Unemployment, says Senator Robertson, has been a cause of Unemployment, says Senator Robertson, has been a cause of public anxiety for a year past. A serious industrial depression was brought about in the fall of 1920 by the falling off of export trade, on account of European countries being unable to purchase Canadian goods, and universal buyers' strikes. Buyers waited for lower prices, and manufacturing fell off. During the last 90 days of 1920, some 150,000 workmen lost their employment. The situation was hardly realized before steps were taken to proceed the process of the proce arrest the movement. Over 8,000 employers were asked to retain all possible workmen, even if only on short time. Banks were asked to aid in extending credits to manufacturers; Federal, provincial and municipal governments did what was possible on short notice. The result was that little further decline occurred after January 1.

On December 14, 1920, the Federal Government introduced a relief policy, reimbursing municipalities one-third of the amount they found it necessary to expend to relieve distress. The Federal Government has expended more than \$600,000 for this purpose, in addition to maintaining entirely 12,165 unemployed disabled soldiers and their dependents at a cost of over \$1,000,000.

oyment situation is of a world-wide nature and whilst we on is continent must take our position in the ranks of those seeking relieve and solve the problem, the interlinking of this situation ith our kindred overseas enters into same—the reflex being too rong to be ignored. Consequently ways and means from overas give ideas to us as our actions are scrutinized in similar shion and benefits may thereby accrue.

In dealing in this matter some tof these viewpoints are given the following when it is stated that the greatest problem hich faces the country today is how to find work for the million nd a half able-bodied men and women now unemployed. Up to w they have been living chiefly on doles, or on each other, or their friends. Unemployment insurance has broken down. ne doles policy must be stopped before it further demoralizes the emunity. Some method of providing useful work with wages, d not wages without work, must be found. In the meantime, Geddes Economy Committee has recommended the scrapping the unemployment exchanges on account of the cost. we never been efficient clearing houses for finding jobs for labor, nd the biggest employers have always ignored them.

There are certain principles which must be followed when saling with the unemployment problem, so that cures may not rease the disease. In the first place, the practice adopted of ving wages and not relief must be stopped, and the Ministry of ealth has already put a check on it. Relief when given should in kind rather than in money. It should be enough to mainin the unemployed decently, but not enough to withdraw the mlus for work and for more comfort. The policy of the labor changes has been to pauperize. The sole condition of relief om these institutions is that the applicants must be doing no ork at all. This discourages men from taking on small job and aking a start.

On the constructive side of national relief it is essential that e work found should be useful, and in the form of national de-While necessary in periods of depression, this work tion was dopment. While necessary in periods of depression, this work tion was brought about by bould at the same time be of a kind that can be reduced or disoverwork. I had frequent ntinued when the progress of industry finds other work for the nemployed. Under the heading of national development works me road improvement-extremely necessary and urgent; the ansformation of existing dereliet or more or less useless canals to modern waterways, or new roads; afforestation, which has en talked about for years and is hardly yet begun, and reclamaon of waste lands. All these works would be useful and remunative national investments. The State would be justified in arrying them on temporarily, at any rate, on a national scale, is important, however, that there should be devolution, and that ese national works should be carried on in local areas under local pervision with State assistance.

At best all these natonal development schemes are palliatives. here is only one remedy for unemployment, and that is more pronetive work in the ordinary channels, but the problem cannot be lived in this country alone. 
