





# SPEAKER TELLS OF EXPULSION

Judge Arsenault, of P. E. I., Heard in Address at St. Peters' Hall.

St. Peter's Auditorium was filled last night to hear a scholarly lecture by Justice A. E. Arsenault, of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island, on the "Expulsion of the Acadians." The chairman of the evening was L M. Owens, who in a few short words expressed the pleasure of the gathering at the opportunity of hearing so learned a speaker and one so gifted in the subject about to be discussed. The lecture was held under the auspices of the North End sub-division of the C. W. L. Justice Arsenault traced the history of the Acadian settlers from the found-ing of Port Royal until the treaty of Utrecht in 1713 and from the treaty of Utrecht until the expulsion in 1755. He described them as being of a loyal nature, peaceable in character and agriculturally inclined.

The total number at the time of the expulsion, about 2,500, was divided into three settlements at Chignecto, Grand Pre and Port Royal. 





## INSTALMENT BUYING

BUYING on the instalment plan has become of sufficient importance to receive consideration from the President of a great banking institution. Sir Vincent Meredith, President of the Bank of Montreal, in his annual address, touched on the part played in the expansion of domestic trade by the extension of instalment sales. He finds that buying on the instalment plan has not resulted in decrease in the aggregate of savings deposits nor reduced purchasing of life insurance. Conducted within prudent lines, he says instalment selling has its merits. Speaking particularly of automobiles, he points out that the percentage of cars returned diminishes as the payments rise. The merchant who first adopted the instalment serves a useful purpose.

Rev. D. E. McDonald, Presbyterian missionary on furlough from India, where he has labored for 15 years, was the preacher in Knox church yesterday morning and in St. Matthew's church last night and told of his work in that

Mr. McDonald is the son of Duncan E. McDonald, of Beaverton, Ont., and received his theological training in Knox College and the Toronto Bible College. The last six years of his service in India have been spent in the central district and the first nine years were spent among the Beehls of India.
This is his first visit to the Maritimes
and his itinerary has included Nova.
Scotia and Prince Edward Island and he is now touring New Brunswick. He is traveling under the auspices of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in the interests of missions. Mr. McDonald will speak today in Sussex and tomorrow night will be heard in St. Columba

church, Fairville. He will afterwards go to St. Stephen. St. George and other parts of New Brunswick. Next Sunday will end his tour in New Brunswick and he will go on to Toronto, where his wife and family are visiting. He will return to India next year.

### IN KNOX

His sermon in Knox church yesterday was preached from the text Romans 1-16: "For the gospel is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth." He dealt chiefly with his work in India, telling of the transformation that has taken place among the hill tribes who were demon worshippers and formerly known as rob-bers. During 80 years of missionary labor among these people the present entire staff of 25 or 30 trained teachers and preachers have been raised up from among the tribes. In some places the churches were self-supporting and self-

propagating.



The Bolshevist Cantonese government troops, coming from Canton, under Chiang Kai-Shek, with headquarters at Hankow, and Wauchang, opposite, have defeated the forces allied to the Peking government and have moved northward from Amoy and down both banks of the Yangtze river, and on to Foochow, hemming in the Peking government (as shown by the dotted line in the above map).

The American destroyers "Truxton" an "Pope," as well as British vessels, have been

sent up the river to protect foreigners. The British have sent thirty airplanes also. North of the Yangtze river, at Sianfu, is a strategic point, as from here the Cantonese forces have planned to march with the western army of Marshal Feng, the Christian general, on Peking and the coast. Marshal Wu Pei-Fu, driven from Hankow, has been waiting at Honan, a short distance away.

# Robb Will Ask Two Preachers Are

OTTAWA, Dec. 12—Supplementary estimates totalling more than \$8,000,000 will be tabled by Hon. J. A. Robb, minister of finance, early in the week.

These supplementaries are the same as were before parliament at dissolution last July. Together with the main estimates for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1927, they make a grand total of \$199,000,000 to be voted by parliament for the public services. To this figure must be added over \$154,000,000 which is authorized by statute and does not have to pass parlia-

ond does not have to pass, parliament in the estimates. Altogether, the total estimated expenditure, including money to be voted by parliament and money authorized by statute for the fiscal year ended next March, is \$345,000,000.

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

They have not seen the well filled, smiling fields and neat village settlements planted on our prairies, wrought out of their own unaided labor. They do not hear about the second generation, speaking fault-less English, entering our educational institutions and capturing the most coveted prizes. Above all, they do not know that these people, essentially agricultural, stick to the farm through thick and thin and have their roots so firmly in the for them. Western people, firmly in the soil that town life has no attractions for them. Western people, attractions for them. Western people, who live in close proximity to peasant colonies, have nothing but praise for the honesty, integrity and sensible frugality of these settlers. They do not recognize any social menace in their presence. I shall now deal briefly with some of the popular objections raised some of the popular objections raised to foreign immigration.

The lower standard of living of the European peasant class is often criticized. But we are not in imminent danger of completely misunderstanding this very elastic phrase? I see a vastly greater menace to society in the almost universal weakness for too high a standard of living, than lurks in any class living well within its means, which is merely another way of describing a low standard of living. To have a hardworking, frugal family characterized as a social hazard because it declines to spend more than it earns, Hitherto we have endeavored to instil precisely these virtues in the minds of our children. We have even held them up as absolutely essential to worldly success. Are we not a trifle inconsistent, not to say ridiculous, in this mod-

ern attitude? But my observations leads me to the conclusion that an inferior standard of living is invariably a reaction to economice necessity. For instance, the Danish farmers are rich. Man for
