Foster, of the British ship Rydal Hall, taken off the wreck of his ship just before she went to pieces off Spanish Town, states that the ship was 1,800 tons burden, with a crew of thirtythree all told. She belonged to the Sun Shipping Company, Liverpool.—
She was an Al iron ship, four months
CALL AND INSPECT. out from Cardiff with coal. On Monday they were seventy miles from Farallones by observation. On Tuesday the weather was bad and she hove to. All hands remained on deck during the night until she struck, about 8 p. m. Her bottom was crushed and she rapidly filled. Seamen Charles Wilson, Geo. White, Geo. Georges, and John Jones attempted to launch the gig without orders. The boat was swamped and all were lost. The sea making a clean breach over the

ship, in lowering the lifeboat Hugh Williams, second officer; William Wilson, stewart; Bay Keith Selwyn, apprentice; Alex. Barlow, William Baker, and Jas. Gomez, seamen, were drowned. The crew did not attemp to get out any more boats but stopped on board until morning, when they were taken off by the whale ship with THE PROPRIETORS of the above estabgreatest difficulty, owing to the heavy surf. The captain remained on board becoming a total wreck, full of water and decks breaking up. Nothing was saved, not even the ship's papers.— The Captain attributes the disaster to currents whose strength was not pro ed at £26,000 and the cargo at £4,000; insured.


