LETTER RECEIVED FROM MAJOR A. E. G. MCKENZIE

Writes in Reference to Death of Capt. Harry Ferguson—Name Should Never Die

Mr. W. M. Ferguson has received the following letter from Major A. E. G. McKenzie of the 26th Battalion:

Flanders, 25th March, 1916

Dear Billie:—
I wrote your father today, but I felt I must write you too. I feel very badly about poor Harry's death. He was killed by a sniper in my trench, only a short distance from my dugout door. A nice fine, clear, sunny afternoon. One would hardly believe that death lurked anywhere near. He was never conscious and lived only a few minutes. You know we were friends and we saw a great deal of him, particularly when in the trenches. Many a night we talked for hours about how we were going to run things when we got back. Major Belyea's death and Harry's have caused me to lose two of my greatest friends in the Battalion, and that in two days is a pretty hard blow to me. It is a heavy one for the Battalion. Harry was doing splendid work as Machine Gun Officer, which the Brigade were especially noting. He was absolutely fearless in his work and he was around visiting those machine guns of his at all times, often at very great danger to himself. It was a great shock to us all, and we have hardly begun to realize it yet, that he is gone. You have my sympathy in your trouble but it must be a satisfaction to you to know that he laid down his life for a great principle and for a great cause. The people of Campbellton should feel proud of him and of the others who have paid the extreme price in this great struggle. They are all heroes and their names should never die.

Dear Mr. Ferguson:—
No doubt you will be surprised to receive a letter from me, but I cannot let the time go by without writing to express my deepest sympathy in the loss of your beloved son. Harry has been closely associated with Harry ever since the 26th Batt. was formed, we were in the same Company and Harry had No. 11 platoon and I had No. 12 platoon, and when we arrived over here, Harry became Machine Gun Officer and I took charge of the Grenade platoon, and in that way we were still kept together, our dugouts were right next to each other.

On Wednesday afternoon the 15th, Harry left our trench and went to the other end of the line, and by a strange coincidence I followed poor Harry without knowing it, and when I arrived at the point I had to go I heard someone say Mr. Ferguson is hit. I immediately ran to where Harry was and it was not half a minute, and Harry was unconscious then and did not know me. He died a few minutes afterward without suffering any pain.

His death has been an awful blow to everyone in the Battalion, as he was beloved by all and was considered the best Machine Gun Officer in the brigade. Mr. Ferguson will you kindly accept my sincere sympathy in your sad loss and convey same to your family. Personally I feel I have lost one of my best friends and I can only repeat that Harry's untimely death has cast a gloom over the whole Battalion, as he had won the hearts of the men by his cheerful nature under all circumstances.

Nearly all the officers that could be spared attended the funeral the following afternoon at three o'clock, which was also attended by General Alderson, Commander of the Canadian Corps and General Watson, Commander of the Brigade. Mr. Lockhart is making arrangements to have a picture taken of Harry's last resting place in a little graveyard a short distance back of our lines. I find it difficult to write this letter and before closing again wish to express my deepest sympathy from the bottom of my heart in your sad loss.

GORDON M. CONNELL REPORTED WOUNDED

Well Known Campbellton Boy Figures in Casualty List.—Former I. C. R. Man

Word was received here Tuesday that Sergeant Gordon M. Connell of this town, but who enlisted with the 29th Vancouver Battalion, had been wounded whilst in the fighting. Sergeant Connell had been residing in Vancouver some seven years before enlisting in the overseas unit in which he was wounded, and he had risen rapidly to the position of sergeant. Prior to his going west he was an employee of the I. C. R. at Campbellton, where he is well known and where many friends will regret to learn of his being wounded.

It was doubtless in the heavy fighting around St. Elloi that Sergeant Connell was wounded, as the 29th saw the heaviest of the fighting there.

CASE SETTLED
The case of Black vs. Thomas, has been settled. This was a case brought by Mr. Black of Halifax, who owns land on both sides of the Upsalquitch River at Upsalquitch, as well as the fishing rights, against Wm Thomas for trespass. Wm. Thomas recently built a house and store on the roadside and Mr. Black entered an action to compel him to remove same. Thomas claimed that he was not on Black's land, but on the public highway. On Monday D. A. Stewart, M. L. A., M. A. Kelly and H. A. Carr went to Upsalquitch and Mr. Thomas agreed to settle the case on Mr. Black's proposition to buy the building. As there was no train returning to Campbellton Monday night, due to a run off, our legal lights and local representative procured a hand car and motored home, arriving here a little behind schedule and weary, but proud of their feat.

INDIAN KILLED IN CAMPBELLTON YARD

John Clements of Mission Instantly Killed on Roundhouse Track

John Clements, an Indian of the Mission, St. Anne de Restigouche, was instantly killed last evening near the Rest House on the track leading to the I. C. R. roundhouse.

Wednesday afternoon about fifteen Indians from the Mission were congregated on the road which leads to Duncan's Point. They were drinking and quarrelling to some extent, and at that time some of them had to be assisted away by some squaws, who were endeavoring to persuade them to go home.

About 9 o'clock last evening Coroner W. A. Trueman was notified that a man had been killed by an engine in the I. C. R. yard. He immediately proceeded to the scene of the accident and held an investigation, which brought about the following facts.

Engine No. 251, in charge of engineer Moody Trites, which had just arrived from west, was proceeding tender first to the roundhouse. When near the rest house the driver thought he observed something on the track and immediately applied air break.

The night was dark at 8.30. When an investigation was made it was seen that a man had been run over, several wheels of the tender passing over his chest, fearfully mangle same.

It was given out in the investigation that deceased had been observed earlier walking on the track in an intoxicated condition.

Under the circumstances the coroner did not deem an inquest necessary and gave permission for the removal of the body. The I. C. R. men were held blameless.

NO CHANGE IN MATTER OF LICENSE

Ward Three Goes Wet With Decreased Majority.—Ward Two Dry

The result of the local option election in Ward III. was disappointing to the Temperance people, as that Ward voted for license by a majority of 18, a decrease of eight from the last election.

It is felt that this defeat was due to the fact that a large number of electors who were opposed to licenses neglected to vote and also that the workers in that Ward did not do their election work systematically.

In Ward two the great effects of organization and team work were shown when the returns were counted. The license party were able to poll only 90 votes in this Ward, despite the fact that a large committee were hard at work. The no license party polled 204 votes, giving a majority for no license of 114, a very large increase over the previous election.

WOUNDED IN FRANCE CABLES HOME

M. Mowat Receives Cable That Son is in Bologne Hospital Wounded

M. Mowat, Esq., Wednesday afternoon received a cable message, which read as follows:—
Bologne, France.
In hospital at Bologne seriously injured, not dangerously, feet.

As Mr. Mowat has three sons on the front line at present, Mordion with the Aviation Corps, Lt. Oliver with the Artillery and Lt. Goog with the 26th, he has at present no way of identifying which of his sons is referred to. The supposition is however that it is Oliver, as it is understood that the 26th is in billets at present.

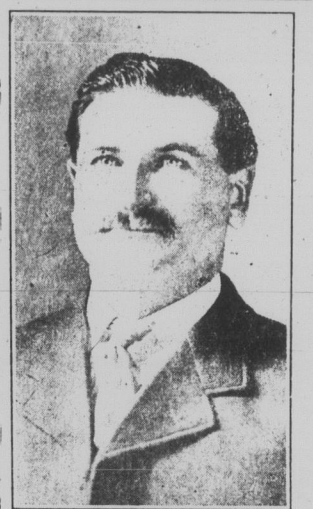

The statements contained in recent issues of the Graphic in reference to the slaughter of big game in this section, have created a good deal of interest, not only in this county, but throughout the entire North Shore, and every week we are being told of additional scenes of slaughter in our woods.

Lumber scalars and others returning from the woods tell unbelievable tales of slaughter. These men are responsible citizens and would not tell untruths about this matter. One man who came out of the woods last week, stated that along one hauling road he counted the carcasses of seven deer which were killed with axes and then the meat wantonly abandoned. Another tells of coming down one of the branches of the Restigouche and counting the killing places of upwards of fifty deer.

The matter is so serious that citizens are asking that a "Royal Commission" to use a very favorite term, be appointed to ascertain what the game wardens of this district are doing to earn the salaries paid to them.

Major General Turner Writes to Col. McAvity in Reference to Good Work

The following letters have been received from Col. McAvity and will be read with interest here:—
Headquarters,
26th Bttn., March 31, 1916.

TO:—
The Editor,
Graphic,
Campbellton, N. B.

Sir:—
It is with pleasure and with considerable pardonable pride, that I attach hereto a copy of a personal letter written by Major-General R. E. W. Turner, V.C., C.B., D.S.O. Commanding 2nd Canadian Division to myself.

This letter was written after we had passed through a trying Winter Campaign and immediately after a particularly hard tour in the trenches, a session during which we had eighteen killed and thirty wounded in three days. Only a week before this we lost two of our best Officers, Major W. H. Belyea and Lieut. H. W. Ferguson.

Knowing that the people of New Brunswick will appreciate information regarding their Battalion at the Front, I take the liberty of sending you this letter.

My Dear Colonel:—
I was very sorry to hear of your bad luck yesterday A. M. and feel keenly with you the loss of so many good men.

Am glad to know, that your Brigade will shortly have the rest, to which it is so well entitled, and no Battalion in the Division is better entitled to it than the 26th Battalion, which has consistently well performed its work, and a bit more.

DAYLIGHT SAVING ADOPTED IN CITIES

St. John and Halifax City Councils in Favor.—Legislation Asked for

St. John, N. B., April 17.—St. John adopted the daylight saving scheme today when the Common Council unanimously placed a bye-law on the civic records providing that the hands of the clock be turned ahead one hour on the last Sunday of April each year until the last Sunday in September. Attorney General Baxter attended the meeting and forecasted provincial legislation along the same line to give documentary status to the new time. A memorial is being sent to the Lieutenant Governor in Council with this aim in view.

Halifax, N.S., April 17.—Halifax has adopted the daylight saving scheme. Following meetings of the Board of Trade and representative business men who favored the change, the matter came before the City Council tonight, and it received the unanimous support of that body. Mayor Martin will issue a proclamation and the new scheme will go into effect on May 1 and continue until September 30.

THE WARS EFFECT ON PAINT

Every one is familiar with the abnormal conditions existing in the business world today, owing to the European conflict. Few lines of merchandise have been affected more than paint products. J. & D. A. Harquail Co., Ltd., who have again made arrangements for the purchase of European paints, varnishes and leads on the market in Campbellton, stated to the "Graphic" that, while the paint markets had been greatly disturbed, with the exception of a few special colors, all supplies could now be obtained and offered at reasonable prices.

"While practically every one is interested in paint," said Mr. Harquail, "few realize that the raw materials for their products come from the other side of the world, and with the worldwide war, many changes in the raw material market have come about."

TREAT SEED OATS FOR SMUT

Last season was particularly favorable to oat smut in the eastern part of Canada, resulting in a great increase of loss from this source. The grain crop will also be worse infected than usual, hence farmers should treat their seed oats very carefully this spring. A small expenditure in time and money may, in this way, increase the yield per acre by five to fifteen bushels.

The prevention for smut, in oats is as follows: On the evening before the seed oats are to be sown prepare a solution of formaldehyde (formalin), 1 pint to 40 gals. of water. Spread the oats five inches deep on the barn floor and sprinkle one gallon of the solution to each bushel. Show the oats thoroughly and cover the pile completely with the oat sacks, blankets, etc. The following morning spread the pile out to dry. Much of the moisture will have been absorbed by the grain, hence the seeder should be regulated to allow for the swelling of the seed.

FAMOUS CHURCH DESTROYED BY FIRE

Rome, April 18.—The ancient cathedral at Andria, near Bari, was destroyed by fire today. The fire began in the residence of the bishop, from which Monsignor Seidi was rescued with difficulty. Andria in the thirteenth century, was a favorite residence of Emperor Frederick II, two of whose wives were buried in the cathedral.

PROHIBITION NOW WITHOUT REFERENDUM

Bill Now Before House Said to Provide For Immediate Prohibition

Fredericton, April 16.—New Brunswick may have prohibition without a referendum if reports which are being quite generally circulated about the legislature to-day prove true. It was expected that the prohibition bill would be brought down to-day, but following the caucus of government supporters last night it was announced that the attorney general would not bring down the measure before Thursday.

It is understood a plan similar to that followed in Ontario, may be adopted here and that the prohibition bill may be passed and brought into effect probably by May 1st next, the end of when people will be called upon to vote whether they wish to have the province continue under prohibition or return to conditions as they are at present or perhaps have a general local option law.

It is understood that there will be another government caucus on the question to-night, but those closely in touch with the situation declare that the plan followed in Ontario will in all probability be adopted for New Brunswick.



It is expected that the House will be engaged to-day very largely with consideration of bills in committee. Some of the measures introduced by Attorney General Baxter last evening are of an important character and may provoke some discussion.



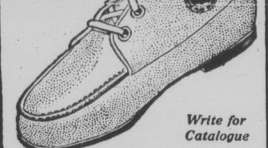

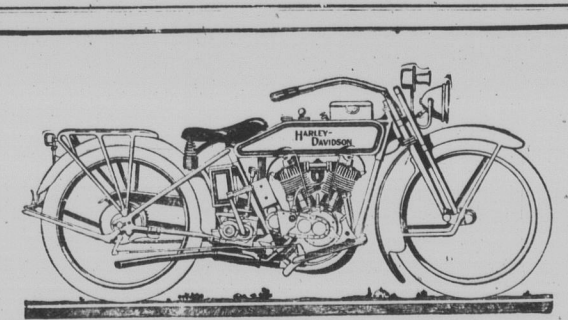
