"Although the health of the families was generally reported as fair, in some instances very good, there were several cases in which families were in bad health due to under-nourishment.

"We have found the families poorly housed and just about getting normal food requirements. In the other items of expenditure, taken together, the families in each of the three groups, on the average, fall far below the level of the theoretically proper standard of living. The 'normal family' would require an income of about \$185 a month in order to be properly fed and housed and still make both ends meet.

"It is obvious, in any event, that the families of unskilled laborers, largely without other income than the earnings of the husband, cannot long continue independent of charitable relief if wages average less than \$100 a month, as at present in Boston, other conditions remaining the same. The bulk of the population here considered falls far below that standard, and even below the reasonably good standard which permits proper food and housing and leaves the families to shift as well as they can on the other items of expenditure."
