A Midnight Frowler Assailed. A curious case was commenced in the Portland Police Court this morning. A man by the name of Gillespie obtained a warrant and had William Walton, Debora Walton, and Debora Walton, Jr., arrested for an assault which took place last March, in Quaco. This very interesting trial was going on when our reporter left the Court.
