THE FREE SPEECH CASE

In past reports of the preliminary examination in the case of the editor and publisher of "Free Speech" who was recently arrested at Miramichi and taken to St. John, charged with publishing several defamatory libels on well known St. John citizens, one witness, W. J. McNeill, Manager of the Advocate Publishing Co. of Newcastle and foreman of the Upper Adolphus, made a statement that the editor and manager of the Graphic, H. B. Anslow, was a party together with the witness and another gentleman, in making the contract for the printing of "Free Speech."

How Mr. McNeill could make such a statement we cannot conceive, as we had no dealings with McDonald or any other person in reference to such a contract, and was in no way connected with it. Mr. McNeill, so far as we can learn on investigation, made the contract as manager of the above company, solely on his own responsibility, and besides McDonald was the only other party to the contract if there was one.

Mr. McNeill's statement will not do credit to the trial which is being held next week.

In this connection we might add that Mr. O. S. Crockett, M. P. attorney for Mr. C. S. O. Crockett in the now famous Crockett case, saw fit to introduce this entirely irrelevant matter in his cross examination of Mr. Anslow, who was a witness on that case.

At the suggestion of C. S. O. Crockett, the attorney asked Mr. Anslow if he was the H. B. Anslow mentioned in connection with the publication of "Free Speech."

A DISGRACEFUL STREET

Campbellton is a growing town and no doubt its revenues are taxed to meet the demands for the opening up of new streets, the extension to the main street, and the laying of new water pipes, but even considering all these, some steps should be taken to place Water Street in a passable condition. Water Street is the principal business street of Campbellton. It leads from the freight shed and station to the water, a distance of less than a mile, and in its centre course, during "wet" weather, is a mass of mire and a disgrace to any town the size of Campbellton. Experiments have been made of dumping quantities of stone and gravel on to the street, but with very little improvement perceptible. All the heavy teams, and some of it very heavy, is done on this street, consequently it is badly cut up, especially in wet weather. There is only one permanent remedy, Water Street must be paved. This is a subject which should be taken up at once and necessary information obtained so that the work could be properly done next season.



DARING HOLDUP BY HIGHWAYMAN

Compelled Train Men to Carry Coin and Bullets into Wilderness

LEWISTOWN, Pa. Aug. 31.—One of the most audacious and startling holdups of a railroad train in the east for years occurred on the eastern slope of the Alleghany Mountains early today when a lone highwayman stopped a Pennsylvania express train with a dynamite cartridge, and at a point of a revolver commanded the crew to carry thousands of dollars in coin and bullion from an express car to a spot in the wilderness. When the conductor of the train attempted to interfere with the train robber he was shot in the hand and the hold hand made good his escape. In the darkness, however, he mistook a bag containing ten thousand Lincoln pennies for gold coin and staggered away from the train, leaving the robbers to be recovered by the railroaders.

When the news of the robbery reached the railroad and express companies they immediately ordered every available detective to the scene in an effort to capture the robber. Bloodhounds were also put on his track but up to late tonight no trace of the man had been found.



NEW REASON FOR BRITISH BAN ON CANADIAN CATTLE Premier Asquith Tells Deputation Loose Guarded Boundary Line Makes American Infection Possible LONDON, Aug. 31—A deputation representing various trading interests attended parliament today to ask the government to remove its embargo on the importation of Canadian cattle. Premier Asquith said he regretted that he saw no possibility of acceding to the request, for while it might be true that disease was nonexistent among cattle in Canada, it was inadvisable that disease appeared from time to time in the United States with disastrous results and it was impossible for this purpose to put Canada and the United States into water-tight compartments owing to the long and loosely guarded boundary line.


