Under this amendment the Irish in the House of Commons would number 48, instead of 80, as proposed by the bill.

John Morley. Chief Secretary for Ireland, replied that this proposal was based on no principle of government, and was the result of a desire merely to curtail representation in the House, and could not be accepted by the Government.

Human life is cheap. Men are sacrificed fact was emphasized in the wreck of the British war vessel Victoria. It is still further illustrated in the Chicago Fair calamity, the heartrending details of which have been an order impossible of execution was given by the commander, and a collision resulted. Though the rammed vessel had many bulkhead doors, the object of which was to keep the ship sfloat even after her armor had been pierced, none of these were shut on this occasion, and in a minute or two hundreds of men were carried down to watery graves. In the Chicago catastrophe, the loss of life was not so great, but it seems to us that it was equally unnecessary, and might in a great measure have been avoided if reasonable caution had been taken by the authorities.
