ONTARIO'S BIRTH RATE Is the lowest for to years.

TORONTO, Oct. 30.—Ontario's birth rate was only 32.4 per thousand during the past fiscal year, according to the Registrar General's report, which will be issued shortly. It is the lowest percentage reached since 1992, and two points below the figures for 1991.



A despatch the other day announced that we were in danger of losing our primacy in the British cheese market to the New Zeslander. That primacy was probably due to a large extent to the immense advertisement we gave ourselves by making the biggest cheese in the world. That cheese was manufactured in the fall of 1892 in the Canadian Pacific Railway station shed at Perth. Ont., and was sent to the World's Fair in Chicago the next year. It weighed 22,000 pounds, and required for its making the equivalent of the September milking of 10,000 cows. After the fair was over the cheese was shipped to England where it was widely exhibited and called attention in a startling manner to the cheese makers of Canada. Their cheese had already made a prominent place for itself in the English market; but that place was enormously enlarged as a result of the unique advertisement, which was fully supported by the quality of the Canadian article. PRESERVATION OF FISH.

New Method Does Away With Use of Salt, Ice and Pickle.

A new method of curing the recently introduced in Hallian, N.S., and, being experimented with by one of the largest shippers of fish in that city, promises to revolutionize the entire fish industry in the Maritime Provinces and in other countries carrying on this industry to any marked egree. This method does away entirely with the use of ice, salt, pickle or other preservatives and so perfectly preserves the fish that two weeks after preservation (which it sufficient time for this important food article to reach cities in central United States, West Indies and some portein South America) the ish is exactly as it was when drawn from its native water. The fish are dumped into a tank holding sea water which has been filtered through four cylinder-like tanks containing willow charcoal and screens to remove the noxious gases and foreign substances,

Next brown sugar is placed in the tank holding the fish to serve as a germicide for such organisms as may be active at freezing temperature. Then ly refrigeration the temperature is lowered to 10 degrees C. below zero, during which time 16.1 per cent. salt is added to prevent ice formation and to assist the formation of a thin protective coating over the fish themselves. Having allowed the fish to remain in this treatment for two hours, they are ready for shipment, removed from the tank and placed in the package or barrel to await transportation to market.

This process is based upon the theory that putrefaction of fish is first caused by bone taint, due to the fact that in the old methods of curing sish the specific or animal heat is partially left within the fish. The new method which has been introduced acts as a preventive to bone taint, completely removing the specific or animal heat from the fish to be cured. vice of New Zealand, where he remained for three years and did much to lay the foundations of the cheese industry in that colony. New Zealand has taken for a time no less than three other Canadians for this purpose, while even Great Britain and the United States have drawn upon our cheese and buffer. ROMANCE OF PICTURE. Alex. Crawford of Toronto Finds

Proclaus Heirloom.

A short notice in a Toronto maga sine a few weeks ago in regard to the "Linc of Mar" led to a search in an old sea chest belonging to a gentle man in the north end of that city and the finding of a letter of January 1, 1870, from the successful possessor of the ancient title of the premier Earl of Scotland, thanking the father of the Toronto elitizen for a complete list of the Mar pictures and family relies, and the impression of old Mar Scale. Further search resulted to

Further search resulted in finding the list referred to, giving the names of the different members of the Mar family, whose features and figures had been emblazoned on canvas, in oil, by some of the celebrated artists of the time, such as Rigaud, Lely, Kneller, Raeburn, Jameson and Allan.

On looking at the wall of his little room in the cliy the gentleman referred to found hanging there a painting representing three children, which he had leard his father say over sixty years ag. was by Sir Peter Lely, court painter in the reign of Charles I. and Charles II., being the picture of three children of the Mar family. If such was the case, how could such a claim be proved? The present Earl of Mar and Garloch had a bitter fight before the House of Lords, but succeeded (he being the nephew of the Earl of Mar who had fought at the tattle of Waterloo), the unsuccessful chalman's being given a new creation by Queen Victoria.

The owner thought it would be as hard a fight to prove the Lainter of the picture; but by a close examination of the oil painting his fears were dispelled, and, in place of a portrait group by Sir Peter Lely, he found himself to be the fortunate possessor of a beautiful work by Sir Godfrey Kneller, who succeeded to the title of Kneller, who succeeded to the title of co t painter on the death of Sir Pot-er Lely in 1680. In 1692 William III. knighted Kneller, and in 1715 George I. madezhim a baronet. best known productions are "The Beauties of Hampton Court," painted by order of William III., and his porby order of William III., and his por-traits of nine sovereigns, Charles II. to George I. of England, Louis XIV. Peter the Great and the Emperor Charles VI. A monument was erect-ed to Kneller in Westminster Abbey, with a highly laudatory inscription

Adulterat 1 Lime Juice.

Adulterat 1 Lime Julce.

Chief Analyst A. McGill, of Ottawa, has been collecting samples of lime fruit julce on a large scale in Toronto for the purpose of analysis, and prosecution will follow where the gross adulteration justifies it.

Lime fruit julce is the fresh fruit julce obtained from the lime fruit, and has specific gravity of 1.030 and not greater than 1.040, and containing not less than ten per cent. of oslids and not less than seven per cent. of free citri. acid.

Only five samples out of the thirty collected recervity fully meet the requirements of the law. Over 30 per cent. of the amples give unmistakable exidence of being adulterated with water. It is the purpose of the department to prosecute larrely on the collection of samples now being taken, as warning has been given in the last bulletin sent out. Many samples taken in Toronto, some of them labelled "pure," have been found adulterated. Oftenders, who eguilty in this respect, may be more harshly dealt with on conviction for manufacturing adulterated lime fruit falce.
