The next speaker was Premier Foster, who in the early part of his address took occasion to pay a tribute to the late leader of the Liberal party. Premier

Foster said in part:

"It is indeed with a considerable degree of pleasure that I arise to address a few words of welcome to our guests tonight.—Guests who are representing the leading newspaper publications in Canada. In extending that welcome I fully realize how important it is that advantage should be taken of their presence to point out the important position St. John holds geographically with respect to the development of the export trade of Canada through Canadian channels, also what we have in New Brunswick in the way of resources which up to this time have not been fully developed because of the lack of appreciation of their potential value. The fact of the visit of this important body, following so closely that of the convention of the Canadian Lumbermen's Association, leads one to believe that perhaps at last our friends from the other provinces are awakening to the possibilities of the east, and that although we are a small portion of that great country called Canada, we have something at least in common with them.

"I desire first to point out as you are well aware that there are many important questions with which the Canadian people are face to face today, and none more important than the working out along well defined lines of the development of our export trade, in order that our trade balance might be properly maintained and in order that we might be placed in a position to look after the financial burdens that we have placed upon ourselves in our effort to effectively sustain the Mother Country in the successful prosecution of the war. How can that be done? How can we get in this position? Simply by the development of our natural resources and by the expansion of our manufacturing industries. But if I guage it correctly, the manufacturers, or those known as such, appear to be more particularly engaged at the present time in guessing what the future is going to bring forth in the way of a tariff, than they are of expanding their industries, and in an effort to develop export trade. 




