NEW YORK, Feb. 10,-Disappointed in his desire to defeat the famous German sprint star, Houben, due to a delay in train service which resulted in his arrival too late to enter competition against the runner at Madison Square Garden Thursday a week ago, De Hart Hubbard, the colored athletic marvel, is now preparing for a new endavour, this time with determination that nothing shall prevent him from making his prow-

Hubbard is now in earnest training for the Wilco A.A. games which will be held in he Thitreenth Regiment armory at Brooklyn on the night of February 13th. This time the versatile athlete will participate in a sport event with which his name os not so familiarly associated, although he is recognized as one of the country's, if not the world's outstanding performers in the even. Hubbard is to run in the hurdle events at the Wilco A.A. games.

It is expected that two world's indoor hurdle records will be eclipsed at the Wilco A.A. games, Besides Hubbard, a number of the best hurdlers in competition at present compete in the low hurdle race at 80 yards and the high hurdle race at the same distance.

The record for the former is 9 3-5 seconds and is held by Forrest Smithson, the Pacific Northwest star, who came out of the West in 1909 and left a trail of new hurdle records wherever he competed. The 80-yard hurdle over three-foot barriers was made on March 13th, 1886, by Malcolm Ford when he cleared six hurdles in 12 seconds.




