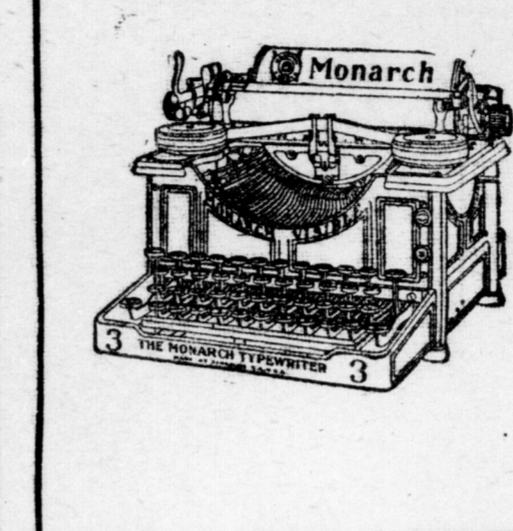
LATE PERCY TRACY BURIED IN LONDON

Power of Nation Will Disappear Unless Sterility Stops, Says Klotz. Paris, France, Nov. 24.—The birth-rate of France was lower by more than 100,000 in 1911 than in 1901.

FRENCH-CANADIANS IN SCHOOL PROTEST

A Resolution Passed at Ottawa Against Whitney's Bilingual Regulations.

Ottawa, Nov. 24. — About 1,600 young French-Canadians, the majority from the city, but a number from outside places, met in the Monument Nationale yesterday afternoon, listened to addresses and passed resolutions expressive of their protest against the new regulations of that Ontario Government in regard to bilingual schools.

The meeting was in connection with a movement known as L'Association Catholique de la Jeunesse Canadienne Française, a new society of young men formed mainly to represent the feeling of French-Canadian youth in regard to Ontario educational matters. The speakers were in the main young men, members of the association, but also included several from Quebec and the west, as well as Trustee S. M. Genest, of the Separate school board, Jules Tremblay and others.

Several references were made to the names of Sir Richard Scott, Dr. A. Froeland and Trustee Armstrong, the three being linked together as benefactors of Ontario French-Canadians.

TWO FORMER PASTORS SPOKE IN CHURCH

Educational Sunday in the First Methodist Church Proved Unique.

Educational Sunday was observed in the First Methodist Church when two former divines of the local church, Rev. John W. Graham, D.D., and Rev. Geo. Daniel, Ph.D., preached to large congregations. Dr. Graham gave a resume of the progress of the Methodist Church, and stated that since "progress" was the word of the age, and to keep up with the advance of Canadian growth, it was essential to provide a more thorough religious training to cope with the situation. The foreign colonies which are being established in such large quantities in the West was another factor, which, if it was to be met with successfully, also demanded training.

To show the progress of the Methodist Church in the prairie provinces, Dr. Daniel stated that they were now 30 more ministers in the field in Saskatchewan and Alberta than the whole Canadian Methodist Church could claim 25 years ago. In 1907 the maximum amount of money lent to students was \$10,000, but this grant under a new system amounted to \$18,000. The students, who were located in the West, were a fine set of young men and a credit to the church.

Dr. Daniel thought that there were many members in the congregation who were not using the church as their means warranted them to do. Their incomes had been materially increased, but the church was not receiving its proper share of the increase. The speaker also paid a high tribute to the ability of the large choir, and said it was second to none in the country.

"BE PREPARED," SAID REV. FATHER O'CONNOR

Death Will Come to All Alike and No One Knows When.

Rev. Father O'Connor, one of the professors in the Roman Catholic Seminary of London, preached to the children at the 9 o'clock mass on Sunday in St. Mary's Church, East London. "There are some things in this life which you may avoid," he told the little ones; "but the one thing you are certain of is death. This is why the Catholic Church begins her year, namely the first Sunday of Advent, with the reading of the gospel of the general judgment, and ends her year, which occurs on the last Sunday after Pentecost, with the reading of the same gospel. Her reason is plain: First and last, she wishes to remind you and that to be saved means to be prepared. No man or person, can save another. You cannot save me. I cannot save you. We must save ourselves. Be prepared, for you know not the day nor the hour."

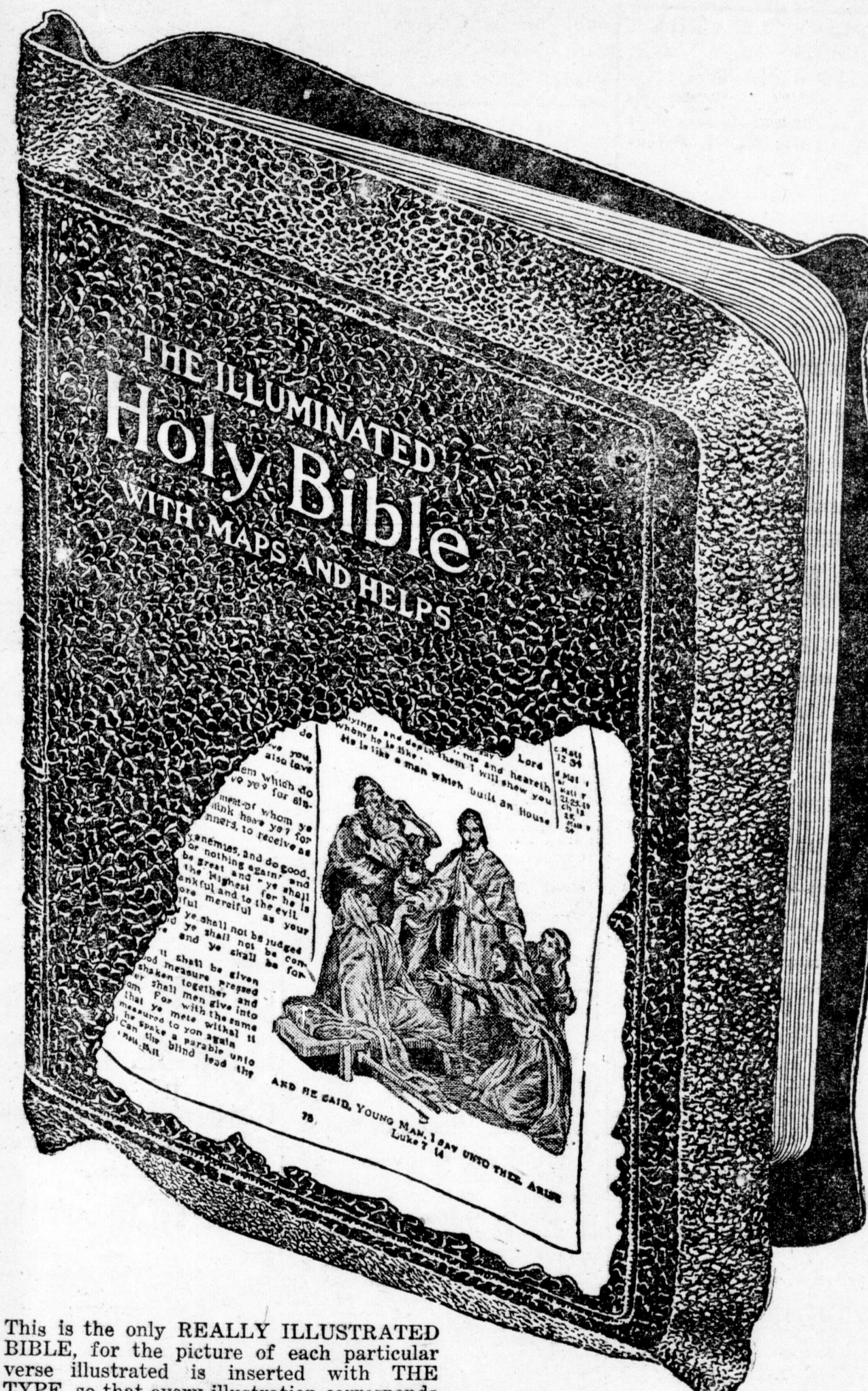
