





Producers Would at Same Time Get More, Consumers Pay Less

> It is probable that the decision will take the form of a resolution, as in the case of oleomargarine, to be forwarded to Controller Hanna. It can be safely said, however, that some concentrated form of delivery will be suggested. The evidence and the information given by the farmers or producers showed that they demanded, individually and collectively, an increase price for their product. The price asked averages thirty cents per gallon. On the other hand, the distributors, with only one or two exceptions, stated thot if there was a central or concentrated form of delivery in each city they would be able to save approx-

mately one cent per quart.

This saving of one cent per quart, or four cents on the gallon, could be divided between the producer, consumer and distributor, or, in the event of eliminating the distributor, it means that the milk would cost the public two cents on the gallon less, and, at the same time, the producer would get two cents per gallon more. The committee's idea of gallon more. The committee's idea of a cancentrated delivery is evidently that a dealer would be allotted a certain territory or zone exclusively. On a certain street, for example, instead of having to deliver the milk at houses here and there, he would deliver the milk to every ouse on that street.





Baked Heart of Beef—Wash a beef heart, remove veins, arteries, and clotted blood. Stuff with a dressing made as for fowl. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Put in a covered baker with two cups boiling water and bake slowly two hours, basting every fifteen minutes.





Combined Teuton Armies Overwhelm The Italians; Claim 100,000 Prisoners

The Austro-German armies under the command of Emperor Charles, who cas as his chief assistant the brilliant field mashal, Von Mackensen, are shaking the entire Italian line from the Julian Alps region to the Adriatic Sea. Having pressed back the Italians at several points upon Italian soil, the combined my forces have now pushed forward on the Italian left wing and captured Cividale, lying to the northeast of Udine and are nearing the plains beyond. In addition the Austrian town of Gorisia, a point of great strategic value on the Isonzo river, has been retaken from the Italians.

According to the latest Berlin official communication 100,000 Italians have been made prisoners and in excess of 700 guns have fallen into Austro-German hands. The second and third Italian armies are declared to be in retreat.

Rome admits the falling back of the second army, asserting that cowardice similar to that shown by the Russians in Galicia, was exhibited in the face of the foe, the Italians surrendering or retreating without giving battle permitting the breaking of the left wing and thereby offering easy access to the town of Cividale


Prior to falling back, however, the Italians destroyed all their depots as stores and Cividale was on fire when the Austro-Germans entered it. Possibly the Italians in this region who are declared by Rome to be retreat ing to prepare positoins on the plains will turn about and meet the enemy

The situation is so grave that a special meeting of the French cabinet has been held for the purpose of deciding upon the question of allied cooperation on the Italian front.

London, Oct. 28-It is estimated in an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Rome that the Italians are opposed on the front of the Austro-German attack by forces four times their number.



"Ther was spirited artillery fighting during the day in the region of the Monts and on the right bank of the Meuse.

Berlin, Oct. 28—Attacks of allied troops on the Ypres front near Houtholst Wood yesterday brought them no important advantages, the war office reports. French attacks on the Aisne front are said to have been repulsed.



The following statement has been issued by the Food Controller's office:

"An order-in-council has been passed upon the recommendation of the food controller allowing, on and after November I, the manufacture and sale in Canada of oleomargarine and its importation free of duty. Suspension of the prohibition of its manufacture, import or sale is a war measure only, and will apply while the present abnormal conditions continue. The conclusion of such period is to be determined by the governor general in council. Strict provisions are incorporated in the ordinance to protect the public and the farmers against fraudulent sale of olemargarine as butter.

The regulations, which will govern the manufacture, importation and sale of oleomargarine in Canada, have been carefully prepared and will afford ample protection against fraudulent practices."
