THOROUGH ENDORSATION OF THE 1919 VICTORY LOAN EXPRESSED BY HON. MACKENZIE KING

Mr. King Lays Emphasis Upon the Necessity for the Maintenance of Canada's Credit and Desirability That the Money be Raised at Home.

Toronto, Oct. 1.—Thorough endors sation of the Victory Loan of 1919, is expressed by Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party in the Dominion, in a letter addressed to the Minister of Finance, Sir Henry Prayton. Mr. King lays emphasis upon the necessity for the maintenance of Canada's credit and the desirability that the money required to meet the pressing obligations of the nation should be raised at home.

This is his letter:

Ottawa, Sept. 10, 1919.

My Dear Sir Henry,

"I am pleased to join with you in commending the Victory Loan to the acopie of Canada.

"It is imperative that Canada's wedit should be maintained.

CANADA PAYING \$24,000,000 TO 90,000 PERSONS

Pensions Act Will Raise Outlay \$4,000,000—Substantial Increases—September Cheques Are Being Made Out at New Rates.

Ottawa, Sept. 26—"Canada is at present paying war pensions to nearly 90,000 individuals at an annual cost of over \$24,000,000, and under the Persions Act, which became effective on September I, the majority of these will receive bonuses and increases which, in the aggregate, will create an additional annual expenditure of troughly \$4,000,000," says an official statement issued by the Board of Pensions Commissioners. Just how It this additional expenditure is to be distributed may be seen from the foi-

lowing figures. A twenty per cent. bonus, payable for one year, is to be added to the pension of the disabled ex-private. To the totally disabled man this represents an increase of \$120, making his abrual pension \$720 instead of the former \$600. The former sergeant, or company sergeant-major, totally disabled, will also have his pension raised to an annual sum of \$720 from the former amount of \$637.50, roughly a thirteen per cent. bonus. The amounts given are those to which totally disabled men are entitled; men with lesser disabilities of course receive smaller amounts; according to the degree of their disability. These bonuses are only payable to the ranks mentioned or corresponding ranks, commissioned officers and warrant officers being excluded from receiving them. The additional pension for married pensioners of \$96 per annum for a totally disabled man), is to be permanently increased to \$180, and made payable to all ranks. The additional pension allowed for children is

The war widow whose husband was killed as a private is to have added to her present pension of \$480 per annumble sum of \$98, bringing her total annual pension up to \$576, the widow of a sergeant having her pension similarly raised to \$576 from its former total of \$510. These increases are bonuses of percentages corresponding to those payable to the disability pensioners uterviously described.

In addition to their personal bonus widows who have been left with chil aren will have the additional pension allowed for their first child increased by \$36, making the total \$180 per an runn instead of \$144. The pension for the oldest orphan child of a deceased seldier has also been increased from \$288 to \$360 per annum.

"The adjustments made necessary through these increases have already been made," an official of the Board of Pension Commissioners stated, and the September pension cheques payable at the new rates will be issued promptly at the end of the month."

The work is to be dealt with as quick by as possible, however, and those cotcerned may be assured of an early adjustment of their pensions.

Pension cheques issued at the new rates for the month of September will continue to be so issued during September, 1919, to September, 1920. Correspondence on the part of pensioners regarding the new rates will therefore be unnecessary.

"Those pensioners who have accepted courses of training with the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment need feel no anxiety, as any pension to which they may be entitled on their release from that institution will be adjusted and paid to them at the new rates," stated the board. This also applies to any other case where a pension has, for any reason, been suspended, and future awards will be made on the new
