

saved 60 per cent of the space that socks required under the old method of shipping.

"Freight costs are based much," said Capt. Moody, "on the volume of space required both in cars to the seaboard and in ships. This way of balling can be applied to a great variety of goods and shipment in perfect condition is assured. One can put 300 bath towels in the same size bale, or 480 Denham hats. The bales are subjected to a pressure of fifteen tons on regular presses, that equire a crew of four men and make our bales at one operation. A press will a fin out 300 bales in a day.

We have a six-story plant in New York, a concrete building, that turns out 6,000 bales a day. There is another plant in the quartermaster depot at Cambridge, Mass. These presses have all been perfected since the war began. They enable shippers to save from 40 per cent to 300 per cent of space over the old way. This saving should make it possible for our business men to compete more efficiently for foreign trade."

Baling is only one of many improved army methods of furthering shipment supplies. The quartermaster department has a very interesting process for aking all kinds of commodities from ins to automobiles. It has a system for hipping five ton automobile trucks, by which a vehicle occupying 1,000 cubic cet of space is put into a crate occupying but 268 cubic feet. have as its inspiration the exploits of some single army or division, it is improbable that military historians will ever agree to award the palm. But hardly has the thunder of the guns died down than the British Royal Navy Division arises to claim at least one war's record, namely, that it has fought in all theatres of combat. It may be left to stouter hearts to contradict anything that the Royal Naval Division may choose to claim, and briefly set down some of the adventures of a most extraordinary division. It was hastily gathered together by Winston Churchill in the fall of 1914 with the express purpose of saving Antwerp. It was composed of a mere handful of regular saddiers, some reservists, the bulk being made up of public school men, many of whom had never fired a gun in their lives while the greatest exploits in this line of the most veteran of them was probably the slaying of pheasants.



Two brigades were naval ratings, one marines and each battalion was named after a famous admiral—Hawke, Nelson, Benbow, Hood, Drake, Collingwood, Howe, and Anson. The division was under the command of Major-General Paris, who was in the thick of the fighting until a shell destroyed one of his legs in October, 1916. It embraced some men destined for immortality. One of them was Rupert Brooke. Another was Brigadier-Gen. Seely, a former minister of war; another was Compton Mackenzie, the novelist. Anthony Wilding, the greatest tennis player in the history of the game, and one of the most gallant of gentlemen, and Brigadier-Gen. Arthur Asquith, D. S. O., son of Mr. Asquith, were in that noble company. The brigade landed on the Belgian coast to protect the left flank of the Franco-British armies in Flanders. It was rushed almost on the day of landing to the defence of Antwerp. Mr. Churchill explained later that it was not sent as an isolated unit, but as part of a large operation for the relief of the city, and added "other and more powerful considereations prevented this from being carried out." As it happened, the main task fell on the shoulders of these raw recruits. They first held the lines to the north of the city and later protected the Belgian field army as it fell back, and without sleep, without food for long periods, it held on, waiting for the reinforcements that never came. Three terrible weeks were spent in this work, which have been described by Brooke, and then the word came that Antwerp was to be abandoned and the division withdrawn down the coast. 





Effort to Be Made in New York City to Prevent Rowdyism on Coming New Year's Eve

New York, Nov. 26-There is a grow ing sentiment in New York city that the celebrated should not be allowed to be repeated on New Year's Eve. 
