

## **Allies Enter Combles** As Climax of Dashing Sweep Over Positions

Anglo-British Forces Move in Concerted Attack Upon Town, Which Stood Like Rock in Torrent-Large Captures of Men and Supplies Reported by Commander.

London, Sept. 26 .- 2 p.m. .- The British have entered Combles, on the Somme front, the war office announced today, and are overcoming the resistance of the Germans.

More than 1,500 prisoners, taken in the fighting of the last twenty-four hours, have already been counted, and a large amount of war material has been captured. The an-

"Yesterday's operations were entirely successful. The preparation and execution of the attack by the artillery and infantry and the co-operation between them were in all respects admirable. More than 1,500 prisoners already have passed through the collecting stations, and more are arriving. Much war material has been captured, but the amount cannot yet be estimated."

"Further progress has been made during the night and this morning. A strong redoubt which had held out between Les Boeufs and Gueudecourt, now has been captured, and the garrison made prisoners.

Moving Guns Out.
Early yesterday afternoon the Germans are reported to have begun moving out of Combles a number of guns. This occurred before the British had taken Morval or the French had reached the outskirts of Fregicourt. The village of Fregicourt is on the road from Combles to Saillisel the only road which, before yesterday's batle, the Germans could use to evacuate Combles. The road is

now swept by the fire of the French Worse Than Precarious, From the south of Morval, held by the British, to the French posi-tions south of Fregicourt, a distance of only about 1,800 yards, was the only part of the loop around Combles which it remained to close. That is now practically accomplished since the fire of the English and French crosses and the situation of the Germans in Combles is worse than precari in the view of the allied officers.

Long Message to Brother Escaped Eye of German Censor -Asked for Bag of Sugar, But Cream Cheese Proved Quite as Efficacious.

When Pte. M. C. Simmons of Delmer, Oxford County, conceived his clever

and daring plan to escape from the German prison camp at Giessen, he asked for a bag of sugar. Instead he got a cream cheese from his brother at Delmer,

to whom he wrote. The cheese was of good Canadian make and contained a compass and map. That was all that was needed. On the inside of an envelope he wrote his request, a letter in itself, but it escaped the eye of the German censor. This was the secret message, written in a very small hand: THE SECRET MESSAGE. "Last fall another fellow and I escaped and when taken were almost to the Black forest, which stretches up to Switzerland. We were gone five nights and traveling all the hours of darkness and were only taken by an accident. This coming summer I am going to try it again. with another \$117,000 asked for. Neither of these sums include about \$35,000 hidden in the expenditure on the hydro sub-station, a clever piece of financing that does justice to the methods of those behind the scheme. Nor do the figures include over \$200,000 that Provincial Auditor Clancy declared in the Legislature had been paid over to the London and Port Stanley Railway out of provincial bydro funds. (Str Adam Beck said this sum was paid back.) The grand total is close to \$1,400 .-000, or double the amount of money voted by the citizens for the electrification of the London and Port Stanley Railway

Much of this money was voted by the people. If the citizens want to vote that much for such a project, that is their business. They have had the right to do so, and they were at least given an opportunity to say whether or not they were willing to expend that sum of

The fact remains, however, that large sums have never been voted on by the people. There was an issue of \$39,000 for extensions, on which the people were not "trusted." There was another issue of \$60,000, on the merits of which the ratepayers had no chance to express an opinion. Now the London and Port Stanley Railway commissioners are asking the city to give them \$117,000 additional for the line. Nearly \$200,000 will thus be expended. The people can be trusted on every other subject but the London and Port Stanley. ## Line Pushed Back From Martinpuich to Peronne; Strong Positions Captured

British Penetrate More Than a Mile and Take Two Strongly-Fortified Villages and Several Lines of Trenches-French Extend Gains Beyond Road Leading to Peronne.

LONDON, Sept. 26, 1 a.m. -The British troops have captured the villages of Morval and Lesboeufs, together with several lines of trences, on a six-mile front between Combles and Martinpuch, south of the Ancre river, says the official report from British headquarters issued about midnight. This front was penetrated to a depth of more than a mile. Many prisoners were taken and heavy losses were inflicted on the Germans.

Lines of Trenches Taken. The text reads:

"South of the Ancre our troops atwhere successful. Enemy positions were stormed on a front of about six miles, between Combles and Martinto a depth of more than strongly-fortified villages of Mon eral lines of trenches, have fallen into


