SPANISH PRISONER BREAKS N AGAIN

Offers New York Man \$120,000 if He Will Help Him Recover \$360,000.

MR. SHEETS DECLINES

Letter From Barcelona Reveals Revival of Game 350 Years Old.

New York, Aug. 19.—A chance to make \$120,000 by investing a few dollars in an old established business is being offered to American investors.

Oliver W. Sheets of 871 Brook avenue is the man who at present has option on the big opening in this ancient and conservative line.

The letter, which would undoubtedly be found in a court of law to constitute a contract, is as follows:

Dear Sir: Being imprisoned here by bankruptcy I beseech you to help me to obtain a sum of \$360,000 in America, being necessary to come here to raise the seizure of my luggage, paying to the Registrar of the Court the expenses of my trial and recover my portmanteau containing a secret pocket which I have hidden two checks payable to bearer for that sum.

One of the saddest features of the Spanish prisoner cases is that they usually die unless the ransom is promptly paid. Generally a cable or a black-circled letter announces that the prisoner has perished and left a helpless daughter as per enclosed photo.

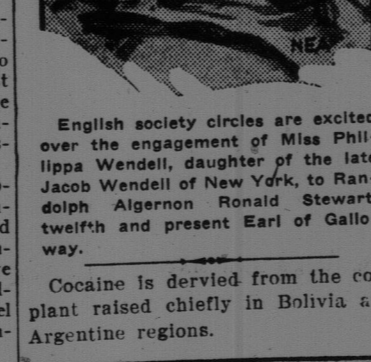

ADVENTISTS HAVE YEAR OF JUBILEE

Fifty Years Ago Sent Out First Missionary Across the Seas.



The Seventh-day Adventists of this city are planning to join with other denominational churches throughout the world in celebrating their jubilee of foreign missionary endeavor.

Funds have increased in leaps and bounds. During the 10 years from 1912 to 1922 the offerings for foreign missions totaled \$1,983,760.91, while the contributions for all purposes during that decade amounted to \$62,090,775.85, or a per capita of \$38.86.

In 1874, the year when they sent out their first foreign missionary, the Adventists established their first training school. Today they are operating five colleges, six junior colleges, three seminaries, 33 academies, and 672 elementary schools, which have a total enrollment of 22,600 students.

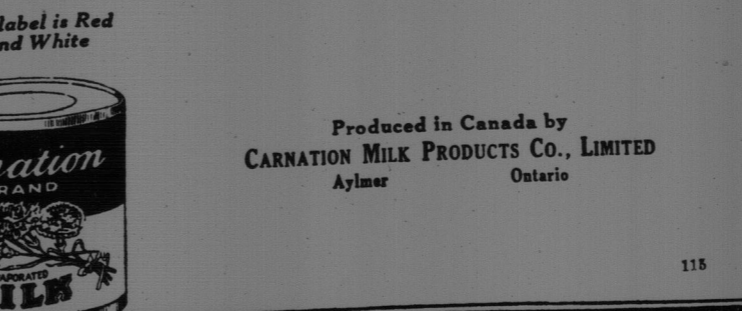

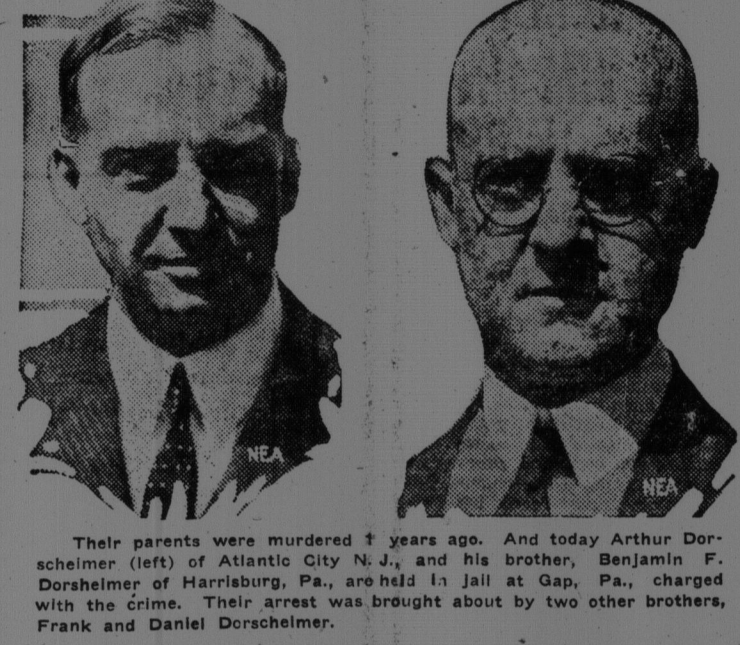
PLAN FOR CONVENTION.

PREPARE LANDING
PLACE FOR FLIERS

U. S. Officials Ask No Official Reception to be Given World Airmen.

Major H. A. Dargue, commander of the United States Air Service in Boston, and his companion, Dr. E. S. Bagnall, of Haverhill, Mass., who arrived in the city yesterday morning to make arrangements for the United States world fliers' arrival here on their way through from Picton to Boston, were busy through the day finishing up the preliminary steps of their preparations.

They called on Mayor F. L. Polts, Harbor Master F. D. Alward, Commissioner James H. Frink, Commissioner W. L. Harding, J. C. Chesley, agent of the Marine and Fisheries Department, Pilot F. M. McKelvie, who will act as their agent here, and many others. The afternoon was spent in looking for possible landing sites and a probable choice of No. 6 slip in West St. John was made. Permission to use this slip will be applied for this morning when the United States army representatives will again meet the Mayor and the harbor master and will also meet Commissioner T. H. Bullock and C. B. Lockhart, collector of customs for the port.

Gas and oil supplies will be arranged this morning. The matter of anchors and buoys was taken up yesterday with Mr. Chesley and was settled satisfactorily, these articles being supplied for the occasion.

Will Take Week to Get Here.

Major Dargue said last night that the fliers would not reach St. John until about a week from the time they left Iceland and that he and Dr. Bagnall would not be here to greet them. Affairs would be left in the hands of Mr. McKelvie and he would carry out the details of arranging for the delivery of supplies of oil, gasoline and other necessities.

He had requested the city officials to forego anything in the nature of a reception for the men, he said, as he figured they would need rest when they arrived. They would appreciate the honor done the men by a reception but thought this was not the time for it.

The planes would be here over night only, he said, arriving either the day after they reached Picton or on the same day. It was planned that they should stop a night in each place but it was possible that they would fly here without spending any length of time in Picton.

Going to Quebec.

Lieut. Locatelli, Italian aviator, who is flying across the Atlantic, will call at Quebec in a continuation of his flight to New York, according to advices received in Quebec by the Illinois. The aviator at last reports was at Reykjavik, Iceland, and will fly thence to Greenland, to Cartwright, on the Labrador coast, and then up the Gulf of St. Lawrence to Quebec.

BEATTY ADDED TO LIST.

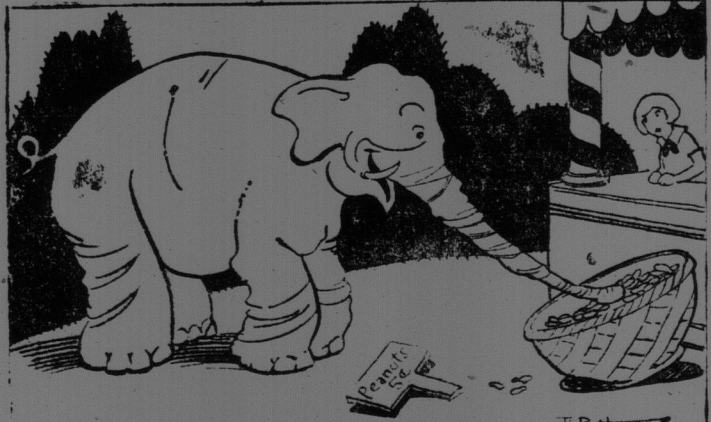

WOMEN DISCUSS MILK PRICES HERE

Report Two Babies Died After Free Supply was Discontinued.

Faced by the grim fact that following the curtailment of the fresh milk fund expenditures two little lives had been lost, the committee of the St. John Council of Women which has charge of that fund yesterday seriously reviewed the situation. The committee met at the residence of Mrs. A. W. Estey, president of the council, and learned that there was now in the fund hardly any more money than would pay the bills of two months and that in the last five months the bills had amounted to \$1,083.99. The price charged for milk in St. John was much criticized and it was decided to have a committee of three consisting of Mrs. Estey, Miss Doris Coates, superintendent of the Victorian Order of Nurses in St. John, and Miss Ethel Hazen Jarvis, acting secretary of the milk fund committee, visit the pasteurization plants and interview the managers. It was stated that the farmers are receiving five and a half cents a quart for milk which retails at 14 cents, that the pasteurization plants charge from one to two cents a quart for pasteurization, that the plants reckoned a charge of one cent a quart against all milk sold as the cost of breakage and loss of bottles and that the additional charge is largely taken up in distribution costs. opinion that the distribution costs were far too high and that in the interests of the citizens generally some form of municipal distribution should be established as a means of reducing milk prices. The charge of one cent a quart to allow for breakages appeared inexplicable to the members of the committee as it was the experience of those present that any breakages in the homes were paid for by the consumer. One pasteurization plant was said to have lost \$1,600 through bottle breakage and the non-return of bottles since May of this year.

Mrs. Estey reported that when an entertainment had been given for one of the Y. W. C. A. clubs recently she had found none of the pasteurization plants would buy back the 28 empty milk bottles and this appeared strange in view of the statement that the plants found it hard to keep up the supply of bottles. Miss Coates, who has supervision of the milk fund distribution which is carried out by the Victorian Order of Nurses, reported there were at present 61 milk bottles receiving milk, the majority receiving a quart a day. The 61 included two sets of twins and the quadruplets who had been readmitted as milk fund babies about a fortnight ago. In all, 91 individual babies had been supplied with milk through the fund since the first of the year. The babies now on the fund included the children of two widows, five deserted wives

and two unmarried mothers. The others were children whose fathers were out of work. Two Babies Died. Miss Coates said that when in June an attempt was made to cut down the number of babies receiving milk because the fund was diminishing, one baby whose supply had been reduced from a quart a day to a pint a day had died and another baby that had had its supply cut off had also died. (Since the fund had been put in operation)

ORDERED TO PAY POTATO POOL LOSS

Decision in Victoria Co. Case Given By Mr. Justice Barry

Fredericton, Aug. 18.—In Chambers this morning Mr. Justice Barry gave judgment in an action which was tried before him, without a jury, at the last Victoria County Circuit Court. Twenty-six of the shareholders of the Andover branch of the Maritime United Farmers' Co-operative, Limited, had, it seems, in the fall of 1920, entered into a partnership agreement to buy potatoes on their own account and sell directly to the trade, thus eliminating the middleman. They were to share the profits or the losses of the venture according to the number of barrels of potatoes delivered by each. The plaintiffs guaranteed their account at the Bank of Nova Scotia at Fredericton, for their proportionate share of the loss. Mr. Justice Barry is of the opinion that the arrangement had not been fulfilled. That was what it was understood that all of the co-partners having produce to sell should sell all of it through the agency of the partnership and through that agency alone, and that was not done. Mr. Howlett's defence was, principally, that having furnished no potatoes to the partnership he was not a part of the loss. The judge found the issues of fact against both the defendants, and entered judgments for \$1,282.25 against Redell and \$546.25 against Howlett, with costs of suit in both cases.

SAVE TWO CLINGING TO DRIFTING BOAT

Halifax, Aug. 18.—The British tank steamer Ivor, loaded with benzine, from Cardiff for Philadelphia, put into this port today with engine trouble and will be detained here at least four days making repairs. The two men manned a boat and rowed out into the harbor, where they were rescued from drowning by Willie Arsenau, aged 14, and John B. Richard, of Richibucto Village. The boat to which they clung was being washed to sea. The boy when brought to shore was almost exhausted.

CATHOLIC WOMEN'S CAMPAIGN FOR DRESS REFORM WITH NEW TREND IN FEMINE AFFAIRS

IMMODEST?

(By HORTENSE SAUNDERS.)
New York, Aug. 12.—The old-fashioned "Sunday-go-to-meeting" dress will soon be with us again if the campaign taken up by the Catholic women of the U. S. proves successful.

The first question to be discussed at the fourth annual convention of Catholic women at St. Louis in November will be the matter of decency in dress.
"The Catholic women of Italy are trying to fix upon a church costume with sleeves at least three inches below the elbow, a collar no more than three inches from the neck and skirts not more than seven inches from the ground," said Mrs. Michael Gavin, president of the National Council of Catholic Women.

"We do not believe such extreme limitation would be popular or necessary here in America," she continued. "Dressing is a matter of personal taste so long as decency is observed, but some standard must be set."
"We have suitable costumes for all activities of women. We all recognize that gowns belong on the beach and bathing suits on the beach. Evening gowns are all right for the ball room but they are all out of place in church."

"Since we recognize that certain clothes are appropriate for certain places, why not have a modest, suitable costume for church attendance? It need not be costly or elaborate—just decent."

"Our aim to promote modesty in dress was at first for appropriate church dress," she says. "Now it really has the deeper ideal of forming feminine taste and to make the woman worker more modest and inconspicuous as a means of protection against vulgar men."
The Catholic women have not offered their own standards in dress as yet. Nor have they set any rule except that for observing modesty. In November they will get down to cases and say just what is decent and indecent in dress.

Then they will mobilize—700,000 strong—for decency.

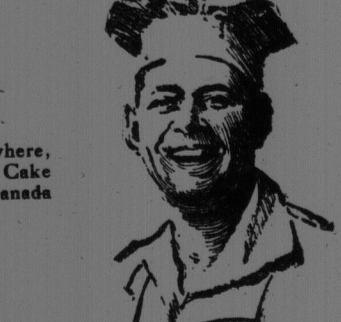

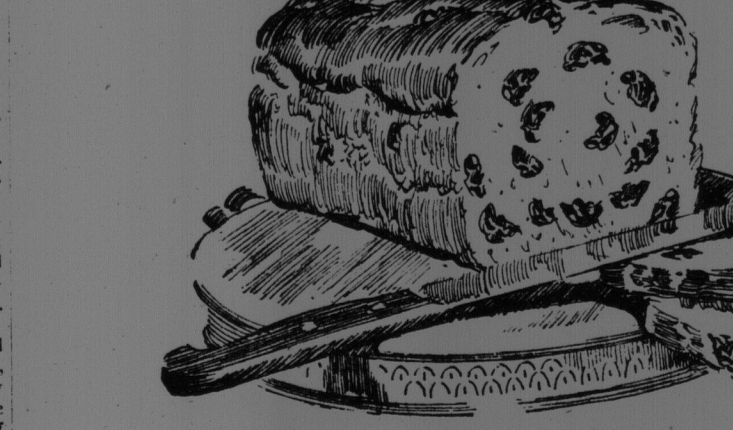

WAR ON MOSQUITO.

(Times of India.) The history of the spasmodic war against the mosquito in Bombay city and of the prejudices which still prevail that war being absolutely thorough, would form a striking comment on the ability of the medical profession to persuade mankind to protect itself against disease. We can only hope that with the spread of education the kind of "safety first" ideas which help to prevent disease may become more popular. There is no lack of object lessons to show what can be done. It has, for example, always been recognized that the elimination of the mosquito is really an engineer's job. Residents in Bombay can see that for themselves at Colaba where the reclamation work has had the excellent effect of greatly diminishing the incidence of malaria among the troops in barracks.

LATIN-AMERICA IN NATIONS LEAGUE

Under Secretary-General to be Appointed—Of Growing Importance.

By HENRY WOOD. (United Press.)

Geneva, Aug. 19—With the ever-increasing importance in the League of Nations of the Latin-American countries, the fifth annual assembly of the league, which has been summoned to the council and the assembly to consider the creation and appointment of a Latin-American under-secretary general for the past two years.

Along with this appointment, which would give Latin-America the same representation at the secretariat as is now enjoyed by England, France and Italy, there would also be an increase in the Latin-American bureau which has already existed at the secretariat for the past two years.

Definite recommendations for the above have now been made by Sir Eric Drummond to the council and the assembly, and the final decision will be taken by the latter in September. Owing to the fact that the Latin-American block in the assembly is, at virtually all times, to control the necessary majority vote, no doubt exists as to the success of the recommendation.

With Sir Eric Drummond representing England as secretary general, Monsieur Averol representing France as first under-secretary and Signor Attol representing Italy as second under-secretary, Latin-America will, in the new third under-secretary general, enjoy the next highest place in the organization of the secretariat.

League Looks to Latins.

While this recognition is accorded for what Latin America has already done in the league, leaders are also looking forward to the future and providing for the ever-increasing role which it is conceded the Latin-American countries are destined to play. With the return of the league to the league there is every reason to believe that Mexico will soon present her application, at which time all Latin America will be in the league with the exception of Ecuador.

Already there exists in the assembly the so-called Latin-American block and when this has been augmented by the addition of Argentina, Mexico and Ecuador, it will give the latter a voting strength which, according to longagers will always constitute the greatest safeguard against any possibility of the league being dominated by European nations or politics.

THE INSANITY PLEA. (Vancouver Province.) Of recent years the plea of insanity has been advanced on behalf of accused persons in murder trials with increasing frequency. Especially has this been the case in the United States, the trial of Harry K. Thaw and the two youths at Chicago being striking instances. In Canada, too, the insanity plea has been put forward on several occasions, notably in the Detour trial in Quebec, while it also formed the chief point in the defence of the Chinaman who has had several trials during the past year in Vancouver. A recent case before the Court of Criminal Appeal in England, in which a similar plea was advanced, led to a clear and lucid exposition of the British law on insanity by the Lord Chief Justice, Lord Hewart.

In dismissing the defence of insanity had come to the almost inevitably a "make-weight" in capital offenses and was very often founded upon an extremely inaccurate view of what the criminal law relating to insanity is. The law is that every man is presumed to be sane and responsible for his acts until it has been satisfactorily established and clearly proved that, at the time he committed the act, he was laboring under such a defect of reason, disease of mind as not to know the nature and quality of his act.

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THE COURTS AND THE CRIMINAL.

(New York Herald-Tribune.) In welcoming to the General Sessions bench William Allen, just appointed by Governor Smith, Judge Alfred J. Talley said:

You have come on the bench of the greatest criminal court in the world at a time when this country is suffering under an indictment which precisions will be heard only with the precision that you will be your most disdressing problem.

If the United States is the most lawless country on earth the courts are at least partially responsible. Their record for delay, for suspended sentences and short terms is without doubt greater than that of the courts of any other nation. Foreign criminals who would never have the hardihood to violate the law in their own country do so here with impunity, trusting to the leniency that too often is to be found on the bench.

It is true that the great majority of defendants are youths. But that is to be expected. Youth is naturally more headlong, more impatient of restraint than maturity. And when the plea of youthfulness is accepted as an excuse for crime, and instead of a salutary sentence a young moron is allowed to go with a warning, the sentencing judge may look with confidence to his return on another charge.

The Herald Tribune recently chronicled the arrest of seven of ten bandits who tried to rob the office of the American Railway Express Company. All these men had been dealt with gently by courts in the past. All of them, if again given short sentences, may be counted on to commit fresh crimes on their release.

The way to check crime is to make it dangerous and to publish to the world that the way of the Crook will be made hard. There are still many unassimilated elements in our population, and in a country whose population number 110,000,000 there are bound to be many criminals. But there is no cause for uneasiness. The character of the population will improve as the country grows older. If the courts deal with the lawbreaker according to his deserts crime will be brought within bounds.

Infant mortality also touched its lowest recorded figure during the year with a rate of 60 per thousand. Another disturbing feature of the figures, is the increase in the spread of small-pox due entirely, it is said, to the incompetence of local authorities. During the year nearly 80,000 cases of tuberculosis were notified.

WORLD SHIPPING

According to statistics just published by Lloyd's, the gross tonnage of sea-going steel and iron steamships and motor ships owned by the principal maritime countries in June, 1924, amounted to 57,830,000 tons, comparing with 42,514,000 tons in June, 1914, an increase of 15,316,000 tons. According to advice received by the Bankers' Association from its English information service, the Lloyd's report indicates that this steel tonnage is exclusive of one and a half million tons of wooden and composite steamers in existence at the present time. These figures are excluded from the comparison because of their comparatively small importance in international trade.

BETTER LOBSTER PRICES IN THE BRITISH MARKET

London.—It will be recalled that last season was a somewhat disastrous one for Canadian exporters of canned lobsters to this country. The demand for the article is mainly confined to the summer, and it unfortunately happened that the prolonged dock strikes which took place here last year held up the arrivals of the Canadian new pack until the season had nearly expired. The result was that when the lobsters were finally delivered, it was impossible to effect sales. The consequent glut of the market has been a serious market was overstocked, with no buyers.

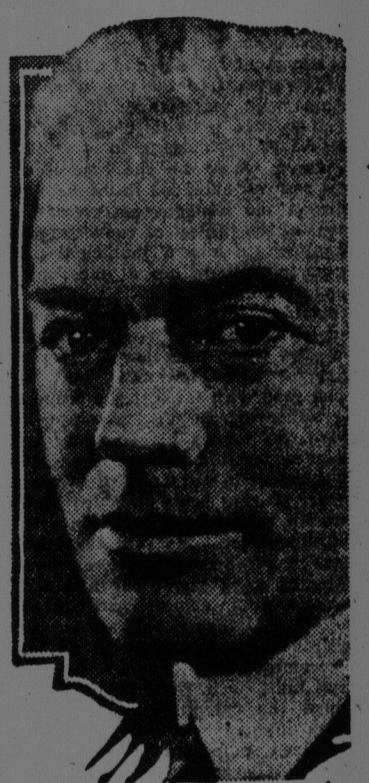
F. G. Spencer, Back From Bangor, Brings News of Carroll Players.
