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**LAWS AND REGULATIONS**  
OF THE  
**British and Foreign Bible Society.**

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- I. The designation of the Society shall be **THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY**, of which the main object shall be to encourage a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment; the only copies in the language of the United Kingdom to be circulated by the Society, shall be the authorized Version.
- II. This Society shall add its endeavours to those employed by other Societies; for circulating the Scriptures through the British Dominion; and shall also, according to its ability, extend its influence to other countries, whether Christian, Mohammedan or Pagan.
- III. Every subscriber of One Guinea annually shall be a member.
- IV. Every subscriber of Ten Guineas at one time shall be a member for life.
- V. Each subscriber of Fifty Pounds at one time, or who shall by one additional payment, increase his original subscription to Fifty Pounds, shall be a Governor for life.
- VI. Governors shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.
- VII. An Executor, paying a bequest of Fifty Pounds, shall be a member for life; or, of One Hundred Pounds, a Governor for life.
- VIII. A Committee shall be appointed to conduct the business of the Society, consisting of thirty-six laymen, six of whom shall be foreigners, resident in London or its vicinity; half the remainder shall be members of the Church of England, and the other half members of other denominations of Christians. Twenty-seven of the above number,

who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

The Committee shall appoint all officers except the Treasurer, and call Special General Meetings, and shall be charged with procuring for the Society suitable patronage, both British and Foreign.

IX. Each member of the Society shall be entitled, under the directions of the Committee, to purchase Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, which shall be as low as possible.

X. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on the first Wednesday of May, when the Treasurer and Committee shall be chosen, the accounts presented, and the proceedings of the foregoing year presented.

XI. The President, Vice-President, and Treasurer shall be considered *ex officio* members of the Committee.

XII. Every clergyman or dissenting minister who is a member of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

XIII. The Secretaries for the time being shall be considered as members of the Committee; but no other person deriving any emolument from the Society shall have that privilege.

XIV. At the general meeting, and at the meetings of the Committee, the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, first upon the list then present; and in the absence of the Vice-President the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be voted for the purpose, shall preside at the meeting.

XV. The Committee shall meet on the first Wednesday of every month, or oftener if necessary.

XVI. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential service to the Society, either Members for life, or Governors for life.

XVII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating Honorary members from among foreigners who who have promoted the object of the Society.

XVIII. The whole of the minutes of every general meeting shall be signed by the Chairman.

## REGULATIONS

Adopted at the Annual General Meeting of the Society in 1826 and 1827.

- I. That the fundamental law of the Society, which limits its operations to the circulation of the Holy Scripture, be fully and distinctly recognized as excluding the circulation of the Apocrypha.
- II. That in conformity to the foregoing resolution, no pecuniary aid can be granted to any Society circulating the Apocrypha; nor, except for the purpose of being applied in conformity to the said resolution, to any individual whatever.
- III. That in all cases in which grants, whether gratuitous or otherwise, of the Holy Scriptures, either in whole or in part, be made by the Society, the books issued be bound, and on the express condition that they shall be distributed without alteration or addition.
- IV. That all grants of Scriptures to the Society which circulate the Apocrypha, be made under the express condition that they be sold or distributed without alteration or addition; and that the proceeds of the sale of any such copies of Scripture be held at the disposal of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

**LAWS AND REGULATIONS**  
OF THE  
**NOVA SCOTIA BIBLE SOCIETY.**

- I. This Society shall be called ~~THE BIBLE SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA AND ITS DEPENDENCIES~~; the object of which shall be the same as that of the British and Foreign Bible Society, viz., to encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment, and to furnish copies of the Scriptures gratis to the indigent, and at reduced prices to those requiring them.
- II. The business of the Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee.
- III. In order to give effect to the designs of this institution, benefactions and subscriptions shall be solicited, and books opened for receiving the names of benefactors and subscribers.
- IV. Every person contributing annually ten shillings at one time, or a donation of ten pounds, shall be considered a member of the Society.
- V. A general meeting of the members of this Society shall be held every year, before which will be laid the accounts and proceedings of the preceding year.
- VI. The whole of the subscriptions and donations, after deducting the incidental expenses, shall be remitted annually in aid of the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society.
- VII. Every member of the Society shall be entitled to purchase, under the direction of the Committee, Bibles and Testaments at the reduced prices of the Society, which are as low as possible.
- VIII. The Committee shall be authorized to meet for the purpose of conducting the business of this Society as often as may be necessary, and shall have power to add to their number as occasion may require.



SUGGESTIONS  
FOR THE COMPLETE  
ORGANIZATION AND WORKING  
OF A  
BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

ANY BRANCH which, in the past, has not attained eminence as a tributary to the AUXILIARY—whose annual grant has not compared favorably with others in districts of less note as to population, wealth or religious privileges, is earnestly requested to consider the following suggestions of means whereby its latent resources may be made more available in the blessed cause of Bible dissemination.

1. The Bible Society being undenominational, care should be taken to preserve its character, as such, in its Branch organization and operation, and to this end the *committee* and *collectors* should, as far as possible, represent every Christian denomination in its district. The *sheet* in the *Auxiliary's Report* containing the *list of Branches* is divided into four columns: one for the name of the Branch and three for the *chief members* of Committee, viz.: *President, Treasurer* and *Secretary*. Where there are more than three denominations in any district, they can be represented by *Vice-Presidents*. When a branch embraces an extensive district, its outlying sections should also be represented by *Vice-Presidents*, who could superintend the work of collecting in their respective localities.

2. At every ANNUAL MEETING (which it is desirable should be held during the *Agent's visit*) the COMMITTEE, if necessary, should be re-cast and *collectors appointed, competent to present the Society's claims and earnestly interested in the work*: for to zealous collectors, rather than to Committee or contributors, belong the honor of placing the silver and the gold at the service of the Redeemer.

3. Should a Committee be impaired by the death or removal of any of its *chief members*, notice of such should be furnished the Agent at the earliest opportunity.

4. Each Branch should decide upon always carrying on the work of collecting during that month most favorable for such in its district, (of which, also, the Agent should be informed) and, previous to the collector's canvass, the annual reports of the Auxiliary should be distributed among the *best* subscribers, and placed in the hands of other persons likely to become valuable supporters. And during the canvass *all* ministers of the gospel should be notified of the same, and asked to encourage their congregations in a liberal response to the collector's call.

5. When a Committee receives notice from the Agent of his intended visit, no delay should be made in appointing the place of meeting and making such known from the pulpit and press; for the delay of a day may possibly result in the preclusion of the meeting by another of merely local interest, whose object might as well be attained at any other time, whereas *the loss of one day means the loss of a whole year*, in so far as a due visitation of the Branch by the Agent is concerned. All ministers in the district should receive special invitations to be present on the platform, and should also be requested to call the attention of their congregations to the meeting, and urge upon them their attendance. The editors of local newspapers should also be asked to insert a brief notice of the meeting.

6. As the annual accounts of the Auxiliary are closed on the *last working day* of December, it is desirable that remittances, with lists of subscribers, should be forwarded to the Secretary or Treasurer in Halifax, not later than Christmas.

7. Any Branch can, if necessary, have its DEPOSITORY, but such should be under its own care. During the Agent's visit, a statement of all Bibles in stock should be duly rendered and payment made to him or the Committee. The Depository may be paid a commission of 10% on his sales. *All orders for the supply of Bibles for the Depositor should be sent by the Secretary of the Branch to the Secretary of the Auxiliary in Halifax.*

8. In view of the transcendent aim and ever growing work of the British and Foreign Bible Society, it is hoped that in every locality a *few persons* may feel moved to espouse its cause as their *special Christian work*, and use their influence in making their Branch an institution deeply established in the popular heart.

## EIGHTY-SECOND ANNIVERSARY

OF THE

## Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society,

HELD IN

ST. MATTHEW'S CHURCH, 9th JANUARY, 1896.

THE Annual meeting of the British and Foreign Bible Society was held in St. Matthew's Church, January 9th, 1896, PRESIDENT J. C. MACKINTOSH in the chair. The meeting opened at 7.45 p. m. with prayer and reading of Scripture.

THE PRESIDENT then called upon the REV. FOSTER ALMON, Secretary, to submit the Annual Report, which was as follows :

The Committee of the Nova Scotia Bible Society, in presenting a brief sketch of their report for 1895, would first refer to the work of the British and Foreign Bible Society in their report for 1894 and 1895. The story of the latest year of Bible work is full of interest and hope. This Society is circulating the Scriptures in more than 300 languages and dialects. The total issues of Bibles, Testaments, and portions of Holy Scripture were 3,837,222; there was an increase of 28,264 copies in whole Bibles. The free income was £139,810 8s. 7d.; sales, £93,552 18s. 1d. Total receipts, £233,363 6s. 8d. The expenditure has been £214,970 7s. 10d, leaving a balance of £18,392 18s. 10d. This balance removes the residue of the long standing deficit, and leaves a small surplus.

The work of translation is proceeding with unabated energy. In the early times of the Society the most pressing want was the translation of the Scriptures into

the great languages of the world not provided with them. This need, by God's gracious help, has been accomplished. There is to-day no known great language that has not the whole Bible translated into it. It is the smaller languages which have still to be dealt with, and their name is legion. During the past year several have for the first time become the messengers of the Gospel of Christ. At present the most important duty of the editorial department consists in revision. For the original translations the Society was, in many instances, indebted to missionaries, who labored under the serious disadvantage of having to express themselves in an alien tongue with which they were but imperfectly acquainted. When defects and errors were brought to light, and the languages became better understood, revision was determined upon—for the committee have ever recognised the obligation of giving as perfect a transcript of the "Holy Oracles" as practicable. Revisions are now going forward in many of the great languages of India, China, and elsewhere. The task is no light one. Some revisions have occupied several years, and been made at an expense of several thousand pounds. There are as many as one hundred languages and dialects in which to-day either translation or revision is proceeding.

The employment of numerous and zealous colporteurs to circulate the Scriptures in the numerous countries of Europe, Asia, Polynesia, Africa, and America, where the Society work has been carried on with unabated energy and success. 429 Bible women have in Asia and Africa sent God's Word to 26,560 native women, and 1,549 of their scholars were last year enabled to read the Bible for themselves. These agents have circulated 15,263 Bibles and Testaments last year. Ample evidence is given in their reports of the high spiritual value of their work. Let one instance of a colporteur's work lead us to form some adequate idea of the way God is blessing the circulation by the Bible Society of that work which makes men wise to salvation through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ. "In the autumn of 1893 a colporteur was climbing the woody hills of Galicia. He found in one of the huts a young forester whose leg had been crushed by the falling of a tree, and amputated, probably with the rude surgery of the nearest village. He was in mental as well as in bodily agony. It is an easy thing for youth, in the prime of earliest manhood, in the fulness of strength, in the dawn of ambition and love, to turn from them all and enter the shadowy house of pain? The kind stranger spoke to him of the only source of comfort, and read with him some of the words of Divine peace. But the sympathy seemed to have come too soon; the wound was too recent; and though at

length he consented to have a Bible, his bearing was hopeless and defiant. A year passed, and once again the colporteur found himself climbing the wooded path he had climbed before. The scent of the pines, the hush of the forest, the clang at intervals of the distant axe, were all as they had been then. He entered the hut, and at the table in an invalid chair, but wasted almost beyond recognition, he saw his friend. In that weary year the glory of youth had vanished, the pomps of human life had been hurried from the stage, the last shadow was unfolding itself and about to fall. He was absorbed in reading; and the colporteur noticed, with a strange awe, that he was studying the volume he had sold him a year before. His head at length was slowly lifted; the faded and sunken eye could not at first recognize the stranger, but in a moment there shone in his face a light as if from heaven. "And then," writes the colporteur, "he addressed me in words like these:— 'I cannot express my gratitude that you have brought me this Bible and thus led me to God. You gave yourself much trouble when you saw me in misery to induce me to buy the Scriptures. This is my only comfort, and I am happy, though I suffer fearfully. Since you were here my pain has greatly increased, but I am comforted, for I have found my Saviour who so tenderly soothes all the heavy laden. I came to feel how miserable I was through my unbelief, but since I have known Jesus Christ I bear the load He laid on me. In His Word I find comfort and salvation.' " May we each one, then, realise the power of units, the power of individuals, and we shall do our work with sympathy and prayer, and give pecuniary help to this Society.

The travelling secretary, Mr. McKelvie, reports 85 Branch Societies and Associations in Nova Scotia. He is untiring in his efforts to promote their efficiency. We acknowledge with thanks the service of our numerous collectors, and hope they will persevere in their useful work.

Our last Annual Report to February 28, 1895, shows that we remitted to the Parent Society:— Free contributions, £350; purchase account, £223 15s. 1d.; in all, \$2,810.25. We hope that when our financial year closes on February 29, 1896, we shall have sent a larger contribution. Our sales at the Halifax Depository have amounted, to December 31, 1895, to \$513,47. Free grants of Bibles and Testaments have been made to the County Poor Farm, Halifax Jail, Victoria Hospital, and Protestant Orphans' Home. Our contributions were for the year ending February 28th, 1895:— From Branch Societies, \$2,362.27; from Halifax, \$632.74; total, \$2,995.11. Surely a larger sum than this should be freely offered for the extension and support of the world-wide work of the Bible Society.

The Committee urge that all the city churches, country Branches, and subscribers who have not yet sent their subscriptions to our Treasurer, do so before the end of February, and hope for a generous offering to the Society for the following reasons :

1. The benefits conferred on our own people. By selling the Bible at cost price, and the editions generally used by the poor below cost, the Holy Scriptures are put within the reach of all classes of our population.

2. Many thousands of Bibles and Testaments are yearly supplied to Sunday and week-day schools.

3. Aid is also extensively given in placing the Scriptures in prisons, hospitals, infirmaries, asylums, hotels, boarding houses, and police and railway stations. Institutions for the benefit of the blind, the deaf and dumb, widows, orphans, and other afflicted classes, are liberally supplied with the sacred volume. The various agencies for the benefit of soldiers and sailors are aided, directly or indirectly, by this Society.

4. The Bible Society is the best friend and most efficient helper of missionary institutions of all kinds. Missionary societies find sufficient difficulty in raising funds for the training and support of their missionaries, and the carrying on of their operations, without incurring the further expense of printing large editions of the Scriptures for heathen or Mohammedan countries. This department of missionary labor is always cheerfully undertaken by the British and Foreign Bible Society. As missions spread, the demands on the Bible Society increase.

5. The work which remains to be done. The population of the globe is estimated at fifteen hundred millions. For this vast number it is believed that above two hundred and sixty million copies of the Holy Scriptures have been provided in a printed form. More than three-fourths of this number have been prepared and circulated by the Bible Society and kindred institutions in Europe and America. But how have these copies been distributed? Protestant nations have received more than half the number. And the fact is, that among one thousand million of heathens, Jews and Mohammedans, only some twenty-five million copies of the sacred volume have been circulated. Well it may be asked, "What are these among so many." Who can think of these multitudes without compassion?

The first resolution was moved by **REV. DYSON HAGUE**, and seconded by **REV. J. A. ROGERS** :

"That this Meeting express their thanks to God for the extended circulation of His Word, and for the funds

contributed for this purpose, and relies on the Holy Spirit so blessing the circulation of that Word, that it may extend the Saviour's Kingdom upon earth."

MR. HAGUE, in moving the resolution, said, that he believed that the Bible was the Word of God, the only true revelation of the true God, the only source of information reliable and authentic. We believe that this Book is the most final authority of the Church, and he would like to say that he had the most profound, earnest, and unshakable conviction that this Book is the inspired Word of God. The holy Book is a Book from God and by God. The circulation of the Bible in the world, and its translation into foreign tongues, is considered nothing less than a miracle. There are a great many Bible Societies; fifty million copies of the Word of God have gone forth from the printing houses of the world during the last ten years. This Book, written in the dead languages, is the freshest Book on earth; it is read by every class and condition of men, and the older one gets the more he enjoys it. The Bible tells about our destiny, about our soul, and about our God; and as long as this Book goes forth, the Kingdom of Christ will spread upon earth. In speaking of the length of time that we have had the Bible, compared with other books, it had been remarked that "Robert Elsmere" had undermined the foundations of Christianity. Now, he would venture to say, that during the past year not over fifty copies of "Robert Elsmere" had been sold in the Maritime Provinces. The book that was said to threaten to undermine Christianity had gone to the wall, and the Book that it sought to crush was rising higher and higher in favor with all nations. In conclusion, Mr. Hague read a charming little anecdote.

REV. MR. ROGERS then spoke, referring to the splendid report which had been read by the Rev. Foster Almon,



which report, he said, simply covered the ground of the work done by the Bible Society. We are here to-night to give thanks to God for the increasing recognition of our obligation in this matter; for readiness to obey the call; for many open doors, and tokens of the Divine blessing. Mr. Rogers said the fixed determination to circulate the Bible was the result of a conviction that it was the Word of God. The character of the Bible, and its unequalled contents, proved its inspiration. We believe that we have such a Book; it comes to us with a warrant from God. The Bible Society takes no part in the criticisms of the Bible—it is God's Word, not man's word; they circulate it as they find it. Without this Book life would be a journey in the dark. If man needs the light of this Book during life, how much more does he need it when he comes to the darkness of the valley of the shadow of death. No storms can put out the light of this Book.

The second resolution was moved by REV. J. S. BLACK, seconded by REV. A. C. CHUTE:

“That this Meeting recognises that the British and Foreign Bible Society, by its numerous translations of Holy Scripture, has proved itself to be a most valuable auxiliary to missionary enterprise, and ought to receive continued and enlarged support from all interested in the extension of the Kingdom of Christ.”

REV. MR. BLACK explained that the British and Foreign Bible Society was undenominational. The management was composed of thirty-six laymen, six of whom were foreigners resident at London; fifteen are Church of England, and fifteen of other denominations. This Society was founded in 1804, and had had an honorable and trusted career. The Bible Society has had a great deal of assault, and it has been no easy matter for it to maintain its present position. It gathered its sinews from every part of the British Empire. He had been present at the Anniversary

of the Society in London, in 1894, which had had the effect upon him of touching his pocket; and he hoped that the way that the Rev. gentleman preceding him had spoken would reach the pockets of the audience present. He had the greatest respect for every Auxiliary, however small, and we should one and all aid to the very best of our ability.

REV. A. C. CHUTE then followed Rev. Mr. Black, and wished to speak in an historical manner. He related several narratives of the introduction of the Bible into the islands of the South Seas, into Uganda, at the head of the Nile, and the populous banks of the River Congo. Twelve pages of the Report of the British and Foreign Bible Society contain nothing but names of foreign nations speaking different tongues, to whom this Society had extended the circulation of the Bible. This Society had appeared at a most opportune time, and had contributed large sums of money to defray the expenses of translations of the Bible by missionaries, thus lending valuable assistance to mission work.

The third resolution, regarding officers and reports, was then moved by MR. JOHN BURGOYNE :

“That the Report, a portion of which has been read and received, be printed, and that the Officers and Committee be selected, with such alterations and additions as may be necessary from non-attendance and removal, and that Bishop Courtney, Rev. J. S. Black, Rev. T. H. Blenus, Rev. H. B. Brown, be added to the Committee.”

MR. McINTOSH, in asking for some one to second the resolution, remarked that the Society hoped for the continued peace of the British Empire, which was the backbone of the British and Foreign Bible Society, and with whose fortunes the Society was identified.

The CHAIRMAN announced that we would sing the "National Anthem," as a suitable closing to a grand and successful meeting. This was followed by "Praise God from Whom all blessings flow." MR. ROGERS then pronounced the Benediction, which concluded the meeting at 9.30 p. m., strictly within the limits.

ON the same evening Charles Street Church was well filled; REV. MR. BORDEN in the chair. The opening hymn was "All hail the power of Jesus' name." After hymn, prayers by REV. E. SOFTLEY, and a few earnest remarks by the CHAIRMAN, the REV. N. I. PERRY spoke on "The value of the Bible to the individual and society." It told of man's destiny, of power to overcome sin, and told of peace. Despite the declarations that the Bible was an exploded book, it still went on its way with renewed vigor. Voltaire said that within one hundred years the Bible would be a subject of ancient history. Voltaire is that subject now; and now the house Voltaire lived in is stacked with Bibles, and his printing press used to print the Bible. The real reason many refused to accept fully the Bible teachings is that, like Robert Ingersoll, they do not want to believe anything that will make them uncomfortable.

CAPT. WINN said that his subject had been the "Bible Society is Auxiliary to Foreign Missions." He showed clearly that it was the backbone of foreign missions, for without it they cannot get along. It had translated the Bible into 325 languages. Unless the Word of God was left in the hands of their converts, their foreign missions were doomed to failure. The work of translation was a huge undertaking, for they sought to let every soul have a Bible in their own tongue, and used the utmost care to secure accurate copies of the Word of God.

The REV. MR. GANDIER showed our personal responsibility to increase the circulation of God's Word, since we have it in our power to diffuse the light. We must discharge our debt to humanity. We are personally responsible to avail ourselves of the increased facilities this century has given us for the sending forth of God's Word. It commenced with few open doors. The Church prayed that doors might be opened. These prayers have been answered, and to-day there is acceptable lands. Our duty then is to give first ourselves to the cause of Christ, and afterwards we had a right to pray, "Thy Kingdom come."



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## AGENT'S REPORT.

*To the President and Committee of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society :*

GENTLEMEN,—In view of limiting our printed Annual to the one cent postal rate, my report of Branch visitation will again have the economic virtue of brevity.

My first journey began on March 9th, and ended on May 5th, a few days being lost by heavy snow storms. During that visit I addressed fair meetings at Shubenacadie, Maitland, Lower Selma, Noel, Moosebrook, Walton, Chevaree, Burlington, Brooklyn, Onslow, Belmont, Middle Stewiacke, Lower Stewiacke, Upper Stewiacke, Otter Brook, Newton Mills, Dean Settlement, Upper Musquodoboit, Elmsvale, Middle Musquodoboit, River John, Scotsburn, Hopewell, Ferrona, Springville, Bridgeville and Pugwash. As we have no active Branch at Shubenacadie, I collected as usual from the principal families in the village. The same, I may say of Maitland, where I find almost steadily diminishing annual contributions, owing chiefly to the failure of its wonted shipbuilding and other once profitable investments.

Newport has not yet made full returns, owing I think, to the continued absence of the esteemed Secretary of that Branch.

I have not yet seen any returns from Springside, but it is sure to come, for nowhere has our society stauncher friends than in the Valley of Stewiacke.

I formed a new Branch at Hopewell and received its first fruit of \$12 from the congregation of St. Columbia Kirk on the Sunday I presented the Society's aim and work among the nations.

The Presbyterian congregation of Onslow and Belmont, as usual, on my annual visit, handed me a very liberal plate collection, and later on I received, per Rev. Mr. Chase, an additional contribution together with Mr. E. Morrison's (of Belmont) bequest of \$5.

After visiting some Branches of the New Brunswick Auxiliary, I resumed work in Nova Scotia on 28th June, and continued, with the exception of some days during the haying season, until 13th August. During that trip I collected, as usual, by personal canvass quite a sum in Cape Breton, Antigonish, Oxford and Parrsboro. You will notice in the subscription lists that our cause has many warm supporters in Cape Breton, and I have much pleasure in again testifying to the many kindnesses and generous hospitalities rendered to your agent in that Island gem which decks the Eastern front of our fair Canada.

My last journey began on October 14th, and was finished on December 21st. During that time my public addresses were illustrated by Magic Lantern Views, which I found added interest to the meetings and considerably increased the plate collections, as you will see by comparing such with those in the past years at the same places. On that trip I visited the Branches in Kings, Annapolis, Digby, Yarmouth, Shelburne, Queens and Lunenburg Counties, and paid a second visit to other parts where needed. On the night appointed for TRURO it rained heavily, and only a few persons came out. Another meeting was appointed for Sunday, 24th November, in the First Baptist Church, and according to the report in the *Daily News*, was addressed by the President, Jas. K. Blair, the Revs. H. F. Adams, J. Wood, A. L. Geggie, T. Cumming, and Wm. Cummings, Esq. The value to our cause by such a popular meeting is amply shewn in Truro's enlarged contribution.

The meeting at Windsor was the largest ever held in our case in that town, the large Sunday School room of the Baptist Church being completely filled, and the plate collection almost \$12.

Avondale continues loyal and liberal. We had a large gathering in the Presbyterian Church at Wolfville, notwith-

standing there was another of an attractive nature in that town. My canvass amounted to \$20.50, but I have not heard of any further contributions. I am afraid that Horton has forgotten its promise to make a canvass in our cause.

We are still deeply indebted to the young gentlemen of Church Street Branch for active devotion in gathering funds to swell our treasury.

Canning Branch, under the administration of Captain John Nicholson and our other kind friends continues to grow in liberality.

I have not yet noticed any returns from Kentville and Waterville, but hope that they will yet reach you this winter.

Somerset still supports the Bible Society most nobly, although the annual contribution is made up by a very few families there.

I am glad to see that Berwick is taking a deeper interest than formerly in our work.

Our support in Lawrencetown is still confined to two families.

Middleton begins to share in the work of Bible circulation, and gives promise of becoming a valuable Branch.

Bridgetown has surpassed her former record, and our friend, Mr. Fitz Randolph, shews unflagging zeal in his personal efforts to obtain an annual contribution worthy of that nice town.

Round Hill Branch also shews unabated zeal in Bible Society interests, and generous treatment of your agent.

We had fair meetings in Annapolis and Digby, and although the contributions do not shew much advance yet I think I am justified in promising a continuous increase as these towns grow in population.

I was again most cordially welcomed to Weymouth by Mr. St. Clair Jones, and your treasurer has duly received the result of the canvass.

My canvass of Yarmouth was not so successful as on some former years: I failed to find some of our old supporters, while others complained of the scarcity of money. I notice also a slight falling away in the subscription of the Ladies Association.

I would like to see BARRINGTON, SHELBURNE and QUEENS Counties take that position on our lists which might be expected from their large population of Protestants, but it seems most difficult to get a hearing or obtain the help of willing hands in gathering funds for Bible circulation in dark heathendom.

Bridgewater has advanced considerably on her last year's contribution, and I have no fears of that Branch so long as it may continue under the management of the very estimable ladies who yet form its committee.

Some years ago a Branch was formed in New Dublin, which proved almost barren. However, in 1894, the promise of its revival was given, and during my last visit I was delighted to receive from the Rev. Henry Crawford, its new President, the sum of \$27.30. In accomplishing this desirable change, he was cordially assisted by Rev. Mr. Richardson from pulpit and platform.

La Have Branch has again showed up favorably, and as henceforth, if possible, I intend to hold at least two meetings during my visit. I trust to see a constant increase in the contribution of that populous district.

I was delighted to see such a large assembly at Lunenburg. The Sunday School room of the Episcopal Church was crowded to the door, every available foot of standing room being occupied. I am aware that the music rendered by Mr. A. R. Morash and his orchestra was the chief attraction on that occasion; yet what influence can be more appropriate than sacred music in gathering an audience for the rehearsal of the Bible's historic triumphs. Lunenburg's contribution has again exceeded a hundred dollars, and I trust that all her future contributions will indicate her growth in liberality keeping pace with her commercial prosperity.



We were welcomed by a crowded house to Mahone Bay, and the liberal plate collection made up for the falling away in the collectors lists.

I have nothing special to report of Aylesford, Gay's River, Folleigh, Great Village, Bass River, and the other Branches in Colchester and Cumberland Counties. The most of our Branches in these places are loyal to our cause, and seldom fail to prove such by their timely assistance.

I have great pleasure in again recording my deep thanks for the many favors everywhere rendered to me during my annual visit,—for conveyance by the way where there were no daily stages, and for hospitalities where there were no hotels. Indeed, during my nine year's agency, I have never left a settlement or village in Nova Scotia without good reasons for invoking God's blessing upon homes to whose hospitalities I was cordially welcomed, and whose parting word 'good bye' I felt meant the fuller blessing, "*God be with you till we meet again.*"

## Extracts from Abstract of Report of Parent Society.

LORD KINNAIRD, the Vice-President, says :— I, as one working actively on the Committee of several Societies, say how much they are helped by the British and Foreign Bible Society, which proves, as I said, that this is the largest Home and Foreign Missionary Society in the world? And on behalf of those Societies, may I express hearty thanks to this Society for the co-operation which they have given, both by men and by material, in order that the work at home and abroad may be carried on? There is one Society which has been very intimately connected with the Bible Society from its very foundation. I refer to the London and Domestic Female Missions and Nurses' Mission, a group of whose agents are with us this morning. Lord Harrowby is the President, following Lord Shaftsbury, and may I, as representing the Committee of that Society, thank you for the help you have given us, helping our 130 Bible women who go from door to door? Lord Shaftsbury used to call them "the women of the people," going to the people with the Word of God. Then there are over 80 nurses who go and visit the houses of the people while they are sick, giving help among the poorer classes in the metropolis and the district within the postal area. But for the British and Foreign Bible Society we should not be able to go on. We return our most hearty thanks for all that this Society has done. Then, in addition to that, I may mention the question of Biblewomen, and refer to another figure in the Report. *There are now 429 Biblewomen throughout the world who take the Word of God and leave it with the people in their own tongue.* What would the missionary societies do but for the British and Foreign Bible Society? As Treasurer of the Zenana Bible and Medical Mission, I desire both on my own and on behalf of the Committee gratefully to acknowledge the substantial help afforded us in providing the salaries of twenty Biblewomen working in connection with our Society in India. I believe that many a door which is now open, and where we are reaping rich harvests, would have been shut but for the entrance of the Word of God. "The entrance of Thy Word giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple." Then those of us who are connected with ragged schools, and colportage associations thank the British and Foreign Bible Society for putting the Word of God into the hands of the colporteurs at home and abroad, by whose means it is taken into places where the living agent could not go. Speaking words of truth and soberness, I say that if it were not that they had the way prepared by the Bible, many and many a door, even at home, would be shut to the living agents connected with the Churches of our land.

And now, when one turns to the continent, we rejoice that two more Protestant countries are to have their own national organization. We rejoice in organizing Bible work throughout the world,

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but we are especially grateful when the Bible, *creating as it usually does a spirit of true manliness, courage, and self-reliance*, prompts countries to bear their own responsibility, and in turn become centres from which the Word of God will go forth, and thus become with other national Societies centres of missionary work. May I just give you one or two figures which I think will cheer you? I hope that I shall not weary you. Germany tabulates a total circulation of 668,495, an increase of 56,000. Next to that comes a very interesting figure. Perhaps it may come as news to some of you, as it did to me when I was reading the Report which was sent to me yesterday. *Russia has the Word of God in fifty languages*, and the stupendous number of 527,308 copies of the Word of God, or Portions, have been circulated during the past year — an increase of over 12,000. This interesting fact may remain in some memories—that, of every seven copies circulated during the past year, one went into the hands of a Russian subject. May we not believe that light will come into that great country, and that before long it may join with the other countries in giving great religious liberty? Nothing is too hard for our God. Let us make a special place in our hearts for Russia, and let us pray that these copies of the Word of God, and Portions, amounting to over half a million, may be centres of light in places which may not be reached, perhaps, by missionaries, owing to the laws which are in existence. May the Word of God become in such places centres of power, and RUSSIA become a Bible-loving country. Then FRANCE has had 167,000, showing, from some cause, a decrease of 65,000. ITALY has had 189,000, showing an increase of nearly 20,000; AUSTRIA and HUNGARY 161,600 odd, showing also an increase of over 5,000. Now, as to JAPAN and CHINA, I think I can show you three little copies which arrived, I am told, yesterday at the Bible House, and which have already been referred to. This larger copy of the Japanese Testament was given to officers in the army and navy going out to join in the war. Then a very pretty little copy, which was got up better for the Royal Body-guard of Japan, was given to members of that corps, and was carried by them, we believe, into China, and we cannot but believe that when they were lying in the hospital some of them would use them, and that they would keep them as mementoes of the united work of the British and Foreign Bible Society, the American Bible Society, and the Scotch Bible Society. And then to the soldiers and sailors another book was given with an inscription on the fly-leaf that it was presented by the three united Societies. This made up a total in Japan last year of 114,000 copies and portions circulated by these Societies alone, being an increase of 79,000 during the past year. Then an equally satisfactory figure, I think you will agree, is that with regard to China, namely, 289,000, being an increase of 53,000 during the past year.

The latest year of the Bible Society's history has been, in some important respects, a peculiarly interesting one: and, in respects

even more important, it has proved peculiarly pleasant. There has been a distinct, if a hardly definable, brightness in its sky, and a sense of exhilaration in its air. From almost every part of the field the reports are encouraging. The financial returns are reassuring. The circulation has very generally advanced, and a large amount of work has been accomplished. But there is something beyond these general facts, pleasant as they are. There is a vitality in narrative after narrative, a consciousness of progress, a hope of better things not distant—like the peculiar sense of the approach of morning after night, or of spring after a prolonged winter. Prejudices against Christian work which have lasted for ages, seem in many cases to be relaxing: the very bitterness of opposition explains itself in the direction of encouragement, and as page after page of the record is turned, an impression is correspondingly deepened of the certainty of the progress which is being made, and of the incalculable value of the work which is being done.

## FRANCE.

Population, in 1891, 38,343,192. The returns as to religion, 1881, were, Roman Catholics, 29,201,703, being 78.50 per cent. of the total; 692,800 Protestants, or 1.8 per cent.; and 7,684,906 persons who 'declined to make any declaration of religious belief.' Bible Society Colporteurs, 47; total circulation for the year, 167,763.

In the little town of Croisic, in the Loire Inférieure—it is the Croisic of Mr. Wedmore's *Pastorals*, with its homely farms, its salt marshes, its sifting Biscayan gales—there is a burying place, long ago forsaken, with suggestive memories of its own. In the sixteenth century Croisic had a population of six thousand—there are now little more than two—of whom four thousand were Evangelical Protestants; but the religious persecutions of the time, which could not spare even this little remote place, drove them for refuge to England. One may find the graves of their people in the lonely *Cimetière des Huguenots*, they have left hardly a living representative, and the Croisic fisher folk are described by the Colporteur as intolerant beyond almost any other and full of prejudices against the Word of God.

There are moods in which one is ready to take Croisic with its Huguenot cemetery as indicating, as an emblem or picture might do, the state of modern France. The old Reformation piety seems to have departed, and to have left behind little except the graves of its fathers. The extracts which follow show that clericalism is increasing in bitterness against a popular Bible; and there is an even more fatal influence, 'that breeze of the age of science'—to use the words of M. Feuillet—'which has blown through the hearts of the people, and left empty spaces wherever it has blown.' When one asks, as every reader of these pages will ask, whether there are signs in France of a return to an earlier piety and a more scriptural faith, it may be difficult to give an encouraging, and some might be disposed to give a pessimistic reply. But the con-

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clusion, like many other pessimistic ones, would be an exceedingly mistaken one. M. Monod's report for the year is interesting in every page, and it goes very far to prove that if the Huguenots, as a party, have disappeared, the spirit which inspired them still lives in the country from which with heavy hearts they fled. One of the most suggestive facts is that the people are becoming weary of a life without God—that secularism, like so many other seductive fallacies, is being 'found out.' There is a light on the page; there is a vitality in the narrative; and there are incidents and expressions which impress the mind with anticipations of better things. One of the Colporteurs, not far from Paris, writes that he has seen almost all the flourishing Evangelical stations of the Department begin with a single family, and it is frequently possible to add, with a single Gospel. Even when the unpretentious little book will not be read by the older people it is frequently bought for the use of the children. 'I am increasingly convinced,' writes a Colporteur, 'that the people, though they have lost faith in their Church, are not irreligious—they are beginning to seek after Christ.' It is incidents and words like these, occurring too frequently for separate notice, that confirm the assurance that the seed, scattered so assiduously, is preparing a harvest. 'Be of good cheer,' says a poor woman in the Lower Alps—and her assurance expresses a much wider feeling than her own—'be of good cheer; the Bible Society is not working in vain.'

#### GERMANY.

There has been in 1894 an increase in the circulation in Germany above that of the previous year of 3,735 copies. The direct work of the Agency, with an increase of 9,592, copies, has improved all round, colportage, Dépôts, and the Army and Navy circulation each partaking in this. Against this have to be set considerable reductions in the number of copies supplied to other Societies working within the same area, and in the free grants. It is clear that German Societies are more and more equipping themselves for expansion by undertaking editions of their own, and that this Society is finding within narrower range fields whose needs it has not yet overtaken. This is very notable in the increase by colportage and in the German Army and Navy. It is also evident from an examination of the statistics of the circulation according to provinces. We have to call attention to the largely enhanced circulation effected in Bavaria, Silesia, East Prussia, and Posen, fields which from their Roman Catholic and non-German population have become in a special sense the care of this Society. To Bavaria there, went in 1894, 20,874 copies, as against 14,072 in 1892; to Silesia 27,795, as against 15,094, also two years ago. On the other hand, a large decrease in the Catholic provinces of Rhenish Prussia and Westphalia must be ascribed to the development of the activity of the Berg Bible Society. But it is clear that in the other most difficult and neglected fields, many openings are being created or found by the Society's exertions.

A closer analysis of the details reveals other interesting facts, which all tend to the same conclusion. During the last ten years there has been a steady and large falling off in our circulation of Luther copies. In 1885 Germany and Switzerland required from us 334,914 Luther copies; in 1894 only 209,232. The demand for this version or its revision is greater than ever; but now, owing to the refusal of this Society to sell to other German Societies below cost price—a step which at the time excited much adverse comment—the Societies of the land have largely increased their own publishing so as to be almost independent of foreign Societies, save for versions for Roman Catholics and non-Germans. On the other side, there has to be noted a wonderful increase in the circulation of Van Ess and Kistemaker German copies. Seven years have seen this more than doubled. Our Polish circulation has made similar progress, and when two new editions are ready that are still in the press—editions sorely wanted—a still greater increase in the circulation among this interesting people may be confidently expected. Again, we have to record a considerable decrease in the number of Bibles sold, and an increase in that of Portions. This is further evidence of the fact that the care of the Protestant community is passing over to more appropriate hands, and that this Society is concentrating its strength on the other sections of the people, among whom so little is known of the Scriptures that a Gospel or Testament is all that is at first desired.

The returns of circulation by all agencies, home and foreign, active in Germany, show a very large increase. The complete figures show that the addition to last year's total will not be less than 56,000 copies. This gives an average per 1,000 of the population of 14.22 copies, the highest ever reached in this country. This method of estimating Bible work is, of course, a rough one, but we look forward to the time when the average shall have reached the figure of 20 per 1000, a figure now exceeded in Denmark, Switzerland, and Holland. The difficulty of attaining this is, that while favoured parts like Würtemberg have largely exceeded this average, Roman Catholic provinces like Bavaria reduce it. It remains for this Society steadily to pursue its work in these backward parts.

#### THE RELIGIOUS POSITION IN ITALY.

However these ecclesiastical and political affairs may be, Christians can only be glad that they have led the Italian Government to reconsider the religious question, and to ask themselves if human politics are the only safeguard of a people. Not many years ago it seemed as if our rulers were bent upon completely ignoring the existence of anything like a religion, and hunting down religious aspirations and feelings wherever they appeared. I remember that a commission was once named for choosing the text-books to be used in our elementary schools, and, before opening a single volume, they laid down the rule that any book in which

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even the name of God was mentioned would be excluded, however excellent it might prove to be in other respects. Things are much changed now. Our leading men seem to think, not only that God exists, but that he reigns, and rules the destinies of nations and individuals. At the beginning of the year Signor Sonnino, the first Protestant Minister of State Italy ever had, ended his financial statement with the words 'May God protect Italy!' He was laughed at at the time, but his words were not lost on his colleagues, and in the following summer Signor Crispi, who not so long ago exalted the goddess Reason, and proclaimed that science alone could do anything for suffering humanity, having recognized perhaps in the outbreak of Anarchism in Sicily and Carrara the proof that a Higher Power alone can counteract the evil passions of men, in the short and pithy speech he made in Naples proclaimed that those only were good citizens on whose banner were inscribed the words: 'Con Dio, e col re, per la patria' ('With God, and the king, for the Fatherland.') This utterance of the Chief of the Cabinet created quite a sensation at the time, but on the 20th of September, in the telegram which the King sends annually to Rome on that memorable day, Humbert himself sounded the same religious note, for the first time perhaps since his accession to the throne.

Later on, our greatest living poet Carducci, the author of a blasphemous 'Ode to Satan,' which to many sounded like the revelation of the new religion of rebellion against God, was called upon to deliver a grand oration for the opening of the new State Palace for the little republic of San Marino, a little independent State that has existed for nearly 1000 years, as a curious relic of the past, in the very middle of the former dominions of the Pope. On such an occasion Carducci proclaimed that God exists and is the author of all good on earth: 'From Him, the Almighty, the All-Perfect, we must take our departure in every enterprise, and He alone can bless everything we do.... Hatred of a pestiferous and tyrannical superstition, and pride of scientists who trusted too much in the victories of external nature, have made the Latin races forget God: but no crimes of the priesthood and no arrogance of scientists can exclude God from history. God is the highest vision to which nations raise their eyes in their youth. He is the Sun of sublime minds and of burning hearts... Where and when the Divine idea shines in its power and majesty, cities are born and flourish; where and when it vaccillates and is obscured, cities decay and perish.'

Is this a return of Italy to God? Perhaps this is too much to say. For certainly the God thus called upon is not yet the God whose love has manifested itself in Christ, the God we preach and adore; yet we must rejoice and hope, when we see the leading men of the nation, who for so many years have openly professed atheism in its most outrageous forms, now speak reverently of God and declare that He alone can cure the ills we suffer from. This cannot fail to have a certain influence on the people. It must lead many to be less opposed to religion than they have been till now.

THE PLACE AND THE POLICY OF THE BIBLE SOCIETY IN ITALY—THE  
POPE'S ENCYCLICAL—OBJECTION'S TO THE SOCIETY'S WORK.

To attract the attention of the Italians to the great and momentous question of religion, to offer to them God's revelation of the Way, the Truth, and the Life, such is the great aim our Society has continued to pursue in this country, with unwearied zeal during the year 1894, and, thanks to God's blessing on our efforts, with no small amount of success. It seems strange that there should be Christian people who question the advisability, and even deny the necessity of such a work as ours in what they call a Christian country, under the mistaken impression either that the Italians are not ready to receive and savingly understand the Scriptures, or that their needs in this respect are sufficiently provided for by their own national Church. May I be allowed to say a few words about these two very strange fallacies!

As for the first, although I am an Italian myself, I hope not to be accused of a want of modesty if I say, in favour of my own people, that they are a gifted race, quick of intelligence, warm of heart, and, although trodden down by centuries of internal and foreign oppression, open to new ideas, to everything that is noble and true. Whatever may be their moral degradation, it has not obscured their mind nor lessened their quickness of comprehension. Moral corruption is perhaps greater in Italy than in many another country, but, for that very reason, few countries need the Bible more than Italy does. And it is a remarkable fact that some of the most important Books of the New Testament have been written for natives of Italy. It is very probable that St. Luke wrote his Gospel, and the sequel of it, the Acts of the Apostles, for an Italian gentleman of high degree; and there can be no manner of doubt that the Epistle to the Romans, that most wonderful exposition of the highest and most profound doctrines of Christianity, was addressed to Italian readers. In Italy were most probably written no less than six of St. Paul's Epistles and that to the Hebrews. No country in Europe except Greece, and perhaps not even Greece, has greater claims to consider the New Testament as its own, and yet few countries have been for so many centuries deprived of it.

As to the second objection, I find indeed that there is in Britain a rather prevalent impression that the attitude of the Roman Church on the question of giving the Scriptures to the people in their own tongue has greatly changed of late, and that we may leave now the work of disseminating the Bible in Italy in the hands of the priests. No doubt the remarkable Encyclical of Leo XIII. on the study of Holy Scripture, as it was published on Nov. 18th, 1893, has greatly contributed to widen and deepen such an impression. In my report of last year I have analysed that document, and I think I have shown that it concerns the clergy alone, and even only some amongst the clergy, but that all the old positions and the old prohibitions, as far as the laity are

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concerned, are maintained. A better proof of it cannot be given than the fact that since the Encyclical has been published, not a single edition of the Bible or of any part of the Bible in the Italian tongue has been printed by the Roman Catholics in Italy. To be quite sure of this, I had inquiries made a few days ago at the great Central Library of the *De Propaganda Fide* in Rome, and at the Archiepiscopal bookstore in Milan, and the answer was that nobody had heard of a new edition, much less of a new translation of the Bible in Italian. I inquired also if the Encyclical had in any way increased the sale of Holy Scriptures, either in the Latin or in the original tongues, and the answer was equally in the negative. No better proof, I think, can be given of the sad fact that the Encyclical of November 18th, 1893 has, as we say in Italy, 'left the weather it found,' and has exerted no appreciable difference, as far as the study and dissemination of the Word of God in Italy are concerned.

But one may ask, Is it then really impossible for an Italian to get a copy of the Word of God in a version sanctioned by his own Church, so as to read it without disobeying the Church law? I do not say that it is impossible for one who is determined to get a Bible at any price to procure one. He can get Sonzogno's edition, which only costs twelve times as much as one of our own Bibles. But he may feel qualms of conscience about that, for Sonzogno's Bible has not been published with the *imprimatur* of the Church, and indeed is not countenanced by the clergy, for although it contains all Martini's notes, it is not accompanied, as the canons of the Church prescribe, by the text of the Vulgate. Therefore he must look elsewhere. Not in ordinary booksellers' shops, however, but on second-hand bookstalls or in some diocesan bookstore. There he may chance to find a stray copy of Martini's own edition, or of some reprint of it done many years ago. It will be in many ponderous volumes and cost from 18 to 40 francs. He may, it is true, content himself with the New Testament, of which an edition (the only one I have been able to procure, and, as far as I know, the only one that has ever been printed of the New Testament alone) has been published in Turin in 1882. I have it by my side as I write; it is a square, thick, ungainly volume, with paper cover, no Latin text, and all Martini's notes. It costs four francs, that is to say, twenty times as much as our cheapest New Testament. The same editor has printed four years ago in a separate volume in better type and style, still with Martini's notes, the four Gospels and the Book of Acts, and this can be got for one and a half francs. Then, to be quite complete, I have been able to find a smaller edition of Gospels and Acts, printed in 1879 in a boys' reformatory at Bosco Marengo, near Alexandria. This can be had in paper cover for fifty centimes, and cloth bound for sixty. It bears the approbation of several Bishops, and well might they approve of it, for the notes of Mons. Martini have been replaced in this edition by those of the Douai Bible, which are even more than Martini's favourable to Romanism.

This short description of all I have been able to find in the Roman Catholic bookshops of Italy, of editions of the Scriptures for the people, is sufficient to show how very scanty and inferior to the needs of a large nation the supply is. But to this must be added the fact that no Society or organization of any kind exists for disseminating the Scriptures at large amongst the people. There are, in the Roman Catholic Church, associations and brotherhoods without number for all kinds of purposes, but as yet I have been unable to find any trace of a Society, a scheme, or an effort of any kind, for placing the Word of God in the hands of the people to read and study it. To this, no doubt, must be attributed the fact that the editions I have named have but an infinitesimal circulation. We were told at the Archiepiscopal bookstore in Milan, the best in Italy, that they did not sell in a year more than 100 copies of the smaller edition of the Gospels and Acts; indeed the whole stock was offered to our Milan depository at a large discount.

The above facts prove conclusively that the impression now prevailing in certain circles in England, viz. that the Roman Catholic Church has now made sufficient provision for the circulation of the Word of God in Italy, is a completely mistaken one. Unhappily such is very far from being the case. The Bible Societies (ours and the Scottish National) are still alone in the field, with what little can be done by the Italian Evangelical Churches and private Christians. If it were not for the continual and devoted exertions of our colporteurs, very few Italians, especially amongst those that live away from large towns, would ever know what the Bible is and teaches as to the way of salvation.

We may therefore conclude that the time has not yet come for our Society to retire from Italy, as it has retired from many another country, because the impulse it had given to Bible distribution had acted beneficially on the native Christians and awakened them to a sense of their duty to take up the work for themselves. All we have succeeded in, so far, is in creating amongst a certain number of Italians a desire for the Word of God, a desire which, thank God, seems to be growing year after year. Are we to withdraw when, after so many years of labour and expenditure, Italy begins to promise some success? Are we to deprive the Roman nation of the possibility of obtaining the Word of God after we have excited in this country some appetite for it? Quite the reverse must be our course. We must continue our work with perseverance and in faith, perfecting our methods and our instruments, neglecting nothing, no means, no opportunity, to extend our circulation, raising the tone of our colporteurs that their work may become more and more a spiritual service for Christ, with a view to the extension of His Kingdom and to the salvation of souls.

More than two million and a half copies of the Word of God in whole or in part, had been scattered throughout the length and breadth of Italy. True, many of these copies had been destroyed

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by the enemy, but the unanimous testimony of the colporteurs was that such destruction of God's Word happened especially after wholesale gratuitous distribution injudiciously made by people, acting no doubt with the best intentions, but at the same time in the most complete ignorance of the character and of the prejudices of the Italians. Even books that have been paid for, may, no doubt, fall into the hands of the priests and be destroyed; but a good number also, especially of the larger and costlier volumes, remain in many a house,—dumb, and yet effective witnesses of the Gospel of Christ. The seed thus cast in so many places will surely give some day a glorious harvest.

#### RUSSIA.

The Russian Empire is still in its youth: no one can easily forecast the strength and influence of its maturity. But if there is any single fact to which the reports of Dr. Nicholson and of Mr. Morrison bear uniform testimony, it is to the goodwill of the Russian authorities to the Agents of the Bible Society, and the readiness of the people to welcome the colporteurs when they appear. Of every seven copies of the Scriptures circulated by the Society last year, one passed into the hands of a subject of the Russian Empire. The circulation in the northern and the southern Agencies amounted to 530,000, and the numbers are steadily increasing year by year. A place of authority and influence much greater than even now it possesses may yet be held by the Russian race. The reports of the Bible Society—and none perhaps more than the last—give good reason to indulge the hope that the influence will be exerted by a Bible-loving and a devout people.

These wider conclusions are illustrated by many pleasant incidents. The story of Mary Jones has been often told, and it will always have a significance of its own; but it may be paralleled, in the devotion it shows, by not a few from the journals of the Russian colporteurs. Dr. Nicolson mentions the case of a youth who set his heart on a rouble Testament but without any means of paying the price. He disappeared, and in a few days the colporteur met him again—the rouble in his hand and a deep light in his eyes. 'How did you get it?' he was asked. His reply was given with characteristic simplicity: he had walked twenty-seven miles to an employer of labour, engaged himself for a rouble's worth of work, and walked twenty-seven miles back again. Yet the incident, among many similar, hardly engages the attention. In another instance given by Dr. Nicolson—it is a very rare one—the purchaser objected to the book as being provided by an English Society. The answer of the colporteur—himself a Russian—was conclusive and emphatic: 'Every Russian knows how much we owe to the English Society.'

'The Bible Society through its Agents in Russia has always carefully inculcated on its employés, and especially on those of them who go among the people, that whatever their own religious

views may be, they are to show the most perfect respect for the Orthodox Church, and to engage in no controversy, or even conversation which might be construed into an expression of hostility to the national faith. The great and beneficent work which the Bible Society has accomplished in Russia, the thousands of sick and wounded soldiers on battlefields and in hospitals who have been supplied by us with the Word of God, the wrecked men in prison who have blessed us for the gift of the Divine Gospel, the hundreds of thousands of remote villagers who, but for the devoted labours of our colporteurs, would never have seen the Scriptures, constitute a claim to generous treatment, and usually secure it for the Society in Russia. To prevent the Scriptures from having free course among the people is to remove a sure agency for good,—an influence that will elevate them and make them good citizens as well as pious men.

#### RUSSIA IN ASIA.

*Population of Siberia, 4,484,549.*

The chief event of the year, so far as concerns the Central Asian section of the great field under review, has been the visit of the Rev. J. Sharp, accompanied by Mr. Morrison, first to the Exarch of the Georgian Church at Tiflis, and afterwards to the Katholikos of the Armenian Church at Etchmiadzin. The story, with its fuller details, is told by Mr. Morrison in a section which will be read with much interest. The Society's deputies were received, it need hardly be said, with marked courtesy, and the results of the interviews have in both cases been entirely satisfactory. The ancient Churches of Georgia and Armenia will, it is hoped, be drawn more nearly in understanding and sympathy to the Bible Society, and the Word of God circulated more freely than before among the people.

Hardly less interesting, though in a different way, are the accounts received from Siberia. The great region—itsself as extensive as all Europe—is evidently stirred with the motion of a life hitherto unknown, and a new and indefinitely great future seems near. There, as elsewhere, it has been the privilege of the Bible Society to be in the van of progress, and it is one of the pleasantest aspects of the narrative that the value of its work seems most cordially recognized. Every successive year may be expected to furnish a narrative of ever-increasing interest, and it is to be hoped of equally advancing progress.

In the sections which follow, Dr. Nicolson guides us along the northern route; at Tiflis we recur to the journals of Mr. Morrison.

#### SIBERIA.

In the record of the year there is perhaps nothing more remarkable than the accounts given of the development of Siberia. It is not long since, to most English readers, the name was a synonym for polar insolation, and suggestive of convict settlements,

ary wastes, and a winter more rigid than the utmost imagination of southern minds. In this there was always a good deal of misconception; but the changes of recent years have been startlingly great. With the advance of the railway a strong tide of emigration has set in towards the east. 'Everybody,' says Mr. Davidson, 'is contributing to make Siberia better.' The details give interest. 'The last numbers of the newspapers contain long lists of sums voted by the various "Local Government Boards," "Assemblies of Nobles," "Municipal Councils," and many private individuals in memory of the late love-loving Czar, who was deeply interested in Siberia. The friends of education and religion are spending money freely in founding schools and building churches all along the line of railway in the poorer districts of Siberia. The Government has ably supported such private enterprise. The Holy Synod has given money and grants of books, and the Society for the Spread of Education has also made presents of books and founded small libraries. All this is encouraging.' He continues in words which will be specially welcome to readers of these pages: 'The Bible Society may consider itself one of the pioneers of this popular movement for the spread of education and religion in Siberia, for we were here with our colporteurs and Scriptures before the movement was begun.'

This, however, is a minor matter. It is most pleasant to find many evidences of the cordial sympathy with which the Society's workers in Siberia are everywhere received. 'There is not,' says Mr. Davidson, 'a single steamboat plying on any of the rivers of Siberia that would refuse to carry our men and books free of charge. We have enjoyed a free grant for carriage of Scriptures on the Ural Railway since the Western Sub-Agency was founded; and we have here to note with pleasure that this line has also granted the Sub-Agent a second-class ticket with which he can travel from Perm to Tyumen and back.' Such ready generosity on the part of the railway and steamboat companies deserves cordial recognition. 'Every one of the Society's employees,' Mr. Davidson emphatically adds, 'feels cheered by such practical sympathy.'

#### INDIA.

Population (estimate for 1891) 286,696,960. Religion (1889): 187,000,000 Hindus; 50,000,000 Muhammadans; 3,500,000 Buddhists; 1,862,634 Christians (Roman Catholics, 963,059; Protestants, 535,081; other sects, 364,494.)

For years the successive reports of the Society's Auxiliaries have been singularly inspiring, and those of the year just closed continue the impression the earlier accounts made. Where everything is interesting it is difficult to choose, and where there is so much encouraging, it is easy to generalize perhaps too favourably. One reads of circulation increasing rapidly, as in Madras and Bangalore, steadily as in Allahabad, or slightly declining as in

Bombay; of translations being revised; of the experience of colporteurs, of Biblewomen pursuing as none but Christian women can their sisterly and noble work. But it is only one who knows intimately and has long observed the currents of thought and life in India who can fairly estimate their direction and their force. Perhaps indeed these currents are becoming too visible both in their flow and volume for any, even the indifferent observer, to be unconscious of them. 'It is manifest to all who have personal intercourse with educated Hindus, writes the report from Madras, 'that their views and feeling in regard to religion in particular are undergoing a marked change.' And the Rev. J. Lazarus, who is well qualified to express an opinion, is thus quoted. 'Christianity,' he writes 'is in the air, and India is passing through a serious crisis. Materialism, once so popular, is growing out of fashion and yielding place to a religious sentiment. Though the educated masses are still at some distance from the threshold of Christianity. Christ is seldom out of their sight. He is more than ever in the van of moral and religious progress. In English and vernacular newspapers, the writers often exhibit an intimate acquaintance with the Bible. Even among the masses the Bible is making way. I have come across many villagers who are in the habit of reading the Word of God.'

The 429 Biblewomen were geographically distributed thus:—India 310, Ceylon 76, Syria and Palestine 14, Egypt 18, China 1, Straits 2, Mauritius and the Seychelles 4. The 310 in India were apportioned thus:—in Bengal, Behar, Chota Nagpur, Orissa and Assam, 120; in the Madras Presidency, with Mysore, Cochin and Travancore, 89; in the Bombay Presidency, with Sindh, 42; in the North-West Provinces, 25; in the Panjab, 23; in Central India, 8; and in Burma, 3.

But, as has been often remarked in this Report, this work must not be estimated as simply one of *figures*. Each native woman to whom the Word of Christ has been brought nearer has an immortal soul. Each copy circulated is at least a book through which the Holy Spirit can bring such a soul to Jesus. And each woman has her sphere of influence beyond herself in a family and in a neighbourhood. Much of the inestimable good that the Bible Society is effecting by the circulation of inspired books is necessarily at present concealed from view. This must be specially so amid the conditions under which Eastern women live and can be approached. But cases here and there come to light which make it plain that the Biblewomen's work among them is very far from being 'in vain in the Lord'. Such results cannot be tabulated by figures. 'The Day' alone can reveal their full value. For that we must work and wait.

The reports continue to bear ample evidence of the high spiritual and missionary value of the Biblewomen's work. But space fails for more than a few samples of its lights and shadows. A. S. P. G. missionary in Rangoon writes:—'The Biblewoman is indefatigable in her work, and has a great influence for good on

It is one of the most encouraging facts of the year that, in spite of many difficulties, the circulation has so considerably increased, and it is significant that full one-half of the increase is due to the patient

labours of the colporteurs. The work of these devoted men seems indeed to grow year by year in its value as well as its compass, and it is increasingly accumulating those evidences of the growth of a new Christian life among the people which in every land, but especially among the vast populations of China, has a limitless interest and significance. During the months of 1894 there have been ceaselessly moving from place to place, not indeed in all the provinces—empires as not a few of them are in population—but in most of the more important ones, 180 colporteurs, six of them Europeans, all the rest natives of their vast, almost voiceless, inscrutable land. One meets them on river boats, among the mountain villages, in the unlighted, unfreshened alleys of their labyrinthine cities. How patiently enduring many of these men are, how genuinely devout, we must read the journals to know. And though the Chinaman of the West seems too often hopelessly alien from his European or American brother, incidents such as we meet in their journals reveal the same human heart. Assuredly some of his words, as always his needs, may well reach the hearts and consciences of Christians at home. 'Why is this news about God and Jesus brought to us only now?' said a fellow-traveller to one of the colporteurs; 'has it never been known before?' And though they often seem stolid, the missionaries who superintend the Bible-men know how impressionable and how receptive many of the rude people are. 'Again and again,' writes Mr. Joseland, whose district is near Amony, 'the men are asked to read from and explain the books; again and again they are asked to make a longer stay and to teach the truth systematically; and when they leave they are nearly always importuned to return as soon and as often as they can.' Another Missionary Superintendent compares their work to that of the pioneer in the prairie or untravelled forest; they are clearing away the undergrowth of centuries; they are opening up roads along which the settlers of a new time may travel, and bridging the rivers he may cross. Those who are most fully acquainted with China anticipate the best results from the war; but instead of forecasting the unknown it is safer to read with gratitude the pages of the accomplished past, and to wait for the turning of the leaf in a volume so full of surprises.

One of the men who was sent to look up old purchasers has been the means of leading a number to the Saviour. The Rev. W. Hunter writes that some twenty men were baptised by himself, and that a district comprising several villages seemed to promise to become Christian 'owing to the bookselling, earnest preaching, and above all, the consistent life of the colporteur.'

Here we may take the opportunity of quoting the testimony of the Rev. Dr. Ross to our colporteurs. He writes:—

'If the real spiritual results are elsewhere what they are in Manchuria, the Bible Society has reason for gratitude for being instrumental in doing so much to extend the Kingdom. In some cases, the native colporteurs have been the means of starting new stations by bringing in converts where no other evangelist had ever been. In others, they have added members to already existing stations; and in many more they have strengthened the bands and increased the faith



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of isolated Christians far away from spiritual ordinances in the  
 'communion of the saints.' Many a village has its one or more believers  
 and sincere searchers after Truth, where the Gospel would not have  
 been known but for the itinerating colporteur. By such results, it  
 seems to me, rather than by the sale of many more books, which  
 could not be read, is our Lord served, and the aim of the Bible  
 Society attained.'

Mr. Turley proceeds: 'All the missionaries in Manchuria have, as  
 usual, given us much help, without which our labours would be less  
 effective. In the sad death of Rev. J. A. Wylie the Society has lost  
 a faithful friend and a very earnest worker. He was a hard-working  
 bookseller, and not long before his death had returned from a book-  
 selling tour. With Liu Chi-fah he spent several weeks, two years  
 ago, selling our books all along the route where the war has been  
 raging.'

We praise God that so many books have been distributed in  
 Manchuria, and especially that the Christians have the New Testament.  
 How that all human help has been taken from them, God will speak  
 to them through His Word.

#### JAPAN.

Population (1890), 40,500,000. Protestant communicants in 1890,  
 32,380.

No report of the year is more inspired by the story it has to tell  
 than that of Japan. It is flushed with expectation. The influences  
 of the war, the writers believe, are strongly in the direction of the  
 advance of Christianity, and the nearer future seems to them full of  
 the highest promise.

It is perilous to forecast, especially in a history so full of the  
 unexpected as that of Japan has been; but the narrative is assuredly  
 a remarkable one. The circulation of Scriptures has immensely  
 increased, and the friendly interest and respect to Christian faith has  
 been still more notable. There is nothing more significant in its own  
 sphere than the way in which the young, eager nation, searching for  
 the highest form of civilization, seems to find in the doctrine of Christ  
 the secret of all that is best in the western world. More clearly,  
 perhaps, than the west itself, the higher minds of Japan are discerning  
 the explanation of its superiority, and turning inquiringly to the  
 spiritual truth. Nothing could be more courteous than the permission  
 given to the deputies of the Bible Societies to supply the army with  
 Scriptures; and never, perhaps, has there been planned under  
 circumstances more favourable so thorough a distribution in the great  
 cities as that which has recently begun. But a few more such changes,  
 and the mind of this gifted people may show a development as  
 remarkable as anything that has occurred in the world of politics.

In the extracts given proof has been afforded of the great and  
 interesting work the Bible Society has performed. Want of space  
 prevents notice of its work in other parts of Europe and Asia, in

Africa, North and South America, and in Australia and the islands of the Pacific.

A careful study of the report will show how invaluable is the aid given to Missionaries by the numerous translations issued by the Bible Society, and the necessity of far greater exertions, and far larger contributions being given to meet the needs of the wide world. We in Nova Scotia, accustomed to an open Bible, cannot understand what the absence of the Bible means in the great regions of Europe and South America.

We ought, says an eloquent writer, after painting in vivid colours the decay of Christian Spirit, the failure of faith, the chilling of zeal which characterise modern France. We ought to bring back the faithful to the great fountain of living water which springs up from the inspired Book. We ought to make them hear, taste, and feel the direct lessons of the Saviour, the words full of grace and truth which fell from His lips. We ought to place the earth face to face with Jesus Christ. Is not this work being done in part, at least by the Colporteurs, Bible Women, and numerous translations of the Word of God.

May each one, then, realize the power of units, the power of individuals, and we shall do our work with sympathy and prayer, and give pecuniary help to this Society.

" I am *only* one,  
But I *am* one.  
I cannot do *everything*.  
But I can do *something*.  
What I can do I *ought* to do,  
And by the grace of God I will."

Let us not be turned aside and tempted to do nothing to make this world better. God is willing and waiting to use us. He prefers to honor us by accepting our services. Yet how feeble we are, how slack in prayer, how cold in our sympathy! The wonder is that so much good is done, not that so little is accomplished.

Let all friends of the dear old Bible Society arrange their forces into line, and with systematic and well-directed prayer seek a blessing by calling down a blessing on God's Word.

Pray for all who help the Society, subscribers and collectors.

Pray for the Committee and Secretaries, that as faithful stewards they may have great wisdom and understanding.

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Pray for all who translate the Word, that they may be enabled  
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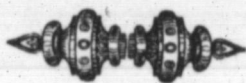
Pray for all who circulate the Word, that the right men may be

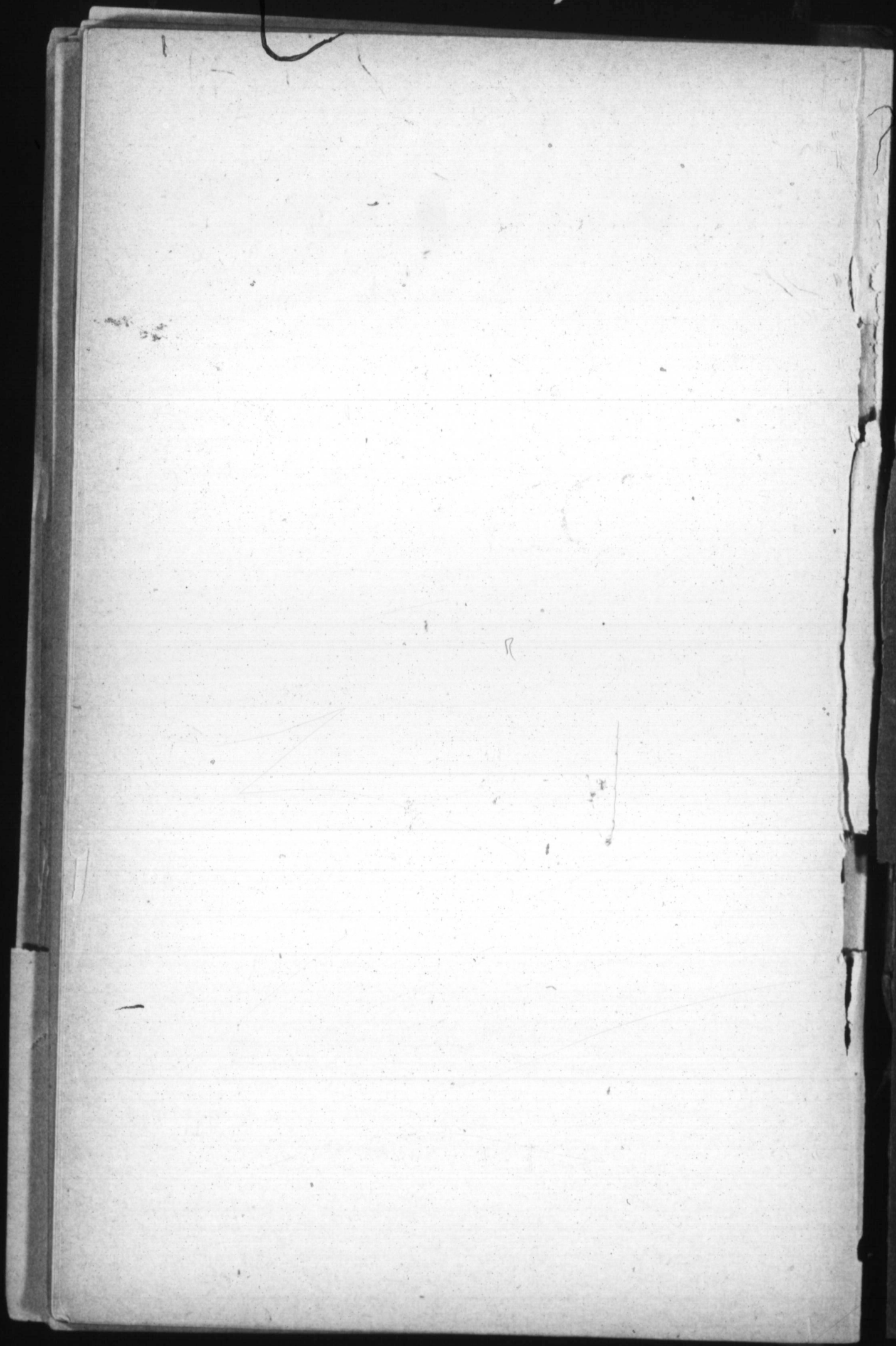
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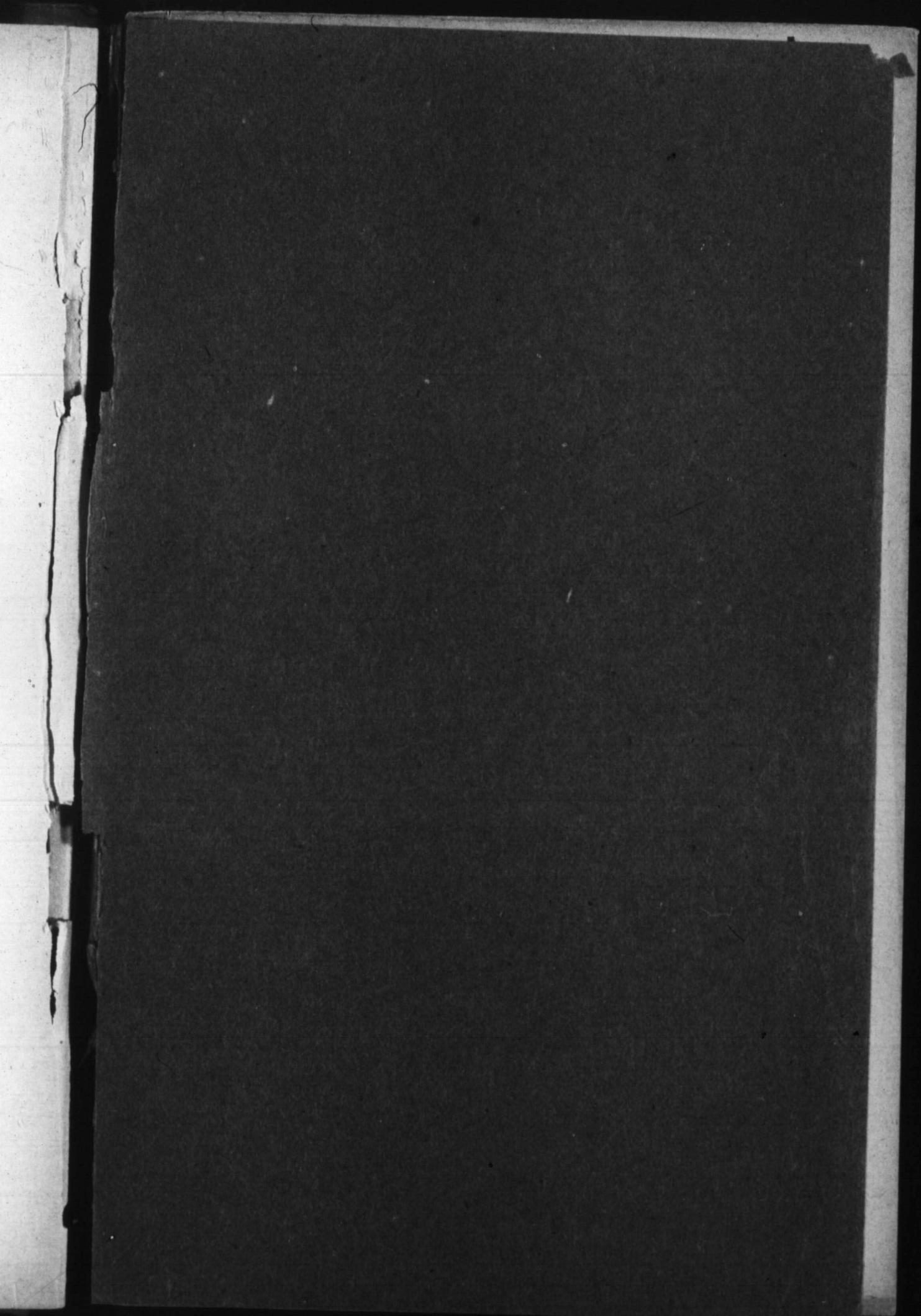
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
