# Shouted "Vive La France" As They Went To Death

Officers and Crew of the Bouvet Stood at Salute as Battleship Sank—Turkish Forts Still Powerful

Paris, March 23.—Standing at salute and shouting "Vive La France," the officers and crew of the French battleship Bouvet, sunk in the Dardanelles on March 18, went down with their ship, according to the Tenedos correspondent

"The captain of the Bouvet had been ordered to cross a dangerous mine zone," he says, "and force a passage to Chanak Kalissi, thus making the allies masters of the straits as far as Nagara. At 12 p.m. the Bouvet was five miles masters of the straits as far as Nagara. At 12 p.m. the Bouvet was five miles from Chanak and was firing at Fort Dardanus. She had crossed two mine zones. The Gaulois followed, firing all her guns. The commander of the Bouvet avoided two mines which were exploded by a destroyer, but a third struck her in the regions of her magazine and she sank by the head.

"Seven survivors of the Bouvet climbed into a boat and spent the night in a bay on the European side of the Straits. They were taken off the next day by a British destroyer.

"When the captain of the Gaulois saw the Bouvet was sinking, he ordered full steam ahead," but his ship had been struck seven times and he was obliged to put back, anchoring off Navrais Island."

A despatch from Mytilene says a division of the allied fleet is still keeping watch on the Gulf of Smyrna. A Greek ship picked up a floating mine near Imbros Island and another was found by fishermen near Lemnos.







## HIGH PRAISE FOR THE CANADIANS

Hostile Fire Did Not Worry Gunners

### CALM AS VETERANS

Drivers Took Guns Into Position as if Merely on Manoeuvres-

Bath a Supreme Luxury

London, March 28.—A long account of the work of the Canadian artillery is received from a man serving with them. He writes:





Com. Potts Urges Expropriation of Street Railway

WANTS INCINERATOR

ed his annual report.

One of the most interesting features of the report is a section dealing with the street railway and the streets through which it runs. He gives figures in contention that the present arrangement for the upkeep of the streets in unfair and recommends that the council take immediate steps towards the expropriation of the railway.

The commissioner also speaks of the immediate necessity of an incinerator and says that he will have plans well advanced this season.

Other recommendations include the suggestion that at least one mile of granite curbing should be laid each year; that new streets should have their lines and grades established before being accepted and that enamel street signs be erected.

Detailed statements of the year's work

Streets North

Main street from Foundry lane to Acadia street was covered with granite block pavement, details of which work will be found in the road engineer's report. This season the sidewalks disturbed by such pavement will be fixed as soon as weather permits.

From Portland street to Simonds street a thin coat of tar macadam was placed over the blocks, and from Simonds street to Douglas avenue a new asphaltic macadam was placed, which I feel will give good service and be of great benefit.

Between the rails from Portland street to Douglas avenue, we experimented with a seven inch concrete pavement which is giving very good satisfaction. I propose continuing this work on the roadway and between the rails from Douglas avenue to the end of Main street during the summer of 1915.

The report of the stone crusher, asphalt plant, etc., appear fully in the report of the road engineer.

We experimented last year in making our binder and asphalt at the plant and conveyed it to West St. John for sidewalk purposes. We found we could save about twenty-five per cent. by having all this work done at the asphalt plant and conveyed to streets where sidewalk work was being done.

We have introduced this year into our department a new and up-to-date method of knowing what every branch of the department is working at and the cost daily. It also shows the work done at the machine shop and asphalt plant and the amount we save between the cost and the charges as formerly paid in machine shops.

Other plans which would have been a great saving to the department have been abandoned for the present year on account of war conditions and anticipated scarcity of money.

Before closing my report would state that the work done in Main street from Simonds to Douglas avenue, which will last for five more years, was paid for out of last year's assessment, and the work to be done this year from Douglas avenue to Indiantown will be paid for out of the assessment for this year.

Canterbury street, Church streets and Princess street have all been paid for and there will be no future charge upon the people.

Granite Curbing

It is very necessary that the question of granite curbing should receive serious attention from your council and a plan be adopted where at least a mile of curbing should be laid each year; by following this method it would then be very easy to fill in and properly grade the streets, as in the absence of curbing it is almost impossible to make a roadway that will stand.

I would strongly recommend when money is available that proper enamel signs be placed on all streets for the guidance of the public and that the





There must be few people in this country who do not each morning scan the casualty list to see whether any of those dear to them have been wounded, or in some cases killed. Now that the "Princess Pats" are in the trenches and part of the expeditionary force is in Trance then these lists will be watched with even greater interest. To look down the column of casualties and see the name of one wounded is almost a relief for he might have been "missing"; the wounded list conveys no uncertainty; it is true and one accepts the news with more hope. "Missing" leaves an emptier feeling. One fears long suspense, or worse than all, utter darkness.

A new field of work has now opened for the Red Cross. It will be a relief to many to hear that something is now being done to trace those who have been lost in the war and to inform relatives of the progress of the wounded. The British Red Cross in France now hear an officer whose sole business is to search, to follow up clues and track down the wounded in all the darkness over which the waves of fighting has passed. No doubt it will mean the saving of life, as there must be many sick men in France in remote farms and villages where there are no trained doctors or nurses available.
