





His physicians confess that the King suffering from an attack of bronitis, and that his condition "causes anxiety." The anxiety will exd to all parts of the Empire, and be shared in almost an equal dee in France, where the King has en always held in peculiar favor. mpathy and interest will be excited all countries, for no other sovereign so universally known and admired. The King has been so active since ascended the throne that his subets have not looked upon him as a eteran. He was born in November, 41, in the palace where he now lies Few men have worn their years so lightly. His rapid recovery from the surgical operation performed on his duties and pleasures.

The King's serious indisposition at this particular time will carry consternation into social circles, and into shopkeeping London, as there can be no "season" without the active participation of royalty. P., a typical squire, has even raised the question in the House of Commons. He wants to know whether British landowners are "to be taxed at the bidding of American millionaires.

They have only a feeling of amused surprise at the manner in which Mr. Fels chooses to spend his money. Unloading his surplus wealth in exploiting an idea happens to be Mr. Fels' form of dissipation. It may seem foolish or quixotic to some people, but it will stand comparison with the recreations of some of his fellowmillionaires, epsecially the Pittsburg

THE DRYDOCK SUBSIDIES.

The Government resolutions regardng subsidies to dry docks take account of the fact that the constantly increasing size of steamships has necessitated the construction of larger docks. This need is emphasized by the country's naval policy. New dry docks are imperative for the ships of our own navy and for receiving and repairing any ships of the British navy which may be employed on Canada's

As explained by Hon. Mr. Fielding, the intention is to divide our dry docks into three classes—first, a dock for general and naval purposes, the subsidy to be 31/2 per cent for a period of 35 years and the maximum cost \$4,000,000; the second class a smaller dock, the cost not to exceed \$2,500,000 and the subsidy 31/2 per cent for 20 ears, and the third class, a still smaller dock, of a maximum cost of \$1,500,-000, the subsidy being 3 per cent for 20 years as heretofore. The first-class dock must be capable of receiving for purposes of repair the largest ship in the British navy, and it is because it will involve a very large outlay that the subside has been made larger than for the other classes.



The corn beef may be a piece of the aitch roast or the fatter brisket, or a shoulder roast. It should be washed, put into boiling water, and cooked gently about four hours for a 6 to 8 pound piece. Add the cabbage cut up an hour before the meat will be done. Serve the meat surrounded by the cab-

For the ice cream, bring one quart of rich milk to the boil, add a cupful of very strong, freshly made coffee. Mix a saltspoonful of salt, half a cup of sugar and three tablespoonfuls of flour with the cold milk, add a little of the boiling milk, and return all to the milk pot and cook 20 minutes, stirring until smooth and thickened. Add two eggs beaten with another half-cup of sugar and stir in only long enough to cook the egg. Freeze

COOKING RECIPES

One cupful of sugar, one-half of butter, one-half cupful of molasses, one cupful of boiling water, two level teaspoonfuls of soda in water, two eggs beaten light, one teaspoonful of cinnamon, one teaspoonful of allspice, two cupfuls of flour. Frosting-Make a boiled frosting, and add one cupful of chopped raisins.

Apple Whip.

Set a pint of sweetened apple sauce in the ice chest until very cold. Beat the whites of four eggs stiff. Into the stiffened whites whip the apple sauce by the spoonful until all is used. Fill glasses with the mixture, and put a spoonful of sweetened whipped cream on top of each glass.

Scalloped Potatoes.

Parboil white potatoes and slice them thin. Melt in a saucepan a generous tablespoonful of butter and fry in this two sliced onions.
