London, Oct. 15—The Rome correspondent of the Morning Post cables that he is informed that Germany is making two more diplo-

matic moves against the allies.

"One is in Spain," he says, "where she is tempting the conservative cabinet with an offer of Gibraltar and Morocco, and the other is in Sweden, where the bait is Finland. Germany's condition is that the two countries shall enter in the European war at a moment convenient to herself, and that Spain shall give her that part of Morocco which she had marked out as German at the time of the Agadir affair."

AUSTRALIA LEADS

IN CONTRIBUTIONS
FOR BELGIAN RELIEF

London, Oct. 15—The Lord Mayor onnounced at the Mansion House that the fund of the National Committee for the Relief of Belgium had reached £1, 000,000. The committee was formed in April to assist the American commission. Of that amount £700,000 was contributed from overseas, Australia leading the way.

As the cost of feeding the people of Belgium is more than £800,000 weekly a meeting was called for the purpose of pledging the City of London to systems atically support the National Fund. Earl Curson and Sir John Simon made eloquent speeches, reterating Belgium's heroism, and need and the Allies' obligation to her. The treatment of Belgium by the Germans, said Lord Curson, was without exception the greatest crime in listory. Sir John Simon declared that it was Belgium's stand which united Great Britain in its determination to fight.

Stockholm, via London, Oct. 15, 3.09 a .m.—The Aftonbladet's frontier correspondent says a naval fight has occurred near Porkala, in the Gulf of Finland. One cruiser is reported to have been sunk and another heavily damaged.

The correspondent adds that a Zeppelin has raided the Finnish coast, causing fires.

Porkala is a peninsula in the Gulf of Finland, twenty miles southwest of Helsingfors, and about 200 miles west of Petrograd. While no mention is made in the despatch from Stockholm as to the nationality of the vessels engaged, it is presumed that if a sea battle has taken place it was between Russian and German warships.

The Gulf of Finland, off Porkala, is the most northerly point where fighting in the world-war is reported to have taken place.

The French premier, M. Viviani, had more cheering news for the Allied countries when, in the French senate, he expressed the belief that "the Allies can count on Italian co-operation in the Balkans."

There is naturally much speculation as to how Italian and Russian assistance will be afforded. Italy has a large number of troops available, and the means of moving them to the desired spot, but Russia is handicapped in this respect, and there is an indication here to believe a report from Rome that Petrograd has asked Roumania to allow Russian troops to pass through her territory on the way to Bulgaria. To grant such a request would be construed by Germany as tantamount to a definite alliance with the entente, and would doubtless result in Austro-German troops attacking Roumania. This, it is thought, might happen anyway, as Germany has already shown her displeasure with Roumania's refusal to allow munitions to pass through to Turkey, and now it is reported that Germany has suspended the postal service and is holding up all foodstuffs consigned to Roumania over German railroads until Bucharest more clearly defines its attitude toward the central powers.

They are, however, meeting with stern resistance, and although under constant attack since Oct. 5, the Serbians are giving ground only foot by foot. The extent of the Bulgarian invasion up to the preesnt, according to a despatch from Nish, consists of an advance over the frontier at one point of a mile. With this exception, says the report, the fighting line remains intact, and the railways have not yet been reached.

It is reported also that the Allies have begun an offensive in the Dardanelles, to keep the Turks busy. The Russians are continuing their attacks in Galicia, in an effort to clear the Austrians from the Roumanian frontier and prevent them from sending any further reinforcements against Serbia.

In fact, there appears to be a general attack on all the German fronts. The British and French, Berlin relates, have attacked in Flanders and Champagne, while the German official report of the campaign in Russia is a record of counter attacks against the Russians, who are endeavoring to regain the initiative.

Even the Belgian coast is not excepted, British monitors again having bombarded the German position along this coast. British submarines in the Baltic so far have sunk ten German ore-carrying steamers and have completely paralyzed the ore trade between Sweden and Germany. This has caused some dissatisfaction in Sweden, and it is charged that two steamers were sunk within Swedish territorial waters. But the British assert that they have been studiously observing international laws, and have been sinking only German steamers.
