The Turks pulled up to the top of the hill three mountain batteries, singing, laughing, and weeping with joy like children. One battery opened fire upon the Greeks, who were retreating on the plain of Traves, and did terrible execution. The writer saw some of the Turkish shells burst in the middle of the seried battalion of Greeks, with the result that whole groups were killed or wounded. On Sunday evening seven new Turkish battalions and several mounted batteries of artillery left for the scene. At dawn the latter were trained on the Greek blockhouse on the plain below. Junes Effendi, the Turkish commander, and his men had been 26 hours without food or drink. A pair of beagles are then laid on the "scent," and with half a dozen terriers and the cycling huntsmen, start off in hot haste. The "hare" checks the course at intervals with paper, and if he be at all cunning can cut out a very exciting "scent" by going through a wood, crossing a hedge, or wading stream, thus at the same time giving

the dogs a "breather. When the bicycle first appeared in India, it was not at all an uncommon thing for natives to fall down and worship it. Calcutta can probably claim more lady cyclists than any other city in India. They ride very well, too. Bicycles have a rough time in India, chiefly owing to the ignorance of the native servants who clean them.

It is intended to appoint a referee inspector of cheese to settle disputes as to quality between buyers and sellers. Throughout Ontario there are what are known as cheese fairs, attended by sellers and buyers. Cheese is sold subject to inspection, and when the inspector of the buyer comes around to test the purchase he sometimes pronounces it below standard and asks for a reduction in price. Many of the fac-tories have lost large sums by having to submit to such reductions, and the object of the bill is to appoint a man who, in the case of dispute, will de-cide whether the cheese is up to the standard or not, giving reasons for his decision, and if it is up to the standard the buyer shall be required to take it off the hands of the seller at the price agreed upon at the fair.



They have listened patiently to advocates of increases, but have granted few of the requests. One of the members said that the bill would be a revenue bill, and not a prohibitive bill. The committee has actically agreed upon a modification f the retroactive clause of the Ding-Bill, which, it is hoped, will b

Capture of Damasi Changes the Situation.

The Sultan's Troops May Find Themselves in a Trap.

Strategic value of Prevesa Which the Greeks Appear Likely to Capture.

The Fortunes of War So Far Pretty Evenly Divided.

Athens, April 21 .- The news of the capture of Damasi puts a new complexion upon the situation on the frontier, is a great encouragement to the Government, and is likely to have the most exhilarating effect upon the spirits of the Greeks, who had been greatly depressed by the reverses of their troops at Milouna Pass. This success and the fact that the fall of Prevesa seems imminent virtually offsets the calamity at Milouna. If the Greek divisions effect a union at Damasi, as is expected, there is almost nothing in the way of their prompt advance to Elassona.

BETWEEN TWO FIRES. If Tyrnavo falls into the hands of Edhem Pasha and the Turkish troops sweep down upon the plain and advance to Larissa to meet the force oncentrated there under the Crown Prince, they will be between two grand divisions of the Greek army. This seems to have been the object of the Greek strategy. Should the Greeks succeed in reducing the forts at Prevesa, as now seems probable, and ccupying the town with the large land force co-operating with the bombard ing warships, the road to Janina would open and the Turkish troops Epirus placed at the most serious dis-

STRATEGIC VALUE OF PREVESA. The strategic value of Prevesa to the Turkish division in ... bania is that as long as it remains in the hands of the Turks it makes possible a steady line of munitions and food supplies. With Prevesa in the hands of the Greeks the line would be promptly cut, and it would be practically impossible to re-victual the Turkish troops by the long land route through Macedonia. On the other hand, the Greek troops could be revictualed by the sea.


