

Thomas sold some of the rarities of his splendid library. The buyers quickly noticed that the volumes bore the stamp of the Ecole des Beaux-Arts, and informed Mme. Thomas. She was horrifled at the only possible conclusion, namely, that her husband had stolen the books from the library, to which his official position gave him access. She at once restored 36 volumes, which she found also bore the Ecole stamp. and which alone were worth \$20,000. It appears that M. Thomas dared not abstract some of the greatest treasures, and actually went to the length

of mutilating them by cutting out the priceless engravings which adorned them. His friends, however, declare that the volumes must have been mutilated before he took them. Among the books purloined was the only volume extant of one of the first ediions of "La Fontaine."



One of the most stirring stories which Capt. Graham has to tell is of a journey to Mackenzie Bay which he made with his wife in the year 1900, on which occasion they were deserted by their companions. They came back the next year, after reaching their destination and accumulating a lot of valuable furs.


It was on the return trip in the spring of 1901 that the captain and his wife met with the most interesting adventure. They had to go down the Porcupine hundreds of miles to Yukon, and for this purpose they built a rude scow. They were assisted by the natives, who, however, did not know anything about handling tools. Their building material consisted of a whip-saw, a hand-saw, a hatchet, a hammer and a brace and bit. The process of building this boat was exceedingly interesting. When finished It was 30 feet long at the top and 24 at the bottom. It was 6 feet wide at the top and 4 at the bottom. No nails were available, and the timbers were fastened together by boring holes with the brace and bit and plugging these with wooden spikes. The natives were set to work gathering gum from the pine trees and with this the boat was made water tight, after the seams had been filled with pieces of quilt and

blanket. "The chief told us we would never get down the river in safety. He indicated that there were falls two sleeps away,' and that the 'Big White Chief' (God) would get us for sure. However, we launched our boat and set out. The current carried us rapidly along.

"At last we came to a canyon, and we were going down it at the rate of


