THIRTY-FIRST SESSION.

KINGSTON, June 19th, 1893.

The Thirty-First Session of the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario opened this day.

DIVINE SERVICE.

I am most thankful to be able to say that that the Mission Fund of the Diocese has exceeded that of last year by the sum of \$1,500, and that of any previous year by the sum of \$1,000 ; but let us not in our satisfaction at this result forget that we have a debt of \$4,000 hanging over us. Another source of satisfaction is that I was able to transmit to the Lord Bishop of Newfoundland the sum of \$1,682.72, contributed by the Diocese in answer to my Pastoral letter on behalf of our brethren who sustained such grievous losses by fire in the City of St. John's.

You will be asked at this Session to elect Delegates to the General Synod, which will meet in Toronto in September to consolidate the Church in the Dominion. This is a solemn responsibility, and I pray that it may be entered upon by the Synod with a due sense of that responsibility.

DECEASED MEMBERS OF SYNOD.

Judge McDonald presented and read the Report of the Committee on the Deceased Members of Synod, which was on motion adopted, as follows:—

The Standing Committee appointed to report in reference to members of the Synod who have died since the last meeting beg to report, as follows:

The Rev. Robert Harding was made Deacon on the 30th June, 1844, by Bishop Strachan, and was ordered Priest, by the same Bishop, on 28th June, 1846. For the first two years of his ministry he was a travelling missionary in the Newcastle District, and was licensed as a missionary at Emily, on 29th June, 1846. In 1857 he was appointed to the Rectory of Adolphustown and Fredericksburg, and after a long incumbency was superannuated in July, 1883. He died in Napanee in the autumn of 1892.

The Rev. James Godfrey was made Deacon 26th October, 1851, by Bishop Strachan, at St. George's Church, Toronto, and was ordered Priest, by the same Bishop, on 10th October, 1852. On the 27th October, 1851, he was licensed as a travelling missionary in the Niagara District, and on the 11th October, 1852, was licensed to Goulbourn, Huntley, etc. During his incumbency of this mission a disastrous fire ravaged a portion of the Ottawa district, and Mr. Godfrey's parsonage was destroyed. His nervous system never recovered from the shock then received. On 17th March, 1873, he was licensed as Missionary at Wolfe Island, where he remained until 1st October, 1884, when he retired. He died in Kingston, suddenly, on 3rd August, 1892, aged 68 years.

The Rev. J. H. Simpson was made Deacon 21st December, 1866, and ordered Priest, 6th November, 1870. He was licensed to Brudenell and Opeongo Road, and subsequently to Beachburg. For some years before his decease, which occurred during the present year, he was not engaged in the active work of the ministry.

Hamlet Burritt, who was representative of the congregation of Burritt's Rapids, and attended every Synod for the last 17 years, died suddenly on May 3rd, at his home in Burritt's Rapids. A liberal contributor to Diocesan and Parochial funds, most hospitable to parochial and visiting clergy, an intelligent Churchman, never absent from either Sunday or week day ser-

vices, never turning his back on the Lord's Supper, his death is a most severe blow to clergyman, congregation and parish.

Edward C. Webster, a lay delegate for many years from Lansdowne Rear, and one of the oldest and most respected residents of Rear of Yonge and Escott, passed peacefully away on Thursday 8th June, 1893. The Rector of the parish reports that Mr. Webster has bequeathed to the Synod \$1,000, in trust, to be invested, and the income to be paid to the clergyman who ministers at Trinity Church, Lansdowne Rear.

"And shall produce a certificate from a physician in good standing in the Province of Ontario that he is in good health and free from organic disease."

II. The following words to be added to Section 3 subsection (b) after the word "Chancellor"—

"That he will offer himself for duty as a lay reader during the long vacation each year of his Divinity course and"

III. The following clauses to be added to the Canon, to be known as Sections 4, 5 and 6, the present Section 4 becoming Section 7--

4. That the Committee may use its discretion so far as to make part or all of the grants to Divinity Students by scholarships awarded according to the results of such examinations as they may determine.

5. That the Committee may use part of the income of the Fund for the purpose of making loans to Divinity Students on such terms as the Committee may determine.

6. On Quinquagesima Sunday of every year a sermon shall be preached on Church Education, and offerings during Lent shall be asked for in aid of the Divinity Students' Fund.—*Carried.*

[N.B.—The Italics represent the new matter introduced into the "Winnipeg Scheme" by the Provincial Synod. In the foot notes the original wording of the scheme is indicated.]

1. CONSTITUTION. There shall be a General Synod consisting of the Bishops of the Church of England in the Dominion of Canada and the Diocese of Newfoundland, and of delegates chosen from the Clergy and the Laity.

The delegates shall be chosen by the several Diocesan Synods according to such rules as they may adopt, or, in a Diocese which has no Synodical organization, may be appointed by the Bishop.

The representation shall be as follows:—Dioceses having fewer than twenty-five licensed Clergymen, one delegate from each order; Dioceses having twenty-five and fewer than fifty licensed Clergymen, two of each order; Dioceses having fifty and fewer than one hundred, three of each order; Dioceses having one hundred licensed Clergymen and upwards, four of each order.

2. TIME AND PLACE OF MEETING. (1) *A General Synod* shall meet for the first time in the City of Toronto, on the second Wednesday in September, 1893, and shall be convened by the Metropolitan senior by consecration.

3. The Synod shall consist of two Houses; the Bishops constituting the Upper, and the Clergy and Laity together the Lower House.

The Clergy and Laity shall vote by orders if required.

4. The President of the General Synod, who shall be styled the Primate, shall be elected by the House of Bishops from among (2) *their own number*.

The Primate shall hold office for life, or so long as he is Bishop of any Diocese of the General Synod; nevertheless, he may resign at any time.

5. The General Synod shall have *the power to deal with all matters affecting in any way the general interests and well-being of the Church within its jurisdiction. Provided, that no Canons or resolutions of a coercive character, or involving penalties or disabilities, shall be operative in any Ecclesiastical Province, or in any Diocese not included in an Ecclesiastical Province, until accepted by the Synod of such Province or Diocese, and that the jurisdiction of the General Synod shall not withdraw from the Provincial Synod the right of passing upon any object falling within its jurisdiction at the time of the formation of the General Synod.*

The following, or such-like objects, may be suggested as properly coming within the jurisdiction of the General Synod:

(a) Matters of doctrine, worship, and discipline.

(1) W.S. "The,"

(2) W.S. "the Metropolitans."

(b) All agencies employed in the carrying on of the (3) *general work of the Church*.

(c) The *general* missionary and educational work of the Church

(d) The adjustment, *with consent of the Dioceses*, of the relations between Dioceses in respect to Clergy Widows and Orphans', and Superannuation Funds.

(e) Regulations affecting the transfer of Clergy from one Diocese to another.

(f) Education and training of candidates for Holy Orders.

(g) Constitution and powers of an Appellate Tribunal.

(h) The erection, division, or re-arrangement of Provinces (4).

(i) *To provide for the revision or disallowance by the Supreme Court of Appeal, in addition to its other powers, of the Acts or Canons of any Provincial or Diocesan Synod as being ultra vires, on appeal of any Bishop or of one-fourth of the delegates of any Provincial or Diocesan Synod.*

(j) *That nothing in the foregoing scheme or in the Constitution to be framed thereunder shall affect any Canons or enactments of this Provincial Synod in force at the time of the ratification of said Constitution by this Synod.*

6. For the expenses of the Synod, including the necessary travelling expenses of the members, there shall be an annual assessment of the Dioceses, proportioned to their representation, exempting those which (5) *have not more than ten Clergymen*.

7. The words Ecclesiastical Province heretofore used shall mean any group of Dioceses under the jurisdiction of a Provincial Synod.

The Scheme was considered clause by clause.

Under Article 4, the Delegates from this Synod to the General Synod were instructed to advocate and endeavour to secure the substitution of the words "the Metropolitans" (found in the margin) for the words "*from their own number*."

Under Article 5, on the motion of the Rev. R. W. Rayson, seconded by Mr. R. Vashon Rogers, Q.C., the Delegates were further instructed to advocate and endeavour to secure the addition of the following as Section (k):

(3) W.S. "Church's."

(4) W.S. but the erection, division, or re-arrangement of Dioceses, and the appointment and consecration of Bishops, within a Province, shall be dealt with by the Synod of that Province.

That the selection or nomination of the delegates, clerical and lay, respectively, from the Diocese of Ontario and from the Synod thereof to the Synod or Conference to be held in Toronto in September, 1893, to deal with the question of the union of the Church in British North America, shall be made by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, with power to him to appoint a substitute or substitutes for any delegate or delegates nominated and unable to attend.—*Carried.*

THE CHURCH IN WALES.

Moved by Judge McDonald, seconded by the Rev. Professor Worrell,

That the members of the Church of England in Canada have observed with alarm and regret the introduction in the Imperial Parliament of a measure the effect of which—if enacted—may be to seriously interfere with the great and successful church work which is being done in Wales; and that the Synod of the Diocese of Ontario desires to express and does express most cordial sympathy with the Church in England in the matter of the proposed legislation, and the warmest admiration for the courage and good confidence shown by that Church in preparing to meet and resist such legislation.—*Carried.*

DIVISION OF THE DIOCESE.

Moved by the Rev. Rural Dean Bogert, seconded by the Rev. Canon Spencer,

That having in view the division of this Diocese into two new Dioceses, and the probability of its consummation in the near future, a Committee be appointed consisting of the Archdeacon of Kingston, the Archdeacon of Ottawa, the Clerical Secretary, the Rev. Rural Dean Carey, the Rev. E. A. W. Hanington, the Chancellor, the Lay Secretary, Judge Senkler, Mr. W. R. Wright, and the mover, to consider the whole question of the future division or management of the Funds of the two Dioceses; and to report at the next Session of Synod.—*Carried.*

PROPOSED AMENDMENT OF CANON XII.

The Archdeacon of Kingston withdrew the following motion of which he had given notice :

That the following be added to Canon XII as Section 8 :

The Mission Board may, if the funds at its disposal permit, make grants of a sum or sums not exceeding \$200 each to clergymen who have given faithful service to the Church in the Diocese as *Missionaries* for a period of at least 15 years, such grants to be named *Good Service Grants*, and to be terminated when the clergyman becomes an annuitant of the Clergy Trust Fund, or is in receipt of an annual income from his Parish or Mission of \$1,000, or at the discretion of the Board.

PETITION FROM MANOTICK.

Moved by Mr. Alexander Scott, seconded by Dr. Smythe, Q.C.,

That it is expedient to grant if possible the prayer of the petition of the Incumbent and Churchwardens of Manotick, (p. 248, 30th Session), and that the consideration of the relief to be given in the premises be referred to a special committee to consist of the Chancellor, his Honor Judge McDonald, and Dr. Smythe, Q.C.—*Carried*.

PROVISION AGAINST LOSSES ON MORTGAGES.

Moved by the Rev. Stearne Tighe, seconded by the Chancellor,

That a sufficient sum be set apart from the interest on the mortgages belonging to the Consolidated Fund to provide a sinking fund to cover losses on said mortgages ; and that the matter be referred to the Investment Committee with power to act.—*Carried*.

PROPORTIONATE GIVING.

Moved by the Rev. R. W. Rayson, seconded by the Rev. Rural Dean Bogert,

That this Synod heartily endorses the system of proportionate giving, and condemns as inadequate and unreasonable the ordinary hap-hazard methods of contributing to the Church.—*Carried*.

PROROGATION OF SYNOD.

The business of the Session being finished, the Doxology was sung, and the Lord Bishop prorogued the Synod, dismissing the members with his Episcopal benediction.

The Diocesan documents which we are anxious to obtain are complete sets of the Journals of Synod, the Canons and Regulations of the Diocese, and any Episcopal letters to the clergy which may be issued by the Bishop.

The following items of information also, apart from the Diocesan Records, will be of great use to us, and if you can supply me with any of them I shall be greatly obliged.

(1) A list of the Clergy of the Diocese, with statistics as to the value of the Livings and the Church work in each Parish, if possible.

(2) A list of the Church Societies and institutions in the Diocese, with the names of their officers, and regular supplies of their reports, etc.

(3) If a Diocesan magazine or paper is published, we should be glad to receive a copy regularly, and also copies of any Church papers published in the Diocese.

(4) If possible, a map of the Diocese, showing the exact boundaries.

(5) A copy, at least once a year, of the time tables of the railways running through the Diocese, so that we may be in a position to advise any of the clergy, or laity, who may be going out, as to route, etc.

(6) It is also very desirable that we should be advised when the Bishop, or any of the Clergy whose movements may be known to you, come to Europe, and of their addresses here. I frequently get letters to forward, and often considerable delay has been experienced in obtaining the correct address.

I hope that you will get a notice inserted in the Diocesan Magazine, and Church papers, that you are the Hon. Secretary for the Church House for your Diocese, and that you will be glad to give any one who may desire it, information about the Church House. I am now having printed some handbills descriptive of the Church House and its work, and as soon as they are ready I will send you a supply for distribution. Any further quantity you may want I shall, of course, be pleased to send you.

It is not intended that the Hon. Diocesan Secretaries should be troubled with any collection of funds for building the Church House, but at the same time we are anxious to increase our membership, and you will doubtless receive some application for admittance as members, or associates, of the Corporation.

The terms of membership are—a donation of ten guineas, constituting Life membership, or an annual subscription of, at least, one guinea. Associates, who are admitted on the recommendation of a member, or Secretary, of the Corporation, pay an annual subscription of five shillings, and are allowed the use of the library and reading room.

I think this letter would do for you to place before your Synod as setting forth the sort of intercourse we would like to have kept up, but if you would prefer that I should write a more formal one, I shall be pleased to do so upon hearing from you.

Again thanking you for your very kind assistance in this matter, and trusting that if at any time I can be of any service to you, you will not hesitate to call upon me.

MY LORD,—I write again to solicit your co-operation in the cause of Prison Reform.

We desire your co-operation in seeking Prison Reform from the Dominion Government, from the Ontario Government, and from the County Councils of the Province.

We are asking the Dominion Government to establish a Reformatory for young men—first offenders. We are asking the Ontario Government to establish one or more Inebriate Asylums, and to re-organize the Boys' Reformatory and the Girls' Refuge. We are asking the County Councils to establish Poor-Houses where needed (so as to make it unnecessary to use the County Gaols as such); to supply able-bodied prisoners in the County Gaols with proper employment; to provide sufficient means for the classification of prisoners, and to provide means for giving prisoners temporary aid on their discharge from Gaol,

We would be very glad if your Lordship would be pleased to appoint a similar committee for the Diocese of Ontario.

We would also suggest that the cause of Prison Reform would be advanced by passing a resolution at your next Synod regretting that the Dominion Government, the Ontario Government, and the County Councils have not as yet acted upon the recommendations of the Prison Reform Commissioners.

I.—REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON ASSESSMENTS.

The Special Committee appointed at the last session of the Diocesan Synod "to take into consideration and report some method of securing the punctual payment by parishes of their assessments" beg leave to report:—

1. That it is not expedient to proceed further in the direction of coercive legislation.
2. That the assessment should be forwarded by each parish to the Clerical Secretary within one week after Easter Vestry meeting.
3. That it should be the duty of the Incumbent to bring forward at each Vestry the subject of the payment of the assessment, and to see that provision is made for the payment thereof.
4. That the list of parishes which have not paid their assessment shall be sent to the Rural Deans by the Clerical Secretary within fourteen days after Easter, and it shall be the duty of the Rural Deans to communicate with the Clergyman of the parish and to urge upon him the duty of seeing the assessments paid.
5. That each Clergyman whose parish is in arrears at the annual session of Synod shall be required to give the reasons for such non-payment on the floor of the Synod.

2.—REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCHES AND PARSONAGES.

(Received but not yet Adopted.)

The Committee to which was referred the resolution of the Rev. Stearne Tighe, respecting the care of Church property in the Diocese, has the honour to present the following report :—

The resolution is as follows :

“That a Committee be appointed to consider the best and most effectual means to provide for the due and proper care of all Parsonages and Churches in the Diocese ; to prevent the waste and deterioration of the landed estate held by the Synod in trust for the use of the several Parishes ; and to recommend to Synod what legislation (if any) is necessary to further this object.”

For the purpose of considering the subject the Church property in the Diocese may be divided into two classes :

I. Churches and the churchyards attached to them.

II. Glebe lands or lands forming an endowment for a parish.

I. With respect to the first, the Church Temporalities Act, Sec. I., provides as follows :—“That from and after the passing of this Act, the soil and freehold of all Churches of the communion of the said United Church of England and Ireland, now erected or hereafter to be erected in the said Province, and of the Church-yards and Burying-grounds attached or belonging thereto, respectively, shall be in the Parson or other Incumbent thereof for the time being, and that the possession thereof shall be in the Incumbent for the time being, and the Churchwardens to be appointed as hereinafter is mentioned, by whatever title the same may now be held, whether vested in Trustees for the use of the Church, or whether the legal estate remains in the Crown, by reason of no patent having been issued, though set apart for the purposes of such Church, Church-yard or Burying-ground.”

II. Glebe lands or lands forming an endowment for a parish consist

1. Of the lands granted by the Crown for the endowment of Rectories.

2. Of lands purchased or otherwise acquired for the benefit of some particular parish.

Rectory lands are held by a peculiar tenure, each rector being a freeholder and having a right subject to certain limitations created by old statutes to lease the property for a time. It is generally understood that a rectorial lease cannot extend beyond the period of twenty-one years, and must be for a rent equal to or approaching the actual value of the land.

Other lands held as endowments may be and are held by trustees, the Synod being the trustee in many cases.

Complaints are frequently made, no doubt with good reason in some cases, that the Church properties are not properly taken care of and preserved, and it has been suggested that steps should be taken to have the titles to all these properties vested in the Synod.

The vesting of the properties in the Synod as trustee does not however give that body control over the properties unless a power of management is given at the same time. There are many properties now held by the Synod as trustee—for example, parsonages and churches—over which it can exercise no control; the object of vesting them in the Synod being merely to obviate the inconvenience of having a constantly varying body of trustees, and to preserve the title in one permanent trustee. The beneficiaries in these cases have the control and right of management.

If the Synod desires to assume the control of the Church properties throughout the Diocese, it is possible but not certain that legislation could be obtained to accomplish that end. What form the legislation should assume is a matter which would require careful consideration.

It has however occurred to your Committee that the object aimed at might be reached without legislation. The incumbent of each parish possessed of an endowment in the shape of house or lands might be required on his appointment to give a bond or other security to maintain and keep the property in proper condition and repair so far as the duty of an incumbent should extend. The appointment of Rectors is by statute vested in the Synod, and that body would probably have power to require the Rectory property to be kept in proper order as a condition of appointment, and in other cases the Lord Bishop would probably have the right to enforce a similar obligation on his appointee.

If the system were to be carried out a separate Committee would be necessary and some expense would necessarily be incurred for inspection, management, etc. A periodical inspection of the property would be indispensable.

3. —REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE REVISION OF PUBLIC SCHOOL TEXT BOOKS.

Your Committee have held a number of meetings during the year, and have been acting in conjunction with similar committees appointed by the Dioceses of Toronto and Niagara. They have carefully examined the Public School History recently issued by the Education Department, and find that although some of the changes recommended by the Committee last year were adopted, there still remain a large proportion of passages dealing with the history of the English Church which need correction.

A joint memorandum was prepared by the Committees of the three Dioceses and laid before the Minister of Education at a joint conference. As a result of the Conference the Provost of Trinity College was requested to represent the three Committees in the examination of the passages promised by the Minister.

The Provost reports that this work is now almost finished, and that there seems every prospect of the views of the Committee being substantially met.

Your Committee ask to be re-appointed to carry on their work for another year.

5.—REPORT OF SUB-COMMITTEE OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ON MISSION FUND DEBT.

At the Executive Committee meeting last month, when the Chairman of the Mission Board read the report of the Board's proceedings, the Bishop expressed his regret at having been obliged to leave the Committee on the previous day and so been unable to fulfil his intention of requesting special consideration of the state of the Fund. His Lordship deplored the existence of the debt and hoped that the matter would receive prompt and earnest attention. In consequence of these remarks a Sub-Committee was appointed to discuss what, if any, steps could be taken to remove the existing liability, and take such action, or not, as they should deem advisable. The Committee consisted of the Archdeacon of Kingston, Rev. Rural Dean Bogert, and the Treasurer, Mr. Pense.

The Committee met in the afternoon and welcomed the presence of the Bishop. After no little discussion, during which his Lordship urged the great desirability of having the Mission Fund debt removed before the Diocese was divided, the Committee decided to adopt the following proposal as at once the simplest and shortest method of getting rid of the debt.

Taking the number of our present Communicant Church members at 16,000, it was apparent that an average of 25 cents from each one would at once sweep away the entire debt of \$4,000.

Two questions then were discussed; 1st, was it advisable that a special appeal should be issued for the purpose; and 2nd, if it were, by what machinery the money could be collected.

The Committee considered that just now, when the minds of the Church members were well informed about the condition of the Fund and all seemed anxious and willing to see the debt removed, the time was not inopportune for an effort to be done with the whole troublesome matter. It was then proposed that the Bishop should formally sanction a very special appeal to our communicants, and that a short statement of the fact that 25 cents from each one would clear off the entire debt immediately, should be made within the ensuing three months; so that by October 1st the returns from all parishes might be received and the debt swept away. Mr. Pense kindly offered to provide all the printing necessary as a gift. This printing involved the short appeal or statement of the facts, and envelopes to be sent to each clergyman for distribution to his communicants, who were to be asked to place their contributions in them on any given Sunday at a celebration of the Holy Communion, and thus make the money to wipe off our debt a real offering to God from our pious and Church-loving people.

This is the proposition of the Sub-Committee, and it has the cordial sanction of the Bishop. Before attempting it, however, the Sub-Committee wished to have the additional approval of the Board and the Synod, as they feel that without a thorough, hearty co-operation of the clergy and laity any such effort cannot result in success. It remains, therefore, with the Synod to express their opinion as to whether the proposal shall be carried any further.

6.—REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ANNUAL COLLECTIONS.

Your Committee are of opinion that the present method of making the annual collections for the Diocesan Funds is capable of improvement. (1) In many of the parishes and missions the collections are practically deducted from the salary of the clergyman in charge, and (2) are too dependent upon the state of the weather and other hap-hazard conditions.

Your Committee would suggest,—That in every parish and mission properly qualified persons be authorized to canvass the parish or mission for the four Diocesan Funds, viz :—Mission Fund, W. & O. Fund, Superannuation Fund, and Divinity Students' Fund. The subscriptions to be payable on the Sun-

days set aside by Canon for these funds through envelopes (labelled and dated) to be furnished to each subscriber.

That the names of the subscribers and the amounts of their subscriptions be published annually in the Journal of Synod, and that the Reports of these four Diocesan Funds, together with the names of the subscribers thereto be published in pamphlet form, and that a copy be sent to each subscriber.

That subscribers be asked to divide their offerings in the following proportion, viz :—

- 75 p.c. for Diocesan Missions.
 - 15 p.c. for Widows and Orphans' Fund.
 - 5 p.c. for Superannuation Fund.
 - 5 p.c. for Divinity Students' Fund.
- All of which is respectfully submitted.

3.—REPORT OF THE MISSION BOARD.

The Mission Board begs leave to present a report of the work done by it during the year ending April 30th, 1893.

The meetings of the Board were held at the appointed times in the months of November and May and drew together a very full attendance of the members who never fail, year after year, to take a deep interest in the work of the Board and especially the equitable distribution of the funds placed at its disposal. The care thus exercised should give satisfaction to the contributors to the Fund, who may rest assured that their money is carefully disbursed, after each application has been most thoroughly weighed and considered in all its bearings.

The receipts for the year were as follows :—

Parish contributions \$10,896.31, being an increase of \$1,494.44 over the previous year and of about \$1,000 over any year since the formation of the Diocese; the interest of the Sustentation Fund amounting to \$1,185.39, of the Watkins bequest amounting to \$200, and of the Gainfort trust amounting to \$237.50, making a total income from all sources of \$12,519.20. The expenditure amounted to \$12,091.74, which being deducted from the income leaves a balance to the credit of the year of \$427.46. This sum has gone to reduce the overdrawn balance of the fund, which now amounts to the sum of \$3,561.31.

This balance has accumulated during the last three years and was the result of a desire on the part of the Board to meet the urgent appeals that were made for increased missionary operations. The Board's expectation of in-

creased contributions was not however realized and it has therefore resolved to make no new grants till this debt is wiped out. It has also been obliged to cut down all grants to the lowest figure possible and much heart-burning has consequently been caused among the poorly paid missionaries who are the chief sufferers.

The earnest appeal of the Bishop which was circulated widely before the missionary meetings, asking for increased contributions to meet this debt, resulted in an increase of nearly \$1,500 income over the previous year. The Board is very thankful for this response which has enabled it to meet all the past year's liabilities and to reduce the debt by nearly \$500, and if the contributions for this year are equal to those of last year, it will be in a position to reduce the debt some \$2,000 more.

The efforts made last winter, notably by some of the rural parishes, to increase subscriptions were most creditable, and if similar efforts had been made by all there would be no lack of funds to carry on the work of the Church effectively and to give larger grants for that purpose.

The importance of the Mission Fund cannot be over-estimated. Upon it depends the growth and extension of the Church in the Diocese; and until Church people, and especially the richer members, make it a matter of conscience before God to give liberally, and in accordance with their means, this growth and extension will be retarded, and the missionaries must suffer and will be led to seek to better their condition by asking for removal from mission to mission.

It has been strongly represented to the Board that it would be desirable to publish the names of all contributors to the Mission Fund by way of parochial subscriptions, inasmuch as each parish and individual would thus secure an acknowledgment of their subscriptions, and be able to see what was being done by others, and a generous emulation thus be excited.

The Board, therefore, has resolved, at the end of this year, to publish the Report of the Mission Board, with the names of such subscribers; and it would therefore draw the attention of the Clergy to the necessity of having the names and subscriptions carefully transcribed from the collecting cards.

Forty-eight Missions were classified for grants from the Mission Fund for the past year, while special grants were made to five others, making in all fifty-three Missions assisted by the Board.

At the May meeting of the Board a year ago, two parishes in the Deanery of Carleton, *Bell's Corners* and *Fitzroy Harbour*, were placed on the independent list. Since that date, by the division of the parish of Roslin in the Deanery of Hastings, a mission has been formed at *Tweed*. In the Deanery of Renfrew, *Stafford* has become independent of the Mission Fund; while *Wolfe Island* in the Deanery of Frontenac, has been placed on the same independent footing. Hence there are now 65 parishes which derive no aid from the Mission Fund. Several other Missions will soon, it is hoped, achieve the same distinction through the exertions of the Rural Deans; while a large number are already receiving reduced grants.

4.—REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Committee have much pleasure in reporting an increase however small over the receipts of the previous year. This is a matter of congratulation when with regret we find that over *twenty parishes or missions sent no response whatever* to either the Epiphany or Ascensiontide Appeals, and thirteen made contributions to *only one* of them. It is not for your Committee to find excuses for the defaulters, some of which may be valid enough, when the mission was vacant or some very exceptional circumstances prevented the collection being made. But surely in response to the appeals made with the sanction of all our Fathers in God in the Province, some, if not all, the mis-

sions in the following list, might have sent one dollar's worth of crumbs from their own children's table for the needy ones elsewhere. To neither appeal have responses come from:—Pittsburg, Lansdowne Rear, Dungannon, Christ Church (Belleville), Gananoque, Madoc, Millbridge, Monteagle, Shannonville, Amherst Island, Marysburg, Bell's Corners, St. Luke's (Ottawa), Perth, Plantagenet, Vankleek Hill, Beachburg, Eganville, Petawawa, Calabogie, and Cobden.

To one appeal only responses have come from:—Loughborough, Oxford Mills, Roslin, Tyendinaga, Parham, Fitzroy Harbour, Grace Church (Ottawa), Lanark, Combermere, Mattawa, Renfrew, Stafford, and Finch.

The total Receipts that have passed through our Treasurer's hands for the year were \$3,955.84. Of this amount \$1,399.47 were contributed through the Woman's Auxiliary.

In the Kingston Archdeaconry all the Deaneries, with the exception of Hastings, show an increase in their returns. In the Archdeaconry of Ottawa there is an increase in the Deaneries of Lanark and Stormont.

As we have said it is not our business to find excuses, but it is only just to the Diocese at large to state that during the last year an energetic effort has been made in behalf of the indebted Mission Fund of the Diocese, whose claims to their liberality were very properly pressed on our brethren by both the Bishop and Clergy with good results; and it must also be remembered that for the proposed division of the Diocese, special appeals have been made during the winter and are still in progress by the Bishop and the Clergy of the portion concerned, and these appeals no doubt to some extent influenced the contributions to the funds for Domestic and Foreign Missions particularly in the Archdeaconry of Ottawa. The Committee would very gratefully state that on the whole there is no falling back of interest in the Church's missionary work at home or abroad. The gratifying report of the W. A. herewith appended shows that in this important organization there are now 1350 adult members in 32 working branches, 225 members in 11 branches of a Junior Association, while in the Children's Church Missionary Guild, composed of little children of the Church, there are 18 branches with 330 members. This last named organization may be regarded as the Missionary Kindergarten of the Diocese, and we should like to see a branch of the C. C. M. G. established in every parish, and the Church's little ones taught that from their early years they may act up to their Guild motto and feel that they can even then be "Serving the Lord" as missionaries of Jesus Christ.

The Balance Sheet of the Fund, and the Accounts of Receipts and Disbursements for the year ended April 30th, 1893, are submitted herewith.

Capital amounting to \$12,937.96 has been received during the year, including \$3,000.00, which a year ago was bearing only 3½ p.c., and \$2,000.00 bearing only 4½ p.c.

Of this amount \$12,671.20 has been invested in mortgages, of which \$10,000 is in a mortgage on the See House at 5 p.c., and the rest bears 6 p.c.

It will be seen that the margin remaining after the payment of the Episcopal stipend of \$3,200.00 is a very narrow one, leaving only \$20.95 to meet expenses of re-investment. Should there be any failure of income from any of the investments, the Bishop's stipend could not continue even at the present low figure.

It becomes, therefore, a matter for serious consideration whether steps ought not be taken to augment the capital of the Fund.

6.—REPORT OF THE CLERGY TRUST FUND COMMITTEE.

The Committee beg leave to report :

That the Capital of this Fund remains as in previous years at \$262,918.24 but that some loss of Capital on account of the Chauncy Seeley mortgage seems to be inevitable in the near future.

That the income of the Fund during the past year was 5 per cent. on the above mentioned Capital, or \$13,145.90, and the annuities paid, which are the only charges on this Fund, amounted to \$13,252.58.

That the deaths of Revs. J. Godfrey and R. Harding have reduced the annuities by \$886.64, leaving an estimated surplus of Income over the charges thereon of \$780.00; and that the recent death of the Rev. J. H. Simpson will still further increase that surplus by \$400, or \$1,180 in all.

That the name of the Rev. Thomas Garrett has been placed on the list of annuitants, dating from April 1st, 1893.

That the Interest on Mortgages belonging to the Consolidated Fund was on May 1st \$8,120.70, of which nearly one-half, or about \$4,000, when paid in will belong to this Fund. The amount at the same date last year was \$8,510.44; but in this was included \$845 due on the Foster and J. E. Morrison Mortgages; both of which have since been foreclosed and therefore do not appear in this year's list of mortgages. Hence making allowance for these, the interest overdue is slightly in excess of the amount due at the same time last year, viz., about \$450.00.

That owing to the decrease in the rate of interest on investments some diminution of income must sooner or later be experienced.

II.—REPORT OF SEE HOUSE COMMITTEE.

The See House Committee beg leave to report:—

That in November last, with concurrence of the Episcopal Trust Fund Committee, and sanction of the Executive Committee, the See House was placed upon a permanent, settled basis as a diocesan institution by the investment of \$10,000 of the Episcopal Fund in the house and lot, secured by first mortgage. All other mortgages were therefore paid off, and by general concurrence the Finance Committee assumed the payment of the annual interest on the mortgage (\$500) out of the Assessment Fund, receipts from confirmation collections to be applied in the reduction of the floating debt on the See House Fund, now \$1,688.07. During the year ended April 30th \$337.75 was paid in on parish assessments, \$156.16 as confirmation offerings and \$280 on note subscriptions. Since April, \$424.39 has been received on account of notes given, leaving \$500 due on these pledges. Several clergy men and laymen have offered their services to solicit subscriptions towards extinction of the floating debt, and the Committee hope at a convenient season to benefit by their kindness.

The Committee congratulate Synod upon the cordial spirit in which provisions for the Bishop's residence have been made by the various committees.

15.—REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Committee on Sunday Schools begs to report :

This Diocese has been represented at the meetings of the Inter-Provincial Sunday School Committee appointed by the Provincial Synod. At the meeting held on the 11th April at Hamilton the Venerable Archdeacon of Kingston was elected permanent Chairman of the Committee and the Rev. Rural Dean Pollard Secretary. After much discussion it was resolved, "That for the ensuing year there shall be only one lesson for each session of the Sunday School." The Archdeacon of Kingston and the Secretary were requested to draw up such a scheme to be reported to the various Diocesan Synods at their next meeting, through their respective Sunday School Committees.

The sub-committee to whom was delegated the preparation of the scheme of lessons, has not yet been able to report, but this Committee is authorized to say that the lessons for next year will be on the lines of preceding years, following the Church of England Sunday School Institute.

The Committee feels that public recognition should be made of the valuable services on behalf of Sunday Schools, performed by the Rev. Canon Cayley and C. W. R. Biggar, Esq., Q.C., M.A., in adapting the Institute publications to the work in Canada, thus bringing us into line with a magnificent system, embracing a Sunday School population of nearly three million of children and a quarter of a million of teachers and extending throughout the world.

The Committee would be neglecting its duty if it did not again call the attention of all members of the Church in the Diocese, both clergy and laity, men and women, young and old, to the paramount importance of the Sunday School. In this age and in this country it is a principal agent in Missionary work and progress.

The zeal of our members for and on behalf of our mother Church will be manifested in a direct ratio by the work they do for the Sunday School.

It is worthy of mention that the Church women in the Diocese have proved themselves immeasurably greater champions of the Church than the men, as the proportion of female teachers to male is as about 2 to 1.

An increase over last year of—Pupils, 216 ; Teachers, 21.

There are also 6 more schools this year, the number now being 184, as against 178 in 1892.

16.—REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

The report of the Committee on the State of the Church for the year 1893 embraces returns from every occupied parish and mission in the Diocese saving two, viz., Augusta and Vankleek Hill. From the former no report has been received, and the returns from the latter reached your Committee only on Saturday evening last, after all the numerical work had been completed.

Upon the general character of these returns, your Committee have pleasure in remarking that they indicate a growing wish to be accurate on the part of those who make them. The apparent guessing of round numbers and the use of the word "about" to indicate the number of services or Communion celebrated are fast disappearing, and there is ever a willingness to report a decline when such is a truthful statement of the case. We are aware that the whole idea of statistics both in themselves and as representatives of spiritual forces is obnoxious to some minds and considered practically valueless, but we would remind such persons that the denial of the principle of annual stock-taking would be regarded as little short of insanity in any other branch of human activity; also that greatly more elaborate and painstaking returns are made by the pastors of the progressive Communion around us, as well as by the Clergy of the Church in the United States.

For the year just closed we can report gains in several departments of the Church's work. 261 families and 517 individuals have apparently been added to the charge of those who care for souls, the principal advance being in the Archdeaconry of Ottawa which reports an increase of 238 households. The Archdeaconry of Kingston with seeming incongruity reports an increase in households and a decrease of population. Apparently some clergymen can still dispense with the parochial register and so cannot tabulate quite accurately the number of souls entrusted to them. It is most satisfactory to note, however, that we are slowly gaining a knowledge of more and more of our people, and our record in this matter is better than that of any other Diocese in the Ecclesiastical province saving Montreal.

Although nearly 1,200 persons have been confirmed, during the past year, we have still an increase of no more than 354 Communicants; in the Archdeaconry of Kingston 266; of Ottawa 88. Throughout the whole Diocese 53 parishes report an increase and 44 a decrease. Unfavorable fluctuations are felt everywhere however. The Methodist Communion in what is known as the Montreal Conference, which embraces the Province of Quebec and the greater part of the territory covered by the Diocese of Ontario, reported last year a decrease in 4 out of 13 districts and an absolute increase of no more than 438 from Frontenac to Gaspe. The Presbyterian gain last year over almost exactly the same territory as our Diocese was about 600. Our variations are owing partly to varying methods of computation.

One clergyman who reports a large increase of Communicants says that he regards every confirmed person as having the status of a Communicant,

Others may adopt a different standard, while most of us taking the requirement for delegates to Synod as our guide reckon only those who have communicated once during the past year. Although, however, our gains have not been large this year, we may well congratulate ourselves upon our general position in this matter by comparison with other dioceses. Taking the figures assigned to the Church in each diocese by the late census and the statistics supplied to the Provincial Synod as our guides, your Committee find that the number of Communicants for each thousand of the population is as follows: Montreal 207, Ontario 200, Fredericton 183, Quebec 166, Niagara 154, Toronto 129, Huron 123, Algoma 95.

The returns of the late Bishop of Nova Scotia made to the year book of the Church of England differ very considerably from those in the Provincial Synod report. According to the former the ratio of Communicants would be 140 per thousand, according to the latter no more than 94.

Throughout the Diocese the early celebrations have increased by 92, the later by 8, the Sunday services by 942. The week day services have increased by 287 in the Archdeaconry of Ottawa, but decreased by 759 in the Archdeaconry of Kingston. This decrease, however, is confined to a very small number of parishes, in some of which, perhaps, a daily service was attempted by a devout and zealous clergyman, but afterwards found to be impracticable. Two parishes alone report a decrease of 476 in this particular. In very many there is a gratifying enlargement. The number confirmed is a little less than last year, but when the average of three years is taken, as per figures reported to the Provincial Synod, our Diocese stands well. Montreal, Niagara, and Ontario are almost abreast, Montreal leading with 16.95 per thousand yearly, Niagara 16.92, and Ontario 16.78. Then come Fredericton, Nova Scotia, Toronto, and Huron, in the order named.

No allusion need be made to the state of our Sunday Schools in addition to the Report of the Chairman of that Committee, except to reiterate the statement made last year that this seems to be the one weak point in our work. Montreal reports 166 pupils per thousand of population; Huron, 163; Niagara, 154; Toronto, 153; Fredericton, 139; Ontario, 121. Only Nova Scotia is below with the saddening record of only 65. May your Committee take the liberty of suggesting to the clergy that to improvement in this special department they may appropriately direct their energies?

The expenditure for all purposes parochial exceeds that of last year by \$3,221.13. In the matter of clerical stipends there has been an increase of giving to the extent of \$2,773.26, but we still deplore that 49 Missions contribute less than \$400 per annum towards the support of the clergyman.

An advance of \$21,650.00 in the value of all church property is reported and when the present circumstances of the country's temporalities are considered and the fact that every parish both in urban and rural districts is suffering greatly from the constant movement of our people southward and westward, a growth in any particular is cause for congratulation.

And may we add that we think the comparisons made in this report should render it impossible to traduce successfully the work or the workers in this Diocese.

18.—REPORT OF THE BOARD OF RURAL DEANS, 1893.

To the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario :

The Board of Rural Deans in presenting their third annual report must first express the concern they feel on account of the prolonged illness of two of their number, viz., the Rev. Canon Pettit, Rector of Cornwall, and the Rev. R. Lewis, lately Rector of Augusta—both able advocates of the Mission cause and painstaking and devoted Parish Priests, whom they earnestly hope and pray Almighty God may of His Goodness comfort as they lie sick upon their beds, and grant them a happy issue out of their affliction.

While painfully conscious that in many respects the condition of the Church is not as prosperous as it might be, the Board cannot but feel that the members of the Synod in view of the work accomplished during the past year have much reason on the whole to thank God and take courage.

In order to promote a more general and lively interest in the matter of augmenting the Mission Fund, the Rural Deans suggested to the Board of Missions the advisability of having the names of all contributors to that Fund on the parochial collecting cards printed in the next year's Journal of Synod—a suggestion that was unanimously adopted by the Mission Board, and from which, faithfully carried out, we predict a handsome increase in our returns.

The Synod will learn with unfeigned pleasure of the gradual increase in the number of self-supporting parishes, and that the stipends of our hard-working clergy in Missions still deriving aid from the Mission Fund have been in some instances largely augmented, in others more or less so, by their being better paid locally than in years past; but they will surely grieve at the tidings that there are, alas, still cases where the Missionary's income amounts to little more than the pitiful allowance of \$400, all told, including the Mission grant.

However, though our faithful laborers suffer their zeal never flags; hence through God's abundant blessing, in every department of Church work steady progress has been made, as the appended reports of the Rural Deans, which will be published in the Journal of Synod, amply shew: Churches, Parsonages, Parish Halls, Driving sheds have been built or acquired in various localities; burdensome parochial debts have been partially or wholly cancelled; new Parishes and Mission stations have been opened; services, Sunday and week-day, have multiplied apace; increasing numbers, not a few of them converts to the Church from the sects, have come forward to receive the blessing of Spirit in the Apostolic Rite of "Laying on of hands"; celebrations of the Holy Sacrament of the Body and Blood of Christ, both early and mid-day, with a marked improvement in the attendance, have been more frequent than of late years, while the success of our efforts to augment the Mission Fund, upon which the Church's welfare in the future so entirely depends, has been without example in the history of our Diocese.

But whilst noting all this progress, and, as in duty bound, thanking God therefor, necessity is laid upon us to call attention to our shortcomings.

It is true our vacant Missions are but few—only five—but unhappily these five are *veritable mission fields*, among them Dungannon and Monteagle in North Hastings, which with several tracts of country as yet unoccupied by our missionaries, are the very districts whose wants form the burden of our earnest and too often ineffectual appeals for more liberal contributions to our Mission Fund. Look for example at North Addington with its six or seven townships containing nearly 400 members of the "One Fold," where, to the Church's great loss, she has never yet erected the standard of the cross and sought to win souls to Christ. All these districts are perfectly accessible—railroads traverse them—ministers of the sects have occupied them for scores of years, while we have put forth no efforts to recover for the Church the long lost ground. Involuntarily are we led to exclaim with Bishop Cox when contemplating a similar state of things: "Lo! where Thine unsent heralds go, why wait Thy Priests, O God?" Why indeed? Surely there is a fault somewhere; else would the Church long ago have been relieved of this discredit. Surely both men and means would be forthcoming if we as a Diocese realized how certainly we shall be held accountable for it. Brethren of both orders, Clerical and Lay, we should remember that we are our brothers' keepers, and that upon us, in union with the 50,000 privileged members of the Church in this Diocese whom we represent here to-day, and *whom Almighty God has endowed with ample means for the performance of the beneficent work*, rests undoubtedly in His sight the responsibility of doing that which shall at once make these desolate wildernesses blossom as the rose and gladden the hearts and save the souls of unnumbered fellow Christians. But this cannot be done until, as our Bishop pointedly expresses it, "the liberality of the Churchmen of this Diocese undergoes a sanctified revision"—until they weigh well and "remember the words of our Lord Jesus Christ how He said, It is more blessed to give than to receive"—not, indeed, until they realize that their welfare here and hereafter—nay their *very Life*—is indissolubly connected with Christ-like thoughtfulness for others.

"He is dead whose hand is not open wide,

ARCHDEACONRY OF KINGSTON.

I.—FRONTENAC DEANERY—REV. W. B. CAREY, M.A., RURAL DEAN.

In Frontenac we have to report an increase in the receipts of the Mission Fund as compared with last year, and this in the face of the fact that two of the Missionaries were for some weeks, and one unfortunately is still, incapacitated from work by severe illness.

The year just closed witnessed not only the reopening of the Diocesan Cathedral after an expenditure on it of some \$40,000, but also last Easter the erection in the same of a magnificent marble Reredos, erected by subscription, at a cost of some \$1,500. A very handsome Memorial Cross was presented at the same time by the family of the late Chancellor Henderson, whose name will be ever held in high esteem by the Church in this Diocese, in gratitude for his faithful service of nearly 30 years, cheerfully and efficiently rendered to her.

A handsome carved oak Reredos and Altar were last Easter placed in St. James' Church, a memorial tribute from a loving son, the Diocesan Treasurer, to a kind and faithful mother. These add much to the already handsome appearance of the lately restored Church.

The old Church of St. John's, Portsmouth, has been handsomely reseated and the Choir properly arranged. Stalls, Prayer Desk, etc., new stained glass windows, and handsome interior decorations and paintings—the whole at a cost of \$15.00 or \$16.00—tend to make the building much more Church-like and more thoroughly in keeping with the sacred object for which it was erected nearly 40 years ago.

The new Church at Clarendon Station, K. & P. Ry., will be completed and ready for the opening early next month when the Bishop will visit the Mission to hold a Confirmation. It was erected at a cost of over \$2,000, and it is hoped on the day of opening there will be very little or no debt upon it. This Mission (Sharbot Lake) is the banner mission of the Deanery, and may be said to be that of the Diocese when its circumstances are taken into consideration. Last year it sent \$207.50 to the Diocesan Mission Fund besides \$21.30 to other Diocesan Funds, making a total of \$228.80 for Diocesan purposes.

Church income for *local purposes*. The present Missionary was sent by the Bishop and accepted the appointment on the understanding that the people should support him without any grant from the Mission Fund. A small grant is to be asked (\$10.00 per month during summer) to pay a student for maintaining Sunday Services on the adjacent Islands, as owing to the bitter opposition the Missionary is now receiving from the sects it will be necessary to keep up 5 or 6 services per Sunday during the Summer.

The Rural Dean paid no less than eleven visits to Missions during the year and held seven meetings. He regrets that with the exception of Wolfe Island there has been no very large increase in the sums subscribed for Clerical stipends. Removals and deaths have very largely depleted our Church population in the missions.

He cannot close his report, he says, without again bearing his humble testimony to the fidelity and cheerfulness with which our ill-paid Clergy are to discharge their sacred duties.

CONFIDENTIAL.—The two Missionaries get very small grants from the Fund. The Rural Dean regrets that he has not time to make a more lengthy report.

3.—HASTINGS DEANERY—REV. T. STANTON, B.A., RURAL DEAN.

This Deanery has not been in a satisfactory condition during the last twelve months, owing to removals of workmen and the difficulty of supplying their places.

North Hastings is still without a clergyman, and what to do with it is still the question. With its numberless townships, scattered population, and the struggle for existence going on, it presents a problem hard to solve in a practical way. It is easy to say what should be done, or could be done, but it is not so easy to do it. With men and money we might, in anticipation at least, do great things; but in this case both love and money fail, jointly and severally. The Mission is large and not yet rich in available treasures, except of people to be benefited; and liberality for righteousness' sake is not yet a distinguishing feature of the Canadian man, and generally fails to meet the demand in full. But if the means were ready, the men are not. They may love the Church; but too many coming to us, even from over the sea, seem to love position and money more (not the place so called), and young men (not all, I know one exception) must double the cost of living at once, and add a woman's craving for society to their own—a chemical compound which should be labelled for the Bishop's use, "To be handled with care," "Right side up," and should in no case be sent on to Maynooth or Monteagle Valley.

In the present emergency, in wide stretches of country like North Hastings, the Missionary must rough it, and do it alone, or with one or more men on the associate plan—in the suitable centres of work.

St. Peter's, Brockville, the venerable mother church of the Deanery, appears to have enjoyed a year of unexampled prosperity as shown by the following figures, kindly supplied by the Ven. Archdeacon of Kingston :

In these latter receipts is an amount of \$400, bequeathed by the late Samuel Keefer, Esq., for a memorial window in St. Peter's, and the large sum of \$870.68 from the "Woman's Guild" and its branches, the C. C. M. G. alone having raised \$150.21.

Trinity, Brockville, under its able and energetic Rector, has displayed great vitality, and raised considerable funds towards liquidating the heavy burdens so long laid upon its generous members. At the instigation of the Rector an Infirmary for aged people has been opened and sustained entirely by voluntary contributions.

St. Paul's, Brockville, has, during the last year, been much improved at an expenditure of over \$1,000 on the interior of the Church. New seats of oak trimmed with birch, and cushioned, have taken the place of the old pews, and stained glass windows put in, one of which is a memorial to Mrs. E. C. Lawless. The walls and ceiling have been tastefully painted, the latter frescoed. A pair of handsome antique brass brackets were presented by Mr. John Webster, and a Vocalion has been purchased on approval for \$850.00.

Gananoque has suffered considerably by the removal of one of its numerous industries to Brockville, but we believe that the Church has not suffered materially, but fully sustains its satisfactory record of last year.

At Lansdowne Front, a driving shed has been erected in rear of the Church, completed and paid for. The interest, \$100, on the Parsonage debt has been paid. The new brick Church of St. Luke at Ballycanoe was opened for Divine service on the 17th November last, and is now completed and furnished. The Rector is much hampered by the large extent of his Mission and the great distance between his principal stations.

At Lansdowne Rear, or Athens, the Rector's work might fairly be judged by the large number lately presented to the Bishop for Confirmation. At Athens the Church has been much improved by some necessary and expensive repairs to the spire and by flooring, &c., the basement, but much still requires to be done, and more particularly a parsonage is urgently needed. The Church at Lansdowne Rear was struck by lightning this spring and considerably damaged, but is now being repaired and the damage will be covered by the insurance.

The Newboro Church has, through the liberality of Mrs. Tett, been re-pointed, re-painted and varnished inside. Bedford Mills was detached from

this parish and attached to Westport on January 1st, which will detract considerably from the Rector's stipend.

At Westport the congregation has increased and the services been well attended. The heavy debt on the Church is rapidly decreasing and now stands at \$1,400.

At Fermoy great things have been accomplished for such a poor settlement. The Church which stood for years unfinished is now completed and looks well, the people having spent more than \$250.00 last summer on this work. There is no debt on the Church and spiritually the work progresses.

Bedford Mills was transferred at the beginning of this year from Newboro to Westport thereby strengthening a weak Mission.

New Boyne and Lombardy.—At New Boyne the congregation has succeeded in paying off the debt on the sheds, and a new furnace has been placed in the Church; while at Lombardy a new organ has been procured for the Church and an excellent Sunday School Library. At a Confirmation in November last the large number of 67 persons were confirmed, testifying to the zeal of the Rector.

Leeds Rear.—The work in this important parish continues to progress most satisfactorily, but we have no special details to chronicle. The Rector's health is much improved, and under his able supervision, assisted by an energetic lay reader, Mr. A. Creeggan, the services have been regularly held and the Church's work carried out.

Kitley.—Abundant proofs of vitality come from all parts of this large parish, evincing the energy and devotion of the active Rector. The new and beautiful stone Church at the Redan rapidly approaches completion, and will, we hear, soon be ready for Divine service and prove an ornament to the Diocese.

Elizabethtown.—At New Dublin the contract for a large and handsome stone church has been let, and as most of the material is on the ground, the congregation hope to have it ready for service in the fall. At Lyn some much needed improvements and repairs have been made to the Rectory, and since last July regular Sunday services have been held in the village of Addison by the Rector.

5.—LENNOX AND ADDINGTON DEANERY—REV. E. H. M. BAKER, RURAL DEAN.

Not a little progress in all departments of Church work has been made in this Deanery during the year.

In Ernestown, Rev. F. T. Dibb, Mission Priest, the respectable sum of \$250, for various purposes, has been contributed during the year within the Mission, \$30 of which has been carried over to next year. About \$70 has been laid out in repairs to St. Alban's Church, and a vigorous effort is being made promising success to meet the first payment of \$100 on the principal of the debt. Work in the out-station of Hawley is showing good results, and the Mission Priest is in process of opening a new station at Morven. On the

whole, though there are many drawbacks, there are also compensating encouragements. The situation is best described in Mr. Dibb's own words as follows: "It is a long lane that has no turning, and although it may be too much to say that we have arrived at the actual turning point we feel justified in saying that it is now in sight."

In Napanee, the Rev. A. Jarvis, M.A., Rector, the year past has been a prosperous one. Financially the Church has met all obligations, and the floating debt has been reduced \$150 whilst the interest upon the consolidated debt has been promptly paid as well as the premiums upon the Life Policies by which it is well secured. St. Andrew's Mission Chapel on Zion Hill which was begun last year, has been completed, and weekly Sunday services are held there regularly. The building is paid for, saving about \$60 for material. A small bell has been presented by Mr. Johnson, a hardware merchant of the town. The interior of St. Mary Magdalene's Church has been decorated in polychromy and the effect is considered satisfactory. Extensive repairs are being done upon the roof of the Chancel. Contributions to the Mission Fund exceeded the average of the last 10 years by 20 per cent.

In Adolphustown and Fredericksburg, Rev. R. S. Forneri, B.D., Rector, considerable progress has been made in many respects during the year just closed. In addition to the ordinary contributions for current expenses and stipend, between \$600 and \$700 have been raised for extraordinary works and objects. Among these undertakings was the erection and completion of a very sightly Church in Gosport, which was opened for Divine Service last St. Jude's day. The other principal work was the much-needed restoration of the Rectory, which was re-boarded and re-painted externally—improvements which have greatly added to the comfort and appearance of the old Rectory. The annual Missionary meetings did not take place, owing to various hindrances, chief among which were bad roads and weather. The sum of \$17.60 was contributed to the Newfoundland Fire Relief Fund.

In Selby, the labours of the Rev. R. Atkinson, Mission Priest, as was generally anticipated, have resulted most successfully. Rectory repairs have cost \$22.00; the erection of a shed and stable at Kingsford, \$112.00, and many days' labor; the renovation of St. Jude's Church, \$35.00; and no debts incurred. A neat fence has been placed around St. John's Church yard, and a site secured at Roblin for a new Church to take the place of St. Peter's at Salmon River, not worth preserving. On stipend account was paid \$350.00, against \$186.00 to former clergyman—leaving \$50.00 still due.

As to Amherst Island, Rev. S. Tighe, B.A., Rector, there is no report, as Mr. Tighe was too unwell to prepare one.

In Camden East, Rev. F. D. Woodcock, Mission Priest, the work is being pushed forward with spirit. The people are dilatory about paying the promised stipend and were \$100 in arrears at Easter, but the Clergyman considers it good.

Tamworth, the Rev. J. R. Serson, M.A., Mission Priest, holds its own as one of the most prosperous missions in the Diocese. The Rural Dean has twice visited it during the year for the purpose of seeing what could be done towards making the Parish self-supporting, but each time his canvass was cut short by bad weather. He trusts yet to effect his purpose. The zealous Mission Priest employs a lay reader and through his assistance continues with success the fortnightly services at Enterprise. At Easter the arrears on account of stipend amounted to \$154, about half of which is non-collectable.

Of North Addington, the destitution of which was referred to in last year's report, and is spoken of this year in the Chairman's summary, it is unnecessary to say more here than that according to the estimate of Mr. G. W. Dawson, M.P., there are at least in that district about 340 members of the Church of England calling for the ministrations of the Gospel at her hands, and that Mr. Plant, the zealous Mission Priest at Plevna, while believing that it will be easy to build a Church at Cloyne, 20 miles from Plevna, declares it is impossible for him, with six or seven stations of his own to look after, to do anything there.

In Bath, Rev. E. H. M. Baker, R.D., Rector in charge, drawbacks have been plentiful, owing mainly to the frequent removals, particularly of young people, yet during the year, satisfactory progress has been made. The revenue of the Parish, all told, not including Endowment, was over \$700, \$100 of which was the income of the Sunday School. Very kindly the Rev. Rural Dean Bliss and the Rev. R. S. Forneri, B.D., under instructions from his Lordship the Bishop, canvassed the congregation last December to make up a stipend for the assistant Rector, they having previously paid him nothing for his services. In response to their appeal subscriptions were obtained averaging \$4.00 per family and \$160 in all, which is being paid through envelopes with fair regularity. A large decrease in the rents two years ago necessitated this appeal to the people, and as on 1st January next, when all the leases expire, there will be a yet more serious decrease, the situation will again become critical.

A fine stained glass window was erected last summer in the Church to the memory of Thomas and Mary Howard by their daughters, Mrs. Northrup and Mrs. W. C. Bell.

It is pleasing also to report that the Parish came into possession of a very desirable piece of property last December through the generosity of Dr. R. Kennedy—no less than a neat Hall with the lot on which it stands. He deeded it to the Synod in trust for the use of the Parish.

The Rector in charge has had since February last the assistance of a licensed lay reader, his son, Mr. F. K. Baker, and therefore the opportunity has been afforded him of being absent occasionally attending to Rural Dean work without his services being interrupted.

6.—PRINCE EDWARD DEANERY—REV. E. LOUCKS, RURAL DEAN.

gress has undoubtedly been made in some parishes, evidenced by increased services and fuller attendance thereon; faithful work on the part of the Clergy, and a more kindly and sympathetic co-operation on the part of the laity. Some parishes have grown more liberal in their offerings towards parochial as well as Diocesan objects, and a general feeling of contentment prevails.

The work done by the Rev. John W. Forster in Carrying Place and Consecon deserves more than a passing notice. Through his indefatigable and unremitting efforts the Church at Consecon has been renovated and repaired at considerable expense, and services are held each Sunday with an increasing congregation. The Parish as a whole is flourishing and the outlook bright.

Marysburg and Milford, under the Rev. John Fairburn's care, shows signs of life and energy, and a brighter future seems in store for it.

Since Mr. Blacklock's ordination to the Priesthood, so far as the Rural Dean can learn, he has thrown himself heartily into his work, and his parish is improving.

The parish of Stirling under the pastoral care of the Rev. Mr. Rollin ought to be self-supporting. A painstaking, conscientious, hardworking parish priest, he is not appreciated as his goodness and ability deserve, by some, who, calling themselves Christians and Churchmen, put everything in the way of the healthy advancement of the Church, make the life of the minister a burden, create and keep up a sense of unrest and ill-feeling, which blights the prospects of the Church, and hinders its growth and influence in the community.

Of the other parishes not enumerated above, the Rural Dean reports that they are making quiet but sure progress.

ARCHDEACONRY OF OTTAWA.

I.—CARLETON DEANERY—REV. J. J. BOGERT, M.A., RURAL DEAN.

During the past year the Rural Dean twice visited the Mission of Ashton and on each occasion made a house to house canvass; the first time endeavoring to obtain a sufficient increase in the subscription to clerical stipend, to compensate for the reduction of \$100 in the grant of the Mission Board, in this effort meeting with fair success; and the second time, to obtain subscriptions to the Ottawa Episcopal Endowment Fund.

Last December he made a house to house canvass of the Mission of Gloucester on behalf of the Ottawa Episcopal Endowment Fund, and at the same time on behalf of clerical stipend. He was much more successful in pleading for the former than for the latter object. This thorough canvass, however, satisfied him that the Mission must receive a largely increased grant from the Mission Board if the Missionary is to be saved from pecuniary embarrassment. The congregation at Billings' Bridge is made up largely of those who find it difficult to live within the city limits, and who are burdened

with debt in their efforts to purchase or build a home for their families. In the two agricultural sections of Taylorville and Cowan's the land in most cases is poor and the people unable to do much for the support of the Church. He has also canvassed on behalf of the Ottawa Episcopal Endowment Fund the parishes of Manotick, North Gower, and Bell's Corners. The Mission of Ashton has lost, by removal, several families, involving a loss to clerical stipend of \$40. In other respects the report is very good. Church property has been put into a good state of repair; the new parsonage, which would be a credit to any Mission, has been improved by the erection of a stable, woodshed and summer-kitchen, at a cost of \$400. Excellent work is being done in the Parish of Bell's Corners in every respect and in each section thereof; steps are being taken to put the church there in a thorough state of repair.

The Incumbent at Fitzroy reports that the new church at the 9th line is out of debt and ready for consecration, but that the other churches and the parsonage need repairs, which the church-wardens will attend to after seed-time. The state of the subscription list for Clerical stipend is not satisfactory, only \$564 appearing thereon. The Rural Dean hopes to visit the parish soon and to work the list up to a larger amount. At Billings' Bridge, in the Mission of Gloucester, a new parsonage has been built and is now occupied by the Missionary. The amount promised to the Clergyman by the Parish is only \$400, which, even with the present Mission grant of \$100, is quite inadequate to the support of a family where, owing to proximity to the city, the cost of living is so great.

Huntley.—The Incumbent writes: "The Church in this Parish is more than holding her own, and is being gradually restored to her proper position as a Witness and Keeper of the Truth; the list of communicants is larger than ever before; the services are well attended, and the parish is entirely free from debt with the exception of the small sum of thirty dollars for a fence which is being placed around St. John's Church. The congregation of St. James' Church last year built a driving-shed, at a cost of \$130. A new iron fence, the bequest of the late Miss Hodgins, has been put in front of St. John's Church. The stipend promised is \$700, of which \$660 has been paid."

Of Manotick it may be said that it is *in statu quo*. The Church in March is alive and thriving. \$1,500 has already been raised towards the erection of a church at Dunrobin. New stained glass windows have been placed in St. John's Church, and its front has been improved by a new porch and large platform. Church work in Nepean is almost entirely of a Missionary character, and though beset by many difficulties, is promising. The congregation at St. Matthias, Hintonburg, though unsettled and migratory, is steadily increasing, and the debt on the church has been reduced. The congregation at All Saints', Birchton, is small and not likely to increase. The new Church of St. Stephen was built at Britannia last summer, and though the interior is not finished, regular services were held in it during the summer months—a great boon to the many residing there during the warm season. It is free from debt.

A beautiful Church has been built at Pierce's Corners in the Parish of North Gower, testifying to a lively interest in Church work in that neighborhood. The amount contributed for clerical stipend is far below what the Incumbent should receive and what the Parish is able to give.

The Rector of Richmond reports that St. John's Church during the past year has been re-shingled, and the contract for re-seating it has been let. A new fence has been put around part of the Church property; the old debt for Synod assessment has been wiped off, and the debt on the church reduced by \$50; general state of the Parish, fair.

2.—LANARK DEANERY—REV. A. C. NESBITT, RURAL DEAN.

There is nothing to report in this Deanery beyond the fact that Church work is being done in every Mission and Parish on Church lines and in the Church's way. There seems to be steady growth notwithstanding the many unfavourable circumstances and methods of opposition. There are only three Missions at present in this Deanery—one receives \$100.00, one \$150.00, and one \$200.00, the whole amount received from the Mission Board in this Deanery being \$450.00. The Rural Dean believes it will be found that each parish and mission has responded well to the appeal made for increased contributions to the Mission Fund this year, especially the Mission of Franktown which has sent in considerably more than it was asked for; and he sincerely hopes and prays that the missionary work of the Church will be sustained with more spirit and energy—our missionaries better supported year by year; for the day is coming when in the province of Ontario the census returns will tell a different story as to the number of those belonging to the old religion of the old Church of England, the (for a time) forsaken mother of the vast majority of the forefathers of the people of Ontario. We must sustain our missionaries in propagating the old truths of the Catholic Church without compromise.

3.—PRESCOTT AND RUSSELL DEANERY—REV. H. POLLARD, RURAL DEAN.

Since last Synod the Rev. C. O. Carson has been removed from Plantagenet to Stafford, much to the regret of the people who had learned to value his earnest labors. Rev. F. W. Squire has been appointed in his place.

Rev. A. U. DePencier, of Navan, has been granted leave of absence in order to take a course at Trinity College, Toronto, and has left Mr. Clarke, a candidate for Holy Orders, in his place, under Rev. Mr. Clayton, of Bearbrook, who performs the necessary clerical duties and administers the Holy Communion every month. The arrangement seems to work very well, as Mr. De Pencier was present at Christmas and Easter and intends returning in June to remain during the long vacation. Mr. Clarke has been enabled to finish the church at Cumberland village, which was moved from a few miles back on the farm of Mr. Sparrow, and it is now used for service with a very encouraging attendance. Mr. De Pencier is trying to raise money amongst his friends in Toronto to procure the usual fittings for the interior.

The parsonage at Bearbrook has been put in thorough repair and last autumn was occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Clayton. Efforts are being made to build a new church in the village.

The opening of a new church at L'Original in Jan., 1892, has been the means of drawing better congregations and in every way putting new energy into the comparatively feeble part of Hawkesbury parish.

A thorough canvass of the Mission of Metcalfe and Russell has resulted in an increase of stipend for the excellent and much respected missionary there, but it is absolutely necessary that an increase of \$100.00 should be made to the grant to this Mission, to enable a Clergyman to exist, and the Rural Dean trusts this will be given by the Mission Board in May. There is great need of a subdivision of this large district if the Church is to hold her own in the country.

4.—RENFREW DEANERY—REV. C. V. FORSTER BLISS, RURAL DEAN.

There are three Parishes and eight Missions in this Deanery, an increase of one Parish owing to the fact that during the year one of our Missions decided to become a self-supporting Parish, and provided the requisite income. One new station has been opened in Renfrew Mission, viz., Bonnechere Point.

Three new Churches have been erected, viz., St. Oswald's, Chalk River, in the Mission of Petawawa; St. ———, Eau Claire, in the Mission of Mattawa; St. Clement's, Esmonde, in the Mission of Calabogie.

The Parsonage at Arnprior has been completely renovated at considerable cost and both it and the Stafford Parsonage have been supplied with very excellent furnaces.

The Parish of Pembroke is about to erect a very handsome Parish Hall at a cost of between two and three thousand dollars. The lot has been paid for and the funds are subscribed for the building, with the exception of a small sum, which will be readily forthcoming when required.

The Church property throughout the Deanery is all in good shape, and with the exception of one Church in Mattawa Mission, one in Renfrew Mission, and some in Stafford, the buildings are all returned as being sufficiently insured. The value is reported at \$51,715 as against \$49,275 last year, an increase of \$2,440. Two years ago the reported value of property was \$46,180. The debt upon Church property throughout the Deanery is returned at \$6,100 as against \$6,270 last year, a slight diminution notwithstanding the fact that three new Churches have been erected during the year.

The contributions to the Mission Fund have not yielded the 50 per cent increase asked for by the Board, though there has been a considerable increase even with the incomplete returns at hand at this date. Calabogie has increased 100 per cent, Stafford 60 per cent, Pembroke 35 per cent. Beachburg, Cobden, and Petawawa have also increased, while Arnprior and Eganville have decreased.

During the year the Rural Dean officially visited all Parishes and Missions, with two exceptions, and in *three* of them made a house to house canvass for the purpose of increasing the local support to clergyman's income, with the following results :

Eganville increased from \$304.00 to \$570.00.
 Stafford increased from \$500.00 to 761.00, and relinquished all aid from the Mission Fund.

Beachburg increased from \$156.00 to \$463.50.

Carson to charge of the Parish of Stafford ; presided at a meeting of the congregation of St. Alban the Martyr, Mattawa, called for the purpose of adjusting some matters of dispute between the Clergyman (Rev. R. W. Samwell) and people ; introduced the Revs. R. Orr and James Empringham to their parishioners, in latter instance holding two services and celebrating the Holy Communion ; held a meeting of the Chapter at Cobden, in February last, and presided at the Fourth Annual Conference of Clergy, Lay Delegates, and Churchwardens of the Deanery, at Pembroke, on the 26th and 27th of April, 1893.

Regarding the incomes of the Clergy, on which we are specially instructed to report, the Rural Dean is pleased to be able to state that a great improvement has resulted from the canvass made during the past two years. Not only have the people largely increased their support in *promises*, but these promises have been very largely kept. Seven Parishes and Missions have been canvassed, the gross annual increase in which yields the comfortable sum of \$1,466.50, and the seven Clergy concerned are now enjoying the benefit of this increased support. The Missionary Clergy of the Deanery are now in receipt of incomes more nearly approaching the minimum sanctioned by Synod than has been the case in any previous year. Last year the incomes reported to the Rural Dean from Beachburg, Calabogie, Cobden, Eganville, Petawawa, Stafford, ranged from \$435 to \$647, inclusive of Mission grants. This year they are reported as follows :

Arnprior : Promised \$854.00 ; paid \$722.00, and Clergyman states arrears of \$100.00 are good.

Beachburg : Grant and promised local support, \$713.00.

Calabogie : " " " " 601.00 ; paid \$596.00.

Cobden : " " " " 788.00 ; paid 782.58.

Eganville : " " " " 670.00 ; paid 397.50.*

Petawawa : " " " " 750.00 ; paid \$690.72.

Stafford : Resigned grant and promised \$761.00, of which \$433.00 has been paid the present Incumbent during his 7 months there. The Mission of Calabogie should have an increased grant of \$100.00, and Eganville \$50.00 increase.

In view of the anxieties that will connect themselves with the office of Rural Dean, if the discharge of its duties are to any extent conscientiously attempted, it is no slight consolation to be able to say that the work of the

Church in the Deanery is being honestly and zealously undertaken; that there are no vacant parishes; and that steady progress is being quietly made. The present condition of a part of the Mattawa Mission is not satisfactory, but the Missionary in charge has reported thereon to the Bishop.

5.—STORMONT DEANERY—REV. CANON PETTIT, M.A., RURAL DEAN.

No report received from Canon Pettit in consequence of his illness.

19.—REPORT OF THE TREASURER.

The Treasurer of Synod has pleasure in reporting a highly satisfactory year, since it succeeds an alarm felt for the capital of Diocesan Funds for several years past from the steady decline of farm values and lessened interest in agricultural pursuits in the old settled parts. All Eastern Ontario is suffering still from the depreciation in marketable expectation of real estate and consequent disinclination to purchase; so that investments made a few years ago at valuations then prevailing, with apparent ample surplus of value above the amount invested, are held now by a narrow margin. The experience of all capitalists is that interest has come in stubbornly, and that occupants have abandoned mortgaged farms, leaving principal and interest to be realized on with difficulty in a sluggish market. It is trusted, however, that the limit of depression has been reached, and that no greater test is before the investor.

Hitherto the Synod of Ontario has been fortunate, since in every such case of surrender or foreclosure so far effected it has emerged without loss of capital. That there will be some shrinkage is undoubted, however, especially in the case of the Chauncey Seeley mortgage, in which transaction officers of Synod were so grossly deceived that exemplary action should follow if only in the interest of public safety.

Thus the permanent capital produced a trifle over 5 2-5ths per cent., or deducting expenses (\$2,423.81) realized over 5 per cent. net. The gross return of the previous year was 5 3/4 per cent., but several mortgages carrying the once prevailing high rates of interest had meantime been paid off. The past year it was necessary to find investment for \$77,775.45, and every dollar had, without choice, to be placed at low rates in city as well as farm mortgages to secure investment and to produce a general result of even five per cent. net, for debentures are now saleable as low as four per cent. Two years ago the Synod held these latter desirable securities to the value of \$309,498, and the conversion of over \$100,000 into mortgage securities has added considerably to the work of the Synod office.

Again a year has passed without a bequest or notable gift to beneficent funds, such as those for widows and orphans, missions, and clergy superannuation, whose needs should surely have touched some kindly heart with means at its command.

STATE OF THE SECURITIES.

Full statements of investments have half yearly been placed before the committees of Synod fresh from the hands of the auditors as approved; and while ordinarily this procedure is ample, it is expedient this session that more than usual detail shall be given by the Treasurer. The audit committees of late years have kindly reported that the financial management of Synod affairs had met their decided approval and been eminently satisfactory. The

Investment Committee, composed of the officials of Synod, feel that they have again merited this good opinion. The increasing stringency of the times and deception in values have increased their care and energy. The overdue interest account has been reduced through systematic pressure by correspondence, and as far as expediency dictated by legal action, from \$9,676 in April, 1892, and \$9,903 in October, 1892, to \$9,134 in April, 1893, which sum has in May and June been further reduced to \$8,120. This is exclusive of the Foster and Morrison mortgages. The insurances on mortgaged properties have been placed in charge of one agent, who has made the Synod reasonably safe from loss by such systematic enquiry and prompt action as it is seldom the privilege of investors to secure. The application and valuation papers for loans have been made so positive and thorough that no loop-hole is left for deception or carelessness. As the margins on real estate investments disappear and money earning power of farmers decreases these precautions have additional value.

CONSOLIDATED FUND.

Dealing with the arrears reported on April 30th, and allowing for \$901.20 of interest since paid, the record is:—

Upon NINETY-ONE mortgages, representing \$178,577.23, no interest was due.

Three mortgages, representing \$6,537.93, called for \$29.08 interest one month due.

Three mortgages, covering \$10,000, had interest in arrear from two to four months, to extent of \$120.81.

Eight mortgages, for \$19,364.28, called for about six months interest, or \$529.19.

Seven mortgages, considered safe, and representing \$21,731, had interest due from eight to eleven months, in all \$1,109.74.

Thus on 112 mortgages there was due in interest only \$1,788, or three-quarters of one per cent. on \$236,210.

Township of Murray—Principal, \$1,600; interest to February, 1893, \$144; has paid \$140 during past year; mortgagor refused \$3,000 for land at time of creation of loan.

Township of Elizabethtown—Principal, \$2,000; interest to February, 1893, \$185.40; paid \$120 during past year.

Township of Matilda—Principal, \$1,714.30; interest to November, 1892, \$238.82; land of Matilda glebe sold originally for \$2,000 on old terms of one-seventh cash down.

Township of Augusta—Principal, \$900; interest to April, 1893, \$159; a case appealing to sympathetic forbearance.

Township of Camden East—Principal, \$7,000; interest to April, 1893, \$810; covers 400 acres; \$500 paid last three months.

Township of Edwardsburg—Principal, \$1,000; interest to Nov., 1892, \$125.80; last year paid \$125; reducing arrears steadily.

Township of Yonge—Principal, \$2,000; interest to April, 1893, \$422.77; original valuation, \$4,000; judgment secured and execution issued, but withheld for prudential reasons.

Township of Pittsburg—Principal, \$1,804.50; interest to January, 1893, \$269.15; farm foreclosed and rented for three years to a prospective purchaser; Synod will escape loss in all probability.

Township of WOLFORD—Principal, \$2,000; interest to April, 1893, \$360; valuation in 1890 by trusted valuator, \$4,000; property not worth over \$800 at best; mortgagor abandoned place.

EPISCOPAL FUND.

Upon 26 mortgages no interest is due. Upon three more six months interest is charged, or \$91.75 on a capital of \$2,866. Upon three mortgages for \$2,586.20, there is due \$162, about one year's arrears. Upon three mortgages for \$3,010 still longer arrears are standing, the amount due being \$681.86. The Chancellor, after full investigation, considers these securities safe for their face value. Compound interest is charged after the first year. Since the accounts were audited \$47.05 has been paid in on the reported arrears.

The above details may not all have a happy effect on paper, but the Synod would have been exceptionally fortunate had its loans escaped the consequences of an unprecedented depression. The figures may, however, be given

with a confident feeling that no loan society in Ontario, though investment be its profession, can at this period make a better shewing on general results of ten years operations in this Province. Proceedings have been instituted in some cases, but these actions have to be undertaken with caution, lest legal expenses add to the load to be carried by Synod. In several cases it is manifestly to the advantage of lenders to nurse the loan, to enable the mortgagor to recover his position a little, as he can handle the property with better results to the mortgagee than if it were abandoned and left idle at an inconvenient season. For the Foster property, near Belleville, though fortunate in meeting an early purchaser there is a loss at present of over \$600 in interest, and its recovery hereafter is doubtful. The Cooke farm reimbursed principal, but there was a loss of interest from the time of foreclosure until a sale was effected. Each case is dealt with by the Investment Committee on its merits after closest enquiry into prospects and values, and undue pressure upon the Committee to enforce collections would be more disastrous than leniency can possibly be.

I.—Auditors' Report.

I.—REPORT OF THE AUDIT AND ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE.

The Audit and Accounts Committee beg leave to report as follows :

That Messrs. John H. Birkett and F. R. Sargent, the Official Auditors, have made a full and complete examination of all the accounts up to and inclusive of the 30th of April last, and their report is herewith submitted.

Your Committee, assisted by the Treasurer, have made a careful examination of all the securities, and compared the same with the statements submitted to them by the accountants and found the same correct.

The securities were all in the hands of the proper custodians.

Your Committee would further report that on the mortgages belonging to the Consolidated Fund there are arrears of interest amounting to \$8,120.70, and on mortgages belonging to the Episcopal Fund there are arrears of interest amounting to \$1,013.54. Your Committee have no means of ascertaining how much of said interest, or how much of the principal represented by the said interest, may be lost to those Funds, and would recommend that the Investment Committee, or a Special Committee appointed for the purpose, be requested to make an examination of said mortgages in detail and report thereon.

Your Committee would also recommend that the alterations proposed by the Official Auditors be adopted.

I.—REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS.

The Committee on Memorials have the honour to report :—

1. With respect to the application of the congregation of St. James Church, Tweed, the Committee have suggested to the applicants a mode by which their object may be attained without application to the Synod or to the Executive Committee, and their suggestion has been adopted.

2. With respect to the application of the Rev. Dr. Mountain, the Committee do not consider that any consent of the Synod is necessary to enable Dr. Mountain to carry out what he desires; but they would recommend that if such consent is necessary it should be cheerfully given.

3. With respect to the application of the congregation of St. James' Church, Morrisburg, the Synod has no power to grant this application, the power being vested in the Executive Committee by statute. Your Committee suggest that the matter be referred to the Executive Committee to take action; and they recommend that the Executive Committee grant the prayer of the applicants, provided the conditions of the canon respecting such applications have been fulfilled. The Committee recommend further that a special meeting of the Executive Committee be called by the Lord Bishop for the purpose of considering the application after the adjournment of the Synod.

2.—MEMORIAL FROM REV. DR. MOUNTAIN.

To the Secretary of the Synod of the Diocese of Ontario :

Dear Sir,—Will you kindly bring before the notice of the Synod this my petition for the requisite authority to raise (say) a 5½ per cent. loan of (say) \$2,500, on all the present or prospective church property in my parish of East Cornwall, Ont., excepting only that lot on which the new church is now being erected, towards which object it is that I require said loan (which I propose to pay off by yearly instalments of \$400 or \$500, and in fact to make it *altogether* a personal liability).

In security for said loan, I propose to give a mortgage on the Rectory House and land, consisting of 2 lots of about one-quarter acre each, with stable, etc., thereon, for which I paid \$2,200. This property as yet stands in my own name, it being only willed to the Parish at my death (though I do now think of making it over fully at the time of the consecration of the church, before next Christmas, I hope).

But as I cannot procure this loan on this property only as security, I wish to include in the mortgage the former church, which had been deeded over to the Synod, and was, at my request, left unconsecrated, with a view to its being ultimately converted into a Church Hall, by its removal to the ad-

II.—WITH OUR CLERGY.

The zealous co-operation of the Church's officers is essential. Surely we shall have it in such a cause! We respectfully ask them at once to let us know the number of their Communicants, and envelopes for each individual offering will be supplied. This offering should then be made at some celebration of Holy Communion *before September 15th*. Thus we hope that this DIOCESAN GIFT TO GOD may come into the Clerical Secretary's hands and the debt be all paid off BY OCTOBER 1ST.

III.—A WORD TO ALL.

This appeal, cordially commended by our Bishop and the Synod, is made confidently to our Christ-loving brethren, lay and clerical, old and young, rich and poor. To the clergy we need say nothing more. To fathers and mothers, spared to live and blessed to see their boys and girls kneeling at the Lord's Table, we would only say, Will you not gladly give this little thank-offering to the Lord for each one of them? To others who are independent and self-supporting,—TO ALL who throughout the Diocese enjoy the privilege of Church membership, specially the blessing of the soul-refreshing and and strengthening Sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood,—we say: here is a golden opportunity to show how the Churches of this Diocese can *all* unite in AN ACT OF LOVE—love towards the dear old Church and towards our brethren, for whose spiritual welfare our fifty missionaries are employed and at work.
