A fire at Rogersville, near Chatham, in the woolen mill belonging to the Order of Le Trappe, completely destroyed the mill and also burned a highway bridge nearby, according to word received from Chatham. The loss to the Trappists is said to be about \$25,000.



MAKING PROGRESS.

The information Mr. Kribs gave to the City Council yesterday was not new. Mr. Kribs has given it before and given it more than once. There is no reason why any representative of the city should not have been in full possession of it months ago. Mr. Kribs is not a mere theorist. He knows his subject. His services have been at the disposal of the city, so far as giving accurate information has been concerned. Ever since he came to St. John. It pleased certain persons, however, to regard him as the mouthpiece of a government which was trying to put something over on St. John.

Mr. Robinson goes on to talk about the Mayor's alleged ignorance of the cost of hydro power to the city up to the point of serving the consumer, and wants to know if it is good business to name the selling price before knowing the cost of the article. He apparently does not know that the selling price is based on a most liberal estimate of cost, which will cover all contingencies.

Mr. Robinson never heard of responsible government? The citizens by large majorities have instructed the Mayor what to do, would Mr. Robinson have him do something else? Does Mr. Robinson stand for minority rule? If, for example, the control of the city were handed over to the New Brunswick Power Company's directors would Mr. Robinson be happy? The people will prefer to stick to responsible government and the will of the majority, especially when that will has been twice expressed in a most emphatic manner.

EXPLAINS THE DEPORTATION FROM ULSTER

Belfast, Nov. 22.—Sir Dawson Bates, Home Secretary of the North Ireland Cabinet yesterday, gave an explanation of the sending away from Belfast of some Protestants because they were considered a detriment to peace. He said that actively speaking the men had not been deported, because the Ulster Government did not possess the power to send them out of the country, but that they had been transported to a place where it was impossible for them to cause mischief. He added that the number of men had been exaggerated. It is said unofficially that the men were sent to Derry, on the Ulster border. They are reported to be members of a secret society organized to counteract the activities of the Sinn Fein, but according to officials of the northern government they participated in the recent outbreak of ordinary crime and it was in the interest of the community that their activities cease.

### SIKI EVIDENTLY HARD TO HANDLE

#### Manager Accepts Federation Decision and Tells of His Troubles.

Paris, Nov. 22.—M. Hellers, manager of Batling Siki, in an interview published in L'Auto, says he accepts the action of the French Boxing Federation in withdrawing the license of the Senegalese, and asserts: "By my work I made him a world champion, I should have liked by my advice, to make him a gentleman."

The newspaper learns that Siki's license was cancelled because of the boxer's assault on the manager of Maurice Prenter and because of his behavior in public places in Paris and in the provinces. Another reason advanced was that Siki some time ago struck a woman.

"By his fault Siki makes us lose all the profits of the victory over Carpentier," said Hellers in the interview, "that is to say, at least 4,000,000 francs—which is not bad—and all the sporting honors—which is better. I understand that the federation is obliged to guard the interests of boxing before personal interests and that is why I accept the decision. I am deeply grieved by all that has happened. I have not seen Siki for ten days, and thought he had mended his ways but from reports I hear I have again deceived myself."

The Pettit Parisien says that Siki has been spoken of by a German motion picture firm with a view to having him appear in a film, but that he has not yet answered.



BROKER VIEWS ON THE MARKETS

(McDougal and Cowans, private wire) New York, Nov. 22.—Evans says: "The market, gauged by the Dow Jones averages, reached its high point of the year on Oct. 14. From there it declined for exactly one month to Nov. 14, which was the low point of the reaction. We will see, in my opinion, a good bull market in full swing again before the end of the year. "Thomson McKinnon—"Recommend the purchase of Standard stocks during such weakness as may appear from time to time." "Block Maloney—"Look for a two-sided market. Good stocks may rally further but rallies may be used for sales." "Bache and Co.—"Re-accumulation of stocks for the second section of the bull market does not discourage the lives on unsupported stocks." "Chicago, Nov. 22.—Winters says: "Our way of thinking prices have advanced as much as supply and demand conditions warrant at this time, and we are disposed to anticipate a decline in the market some time in the near future."

Other weak spots were Studabaker, American Express, Woolworth and American Can, all off a point or more. St. Louis Southwestern Pfd. moved up 1/8-8, Missouri Pacific Pfd. 1 1/4 and So. Am. Bank note jumped 3/8-2 points to a new high record and Public Service of New Jersey gained half an overnight announcement of a higher dividend and then reacted on profit-taking. Foreign exchanges were easy.

PROFESSIONALS OPERATE AGAINST SOME OF THE STOCKS AT START OF WALL STREET DAY.

New York, Nov. 22.—(noon)—Most stocks received relatively little support during the morning. Trading was in exceedingly small volume but prices, nevertheless, kept slipping off steadily, with the selling covering a wide range of shares. Dividend paying railroad issues were about the only exceptions to the general reactionary trend. OPINION ON THE MONTREAL MARKET

(McDougal & Cowans, Private Wire) Montreal, Nov. 22.—The local market was very dull on the local stock market, the trading in rights of Dominion Textile and Bell Telephone, two companies which have recently issued new capital stock, being nearly double the trading in listed shares. There is a desire on the part of the public to participate in the new offerings of these two companies but the fact that both shares are at a low level, and the fact that the market again exhibited considerable individuality, being characterized by a decided reactionary tendency, despite the dullness, while New York was not only very dull, but most moderate and showed a reactionary tendency at the close.

The French and British, he says, will give up part of the shares they received under the San Remo agreement.

London, Nov. 6.—(Associated Press, by Mail)—The total tonnage of merchant vessels at the end of June, 1922, holding the classification of Lloyd's Register, exceeded 27,000,000 tons, the highest figure ever recorded, according to the annual report of "Lloyd's Register of Shipping." To these figures should be added 298 vessels of 4,204,018 tons under the heading of "class contemplated," which brings the aggregate to 31,204,018 tons. On the first total 5,878 vessels of 13,724,562 tons are British, and 4,151 of 13,600,567 tons belong to other countries. It is said that disturbed political and economic conditions, disorganization of cargoes, and stagnation of the international trade, provide adequate explanations for the continued falling in shipbuilding. Vessels of all types of construction intended for bulk oil carrying, and built in the last twelve months, amounted to 114 of 602,897 tons. The progressive demand for oil carrying vessels is shown by the fact that the register tonnage of these vessels has increased from 1,478,988 tons in July 1914, to 5,062,699 tons in July, 1922. Some 299 vessels of 1,898,529 tons were fitted for burning oil fuel during the year, and valued in July, 1924, the vessels so fitted totalled 1,810,209 tons, the figures for July, 1922, were 1,446,162 tons. J. M. ROBINSON FOR MINORITY RULE TELLS WHY SHE WAS OUT LATE

Further Evidence in Case of Men and Women—Trouble in a Barn.

A case against Harold Winchester, Henry Mitchell, Rebecca Scott and Gertrude Chittick, charged with rancor, was resumed this morning in the police court. E. S. Ritchie said he had been requested by the father of the Scott girl to represent her. He said his client was unable to make an explanation as to why she had been out until three o'clock on Sunday morning. Rebecca Scott said that she lived with her father and uncle in Prince Edward street and had kept house for her father for the last twelve years. On the night in question she had been coming from her sister's house when she met her father and her sister in the hospital. She had the Chittick girl, who she said, had been drinking with her when they met the two men by the street. They had been arrested as they were walking up the street behind the men. She had known the Chittick girl for six years. Dr. J. H. Allingham again urged the magistrate to show as much leniency as possible for Winchester, who, he said, was inclined to be decent and he thought this escapade would be a lesson to him. Winchester and Mitchell were allowed to go on condition that they return this afternoon with money with which to pay fines which might be imposed on them. Rebecca Scott was allowed to go in charge of her father who paid a fine and said he would look after his daughter. The magistrate said the fine imposed was for being out after nine o'clock in the evening. The Chittick woman, who said this morning that she was married, was remanded to jail until her fine could be arranged. John R. Shields, charged with assaulting the son of William H. Knox, pleaded not guilty. E. S. Ritchie appeared for the defence and K. J. MacRae for Knox. William Knox, the boy on whom it was alleged assault was made, said that he had been in a barn with two boys and that the accused had kicked him and thrown him down on some stones and punched him and twisted his arm behind him. His evidence was corroborated by Donald Smith and Harold Lord. The accused said the trouble had occurred in a barn owned by H. A. Northrup. He was employed there. He had put the boys out of the barn and one of them had thrown stones at him and called his a bad name. He said John Knox, uncle of the former witness, had struck him and scarred his face. H. A. Northrup, said Shields was an excellent boy and a good living chap and very honest and reliable. Wilfred Wellington said he had been in the barn when the trouble occurred and had seen Knox hit Shields. He admitted that he had said to Knox "Come out and see what you can do." After both lawyers had summed up their cases Shields and John Knox were remanded to jail.

THINKS MAYOR FISHER SHOULD NOT OBEY POPULAR MANDATE

The "Interests" Again—The Mayor Declines to be Drawn Into Useless Controversy; Refers His Correspondent to Mr. Kribs. The Daily Telegraph yesterday received a copy of a letter from J. M. Robinson to Mayor Fisher. Since it was a letter to the Mayor the Telegraph felt it would be but fair to await the Mayor's reply and publish both together. The Mayor's reply is now available and the Times herewith prints both letter and answer—His Worship, The Mayor, City.

Dear Sir—The interview published in the daily press in reply to my recent letter to you accuses me of lack of courtesy in too hastily publishing a letter in the daily paper. I apologise. The interview further insinuates that I have an axe to grind, and, while I thought it was well known just what my position is, nevertheless I shall state it to you as briefly as possible.

- 1. I represent a considerable holding of First and Second Preferred Stocks in the New Brunswick Power Company and have sold these securities to investors. 2. I have dealt in the bonds of the New Brunswick Power Company and have sold these bonds to investors. 3. I am a tax payer in the City of St. John and I represent other interests who pay taxes. The first letter was addressed as a taxpayer to you and in that letter I asked you: 1. To correct me, if my judgment was wrong. 2. To advise me what interests, other than the interests I have mentioned, are incurred in the civic operation of a distributing plant for electric power. In your reply, as published in the paper, you neither: 1. Offer any correction of my judgment, nor, 2. Inform me who, in your opinion, will pay any loss. May I ask you to answer these questions, either publicly or privately, bearing in mind that, as a taxpayer in this city, you represent me and my interests to exactly the same extent that you represent any other taxpayer under your jurisdiction. I am informed that you have stated that you do not know just what the hydro power will cost the city up to the point of serving the consumer and I take it that that is a very reasonable statement on your part, as there are certain factors, some of which are referred to upon which such cost would be based and which have not yet been determined. After the necessary work until all construction is completed, but that you nevertheless say that you expect to use the Ontario rates, and I would like to ask you: 1. If in your judgment as a business man, it is good business to name the price at which you will sell before you know what the article will cost you? 2. If you, as a business man, backed by one section of the citizens, as you are today, would invest \$600,000 of your own money in a distributing plant on the basis of cost of power and other expenses, would you be prepared to market on which you propose to expend the money of the taxpayers? These questions are asked you, because I would like to know from you whether you are giving your best judgment to this question or, whether you are more or less automatically carrying out the instructions of one section of the population, and may I say to you in conclusion that in putting these questions to you, there is nothing personal intended. I am addressing you, as an taxpayer might address the Chief Executive of his city, and I am thanking you for the courtesy of a reply. I am, Yours very truly, (Sgd.) J. M. ROBINSON. St. John, N.
