N.T.R. WILL BE MONUMENT OVER LAURIER'S POLITICAL REMAINS

Montreal, June 10.-Hon. Arthur Meighen, Solicitor General, in an address tonight before the Westmount Conservative Association in Victoria Hall, referred to the Transcontinental Railway as likely to prove a monument over Sir Wilfrid Laurier's political remains. "Two hundred million dollars," he said, "have been planted on two streaks of rust between Moncton and Winnipeg."

Mr. Meighen said the interest on the Transcontinental burden was at the rate of \$1,000 an hour. He blamed the Liberals for having precipiated political strife and said the Conserva tives "had to strike out in defense."



LORD MILNER'S LETTER BIG ARGUMENT FOR CONSCRIPTION

"The change of Ministry will not bring us victory without a change of method. We have now got the best men of all political parties working together in one Cabinet, and the nation as a whole is heartily rejoiced at it. But even the best Government cannot do the impossible. You might as well expect an army using the did Brown Bess to beat one equipped with quick-firing rifles, as a country-that still clings to the voluntary cystem to be a match for one which is organised throughout on the principle of national service.

"The handicap is too enormous. It hampers us everywhere, in the provision of ammunition no less than in the provision of men.

"It is the root cause of nine-tenths of the hitches, delays, and blunders, and of the widespread and justified unesainess and discontent which takes so unfortunate a form in perpetual fault-finding with this or that individual Minister—men who are doing hard and often astonishingly good work with a clumey and inadequate instrument which they are afraid to discard.

"What has been achieved so far (and it is wonderful considering the conditions) has been achieved largely by the aid of a number of exceptional measures, drastically interfering with our femous "rights of property" and "liberty of the subject." Yet nobody complains.

"Ministers have only to say that such and such an emergency measure is necessary to the efficient conduct of the war, and they get is.

"The spirit of the nation is excellent, it simply needs firm leadership. But this whole series of special laws, though they have thoroughly riddled the principle of individual liberty, have not touched our fundamental need, which is to give the country in its life-and-death struggle a claim to the personal service of all its citizens."

Further he writes: "The way we are at present going on is unfair to everybody. It is unfair to our splendid men at the front and our gallant Allies. But it is unfair, also, to thousande of men at home, who are unjustly defounced as "slackers" or "cowards," w

"And even the real "slacker," the man who obviously ought to go and has no reasonable excuse for shirking, does it lie in their mouth to repreach him, who are themselves so slack that they are afraid to compel him to do his duty, though they have the power? Surely, in all this outcry about slackness and timidity we are putting the saddle on the wrong horse.

"I know it may be said that men who need compulsion to make them join the colors are not the fighting men we want. But every sort of compulsion, often of the most invidious kind, is going on in this country at the present time. It is only honest, straightforward compulsion, equally applied all round, that we stick at.

"Moreover, it is not at all true that men necessarily fight badly because they fight in obedience to a constraining law, not from the mere impulse of patriotism. And granted that the pick of our manhood, the keenest, most enterprising, most courageous, are already at the front, that does not mean that the rest may not be good average fighting material.

"No great army was ever yet composed mainly of Paladins. And the last thing we want as a nation is that a heroic minority should be wholly sacrificed, and only men of average or inferior spirit and sense of duty left to carry on the race.

"We have relied too exclusively upon the pick of our people, and we have lost too large a proportion of them. It is high time that the whole of our able-bodied manhood—no mean material either—should be enrolled to support them in the field, except those who can render the more efficient aid in other ways. And the nation is ready to obey the order. It only needs the captain on the bridge to give the signal."



New York, June 10—Such misgivings as Wall street conjured up yesterday in connection with the retirement of Mr. Bryan were largely dispelled today.
