternoon of that day I held a meeting in Lakeville Branch, receiving 75 cents from the plate and the assurance that collectors would be sent out in due time.

The meeting at Waterville (Jackson town Branch) was poorly attended. The contributions from that Branch for last year appear in your Treasurer's sheet, but there is no list of names reported.

At Victoria Corner only a few persons came to the meeting, yet the time there did not pass unimproved.

On the night appointed for our meeting at Woodstock our cause had to yield to another of a local character, but on the following night, at a prayer meeting, I was privileged to address a fair audience. I was glad to see in the

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last report a contribution from Woodstock, and hope that an enlarged gift will be recorded in the present number. I met with a disappointment at Jacksonville as to a meeting, but I think that our cause in that quarter will henceforth show an improvement.

On Saturday I proceeded to Kirkland, where, on Sabbath morning, I addressed the Presbyterian congregation, and received from the plate \$3.51. From there I was kindly conveyed to McKenzie's Corner, where, at our appointed meeting, I received \$1.70. I notice that your Treasurer has since received \$24.00, all of which, with 61 cents at Debec, make a total of \$29.82 from Richmond Branch. This finished my spring circuit among the Western Branches, and I reached home on June 17th, when, after resting one day, I returned to my work in Nova Scotia.

On Monday, 11th August, I visited Scotch and McDougall Settlement, where the meeting was well attended, and the manifestation of interest in the cause all that could be desired. The plate collection was \$1.57, and I also received from Mr. John McDougall his annual contribution of \$5. This, with what your Treasurer has since received, shows the sum of \$19.92 from that fine little Branch.

The following night, at Buctouche, we had a nice meeting in the Methodist Church, at which the collection, \$2.52, was handed to me. I have not yet heard of the collectors' returns.

On Wednesday we had a fair meeting at Kingston, where I received \$2.40. At the meeting, on the following night, at Richibucto, the audience was fair, and the collection \$2.79. Since then your Treasurer reports, in the daily press, the receipt of \$33.26 from Richibucto. I hope that more will follow, otherwise such will show quite a declension in the annual contribution of that important Branch.

I held a meeting, for the first time, at Molus River (a section of Bass River Branch), and received from the plate \$2.29; and on Sabbath I addressed the congregations of Bass River and Nicholas River. At both of these places

there were large gatherings, and I was encouraged by the earnest attention of my audience.

The meeting at Weldford was better attended than usual, and I trust the committee which, on that occasion, was recast, will succeed in their efforts to revive our cause in that locality. There I received the plate collection of \$1.27, and the contributions of Rev. William McLeod and T. Glenn, \$1.70 and 50 cents respectively.

I had a fair audience at Campbellton, although there were two other meetings in the town at the same hour. That new Branch did most nobly last year, and I am anxious to hear of its second year's canvass in time for the present Report.

At Charlo the meeting was smaller than usual, partly caused by the storm and partly through imperfect notices, one of my letters to that place having gone astray.

At Belledune we had a nice meeting, at which the collector handed me her gatherings, which, with the plate collection, amounted to \$7.15.

Our meeting at Bathurst did not happen on the most favorable night for our purpose, yet it was fairly well attended, and the plate returned me \$2.76. I also received from Mrs. Grant 50 cents.

The Sabbath on which I was at Red Bank and Whitneysville (North Esk Branch) was very stormy, and the meetings were consequently small. That new Branch did well last year, and I trust will continue to show its grace of liberality in future.

Returning South I failed, through a most violent storm, to reach Hillsboro, and was also disappointed at Hope-well Cape. I addressed a meeting in the Methodist Church at Albert on Sabbath, received from the plate \$1.41, and was encouraged by the promise that collectors would be sent through the district.

At Salisbury, on the 1st September, I was kindly assisted by the Rev. Mr. Armstrong, of the Baptist Church, in presenting the Society's cause. Although our meetings at Salisbury are always very small, yet the friends there merit our warm thanks for their liberality.

At Petticodiac I again failed in procuring a meeting,

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through the absence of two ministers to whom I had written, but accomplished my object at a subsequent date.

At Corn Hill the meeting was a failure for similar causes.

At Newton the meeting was small, owing to an extremely dark and drizzly night. The collection there was 41 cents.

The meeting was fair at Carsonville, the attention good, and the collection 83 cents.

At Millstream, on Sabbath, I had only one meeting, at which the collection was \$1.11. I had hoped for two or three meetings on that day in that Branch. I learn from the press that the late President of that Branch, George L. Good, Esq., has gone to his rest to which he was calmly and hopefully looking forward during my last visit. Henceforth I will miss his warm welcome and genial company, and the Bible Society a good friend.

After a long walk to English Settlement I had a small meeting, at which the collection was 76 cents. The following day I was kindly conveyed by Dr. Murray to Scotch Settlement, Kings County. Although the day was very wet and the night dark, we had a good meeting. By the death of Mr. Robertson that Branch has lost an officer who for many years took an active part in carrying on its work, and one upon whom your agent could always depend for travelling comforts.

I hoped that arrangements would have been made for a meeting at Bellisle on the 10th, but, for the third time, was disappointed; but the following night, at Midland, where I addressed a nice meeting, I received the promise of the committee to include Bellisle in its Branch, and to that end a Vice-President was elected to superintend the work of collecting in that section.

On Sabbath, 14th, I had a meeting in the F. C. Baptist Church at Hampstead, and also at Wickham, and received the collections of \$1.44 and \$1.08 respectively.

At Gagetown the meeting was fair, and the collection \$1.98; but our trusty old friend, R. T. Babbit, Esq., resigned his position on the committee, thinking that fresh

officers might be conducive to the Society's success. At the present writing I have no report bearing on that desired consummation.

It was again a very wet night when I was at Douglas Harbor, and hence no meeting; the few friends, however, whom I invited assured me of a collectors' canvass.

It was drizzly and dark the following night at Lower Jemseg, and though the meeting was small it was very interesting, the President and the Rev. Mr. Hurley being most happy in their addresses. I held another meeting at Mill Cove, where I received a collection of \$1.29, and was pleased to see such a large attendance.

On Sabbath morning, at Red Bank Kirk, on which occasion there was also a funeral service, I received \$10.01. In the afternoon, at Salmon Creek Presbyterian Church, I had a fair meeting, and received \$1.72; and at King's Hall, Chipman, as usual, a large and interesting meeting in the evening, and received \$7.00—in all \$18.73. My visits to Chipman are always anticipated with pleasure and attended with profit, notwithstanding my necessarily short stay there. The meetings are carefully arranged for and announced, the committee and collectors, active, and the Branch, for its position, most liberal to our cause; our last Annual Report shows \$57.93 and \$14.01—a total of \$71.94, being Chipman's valuable contribution for that year.

On Monday the meeting at Sheffield was small; but the following night, at Lakeville (a section of that Branch), I had a large audience and pleasant meeting. Sheffield Branch is worthy of the highest praise for its steady and generous assistance. \$121.31 was its last year's munificent contribution, although floods and frosts had made sad havoc with its farm crops. I hope that its expected contribution will reach you in time for the present report and compare well with those of the past.

I held a small but interesting meeting at Jerusalem, receiving 48 cents, and reached home on the 27th September, from my second course among the Branches.

The Sackville annual meeting, to suit my convenience in attending, was held on the 16th October. There was a

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grand gathering in the Methodist Church. It was grand, not only in point of numbers, but in its valuable bearing upon the Society's future; for the venerable President, Dr. Stewart, with the College Faculty, had marshalled a comely host of students to witness an hour's review of the British and Foreign Bible Society's world-wide work. Such a goodly array of the country's best blood and brain in the bounding vigor of youth, preparing as moral and mental athletes for "the world's broad field of battle," was the best feature of that occasion, and in that happy stroke of generalship the President's service to the Society is most commendable, as it must prove beneficial to its cause wherever these young ladies and gentlemen place themselves for the active duties of life.

I visited the Botsford and Baie Verte and Port Elgin Branches from the 6th to the 10th of December, where I held three meetings, which, considering the state of the weather and roads, were all fairly attended. I rejoice to see that you have already received Botsford's contribution of \$69.34, and that it shows a marked advance on a very honorable past. If spared for another year's visitation, I hope that arrangements will be made for a meeting at Cape Tormentine and Bristol. I hope that Baie Verte and Port Elgin will this year follow along the same line of progress as during the past two years. In 1887-8, its gift was \$26.30; in 1888-9, \$42.75; and in 1889-90, \$50.70. It should reap some of the benefits of increased commerce through the construction of the ship railroad.

I addressed a fair meeting at Dorchester on Sabbath, the 21st December, but with what result I cannot yet say.

At Point de Bute, on the 22nd, the meeting was small, owing to the icy state of the roads.

I was again on the road from the 15th to the 30th of January, when I visited the Branches between Shediac and St. John. The meeting at Sussex, although on a lovely night, was poorly attended; but efforts will be made to make the annual meetings there more successful in the future. I was glad to see such a good contribution from that Branch in last year's report. May it continue to advance along the same liberal line as that of the last

three years. Sussex, from its wealth and bounds as a Branch, could far outstrip many other Branches. Let the good friends there not be discouraged by the manifestations of indifference on the part of those to whom they might most naturally look for help. Almost every Branch has the same difficulties to overcome.

In company with the Rev. Willard Macdonald, I drove to Barnesville on the 20th of January, where, notwithstanding the icy state of the roads, there was a large assembly in the Reformed Presbyterian Church, many having travelled from Gardner's Creek, fifteen miles distant. We missed, however, for the first time in four years, the familiar faces of some warm friends from the vicinity of St. Martins. We were glad, however, to see the venerable President again in the chair and to learn of his success in another year's working of the Branch. On the platform were Rev. Mr. Patton, Rev. Mr. Paisley, and Rev. Mr. Macdonald. The thanks of the Branch and Society are especially due to the gentlemen from Hampton for travelling so far on such a day, and for the studious preparation and eloquent delivery of most appropriate and instructive speeches. It is pleasant to note that the Society's anniversary at Barnesville has for many years been regarded by that community as the most interesting event of the season; talented speakers from a distance being always procured for the occasion, while the home talent is always to the front with appropriate help. That Branch's last contribution of \$145.14 tells better than words of its management and Christian zeal.

At Waterford, on the 23rd, we had a fair meeting in its commodious Hall. That little Branch has done well, considering that its support in the past has been drawn from the weakest of the denominations in its locality. I have hope, however, that in the future its hands will be strengthened by those more able to do so.

The Sabbath on which I was at Donegal was very stormy, still I had a good audience at Mechanics' Settlement Hall. The Society is under a debt of gratitude to the President, Alex. Moore, Esq., for conveying me about twelve miles over heavy roads to Penobsquis, on a bitterly

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cold morning. No branch is worthy of more honor than that of Donegal. May its mountains "bring peace to the people and little hills by righteousness."

Hampton and Lower Norton Branch held its annual meeting on the 26th, in the Agricultural Hall, and, as usual on such occasions, the large building was filled to overflowing with the residents of the town and adjoining country. The honorable and esteemed President of that Branch Society was the recipient of countless congratulations at having again provided such a large assembly with a banquet of speech and song, while his face beamed with joy as of a bridegroom at a marriage feast; and well he might, for it was to all present a most enjoyable occasion. The most of the local ministers and Rev. John DeSoyres, of St. John, were on the platform, and, in their happiest mood and form of speech, for two hours edified the audience with Bible Society annals and the progress of the incomparable Book among the nations of the earth, while the best singers of the various church choirs (who had made careful preparation for the event) sang some choice anthems in fine classic style, giving the audience a musical treat seldom obtainable outside a populous city. As Hampton's most interesting and intertaining meeting came to a close, your Agent, while sharing the joy of the Branch's talented President over its success, breathed the prayer that every Branch of the New Brunswick Auxiliary would follow the splendid example of Hampton in celebrating its anniversary with the choicest music and oratory worthy the occasion.

I held a meeting at Petticodiac on the 27th, and was assisted in organizing a Branch by the Rev. Messrs. Thompson and Bell, where also I received a collection of 92 cents. That was my fourth attempt to form a Branch in that place, and I hope that the good people there will always rejoice in the privilege of using the B. and F. Bible Society as a channel in spreading the knowledge of God.

On the following night the meeting at Moncton was again a failure. It seems to be as difficult to procure a meeting there in the Society's interests as to gather funds for the cause from the adherents of the churches in general. The

esteemed President, Secretary and some of the committee have the cause deeply at heart, and have been assiduous in their endeavors to procure representative meetings and a general canvass year after year, but the indifference of some and open antagonism of others have been very discouraging. In former years the committee instituted a canvass by city wards; such not having proved entirely successful, they adopted the plan of collecting by congregations, but that plan has shown only partial success. Perhaps a union of both systems would suit best in Moncton. I appeal to the good ladies of Moncton to come to the rescue. If they once take the matter earnestly in hand, success will crown their efforts in one of the noblest causes on earth. The committee have decided to hold its annual meeting henceforth during the week of prayer; evidently a wise decision, for on such occasions prayer will be accompanied with the sweetest of all works within the Christian's power.

I paid a visit to Shediac, merely, however, to see the friends of the Society, as the Rev. Mr. Robinson, of Moncton, had kindly addressed that Branch on a previous Sabbath, and with good results. I paid, also, a second visit to Upham and St. Martins Branch, and addressed a good congregation on Sabbath, the 8th of February, which, so far as I know at present, finished my visitation of the Branches in the Province for the season. I greatly fear that the result will not be commensurate with the time and labor expended, not, as before stated, due to any abatement of interest in the cause manifested by the people, but in the failure of some industries and the unprofitable returns from agriculture in some sections of the Province.

In the review of my work, permit me to express the belief that the Parent Society's valuable Annual Reports are not always carefully examined by those who receive them. This is deeply to be deplored, for it is the best source of correct information to all who are influenced by unfavorable rumors to refuse pecuniary help or who stand aloof from the Society's meetings. In these Reports it may be seen, both in the columns of Expenditures and Transla-

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tions, that every Protestant church depends more or less on the British and Foreign Bible Society for success on the mission field, home or foreign; and that, true to its constitution and name, the Society, without discrimination, grants every possible help to translators, missionaries, colporteurs and Zenana workers. The Society's platform is so broad that upon it every Christian may, without violation of conscience, securely stand; its aim is so worthy, that every good man may heartily assist, while its noble deeds form one of the brightest chapters of modern Christianity. With, then, a constitution so Catholic, an aim so charitable, and a history so successful, surely I am justified in the prayer that Almighty God may speed the day when, instead of any reflections on the apathy of any Christians towards the Society, the pages of your Agent's report will be luminous with expressions of joy that, at every meeting held under its auspices, ministers and members of every communion rally around its standard, that, by prayer, speech and purse they might promote this cause for the wider dissemination of the Holy Scriptures. With deep thanks to the many friends for hospitalities bestowed and my free conveyance by the way, for generous contributions and assistance at meetings; and to Him who is above all and the inspirer of "all holy desires, all good counsels, and all just works," do I humbly render thanks for every mercy, and that by His kind providence I, in perfect health, though weary and anxious for the cause, am still permitted to subscribe myself,

SUGGESTIONS

For the Complete Organization and Working of a Branch Bible Society.

Any Branch which in the past has not attained eminence as a tributary to this Auxiliary—whose annual grant has not compared favorably with others in districts of less note as to population, wealth or religious privileges, is earnestly requested to consider the following suggestions of means whereby its latent resources may be made more available in the blessed cause of Bible dissemination.

1st. The Bible Society being undenominational, care should be taken to preserve its character as such, in its Branch organization, and to this end the Committee and Collectors should, as far as possible, represent every Christian denomination in its locality. The page in the Auxiliary's Report containing the list of Branches specifies only the three chief officers of each Branch, viz.: President, Treasurer and Secretary; but where there are more than three denominations within the bounds of a Branch, they may all be represented by Vice-Presidents, whose names may appear on the page presenting the full Committee, together with the Collectors and list of subscribers.

2nd. When a Branch embraces an extensive district, its outlying sections should be represented also by Vice-Presidents, who could superintend the work of collecting in their respective sections; great care should be taken in choosing Collectors who are competent to present, if necessary, the Society's claims; for to Collectors rather than to Committees belong the honor of placing the silver and gold at the service of the Redeemer.

3rd. At every annual meeting (which it is desirable should be held during the Agent's visit), the Committee, if necessary, should be re-cast, and Collectors chosen. Should the Agent's visit happen on a Sunday, such business should be transacted on the preceding Saturday. And should a Committee be subsequently impaired by death or removal of any of its chief officers, notice of such should immediately be furnished to the Agent, and also the names of the persons chosen to fill the vacated position.

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4th. When a Committee receives notice from the Agent of his intended visit, no delay should be made in appointing the place of meeting, and making such known from pulpit and press; for the delay of only one day may possibly result in the preclusion of the meeting by another of a merely local character, whose object might probably as well be attained at any other time; whereas the loss of one day means the loss of a whole year, in so far as a due visitation of the Branch by the Agent is concerned. *All* ministers in the locality should receive special invitations from the Committee to be present on the platform, and should also be requested to call the special attention of their congregations to the meetings and urge upon them their attendance. The editors of local newspapers should also be asked to insert a brief notice of the meeting; and church choirs, if asked, will generally unite for the occasion, thus making the annual meeting of the Bible Society the most instructive and entertaining of the season.

5th. Each Branch should decide upon always carrying on its collecting work during the month most favorable for such in its district (of which also the Agent should be informed); and, previous to the canvass, the Annual Reports should be distributed among the best subscribers and also placed in the hands of other persons likely to become valuable supporters.

6th. As the annual accounts of the Auxiliary are closed on the last of February, remittances, with lists of subscribers and officers, should be forwarded to the Treasurer, Robert Cruikshank, Esq., St. John, before that date, but still more desirable if remitted before the Auxiliary's Annual Meeting, which is usually held on the first Thursday of January.

7th. In view of a work of such transcendant importance, it is hoped that in every locality a few ladies and gentlemen may feel moved to espouse the cause of the British and Foreign Bible Society, and use their influence in making their Branch an institution deeply established in the popular heart.

ABSTRACT OF THE EIGHTY-FIFTH REPORT
OF THE
British & Foreign Bible Society
FOR 1890.

The latest chapter in the history of the Bible Society is one of much interest. It is an account of work which in almost every part of the vast field is extending, and which is exerting year by year a deeper and happier influence. It is the sole object of the Society to 'encourage the wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment,' not only at home, but also in other countries, 'whether Christian, Muhammadan, or Pagan.' How noble this object is—how immense the labour necessary to realize it—few years have shown more impressively than that which has recently closed: it may be added, that few have reaffirmed more distinctly the soundness of the methods by which this labour has been guided.

But, before one enters on the details of life in its conflict and effort, some reference must be made to those who have "entered into rest." In May 1889 Bishop Rawle, of Trinidad, one of the Vice-Presidents of The Society, passed away. In August, Mr. Joseph Moore, one of the most prudent and most devoted, as well as one of the oldest members, of the General Committee, died; and a few months later, the Society's former Agent in Rosaria—the trusted Adolf Henriksen. In October the Society lost its faithful Agent for Denmark, Pastor Plenge, and in December another of its Vice-Presidents, the great Churchman and scholar, Dr. Lightfoot, Bishop of Durham. December proved also the month in which two Honorary Life Governors were removed—Mr. T. W. Pocock and Mr. J. Spence. In February Mr. F. Ehrenzeller, long a member of the Committee, died. The last name in this succinct Obituary is also one of the most illustrious—it is that of the renowned Hebraist and Translator, Dr. Franz Delitzsch, who died on March 5 of the present year.

Several distinguished names have during the year been placed

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on the lists of the Society's Honorary Office-bearers. To that of Vice-Presidents have been added those of the Bishop of St. Asaph, S. W. Silver, Esq., and G. F. White, Esq. The Rev. Allen T. Edwards, Alexander McArthur, Esq., M. P., F. Cleeve, Esq., C. B. and Theodore Fry, Esq., M. P., have been associated with the Honorary Governors for Life; and Bishop Szasz has been elected an Honorary Member.

The name of Mr. Fry recalls one of the most interesting events of the year—the acquisition by the Society of the unique collection of English Bibles formed by the late Mr. Francis Fry, of Bristol, to the purchase of which by private subscriptions his son, Mr. Theodore Fry, so liberally contributed. Full and interesting accounts of the transfer of the "Fry Library" have been given elsewhere by the Editorial Superintendent, the Rev. Dr. Wright, to whom the acquisition is so largely due.

The FINANCIAL accounts show that the total of the Society's income and outlay is, in both items, close on that of last year. But there was then a deficit of some thirteen thousand pounds; and there is a similar deficit now. There has also been an increase on the expenditure; but, considering the whole sum, it is very slight. The Legacies are less than before by some five thousand pounds, but it is pleasant to know that the Free Contributions from Auxiliaries are gradually but steadily rising. The Home Sales are less; but this is more than counterbalanced by a considerable increase in sales abroad.

Looking broadly at the financial position, no one can be content with it: the Society's work has constantly moved forwards, but the normal income has not equally advanced. Behind the Society's splendid opportunities and its achievements there must be a heart just as strong and generous as these are great, and a power which strides, pace by pace, alongside of the demands of the task. Until this equilibrium of powerful forces is attained, the friends of the Bible must not, and they cannot rest.

The figures are: Total receipts, £212,077 10s. 2d. [of which, £113,773 6s. 0d., was Free Income, and £98,189 19s. 10d. the sum received for Scriptures sold]; payments, £227,566 0s. 8d.; deficit, £15,488 10s. 6d. Last year also there was a deficit of £13,508 18s. 10d.; but in 1888 there was a credit balance, after meeting the deficit of the previous year, of £15,537 3s. 6d. The Free Contributions from England and Wales have, during 1889-90, increased by £1,022 11s. 5d.

The ISSUES of the year have again been large—they rise to a total of over THREE MILLION SEVEN HUNDRED AND NINETY THOUSAND COPIES. This is an advance on those of last year by one hundred and fifteen thousand, and on those of ten years ago of a

million of copies. The figures of recent years have been swollen by the special and temporary returns of the 'Penny Testament': but when these are withdrawn the normal issues show strong and rapid progress, and give striking evidence of the immense and ever-widening tide of this river of the water of life.

showing a total of 3,792,263, and, compared with the issues of 1888-9, an increase of 115,059 copies. The issues of 1880 were 2,780,362. It will be remembered that many of the London issues are for use abroad.

But from these statistics—so practical, so definite, so suggestive of something great which has been accomplished, yet, in another sense, so vague, so insufficient—let us turn to the actual details and the picture of the work to which they refer—a picture full of movement and color, full also of human reality, and varied as the races and the countries which are seen by glimpses, as in a panorama, passing before the eye. Nothing can be more interesting than the simple narratives of the colporteurs: we travel again with them through the streets of European cities and crowded bazars of the East—by sheep-paths which lead over the hills of Italy or France—across the wastes of Siberia—along the rivers of China. We listen to them as they converse—ever on the all-absorbing subject—now with Hungarian peasants, then with Persians, with Jews, with Arabs of the Desert, with the Fellahin of the Nile, with Malays, with Koreans. We catch glimpses—in the endless world-wide journeyings—here of the glens of Norway, again of the white roofs of Nazareth, and Jerusalem, then of the palm-trees and the bungalows of some district of Hindustan. So graphic are they, so endlessly varied; and yet—like everything which deals with the human spirit, and with the unseen—they suggest immensely more than they describe.

The narrative begins with FRANCE, and in this, its earliest chapter, there is a brightness of tone which is happily preserved—with more or less of interval—onwards to the close. It is not that the circulation has risen to a total which nearly trebles that of the year before—this is accounted for by the Free Distribution

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at the Exhibition, and the colportage sales are even less—total circulation, 419,089 (previous year, 123,806); colportage sales, 55,512 (previous year, 58,927)—but there are evidences of a deeper and more substantial kind. 'It is my strong conviction,' says M. Monod, 'that the current of popular thought and life is very apparently less irreligious than it was a few years ago.' The same hope touches the colporteurs' journals—often otherwise weary enough—with a pleasant light. 'It is impossible,' one writes, 'to deny that the public religious mind is better in this part of Brittany than ever it was before.' 'Here in the Pays Basque, considering the actual state of the people, what is sold now is *certainly* good seed in good ground, living water fertilising the desert.' 'It seems to me that in these districts of the Loire and the Rhone superstition is not so general as it was, and that what people call "the Protestant faith" is honored by many who ten years ago felt nothing but a bitter hatred against the Gospel and the Scriptures which we circulate. Blessed be the Lord for that! Those times are gone, and the light of the Gospel seems to spread.' These words are adopted by M. Monod as his own: 'I like,' he says, 'to finish under the impression which they give.' But whatever opinion may be ventured as to the signs of general advance, there can be no doubt as to the instances of individual good which constantly appear. As the pages are turned over in the long record of the year, we see the men at work everywhere—they are found in the old towns of the north, in the seaports, among the shepherds of the Adour and of the Alps: we watch them conversing with the reapers in the harvest-fields of Cen ral France: pressing along the crowded thoroughfares of Paris: itin-erating among the villages of Auvergne. 'These little Gospels,' as one of them calls the portions, 'are a great blessing,' and many impressive stories are told of the way in which they are constantly proving messengers of peace. Nothing can lessen the value of this quiet ministry—or of these instances of individual good. For, after all, each soul is itself a world, and each person the central figure in a history which shall have no end.

M. Monod's account of the Exhibition—in many ways the central event of the year—is equally pleasant. Over a quarter of a million of Portions of Scripture passed into the hands of visitors, and the nature and work of the Society were made known perhaps more widely than ever before. It should be added that there are occasional but distinct evidences that the influence of Lasserre's work is by no means exhausted. On the whole, the past year in France has been one of exceptional importance, and much will be expected from the future.

From SPAIN the report of the year is strikingly hopeful: the

same slowly liberalising influences which are touching France seem to be also at work beyond the Pyrenees. The copious accounts of Mr. Jameson's colporteurs have left on his mind a strong and distinct three-fold impression—'first, that the power of the priesthood is rapidly lessening; next, that rationalism in a crude form is extending; and lastly, that the Scriptures are gradually but increasingly getting into the hands of the people, and influencing their lives.' Beyond these conclusions he does not go. The history of Spanish evangelisation has been full of surprises, and many of these have been painful. But it is impossible to ignore the consensus of facts which, in the simple narratives of the journals, become articulate and eloquent. In the meantime, with a care which is expectant as well as prudent, the colportage system has been reorganized 'so that no village may, if possible, be left unvisited: so that no hamlet, no farm-house may be passed without having the Word of Life offered at the door.' The men have loyally accepted the new and often difficult conditions: they are found climbing almost inaccessible mountain passes, sleeping in the open air, braving all weathers, and, much harder to brave, all discouragements, so that their noble work may be done. If the actual sales are but slightly in advance of those of last year, it is only from the initial difficulties of the new system; and the total circulation of the year has increased. Total for the year, 51,906 (previous year, 47,413); colportage sales, 30,938 (previous year, 27,317). The tone which Mr. Jameson finds in his summary is one of 'hope and expectation'; it has been a year of 'foundation work, where much is unseen, but nothing lost'; and remembering to how large a degree in Spain this Society is the only agent and messenger of evangelical truth, he reaffirms his assurance that, if ever the Peninsula becomes evangelical, it is to the Bible Society the debt and the honor will to a large extent be due.

From Spain, thus but half awakened from its mediæval sleep, with its languid, suppressed life, its lingering traditions, its touches of Oriental manner, the transition is great to ITALY. For in Italy everything is instinct with the movement of modern life—everything is in transition, everything is aspiring and expectant. The accomplishment of political unity is not a final but a first step. 'We have made Italy,' said Massimo D'Azeglio, 'we have now to make the Italians.' Of all this eager motion and hope Signor Meille's annual letter is full: he also would see a new era, and he justly believes that the forces which are—often blindly—feeling their way to a great future can have no safer ally than the Society which would do for Italy what has been done for England, and make the Bible the companion of every fireside.

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It is in this connection he quotes the words of Professor Teza, of Padua, from whom the Annual Report of last year received an appreciative review, in which he called attention to 'the vastness of our field, the importance of our work, both in its missionary and its linguistic aspects, and the success which has been attained.' In a more recent lecture Professor Teza claimed for the English and the German literatures 'an undeniable superiority to all others, whether ancient or modern, in richness, in variety, in high moral tone, and attributed this to the fact that in both countries the Bible has been the book of the people.' He adds, sorrowfully, that Diodati's version, 'with its brief and pithy style, in which one feels the result of painting and of sculpture, which speaks and comments at the same time,' was quite equal to have rendered in Italy the same noble service which Luther's and our English Bible have in their northern spheres, 'if religious intolerance in former times and religious prejudice at the present day had not made it a forbidden book for the great majority of the Italian people.' These times are surely passing. It is with special interest that Signor Meille notes 'that the variance between the civil Government and the Vatican is wider than ever; that every year the colporteurs visit hundreds of places where the voice of the evangelical preacher is never heard, leaving behind them many copies of the Word of salvation'; that the circulation they have effected is the highest ever known; the colportage sales for 1889-90 were 95,328 copies; that the Society's efforts 'to make the Scriptures a household book from the Alps to Sicily are every year more and more successful'; and that, in spite of an opposition, which is constantly growing more bitter, 'could we only know in how many homes and how many hearts a Bible, a Testament, and even a single Gospel has shed light and consolation, we would have ample confirmation of the Divine promises on which we rely, and also ample encouragement to persevere to the end.'

In leaving Italy we leave also the great Latin peoples of the West; the Roman tongues are heard no longer; we are on the confines of the Teutonic races—especially we are on the confines of Germany.

To GERMANY, indeed, one must turn early, and with special attention. Perhaps no chapter of the year is more important than that which refers to the early home of the Reformation. So much of the brain-work of Europe—one may say so much of the brain-work of the world—is done there; so much power is folded and waiting for its hour of action; so wide are the influences either of the strength and soundness, or of the decay of the nation's spiritual temper, that one cannot easily overstate the interest of the subject.

For all these, as well as for other reasons, the favorable—almost the triumphant—tone of the annual letter will be doubly welcome. To use Mr. Watt's words, 'the year stands forward as that in which, for an ordinary year, the spread of the Word of God, as a printed volume, reached the highest point ever yet attained in Germany. The circulation of all the Bible Societies, native and foreign, taken together, exceeded six hundred thousand copies. The figures of the German Societies have of late years gone up by leaps and bounds. What is more remarkable is that our own direct circulation has not, as might have been expected, gone back in consequence. On the contrary, with only twenty-seven colporteurs, compared with fifty-eight in 1881, the increase on that year is more than twenty-five thousand copies.' It adds to the suggestiveness of these figures to quote the words in which Mr. Watt sketches the ideal of colportage work, which his own men, as well as others in every field, are nobly realising in actual life. 'Every effort is made to get the right men and to secure the right kind of work. . . . We wish to think of each Bible, each New Testament and Portion, sold by the colporteur, as an outward and visible sign of a victory gained over hostility or indifference to the Word of God. Viewed thus, the colporteur's work is grand; nor can its worth and the measure of blessing attending it be gauged by the number of copies disposed of. . . . It is in this spirit we have tried to work during the past year, and our circulation of fifty-five thousand copies by colportage represents to a greater extent than, perhaps, on any previous occasion, solid work of this kind done.' It should be remembered that the German Bible Societies are restricted by their rules to providing Bibles for Protestants. The seventeen millions of Roman Catholics and the populations whose speech is not German would be unapproached were it not for the labors on their behalf of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

The narratives of the German staff of colporteurs add the substance and actual touch of circumstance which often escapes from general statements like this. Everywhere—from Posen, on the eastern frontier, where one hears the Polish tongue and notices the Slav features, in Silesia, in Bavaria, in Eastern and Western Prussia,—to Baden and the Rhine, the men urge their inspiring but often difficult work. There are respects in which it is more difficult in Germany than elsewhere. When one passes from the influence of Catholic intolerance it is often to meet a more fatal power—the 'Free Thought,' which chills spirituality at its heart and scorns every form of religion, and one not infrequently catches a more weary cry of pain from conflict with this featureless power, than from strife with any other foe. But there is nothing more

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admirable in these simple men than their patience in such tests, their quiet persistence, their gentleness, their faith. Again and again their words awaken old sensibilities; a sense of better things returns, the forgotten Gospel is opened afresh, and they go on their way rejoicing. It should be added that one of the most characteristic sections of Bible-work in Germany is that devoted to the army; and Mr. Watt, in noting a circulation of some thirty-five thousand copies, mentions two interesting things: one, 'the participation in the work of an ever-increasing number of Bible Societies'; the other, 'the warm support of many of the officers in command, some of whom pay for copies to be given to their men.'

What is true of Germany may be found in altered circumstances, but in similar forms, in Switzerland, Holland, Denmark, Belgium, and Norway. These lesser members of the Teutonic group reproduce within their own boundaries many of the aspects of the work seen in a wider or busier field. In SWITZERLAND there are ten centres of Bible distribution: one of them the recently formed 'Bible Union,' with which the Society is especially associated, and the records of the year are singularly vivid and encouraging. In HOLLAND, and in view of the proposed withdrawal of this Society, a new Auxiliary, full of purpose and energy, has been formed, and the Netherlands Society is pursuing its course with increased vigor. From the work in DENMARK the sure and skilful hand of Pastor Plenge has been suddenly withdrawn; but the place of that devoted man has been filled by his friend, Colonel I. Ravin, and the work progresses with many signs of encouragement. BELGIUM lies partly within the Latin, partly within the Teutonic limits; it represents the difficulties of both, and is one of the least rewarding fields; but the circulation of the year has again advanced, the Depot and colportage sales have been 11,646, against 10,570 in the preceding year, and Mr. Kirkpatrick's men have worked with commendable resolution and with success. In the report from NORWAY one seems to pass from scenes of conflict to those of repose: its quiet fjords and mountain parishes lie outside the maelstrom of less happy life: it is like a return to the old homes of piety: the colporteur passes, amidst the welcomes of the people, from stage to stage of his journey, treated everywhere and honored as a friend. See the *Monthly Reporter* for May, 1890: 'A Bible Journey in Norway.'

At this point the course of the survey sweeps southward, and draws us again within the whirl of religious and political life. Scarcely any Agency of the Bible Society is more varied in race and language than AUSTRIA-HUNGARY, and few have had a more

varied history. Within the wide Hungarian plain, and among the populations which spread themselves along and over the mountain ranges, or beside the levels of the Danube, one may see the East meeting the West, and the past of the Middle Ages and their nomad peoples shaping itself into the future. How sensitive Mr. Millard is to the spiritual interests of his Agency all readers of his report know, and they will welcome the pleasant message which this year he is able to send. In both the important avenues of issues there has been increase; the colportage sales have been 93,151: last year they were 90,887; and, conscious as he is of the immeasurable difficulties of the field, he is surprised that there has been any advance at all. But, what is far better, there are evidences that a spirit of serious inquiry is in many places being awakened, and that many anxious minds have been led to find place in the study of the Word of God. These instances come from every part of the Empire, and Mr. Millard 'thankfully lays stress on the fact that this is the case in places in which, up till now, few such happy results had been observed.' He adds that the colporteurs' licences, where these were necessary, have been readily renewed by the authorities, and that the Protestant Churches of the Empire, when meeting in congress in Vienna, passed a cordial vote in favor of colportage. The survey which his report furnishes of the various provinces of his Agency are everywhere full of that deep interest which belongs to the history of the soul; and occasionally it becomes warm with expressions of thankfulness for unusual or unexpected advance. 'The accounts from Bohemia,' he writes, 'are most cheering: the circulation has again increased, in spite of great opposition. In Hungary our issues are the largest on record; in Croatia they have again surpassed those of the previous year. Galicia and Bukowina are a difficult field in every respect, yet we find to our joy that our circulation is increased. In Servia, Poland and Roumania we are permitted to see many evidences of the blessing of our work.' From Bosnia, where the first Protestant Church was consecrated last summer, Mr. Millard was delighted to receive a donation from a poor widow in aid of the Bible Society, and from a number of soldiers in Poland a vote of thanks for 'such precious books at so low a price.' No summary of the year can, perhaps, be better than his own. 'Clouds have been dispelled, numerous cares removed, much opposition had to be encountered, not all hopes were realized; but God's abundant blessing has followed our work. May He grant us to spend and be spent in His service, impelled by the power of a Redeemer's love!'

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tory of Islam, and feel the touch of its chill and oppressive shadow. Across the south-eastern barriers of the Austro-Hungarian monarchy stretch less the territories than the influences of the Turkish spirit and its Government; they sweep eastward and southward to Persia and the Indian Ocean. In this empire of Muhammad two famous cities are at the same time the two headquarters of the Society—the one the centre of the new spirit in the Old World, the other of the old and barbaric spirit in the New—Alexandria and Constantinople. The TURKISH and EGYPTIAN Agencies which they represent may suitably be considered together, for both are included in the region which they unitedly occupy. In this survey Greece is included, though politically and religiously it stands apart. The reports of the past year are, perhaps, less cheerful than those which precede them; there are frequent references to the increasing poverty of the people, and the tightening hand of civil and religious intolerance, and the circulation has only maintained itself. Total circulation in the Turkish Agency, 38,092 (previous year, 37, 256); in the Egyptian Agency, 19,203 (previous year, 18,790). From Constantinople, indeed, the real circulation is less, though the total issues are slightly more; from Alexander there is a genuine increase, but it is slight. Even this, however, is perhaps to be taken as advance rather than loss of ground. To Dr. Thomson's eye three causes amply explain any lessening of the work. One, the prevalence of influenza and kindred disorders; another, the hostile action of the Greek Church in Bulgaria; the third, the rising in Crete. Mr. Weakley's staff has also been touched by the prevalent epidemic, and he has had to work for some time with but a fraction of his force. But in spite of all such qualifications the story of the year is irresistably vivid and interesting. In the Northern Agency the centres of movement are, perhaps, Albania and GREECE; and from these, as well as, indeed, from the other provinces, there are too many evidences of successful work to allow any sense of disappointment. 'In Greece,' to quote from Dr. Kalopothakes, 'the colporteurs have visited almost all the Cyclades and the Ionian groups, and most of the larger towns and villages on the mainland, and with one or two exceptions they have been gladly received; after a second visit they are welcomed as familiar friends.' It is the modern Greek Bible, adds Dr. Thomson, which is proving the means of awakening the nation from the sleep of centuries; and he emphasises the interesting news that the Patriarchate, conscious, on doubt, of the new spirit of inquiry, has announced the approaching publication of a fresh edition of the New Testament. The coast of Asia Minor and the famous Ægean Islands have been carefully

visited by the colporteurs, and with very general—sometimes with very special—success, and considerable advance has been made in opening up new districts in Macedonia and Albania, as well as in Bulgaria. In Cyprus opposition to Bible-work has almost disappeared, and the returns are in advance of the previous year; in Crete, the work, though largely limited to the cities, and naturally dangerous, has been carried on with admirable courage, and Dr. Thomson believes 'the good leave is evidently at work.' Altogether the yearly accounts are 'full of labor,' and, it may be added, of conflict, though no striking or brilliant results appear.

The accounts from Alexandria are, perhaps, more varied, and they carry more appearance of present success. Alexandria itself has, indeed, had its colporteur force almost entirely withdrawn, but there has been an enlarged circulation at Cairo, and good work is being done there. At Port Said the issues have also increased, and a friendly feeling seems to be establishing itself between the colporteur and the sailors whom he visits on their rapid passage. At Aden the circulation has doubled itself, and some tentative journeys have been made to the interior; at Mas-sowah, where the Swedish Mission is at work, the doors have been re-opened at last, and a mule's load of Scriptures, sent to the Tigre country on the road to Khartoum, is the vanguard of the new Christian advance. From Palestine the accounts are less favorable; but Mr. Letheby still occupies "Kir of Moab," and from this "centre of future work for the interior of Arabia" he already foresees the annexation of the peninsula for Christ.

From the steep of this wild fortress the eye, turning to the north-west, notes the solitary glen which leads, ten miles away, to the shores of the Dead Sea, and beyond to the Mediterranean and the populous spaces of Europe. But should the view be turned eastwards, and the thought pass across the masses of barrier mountains, and again onwards towards the north, it will visit first, the valleys and the cities of PERSIA, where Mr. Douglas is now receiving from the hands of Dr. Bruce the charge of his successful work, and then enter, across the northern frontier, the vast spaces of European and Asiatic RUSSIA. And if, from this limit, the view still sweeps northwards and onwards, at once towards both east and west, it will pause only at the ice of the Arctic Ocean, and in the silence of its deserted shores. It must always be a deep joy to the Society that nowhere are its messengers more generally welcome than among the populations of the great empire to which belongs so much of both east and west—so much of the past and also of the future.

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accounts of colportage which has gone actively forward—of a circulation which has broadened its issues by twenty thousand copies, and reached a total of over three hundred and eleven thousand; the total of sales and grants is 311,264, against 290,257 in 1888; of a new subagency at Jekaterineburg which breaks the almost endless line of view across northern Siberia, and ‘places the coping-stone on the organization of the Agency,’ and from which, within six months, eighteen thousand copies have already been distributed, almost doubling the issues during the whole year before; this large circulation is in part owing to the devoted labors of Dr. Baedeker on behalf of Siberian prisoners and exiles. Of the receipt of the seventh Hundred Thousand within six years, of the People’s Russ Testament; of the progress of new versions or new editions for the Kalmuks, the Uzbek Turkis and the Kazan Tatars; and in one brief, and in itself almost sufficient sentence, of ‘work which has steadily and continually advanced from year to year.’ From the south, Mr. Morrison’s report is equally favorable. ‘The year,’ he writes, ‘has passed without any of those special troubles and anxieties which marked former years; the circumstances and surroundings of our work are becoming more hopeful, and its simple and holy character has become more generally appreciated in all parts of the country.’ The circulation has increased, in some districts at a very rapid rate, and this in spite of a season during which alternate droughts and floods wasted the lingering harvests. In the case of neither the Southern nor the Northern Agency can details of their various work be given here: the survey is too rapid, the limits are too confined. One hears of the colporteur ‘plunging painfully from village to village through miles of deep snow, again along swampy roads, almost waist deep in mud and water,’ but distributing, with unconquerable patience, some two thousand copies during the year. This was in the Kiev district. The same physical difficulties, borne with equal fortitude, reappear elsewhere. In the district east of the Black Sea, near Batorum and Kutais, we hear of the moist malarial atmosphere, the brooding fever, the indescribably bad accommodation; but the men, themselves Orientals, bear with these two common conditions, and seven of them, among the fanatical and half-civilized people of these wild mountain districts, sell during the year fourteen thousand copies. This is in Transcaucasia, within the shadows of Ararat. In Turkestan, and in the localities associated with the name of Alexander, where three hundred years before Christ he ‘flung the net of Greek civilisation across the East,’ we read of similarly successful and, if possible, more interesting work. Tcharjui on the Oxus had last year eight

hundred and thirty copies; Askhabad, five hundred and sixty; Merv, the 'Queen of the Desert,' four hundred and seventy; Kerki, on the Afghan frontier, three hundred and sixteen; Samarkand, two hundred and eighteen; Bokhara, a hundred and forty-five; and the work would have been better but for transport difficulties. It is delightful to meet in these journals the familiar statement that everywhere 'the Russian soldier is the colporteur's best friend.' The same thing is noticed by Mr. Millard when speaking of Ruisian Poland. 'I cannot refrain from repeating,' says one of the colporteurs there, 'with what evident joy the Scriptures are purchased by the Russians as a people. Very often soldiers tell me with what fervent desire they have been wishing to obtain a copy of the Word of God. It is touching to see how they kiss the volume, and press it to their hearts.' Instances of a similar kind are found in every part of the Empire.

From CHINA the reports of the year are less inspiring than these—'the dark lines,' to use Mr. Kenmure's phrase, 'seem more numerous and prominent,' and the total of actual issues in each of the three Agencies is less than those of last year; but all together they exceed a quarter of a million copies, and this very favourably compares with the circulation of 1887. The tone of the account from the Northern Agency is saddened by allusions to famines and pestilences which have 'reigned'—the expression is Mr. Bryant's—and 'with dire sway,' across the levels of Shantung and Manchuria. The European staff has also been reduced in the Southern as well as in the Northern Agency, or weakened by temporary illness or absence. Yet each report is pronounced in its favourable estimate of the past and in its outlook—as in many cases where less favorable outer results emphasise the importance of those which are spiritual. These, happily, are far from being rare. Even across the pages of the most disheartened journals lies a ray of light—a thread of gold: it is the light which ever accompanies the history of the individual soul as it moves through confusions of thought and sense to the light which is rising in China with the approach, in these latter days, of Christ. In out-of-the-way hamlets, in obscure mountain tracks, one hears of copies of the Gospel which have come—one cannot say how, or whence—but as messengers of life and of a new world. The same general statement is true of China's island sister, JAPAN: there also the issues are less; the total of the year is 23,852, compared with 37,703 for 1888; the warm breath of evangelical revival which introduced a new word to the language and a new and happy conception to the mind has for the time subsided, and political movements seem to have absorbed the national thought.

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But there also the river has sunk only to reappear, for the legend of Arethusa is a reality in the spiritual history of nations and of the soul. Perhaps for both peoples no summary of the year can be more just than that of Mr. Kenmure: 'The great matter is preparedness of heart—good soil for good seed—and this we can see, in China, being realized. There is a movement of the dry bones. New influences are at work: new experiences are being passed through; new light is coming in. There is a demand for railways and telegraphs and electric lights. Material things!--but with them will come knowledge, and with it the knowledge of Christ. An important step has been taken by the Committee in deputing the Editorial Superintendent, Dr. Wright, to go to China to attend the Missionary Conference in May, and to do everything possible in order to secure the preparation and diffusion of the most perfect versions in the Empire, and the completion of the Society's organisation.

The comparative quiet, the pause in spiritual motion—if indeed there be a pause—which seems to touch the accounts from China, is strongly contrasted by the vigor of those from INDIA. In these the ear seems addressed as well as the mind; we seem to catch the sounds of a conflict which has come from the very advance and victories of Christianity, and which proves how deep and how shattering of the old order these victories are. It is as if one heard, in their ancient and famous temples, the voice of the old gods as they alarm each other and go out to battle—as if, in India, the era had come again when the divinities of classic Greece and Rome were fighting with early Christianity for their lives. 'Never,' says one account, 'have the powers of evil been so active in Southern India as now'; and the same report, with a voice more or less emphasised, arrives from other parts of the country. And—just as in the second and third centuries—it is along the great roads, in the cities, wherever active political or intellectual life centres itself, that the force, and almost the despair of the assault of idolatry is seen. In the country districts and up among the mountains one still finds in India—and will find for long—the *Pagani*, the village people who peacefully worship the old deities; or, hearing of Christ, wonder whether this is not Krishna again in a new incarnation. We have come, it is increasingly evident, to 'the last great battle': to the mutiny, not of the people, but of the powers and tributaries of the vast pantheon of the East, which is to precede the wail—which some believe they have already heard in India, sobbing itself away—'Great Pan is dead!' So far the reports of the year seem to be articulate and significant; they are equally articulate as to the spirit in which the assault is being hailed, and the way in which

it is already being met. Never were the sales of the Madras Auxiliary so high as during last year; those in the Bangalore territory have also advanced; in the Punjab they have risen by one-half, and added fifteen thousand to the issues of the previous year. Even more important than this may prove the quiet influence of the two hundred and sixty-six Bible-women who in India and Ceylon have been subsidised by the Society, and by whose means, in the Zenanas and among their native sisters, the circulation of seven thousand Scriptures in 1888 has risen to ten thousand six hundred in 1889. For, again, as in the early centuries, and in the East, as once before in the West, it cannot but be that Christian women, winning back their old place of sweet supremacy, shall develop their unique influence, and tend, as they alone can tend it, the infant Church of their people as it slowly strengthens towards its prime.

Beyond the shores of India and of Asia lie other immense fields occupied by the Society, the island-worlds of MALAYSIA, of OCEANIA, of AUSTRALASIA, the ever-extending continent of AFRICA, the Dominion of CANADA, the Republics of SOUTH AMERICA. To these hardly a glance can be given here, but their importance is perhaps scarcely less than that of those great peoples whose reports have been reviewed. From Singapore Mr. Haffenden announces a circulation which, from the thirty-three thousand of last report, now passes forty-eight thousand; and within this total the purely Malay issues have increased a hundred per cent. He speaks of disarmed Muhammadan prejudices, of growing thoughtfulness among the native races; and adds, 'hundreds upon hundreds of towns and villages have been visited; and so many registered conversations that, for fear of exaggeration, I must not mention their number.' From NEW ZEALAND and AUSTRALIA the messages of the year are unusually bright; it is evident that the Greater Britain of the southern seas will emulate—it must be hoped it will yet surpass—the highest Christian enterprise of the old land. The reports, which barely touch the new world of AFRICA, Morocco and Algiers in the north—and to Egypt reference has already been made—and the group of Auxiliaries of the South, seem all to show the expansion and advance which has elsewhere in this rapid survey been so evident; but the Dark Continent is only as yet touched by the dawn of its approaching day. See the *Monthly Reporter* for March, 1890: 'What can be Done for West Africa,' by Dr. Cust. In the Dominion of CANADA the conflict of race and faith seems to deepen; in the South American Republics the influence of secular life and a low morality is fatally present; but Brazil has received, without bloodshed or political shock, the conditions of religious equality

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and freedom which have so often proved favorable to the advance of the Kingdom of God.

It is at the close of a survey like this that one may be asked to recollect again some of the figures which were given when it began. It has been said that within the year almost four millions of copies of the Scriptures—whole or part—have been put into circulation. Is it possible still to think of these numbers as they may have been thought of when they were read—as blind figures, as a dumb register of the routine work of printers, of tradesmen, of colporteurs—an expression which only meant something vast, but which, when one tries to touch it, disappears into the unknown? Shall they not now be more justly understood as symbols of the forces and the acts of life—of life in conflict, in persuasion, in the awakening of thought, in conviction, in love, in anger, in prayer—but always of life in its activity, and never of death in its hopelessness and doom?

And if it be said that multitudes of these messengers are neglected and destroyed, that they lose themselves and leave no trace, and that, like the leaf in autumn, the wasted seed in spring, they also belong to the grave—let it be remembered that even in material nature there is a wider law than that of destruction, and a deeper one than that of decay. There is the conversation of all energy, the preservation of all matter: the leaf will pass into another form, the seed will go to its divinely-appointed place—even in death these will praise Him, they will glorify Him whom all things serve. It is when duty guides us into the heart of difficulties, when opposition vexes us, when the narrowness of sense torments the spiritual mind, when failure seems to triumph over the noblest lives—it is then that we may most truly follow, most entirely obey. When the New Jerusalem comes down out of heaven from God we shall receive again our lost messengers—we shall hear of the forgotten ones—we shall reap the harvest of the dead. It will then be seen that the strength of that eternal city was being laid in the darkness in which we lose ourselves, and its beauty fashioned in the conflict in which we fall.
