HAMILTON, Aug. 12.— The seventh annual session of the Dominion Council, Royal Templars of Temperance, convened in the Royal Templar Hall yesterday morning. Every Province was represented in the council. By the report of the officers it is seen that the year, which ended June 30, was more prosperous than any the council. By the report of the officers it is seen that the year, which ended June 30, was more prosperous than any previous year. At the last annual session 16,000 members were reported; this year, according to the books as they appeared on June 30, there was a tax-paying membership of 50,130, and the actual membership was 3,000 in advance of this. During the year the order formed 74 new councils in Outario, 13 in Manitoba, 9 in Quebec, 6 in the Northwest Territories, 4 in New Brunswick and 1 in British Columbia. The present membership is divided as follows in round numbers: Ontario, 16,000; Manitoba, 2,500; Quebec, 2,500; New Brunswick, 1,000; British Columbia, 400; Newfoundland, 150. In the beneficiary department during the year new business to the extent of almost \$750,000 was written, bringing the total insurance up to \$6,000,000. The death rate during the twelve months was barely up to the average of four year past, 6 in 1,000 which is conmonths was barely up to the average of four years past, 6 in 1,000, which is considered very low. The receipts in the beneficiary fund amounted to \$72,349 62, and after paying all death claims there remained a balance of \$27,500 42 to be added to the surplus in the bank. In the general fund the receipts in the Do-In the general rund the receipts in the Bo-minion Secretary's department were \$11,-728 81, and the expenditure \$11,461 20. These figures do not include the receipts and expenditures of the publication de-partment, as follows: Receipts, \$7,271 03; expenditure, \$3,673 71. A Forest Farmer Fooled by London Sharpers—The Culprits Captured and Sentenced. The following is from the People, a London (Eng.) newspaper:

At the Mansion House Police Court, George Mackenzie, 62, and Milliam Hall, 35, were charged before Mr. Alderman Davis with obtaining money by means of the confidence trick. The complainant was John Thomas Kerr, a farmer at Forest, Ontario, Canada, and on, Monday as he was leaving the Tower of London, the prisoner Mackenzie spoke to him, stating that he was a religious philanthropist from Glasgow, and was on a visit to London. Kerr asked him the way to St. Paul's Cathedral, and the prisoner volunteered to accompany him there. Out. St. Paul's Cathedral, and the prisoner volunteered to accompany him there. Outside St. Paul's the prisoner, observing that he was himself a temperance man, invited him to take some refreshment, and they went together to a neighboring tavern. While they were there Hall made his appearance, and asked if they had seen "a lady," whose description he gave them, stating that he had shown her over St. Paul's, and that she had borrowed a sovereign from him, and had then disappeared. Resuming his conversation, Hall stated that he had come to London to secure some property to which his den to secure some property to which his brother laid claim, and which consisted of £36,000 and 36 acres of land. Macket asked him if he was sure of getting the money. Hall replied that he was, and that he had got some already, producing what appeared to be a roll of bank notes. Macenzie warned him not to be so free his money among strangers. Hall that shook hands with Mackenzie and that shook hands with Mackenzie and the prosecutor, and asked the former if he would like a present. Mackenzie said he would like a ring: Hall said his lawyer advised him not to show confidence in strangers unless they could produce some money of their own earnings. Mackenzie showed him what seemed to he a £5 note. After some more conversation, Hall asked the complainant to show him a proof of his confidence, and he would give him a watch. The complainant, at Hall's request, placed his purse, containing some American notes and money, into his (Hall's) American notes and money, into his (Hall's) breast pocket. On this both prisoners left, but they were arrested by Detective-Sergeant Outram and other detectives, who had been watching them the whole time. The purse and money were found on Hall, together with some notes on the "Bank of Engraving." Both prisoners were known to the police, and Mr. Alder man Davies sentenced them, as rogues and vagabonds, each to three months' hard labor.

The deceased, who was in his 73rd year, studied law in his youth, but for over 50 years he devoted his attention to literature, and as a writer of poetry and prose has achieved fame. One of his best known productions was "The Biglow Papers, a witty and humorous satire, mainly directed against slavery and the war with Mexico. From 1857 to 1862 he edited the Atlantic Monthly, and from 1863 to 1874 he was joint editor of the North American retained a high position in the literary world. His death is a distinct loss to

literature. Another death chronicled to-day is that of Mr. Geo. Jones, editor and proprietor of the New York Times. DEATH ON THE TRACK.

William Steel, a London Township Farmer, Killed at Hyde Park Grossing of the London, Huron Grossing of the Lendon, Huron and Bruce Railway.

William Steel, a well-to-do farmer, residing on the fifth concession of London township, met his death Tuesday afternoon at the Hyde Park crossing of the London, Huron and Bruce Railway. 


