I have been closely associated with Harry ever since the 26th Batt. was formed, we were in the same Company and Harry had No. 12 platoon, and when we arrived over here, Harry became Machine Gun Officer and I took charge of the Grenade platoon, and in that way we were still kept together, our dugwe were still kept together, our dug-


London, April 18—"The French have captured the submarine which torpedoed the Sussex, and have made prisoners the captain and crew," says the Daily Mail.
